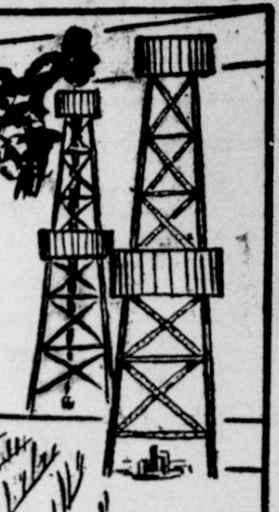

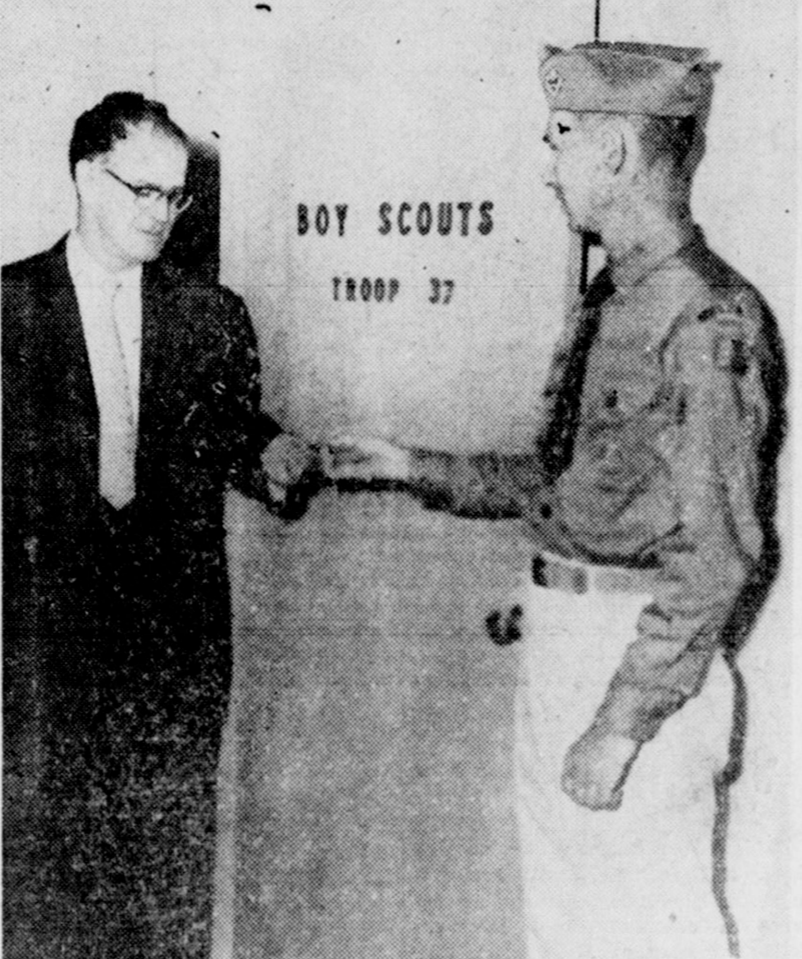

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Stubble mulching is a year-round way of managing crop residues and stubble to lease residues of previous crop on soil surface until seeding time, according to Soil Conservation Service technicians.

Farmers have found the practice to be an effective control of wind and water erosion. Left on the surface, the plant residues keep water from compacting the soil and from detaching soil particles. Amounts of residue on the soil surface that are necessary for protection vary with the soil, but disc type plows cover about one-half the stubble at each plowing. Plows with 32-inch sweeps or larger only cover about 10 per cent of residue, conservationists point out.

To control weeds and conserve moisture, farmers usually want to plow three or four inches deep most of the time. But a deeper cultivation is necessary and it should be done at first or second plowing.

Ralph Swinford, SCD supervisor in Friberg-Cooper community, has made plans to use 42-inch sweeps with rolling coulters. Dan Flippen will stubble mulch more than 200 acres.

The crop on Albert Brockriede's farm near Electra will make good wheat following good stubble mulching.

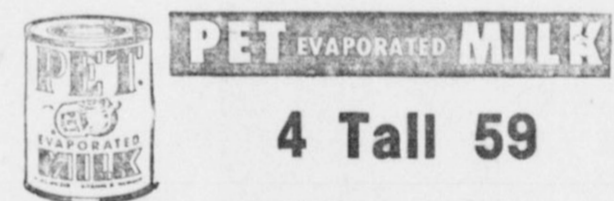

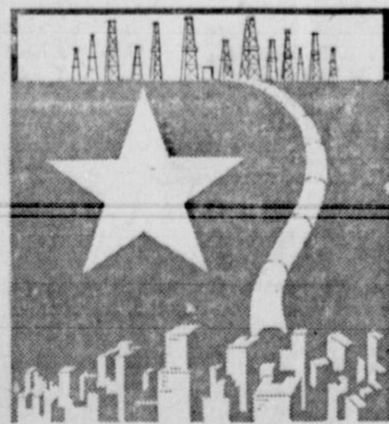
