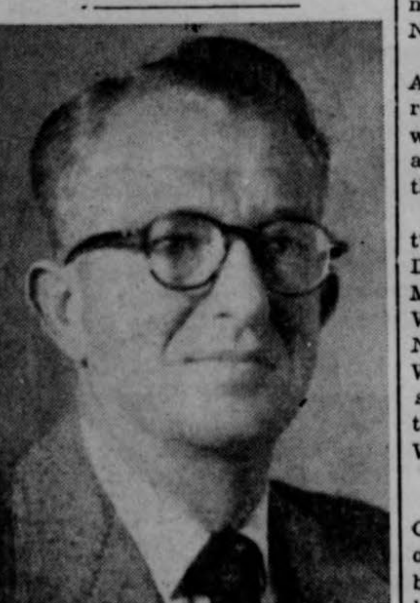

School News

Supt. Keith D. Swim has announced the Iowa Park schools will open Tuesday, Sept. 6. The school board voted to have a two day holiday for Thanksgiving on Thursday and Friday, Nov. 24-25.

The Christmas holidays will coincide with those at Sheppard AFB. The dates will be determined later.

A group of school trustees plan to visit Jacksboro's school plant this Friday. They will inspect the gymnasium, band and agriculture shops.

The local school board plans to have a public meeting in the near future, at which they will give a complete detailed report on plans looking into the future on building needs of the system.

With the growth of Iowa Park there is a consequent growth in enrollment at the school, and plans must be made to take care of the needs of our citizens of tomorrow.

The two temporary units are already near completion. These self-contained units will house the two first grades this next school year.

The board recently voted to buy a new 16 mm. moving picture projector and a new 48 passenger school bus with a Ward body and a Ford chassis.

Mrs. A. R. Baldwin, first grade teacher here last year, has resigned to accept a position in the City View school.

Miss Ethyle Kidwell, principal of the elementary school, reminds all parents of students entering the first grade in September, that the pupils must be immunized against diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough, and bring certificates of such immunization.

The student is also required to bring a birth certificate. Miss Kidwell suggests that parents have photostatic copies made of the birth certificates as the school will need to hold the certificates for a length of time.

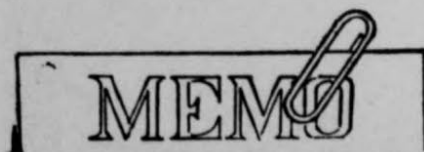

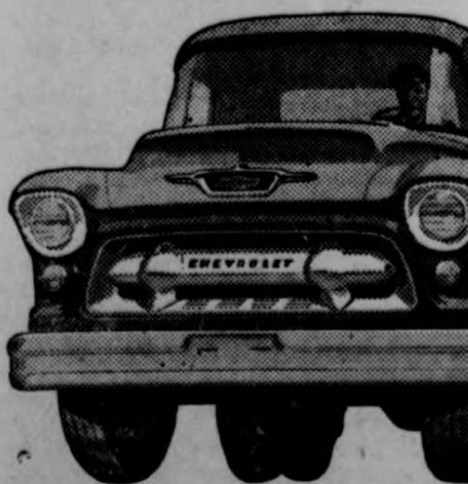

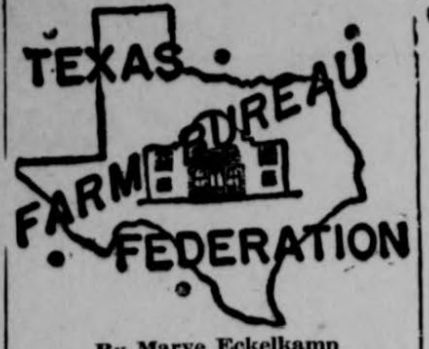

At the recent session of the state legislature, the Texas Farm Bureau was successful in defeating an ad valorem tax using the urgency of a water program to promote the shifting of taxation back to real property.

This proposal for financing a water program would have been beneficial to the Gulf Coast industries only, yet this constitutional amendment would have placed an assessment of 3 cents per \$100 valuation on all real property in the state, had it passed. This money would have been used for bonds to build dams and reservoirs to conserve more water.

No one in this section of the state would have received benefits whatever, but would be helping foot the bill. The main reason for our not benefitting from this proposed tax bill lies in the fact that you cannot build a dam without a permit from the board of water engineers.

This board cannot issue a permit unless there is unallocated water available in the rivers or streams in Texas. There is no unallocated water running around loose in the state. Consequently, the people who now have permits but are not using all of the water granted them in these permits are the only ones who stood to profit from this proposed legislation, mainly the Gulf Coast industries.

Farm Bureau favored another proposed constitutional amendment which, had it passed, would have authorized the legislature to make an appropriation to the extent of one-third of the indebtedness of a water district. This would have prevented special interest groups from getting their foot in the door for shifting the burden of taxation from natural resources back to real property owners by increasing the state ad valorem taxes, but at the same time would have provided for water districts and the state water conservation program.

FORMER PARKAN DIES AT WICHITA FALLS

Funeral services were held for Mrs. Nancy Peveler, 86, of Wichita and formerly a resident of Iowa Park, Monday at the First Methodist church in Wichita Falls. Burial was in Highland cemetery here.

Mrs. Peveler died at her home Friday, July 8.

She was born Nov. 2, 1889 in Elmora City, Okla. The Peveler family lived in Iowa Park in the 1920's, later moving to Wichita.

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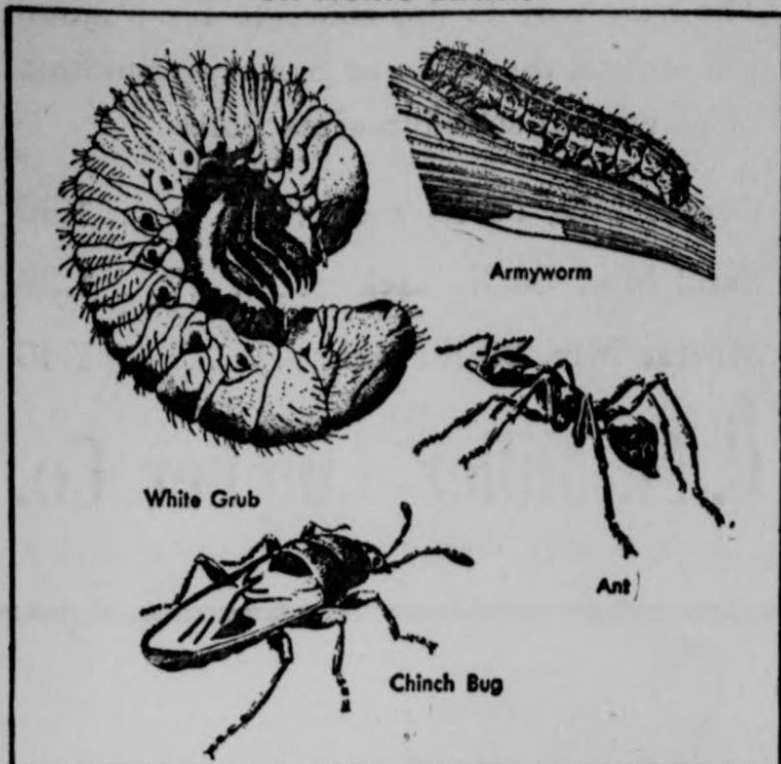
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Wrecking Crew Now at Work on Home Lawns

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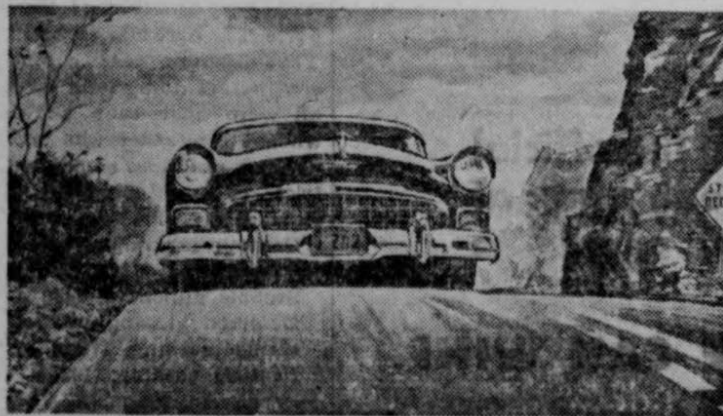
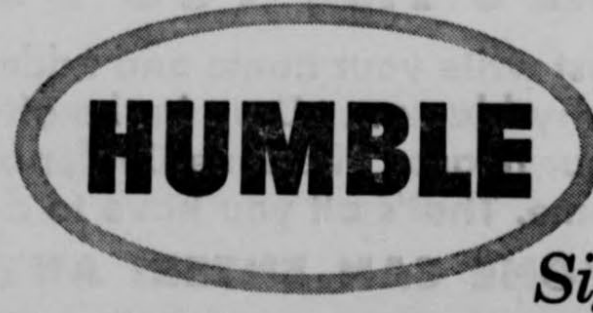


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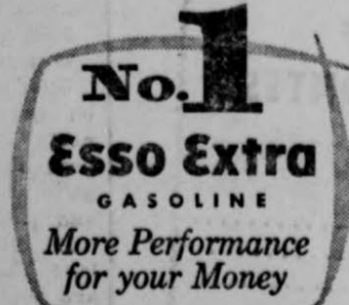
