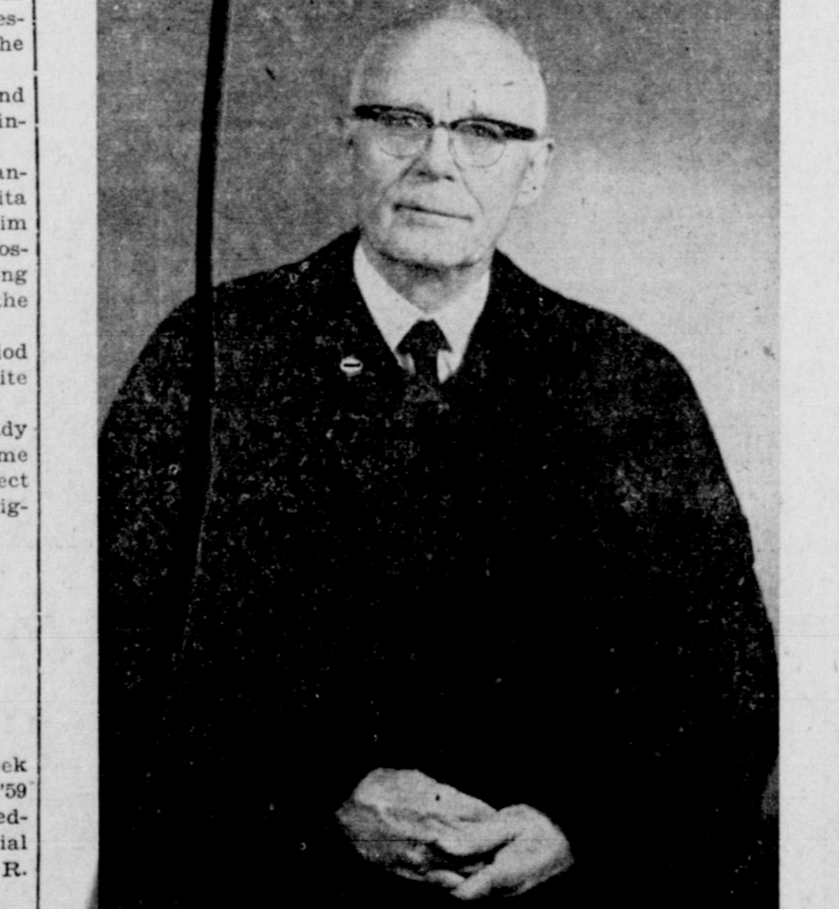

Rabbits and Rats

Final plans have been completed for a series of Rabbit Control meetings next Wednesday and Thursday, according to B. T. Haws, Wichita county agent.

V. R. Smith of the Rodent Control Service in Fort Worth will be here to conduct the meetings. Poison will be available at the demonstrations only.

Smith will demonstrate the use of strychnine and oats as a rabbit bait. This measure has proved itself effective in other counties.

Haws says he knows of no adverse effects from the use of this combination. The bait is not put out in large enough amounts to hurt livestock, and it will not kill quail.

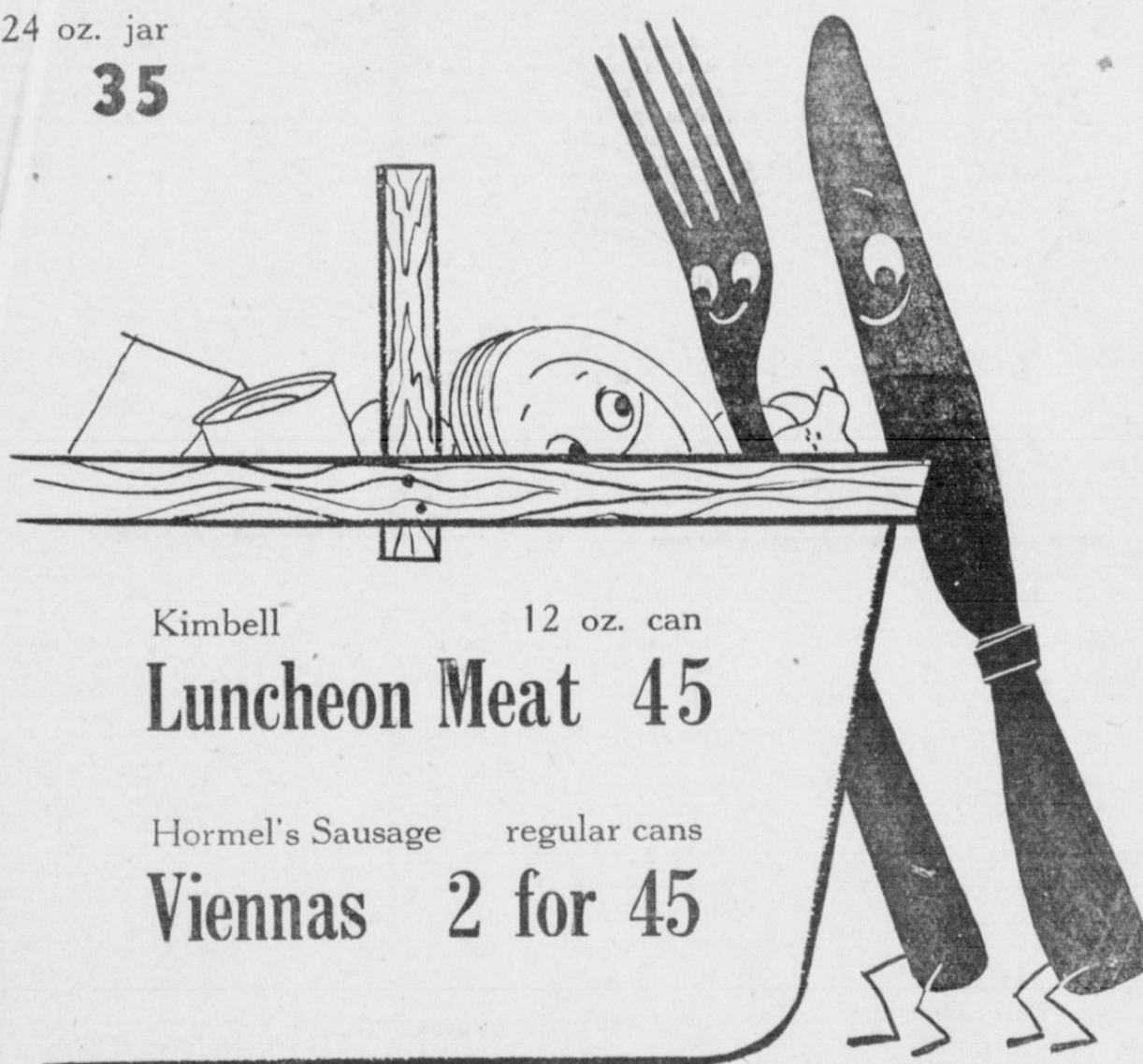

BASIC ROAD SIGN SHAPES:

Octagon—which means Stop. Round—first railroad crossing warning.

White crossback—last railroad warning.

Diamond—dangerous or unusual conditions ahead.

Triangle—yield right of way. Rectangle—speed limits, passing regulations and similar laws.

To learn where chiggers are harboring, stand a piece of black cardboard on end where you suspect their presence. If after a few moments you see tiny yellowish or pinkish mites accumulating on the upper edge, you know it's time to check your supply of insecticide.

Light applications of sulphur dust on lawns and low branches of shrubs have been used successfully for years to control chiggers. Nowadays the new insecticides such as chlordane and lindane give better results. Just follow the directions on the label.

A quick word of caution: Be sure to avoid unnecessary exposure to the insecticide. If you spill the concentrated material on your skin wash it off immediately. And be sure to keep children and pets out of the yard until the spray dries.
