Whole World Hears of Leaking Ammonia Tank in Iowa Park

Near tragedy struck Iowa Park last Friday afternoon, and Our Town was mentioned in newspapers, over radio and television, all over the nation.

Local folk are receiving letters and clippings from friends everywhere, all concerned with the welfare of Park folk.

Cause of it all was a broken gasket on the liquid level gauge of a 6,000-gallon tank of anhydrous ammonia on the south side of the Burlington Lines railway just east of Northwest Materials company's Red-E-Mix plant.

Deadly fumes of ammonia spread toward the south and east, causing many residents to leave home and seek shelter for the night with friends and relatives in other parts of town.

Volunteer firemen were called to the scene and kept several streams of water playing on the tank and the escaping ammonia to cut the fire and poison danger.

Firemen from Sheppard AFB joined in the work of wetting down the liquid as it escaped from the long cigar-like tank.

When the tank began to leak about 5:00 p.m. Friday, liquid ammonia poured out, to present a deadly threat. Quick action of the firemen brought the danger under control.

After 1:30 a.m. Saturday, Malcolm Wilson, representative of the Southern Fertilizer and Chemical company of Dallas, and L. E. Tibbals of the New Ice company of Wichita Falls, began pumping the liquid from the leaking tank into smaller tanks, and the immediate danger was relieved.

The Circle L Cafe, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Lindley, stayed open all night and served free coffee and meals to the firemen, police highway workers assembled for the emergency.

Your Volunteer Fire Department

What does the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department mean to you as a buyer of fire insurance, and as a protection of your life and property?

This also pertains to you if you have property within five miles of the city limits, when buying fire insurance. If your life or property are in danger, we are always at your disposal.

The following figures are based upon insurance bought for the year of 1958:

No. 1. Fire insurance premiums for the city of Iowa Park in 1958 totaled \$30,000.

No. 2. The key rate until April 1, 1959 was 43 cents. If there was no recognized fire department the key rate would be 81 cents or more. Let us look at this:

A key rate of 43 cents cost in 1958 — \$30,001.

A key rate of 81 cents would have been \$11,400 more.

The fire department alone does not get you all this credit, but

most of it. Let us break this down to see some of the items:

A. The 4 hours drill each month is \$600 to \$1500 a year.

B. The equipment being properly maintained is \$600 to \$1500 a year. This is just a few of the ways the department saves you money.

One cannot put dollars and cents values on the life and property we are always ready to protect or save.

Let us discuss some ways of getting fire insurance credits. In other words—ways of saving you more money:

A. One paid fireman on duty—\$1800 a year.

B. A pumper fire truck that would meet state requirements—\$600 a year.

C. Sending a fireman to the annual fireman's training school—\$600 a year.

These are approximate figures based upon the year 1958.

Many Friends Here Mourn Death of Mrs. Bradford

The entire community was saddened Sunday morning, Aug. 9, by news of the death of Mrs. W. R. Bradford in a Wichita Falls hospital. Death came after a long illness but until June of this year she not only faced life courageously and cheerfully, but taught youth wisely and tenderly, stimulating them to noblest in life and character and exerted herself to the utmost to throw helpful influences about her family and friends.



Mrs. Bradford, formerly Miss Chester Maggie Balch, was born in Aurora, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Balch, pioneer residents of this area.

She was graduated from Boyd high school and attended North Texas State college at Denton. Later Mrs. Bradford received a bachelor of arts degree from Midwestern university in Wichita Falls.

She was married April 30, 1916, at Boyd to W. R. Bradford, who was superintendent of Iowa Park schools for 30 years. The Bradfords came to Iowa Park in 1920 and except for two years, one in Panhandle and one in Wichita Falls, they resided here until 1953, when Bradford resigned. They moved to Wichita Falls and resided at 1107 Brook.

Mrs. Bradford taught at Iowa Park, Byers, Bridgeport, Sheppard AFB, Randlett (Okla.) and Wichita Falls. She served as principal of Howard rural school in Wichita county for three years.

During the years her love for children and interest in the profession manifested itself in the tasks she performed in addition to teaching duties. She was school custodian, dietitian and cook, preparing and serving the children's lunches daily.

After moving to Wichita Falls, Mrs. Bradford served as substitute teacher there for three years. For the past two years she was a regular teacher and had been offered a contract for the coming school term.

Mrs. Bradford was a member of 10th and Broad Church of Christ in Wichita Falls. She was also a member of the Iowa Park Eastern Star and a former member of the 23 Study club.

In paying tribute to a virtuous woman King Lemuel said: "Her children arise up and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praiseth her." Mrs. Bradford was truly a jewel in the hearts of her husband and daughter, yet always holding herself in the background.

Mr. Bradford said a large measure of his success can be attributed to Chester's helpfulness. During their connection with the local schools, Mrs. Bradford worked untiringly with school banquets, programs and trips and co-operated, in every way with the board of trustees for the betterment of the school.

In Mrs. Bradford, a woman of energy, ideals, influence, achievement, capacity and consecration, we are given an example of loyalty, purity, patience and worth and of beautiful devotion to family and friends.

Funeral rites were conducted at First Baptist church in Iowa Park Tuesday afternoon. Glenn Owen, local Church of Christ minister, assisted.

Interment was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

Survivors include Mr. Bradford; a daughter Mrs. John Guthrie of Denver, Colo. (A small daughter Mary Katherine died in 1933); four sisters: Mrs. Dewey Gardner of Seymour, Mrs. Minnie Edwards of Rhome, Mrs. Ray Riggs of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Albert Yarbrough of Wichita Falls; two brothers: Fred Balch of Clovis, N.M., and Ed Balch of Byers; two grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews.

Chester's thoughts were always centered around Bob's work in the school. Her devotion to and concern for all problems relating to the school, the students and the faculty was evidenced in all she did.

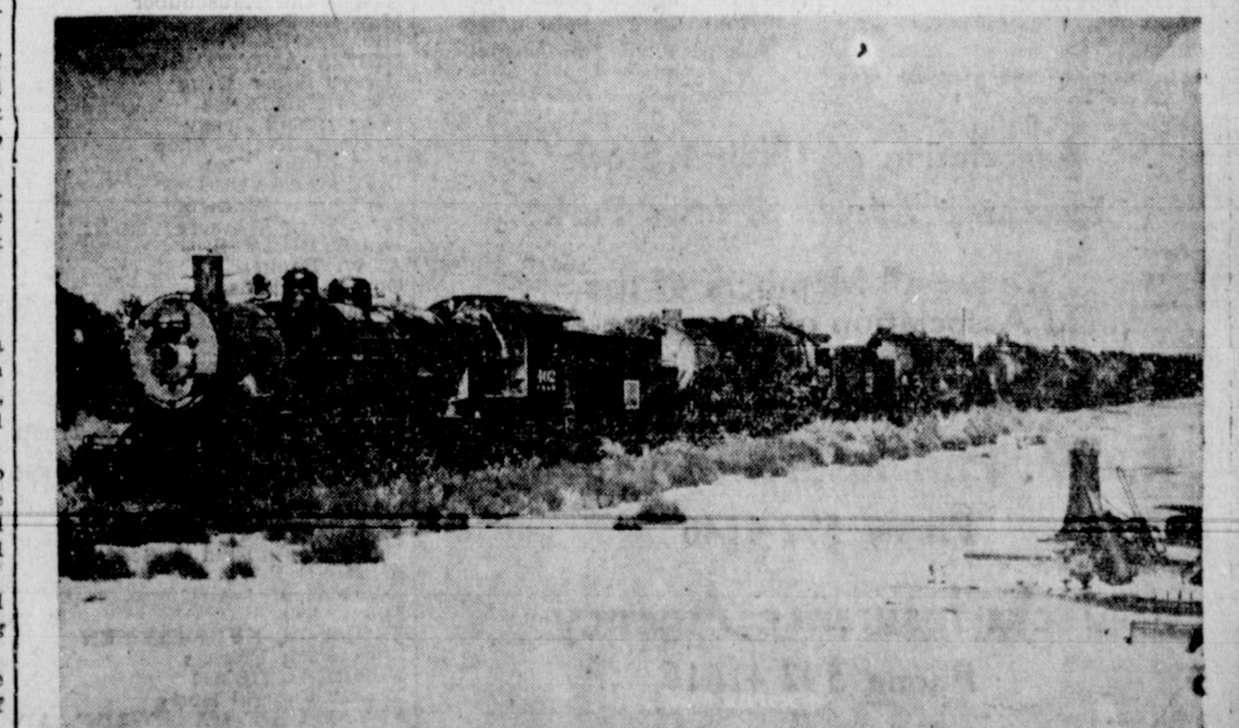
In the classroom as a teacher, her love and interest for children served as a tribute to the teaching profession.

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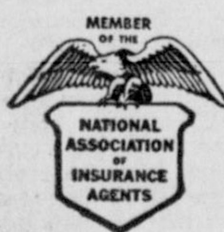

Bill Ballard of Wichita Falls, assistant probation officer for Wichita county, was guest speaker for the Lions club luncheon Tuesday. His talk was entitled "The Verdict Is 'Guilty'—What Now?"

Ballard said most people's reaction to that question runs either to tear gas or tear ducts. There are those who want only retribution for crime committed; and there are those who have only sympathy for wrongdoers.

But there is a third answer—reclamation. Such a program, the reclaiming of mixed-up young folk cost money and takes trained personnel — and Texas is not yet ready for such a program.

Ballard pointed out that it is false economy to turn down the opportunity of saving hundreds of young people from lives of crime. It costs several thousands of dollars to convict a man of a felony, plus \$250 a year to keep him in the penitentiary, plus a large sum to aid his dependents while he is away.

In discussing juveniles, Ballard pointed out that 95 per cent do not get into trouble. He deals with the other 5 per cent. And in many of these problems there has not been enough research made for anybody to come up with answers.

Girls do not get much if any schooling. Even daughters of the well-to-do are not encouraged to

stay long in school. Until recently few women worked in stores. Their place is in the home, and that's where they can be found.

Although most houses in Iraq are poorly built, the women are good housekeepers.

Men do all the visiting, and they never stay more than an hour. Her description of bargaining in the market places was amusing and enlightening.

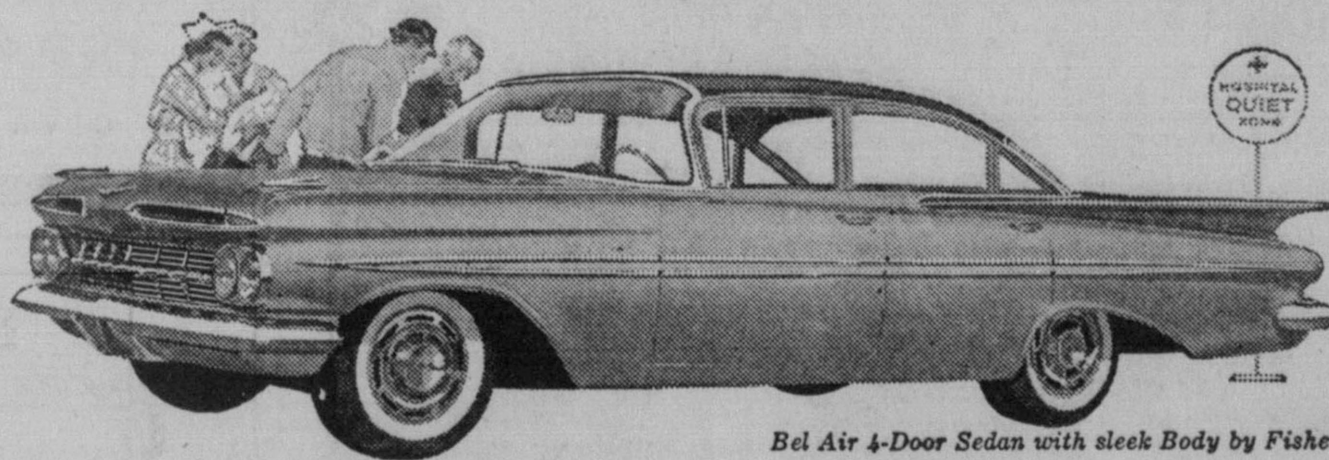

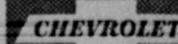
