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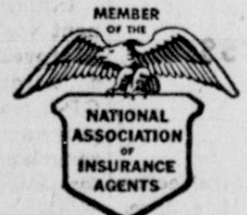

Scores of new laws passed during the regular legislative session ending in May go into effect this month.

From here on, anyone convicted of four moving traffic violations within 12 months will be classed a "habitual violator," subject to suspension of his drivers license for any period up to a year. Same rule applies to anyone convicted of seven or more violations committed within a 24-month period.

New, tightened laws are in effect on the waterways, too. Now against the law are: Operating a boat or skiing while under the influence of liquor, skiing at night, and "reckless or negligent" boating or skiing.

Now required by law are: A life preserver for every passenger on a boat and a lighting system, according to size, for every boat.

Boat registration fees will not be required until next April.

A new law makes taking a ride in someone else's car without his permission a felony offense.

Ranchers and farmers will be required to fence land along state and federal highways to prevent cattle from roaming on the road. Law does not apply to farm-to-market roads.

Retail merchants no longer may advertise goods at "wholesale" prices. Only firms that sell only to retailers may claim wholesale selling.

The new "stick with the party" law requires that a poll tax holder have his receipt stamped with the party name the first time he participates in a primary or convention. From then on, he's a member of that party until he gets a new poll tax receipt.

A new program to inspect for cattle disease at livestock auctions was authorized, but it was given only a fraction of the money supporters said was necessary.

No. 1,000,000

A milestone in modern Texas criminology was reached recently as the Texas department of public safety filed its one-millionth criminal fingerprint record.

The card number 1,000,000 was that of a 15-year-old boy who was arrested for theft and later released.

Collection of criminal fingerprints began on August 10, 1935, with establishment of the bureau of identification.

In addition to the million cards representing those who have run afoul of the law across the state, there are more than half a million "repeater" cards representing extra contacts. These are received from local enforcement agencies at a rate of about 8000 a month. All are kept on file for reference.

During the first half of this year, major crime increased more than 6 per cent, with a 20 per cent hike in both murder and rape.

fire from your face to prevent breathing flames and gases. Inhaling flames and gases is more deadly than burns.

9. If you have to find your way out of a smoke-filled room or building, remember the least dangerous air is near the floor. Crawl on hand and knees, head down. If you must dash through flame or smoke, hold your breath or hold a wet handkerchief or towel over your mouth and nose to help prevent inhaling hot, toxic gases.

10. Think about what you and your family would do if fire struck in your home tonight. Plan your course of action now—in advance. Figure out a means of escape from every room in your home.

1. Remain calm. Do not get excited. Think.
2. Clear home or building of all occupants.
3. Call the fire department at once. In Iowa Park the number is 592-4321.
4. Use available fire extinguishers or other fire fighting appliances to control fire until firemen arrive.
5. Become familiar with all exits in churches, hotels, motels and all public buildings you occupy or frequent.
6. Remember, panic—not fire—is your most deadly enemy. Most people killed in fires could have saved their lives if they had not become panic stricken.
7. If trapped by fire, feel of doors for heat before opening them. If door is hot and you are forced to stay in the room, block the door with furniture to keep out smoke, gases and flames. If door is not hot, open slightly. If it appears safe on the other side, proceed cautiously; otherwise, close it tightly.
8. If your clothing catches fire, do not run. Lie down, roll yourself in a rug or blanket to smother the fire as quickly as possible. Exclude
