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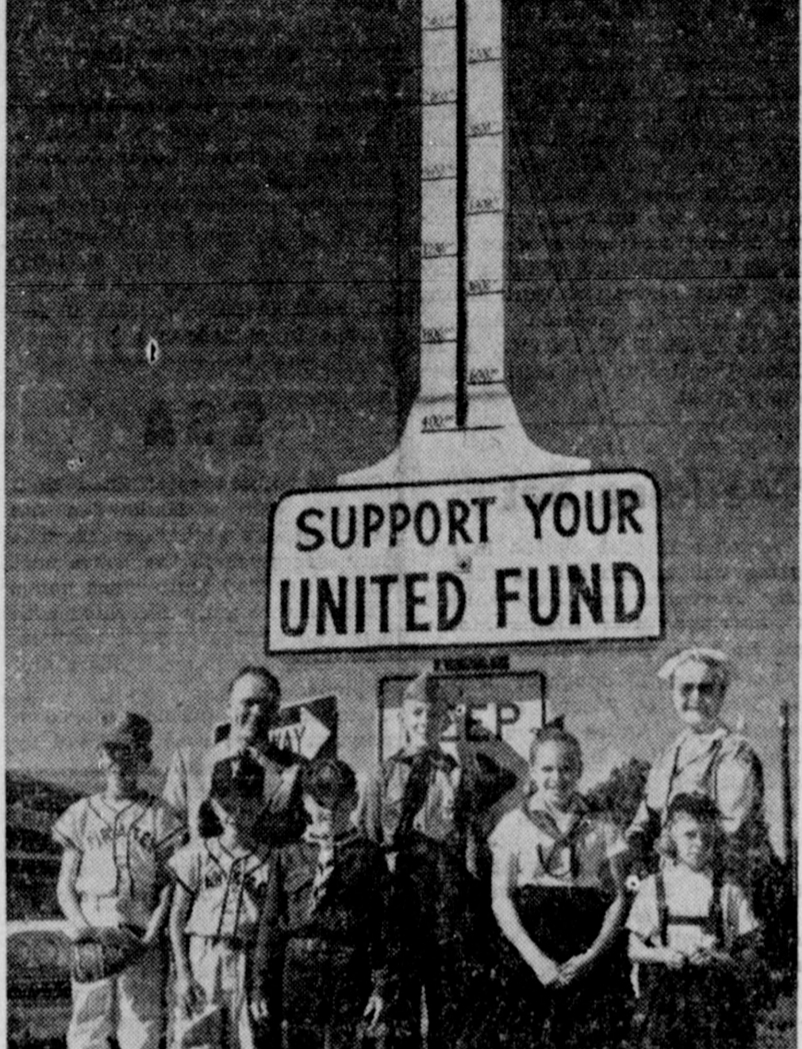
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Pictured in front of the United Fund thermometer are representatives of some of the causes supported by your contributions.

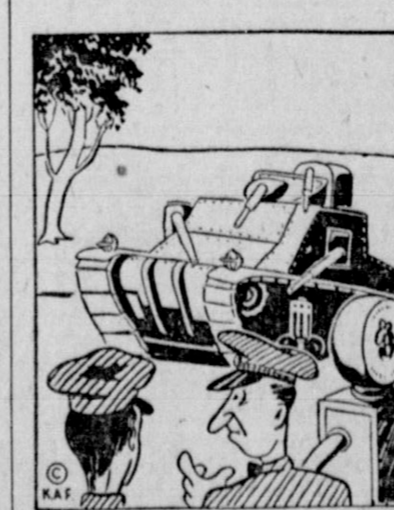
