Folk in this area don't do much ice skating and look on that sport as something entirely foreign to their abilities. But they all enjoy seeing experts on the ice gliding along gracefully and soundlessly!

We had the privilege of watching a real expert Wednesday night at Beverly Ice Arena in Wichita Falls. She is Marge McCommons, instructor at the arena.

Marge is a GI bride from Scotland, wife of S-Sgt. Donald McCommons, who is in headquarters personnel and records, at Sheppard AFB. She has been in the States six years. They have a 3-year-old son Roy who is learning to skate.

Mrs. McCommons does about everything on skates that has been thought of. She traveled with an ice skating show in Germany and France and England and her own native country. Only 26 years of age, she has been skating well over 16 years and is having marvelous success teaching Texans and Sooners and airmen from everywhere in the nation the art of ice skating.

We found W. T. Knight, owner and manager of Beverly Ice Arena, a pleasant and accommodating host. From now until Jan. 3 the rink at Tenth and Beverly will be open each day for three sessions of skating—9:30 a.m., 4:00 and 8:00 p.m. He expects a heavy run of skaters during the next few weeks and especially during the Christmas holidays when public schools and neighboring colleges are in recess.

Betty King, who incidentally formerly lived in Iowa Park, is manager of the coffee shop which is an integral part of the Beverly Ice Arena. The food is good and her piping hot coffee has an inviting taste.

The arena itself is large enough to let the expert really let himself go, and the beginners are not apt to be run over by the other skaters. Drop in, we say, and see ice skating in Texas, and the first thing you know you will have the urge to slip into a pair of skate shoes and try your luck.

Hints on Mailing for Christmas

Postmaster Pete May this week announced his annual "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, and outlined plans for insuring delivery of all Christmas gifts and cards by Dec. 24.

"Public co-operation," Pete said, "has been a key factor in moving Christmas mail on time in recent years, and I am hopeful it will be even better this year."

The postmaster urged patrons to start mailing Christmas packages now. Gifts to distant places especially should be mailed as early as possible.

"This is also the week to prepare and mail out-of-town Christmas cards," he said.

Mr. May gave these pointers on proper mailing of packages: "Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure every package is tied with strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents."

"If your article is of unusual size or bulk, check with the post office, because there are restrictions on size and weight."

"It is important to make sure your package bears the correct mailing address and your return address. If you are sending gifts to a large city be sure to include the addressee's zone number. The zone numbers should also be used on Christmas cards and all mail to cities with postal zones."

"The address should be on the top of the package, and it should be carefully written or lettered. A piece of transparent tape placed over the address will usually prevent defacing in transit. It is also a good idea to include the address inside the package in case the outside address should become defaced."

"If you use Christmas stickers or seals, place them where they will not conflict with the address. Then, before you drop the package in the mail, be sure you have firmly affixed the proper postage."

All packages going to distant cities should be in the post office by Dec. 10. Other mail should be sent on its way as soon as possible, and all local mail should be in the post office no more than a week or 10 days later. This kind of co-operation would mean that all Christmas mail would be delivered on or before Christmas Eve, the postmaster explained.

4-H Beef, Electric Projects Win Chicago Congress Trip For Texas Pair

A Martin County boy and a Brown county girl are the champion Lone Star 4-H'ers in beef and electric projects, respectively. They have been named state winners by the Cooperative Extension Service, and will be delegates to the National 4-H Club Congress opening Nov. 29 in Chicago.

Sixteen-year old Bobby Sale's prize steers have won for him the dairy cattle, swine and poultry, including game birds.

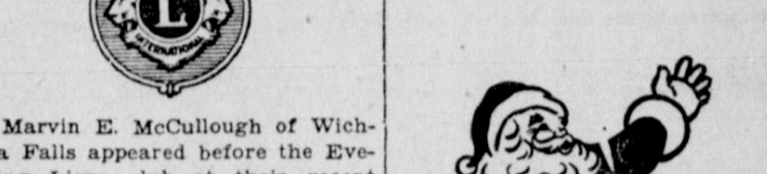
Young Sale is junior leader and past president of the Stanton 4-H Club and information chairman of his county club. He is a junior at Stanton High School. Through his 4-H work, he has earned money to help pay for his college education.

Miss Perkins became interested in this project in 1953, shortly after joining 4-H. The first year she made a lamp and completed 10 repair jobs. Since then she has made 21 articles and twice as many electrical repairs.

The Brownwood High School senior has also given approximately 80 demonstrations and has prepared and led several electrical plant tours for Brown county young people. A junior leader and district club treasurer, she has devoted seven years to 4-H work.

The donor of her trip is the Westinghouse Educational Foundation. Both Miss Perkins and Sale are eligible to win \$400 national 4-H scholarships provided by their respective award donors.

LIONS CLUB Your C of C



Marvin E. McCullough of Wichita Falls appeared before the Evening Lions club at their recent meeting and explained the North Texas Boys Ranch to be located four miles east of Henrietta, if the project materializes.

McCullough said, "During the past three years, a group engaged in building chapels at Gatesville State School for Boys and Gainesville State School for Girls devoted much time to a study of our youth training program. This study pointed up the following facts:

"1. The population of Gatesville Reformatory has doubled in the last three years from 550 to 1100.
"2. Many boys are sent to Gatesville who would never have gone there if they had received the boys ranch training when the need first became obvious.
"3. Many of these boys are finally released on coming of age and embark on a career of crime which takes them to the penitentiary.

"A boys' ranch similar to Cal Farley's and organized to serve the 13th Congressional District was decided on as the practical way to meet this need. They decided to present it to the people through the churches first, it being a basic religious duty to guide and train the young and specially to give attention to family situations in which the interest of youth is not well served.

"Mr. and Mrs. Bryant Edwards have offered to give approximately 700 acres of fine land located east of Henrietta, and to build the first dormitory or key building at a cost of \$50,000 or more. We are assured of financial support from several sources, but in order to perpetuate this work, feel that the moral support of all good people is necessary.

"We are asking the churches to give support to the ranch by underwriting the boys ranch with 50¢ per church member per year in the church budget.

"We have been promised the assistance of many other boys ranches, such as Cal Farley's of Amarillo, in staffing the ranch.

"It is hoped the ranch can begin building early in 1960 and will start with a few boys and one married couple and that it will grow with the need to approximately 100 boys within a few years. It is also expected that other congressional districts in our state and nation will adopt this pattern to save our boys before they become candidates for and perhaps victims of reformatories and penitentiaries."

Mr. McCullough closed his talk with a request for each person present to take this project into his own church.

Tony Waters was high point man in both games with 17 and 10 respectively. Next high in the Byers game was Gary May with 9 and Mack Mills with 8.

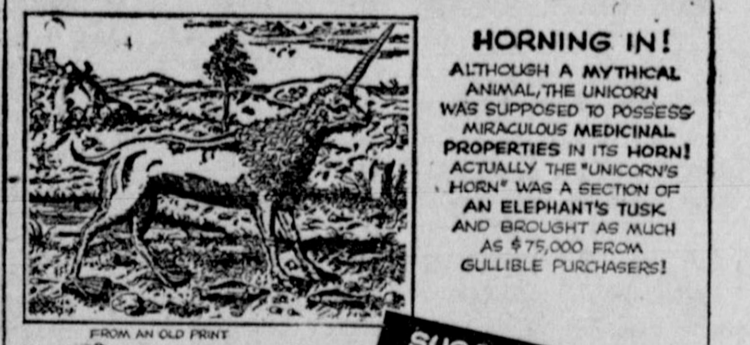
Next game of the Burk tournament will match the Hawks and Petrolia.

Perhaps a perpetual tendency to be selfish and nurse a fixed opinion is, after all, evidence that we are still human. We grow older without giving thought to any noteworthy change that others see in us after many years, yet we become alarmed to see the identical in them.

I spent the past Thanksgiving Day in Poe Valley, the haunts of my early childhood. The meandering course of Big Sandy river and the blue, lofty peaks of Cattlehorn mountain are the only things that will never change.

My boyhood hero Zee Latty is no more. He was a master mimic of wildlife. His version of the wailing moan of a lobo and frightening scream of a wild puma, sent poultry scurrying for cover and alarmed mothers into searching for their young.

Old Zee's rock cabin is still intact near the huge boulders at Buffalo Gap. I spent many hours in back of his cabin, admiring a long line of the skins of wild animals he had taken with trap and gun; hoping some day to grow as tall, find myself a rock cave and hang lobo and puma hides as high as Zee did.

Aunt Zoe says they still have the annual beauty contests, but the contestants nowadays don't wear enough clothes to wipe a pair of specs. Teasingly, she recalled the last contest I saw there.

She believed that I dug up most of the wild onions under the brush arbor with my big toe while the snagle-tooth cuties in ruffles ate huckleberries and poked blue tongues out at me between two white fangs. Favors that year would go to one of the new teachers—Gertie Hoochmire or Cindy Hanks.

Measurements all down, the head judge was making notes of facial features. Hoochmire had an awfully bad turned-up nose. Miss

Kanks had buck teeth and adenoids, and had trouble keeping her lips together and breathing. Miss Gertie got so tickled she was about to explode, when finally a big nasal snort parted her bangs—and the hair pulling started. They had accused one another of "false" pretense and riffin'.

The women folk finally herded the teachers in behind a plum bucket in a draw, leaving a string of sweater sleeves, button shoes and torn up waists. Jinnie Jinks said one, or both, was about to prove her point, but that Sap Mil-trotter had to go and pitch two blankets over them plum bushes.

Sap said: "In the first place, I'd a-called it a draw, 'cause both were perfect 21-28-21's."
