1 1/2 cups sugar	ages) semi-sweet
1/2 teaspoon salt	chocolate pieces
3/4 cup instant malted milk	1 teaspoon vanilla
	1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Combine butter, evaporated milk, sugar, salt and instant malted
milk in saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil, and cook 4 to
5 minutes, stirring constantly. (Start timing when mixture starts
to "bubble" around edges of pan.) Remove from heat. Stir in
marshmallows, chocolate, vanilla and walnuts. Stir vigorously for
1 minute (or until marshmallows are completely melted and
blended). Pour into 9-inch square buttered pan and allow to cool.
Cut in squares.

Pecan Log
(Makes 2 dozen slices)

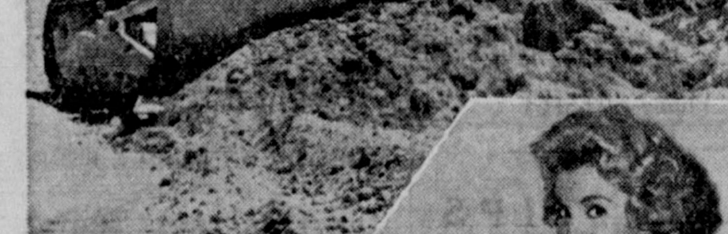
2 cups firmly packed light	1/2 teaspoon maple extract
brown sugar	1/2 cup peanut butter
3/4 cup (small can) undiluted	1 cup chopped pecans
evaporated milk	1/2 cup ground or finely
1/2 teaspoon vanilla	chopped pecans

Mix sugar and evaporated milk thoroughly in a 2-quart sauce-
pan. Bring to a rolling boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium.
Boil for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add
vanilla, maple extract, peanut butter and 1 cup chopped pecans.
Beat until well mixed. Pour into 9-inch square buttered pan and
allow to cool. Shape into 12-inch roll. Roll in 1/2 cup ground or
finely chopped pecans. Cut into 1/2-inch slices.

Almond Peanut Clusters
(Makes about 3 1/2 dozen)

2 cups firmly packed light	1/2 teaspoon vanilla
brown sugar	1/2 teaspoon almond extract
3/4 cup (small can) undiluted	1/2 cup peanut butter
evaporated milk	1 1/2 cups chopped almonds

Mix sugar and evaporated milk thoroughly in a 2-quart sauce-
pan. Bring to a rolling boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium.
Boil for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add
vanilla, almond extract, peanut butter and almonds. Beat until
well mixed. Drop candy rapidly from a teaspoon onto a buttered
cookie sheet. Cool.

Back of Week

McMurry's tiny tornado, Gerald Combs, was recently named Back of the Week by the Abilene Touch-down club. Jerry received the honor following his spectacular play in McMurry's 51-0 victory over the Eastern New Mexico university Greyhounds.

The 5 ft. 4 in. 135 pound Little All-America nominee scored twice for the Indians, including a 20-yard dash and an 82 yard run-pass play.

Combs, probably the smallest player in the nation in collegiate football circles, caught two passes for 123 yards and gained 78 yards rushing in eight carries to lead the McMurry attack.

Jerry is McMurry's leading ball carrier, with 460 yard gained on 61 carries. His yardage gained receiving passes in the New Mexico game established a new school mark. The previous record of 379 yards gained on 14 receptions for one season was set in 1949.

Combs made the NAA's Little All-America nominations list recently. An inspiration player, he has swivel-hipped his way to freedom on several occasions for the Redskins this year.

Combs played his final game of the season before hometown fans Thanksgiving Day when McMurry beat Abilene Christian college in their traditional Game of the Year. Gerald is a hometown boy who

made good as a backfield map for 'he IPHS Hawks. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Combs.

Although it is a sad thing to destroy a tree in North Texas, some beautiful ones had to be pulled up and hauled off to make way for the expansion project.

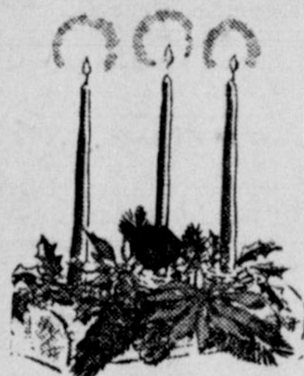

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Important Message to Private Car Owners

from the
Independent Insurance Agents Association of Iowa Park

Because of public demand the State Board of Insurance has promulgated the TEXAS SAFE DRIVER INSURANCE PLAN effective January 1, 1960. The Plan provides for reduction in automobile insurance premiums for careful drivers who have had no accident or moving traffic violations for a period of three years, this period being the three years ending 90 days prior to date of insurance policy. Drivers with a record of accidents and traffic violations will be penalized by paying higher premiums and in some cases the penalty can be as much as 100% increase in their premiums.

This PLAN is mandatory and all Insurance Companies and their Agents doing business in Texas must adhere to the rules and rates as promulgated by the State Board of Insurance including the securing of the signed application.

All policies dated after January 1, 1960 will be issued only upon a written application completely filled out and signed by the applicant for insurance.
