## Traffic Deaths, Injuries on Increase

Texas Department of Public Safety has released information on traffic deaths and injuries through the month of October. The report presents a gloomy picture; deaths are up 4 per cent over last year and injuries increased 15 per cent.

Commenting on the report, Murrell R. Tripp, president of Southwestern Insurance Information Service, noted, "These statistics are what the Texas Legislative Council had in mind when they suggested that the State Board of Insurance devise and put into effect a plan that would penalize reckless drivers and reward safe drivers. The Texas Safe Driving Plan was the answer, and the casualty insurance industry is hopeful that it will result in more careful driving and lower accident rate."

"Ordinary measures are no more popular, with adults than with children, and adoption of the plan necessitated courageous action on the part of the board."

"For companies and agents the plan means greatly increased paper work and record keeping. For the plain citizen, it means keeping that foot light on the accelerator and eyes on the road, for law violations and negligent collisions will send his insurance rate skyrocketing."

It has become apparent that increases in rates are not the answer to the rising number of claims and cost of settling them. Twenty per cent of the drivers are the trouble-makers who cause a high percentage of the claims and claim costs.

Some way was sought to charge these drivers more, and the cautious drivers less. "It seems perfectly fair that now an accident-free driver earns a 20 per cent bonus on his liability and collision insurance premium," Tripp said.

"No plan is perfect and every plan contains imperfections which time and experience will correct. If we can discipline Texas drivers into a decreasing fatality and injury record, we will accomplish a great deal. Each driver should consider that an improved traffic safety record is worth some sacrifice. Among the lives saved might be someone near and dear to him."

# ABUNDANT LIFE

## A NEW EMPHASIS ON THE SUPERNATURAL

I have a positive conviction on an important subject. I sincerely believe that there will be a new world-wide emphasis on healing and supernatural deliverance. This will shortly come to pass in: (1) the established churches, (2) in the medical profession, and (3) among mankind generally.

Already this has begun. Miracles, healing, supernatural deliverance are the talk of spiritual leaders everywhere. A new wave of it is sweeping Scotland and England. Sometime ago, we sent our film, "Venture Into Faith," to Berlin for its German premiere. On the opening night 2,500 were present. This film has caused an amazing revival of healing and supernatural deliverance in South Africa, Israel, Trans-Jordan, Switzerland, England, Germany, Philippine Islands, and in other foreign lands.

Doctors are opening their minds more and more to healing by faith. Many of them are attending our crusades, often sending their patients for prayer.

Mankind everywhere is becoming more conscious of God's supernatural power of deliverance. I urge you not to lag behind in your thinking and believing. A few years ago I did not know the Lord as He really is. I knew Him as the Redeemer of my own life, but not as the Deliverer of humanity. Now, I see His infinite tenderness, His constant concern for men's souls and bodies.

The reading of the four Gospels and the Books of Acts brought Jesus into focus for me to see. Jesus came against four enemies of mankind: sin, demons, disease and fear. He was a healer and miracle-worker. He spent two-thirds of His time healing the sick. He looked on sickness as a criminal power and all His power was against it. What He did, He wanted His disciples to do. He transmitted His power and authority to them. They went forth healing the sick and preaching the gospel. With His authority they brought deliverance to the souls, minds and bodies of the people. He still expects His followers to do the same things. His orders haven't been changed, and He hasn't given the signal to stop working.

The second day that I was in the Holy Land, I visited the garden tomb where Jesus rose from the dead. The man in charge of the tomb had broken his leg and had it in a cast. I said to him, "Sir, I would like to pray for you." He said, "Why, of course." I then laid my hand on his leg and asked God to heal the broken bones.

When I came out of my hotel room the next day, the street was full of people who were seeking my prayers.

I had never seen them before, but they had heard of the miracle at the empty tomb the previous night. The caretaker had been completely and miraculously healed.

## Hunters Pay Many Fines

Game law violations from automobiles took top billing during the month of November, according to arrests reported by the Game and Fish commission.

Twenty-four persons were fined for hunting from automobiles, and another 19 for headlighting game animals, making a total of 43.

Hunting without a license produced fines for 40 hunters; killing quail in closed season netted 18 fines; exceeding the bag limit on doves brought 15 fines.

Another 15 persons paid fines for hunting with unplugged guns. A shotgun used in hunting all migratory birds and game birds in Texas must be plugged to three shots.

Many of the repeating shotguns in automobiles carry five shells in the magazine, and must be plugged back to hold only two shells in the magazine and one in the chamber.

There were 279 violations for the month, which brought fines and court costs of \$9,469.45.

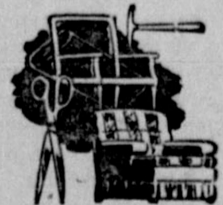

## 68 Years

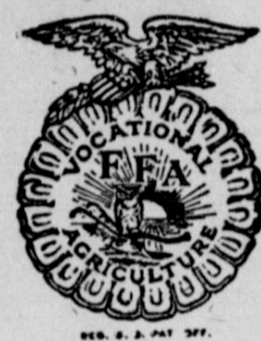
Mr. and Mrs. John B. Barbour honored her parents Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Lindsey on their 68th wedding anniversary with a 6 o'clock dinner in the Barbour home Monday.

The honored couple have resided in this community since 1911. They were married Dec. 22, 1891 at Lima, Ill. They moved across the river into the Mississippi valley near Quincy in 1894, traveling by wagon.

In 1908, when preparing to move from LaGrange, Mo., to South Texas, they packed apples and pears in barrels to bring along with their household goods and livestock. Mr. Lindsey rode in the boxcar with their worldly possessions. Livestock was in one end and household goods were in the other end. Mrs. Lindsey rode with the children on the passenger train, carrying enough food in large baskets to last on the trip. Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey and family lived on a farm northeast of Iowa Park, where he did extensive farming until 1943, when he retired.

Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey own their home at 422 N. Bond, where he takes care of his own yard.

They have three daughters: Dr. Maud Campbell of Chicago, Ill.; Mrs. Nina McCombs of Bakersfield, Calif.; and Mrs. Barbour. The one son William died in 1936.

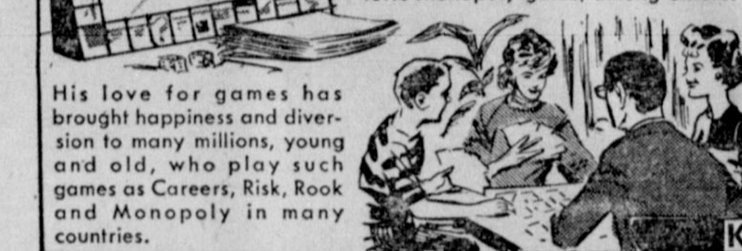

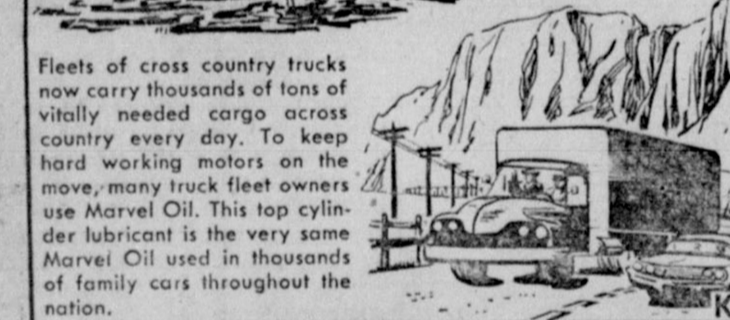

## Make Your Own Christmas Tree



Brighten your home this Yuletide with easy-to-make Christmas Tree decorations for table, mantelpiece, Nativity Scene. Materials needed: 30 6-inch Dress-A-Doll Disks, 9-inch tapered candle, 3-inch styrofoam square for base, white glue and glitter, needle, 2 toothpicks. Johnson & Johnson Dress-A-Doll Disks are available in several colors, at leading 5 & 10 cent stores and novelty shops.

1. Hollow out hole in base, set needle firmly in glue. Cut wick from candle. Caution: flammable, do not light candle.
2. Fold 3 disks in quarters, scallop rounded edge of each one by cutting with in-and-out motion. Repeat with 3 more disks, scalloping 3/4-inch from rounded edge. Repeat with 6 more sets of 3 disks each, scalloping each set 3/4-inch further from rounded edge than preceding set.
3. Cut 3 circles 2-inches in diameter and 3 circles 1 1/2-inches in diameter from remaining disks. Scallop edges of circles.
4. Fold each disk in half, cut slit in center; fold in half the other way, slit again. Reduce size of slits every 3 disks to allow for taper of candle.
5. Apply glitter glue to edge of each scallop on disks. Add glitter, let dry. Slide disks over candle, largest set first, etc.
6. Cut 2 stars from box containing disks. Insert needle between stars, glue stars together. Apply glitter. Stick needlepoint into top of candle.
7. Break 2 toothpicks in half, stick in base underneath bottom of tree to prevent tree from sagging.
8. Cut 3 circles 2-inches in diameter and 3 circles 1 1/2-inches in diameter from remaining disks. Scallop edges of circles.

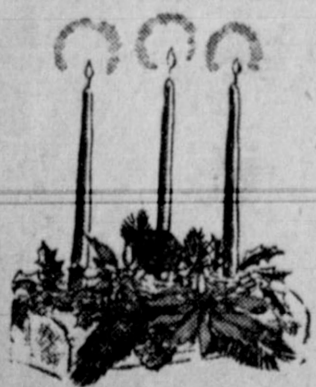
