## Service Held for J. D. Chapman

Funeral service was held for  
James D. Chapman, 52, of Iowa  
Park, in Stamford, Sunday after-  
noon, Dec. 27, with Rev. Chick of  
Calvary Baptist church in charge.  
Burial was in Highland cemetery  
of Stamford.

Mr. Chapman died Thursday in  
an Odessa hospital where he had  
been a patient since Nov. 22. He  
was seriously injured when he fell  
into the gear of a ferris wheel  
while waiting for a brother Oscar  
to get off from work at the amuse-  
ment park in Odessa.

Mr. Chapman had improved and  
had planned to be discharged from  
the hospital in a few days when he  
suddenly became seriously ill  
and died.

He was born in Carroll parish,  
La., Nov. 3, 1907, son of Mr. and  
Mrs. J. H. Chapman. While a small  
child he moved with his parents  
to Milam county, Texas. They later  
moved to Haskell county in 1916.

Mr. Chapman was married to  
Miss Nila Berry in Stamford where  
they resided for many years.

Chapman was soloist and choir  
leader for Rev. Sam Morris on the  
Voice of Temperance in Del Rio  
at one time.

The past 15 years he has been  
employed with the Vandikes Victo-

five years.

son J. D. Jr. of Iowa Park; two  
daughters: Mrs. Christine Burtle-  
son of Iowa Park and Mrs. Edith

brothers: Ross and A. E. of Iowa  
Park; Oscar of Eloy, Ariz.; a sister  
Mrs. Chester Allen of Austin; and  
two grandchildren.

ber of the First Methodist church.

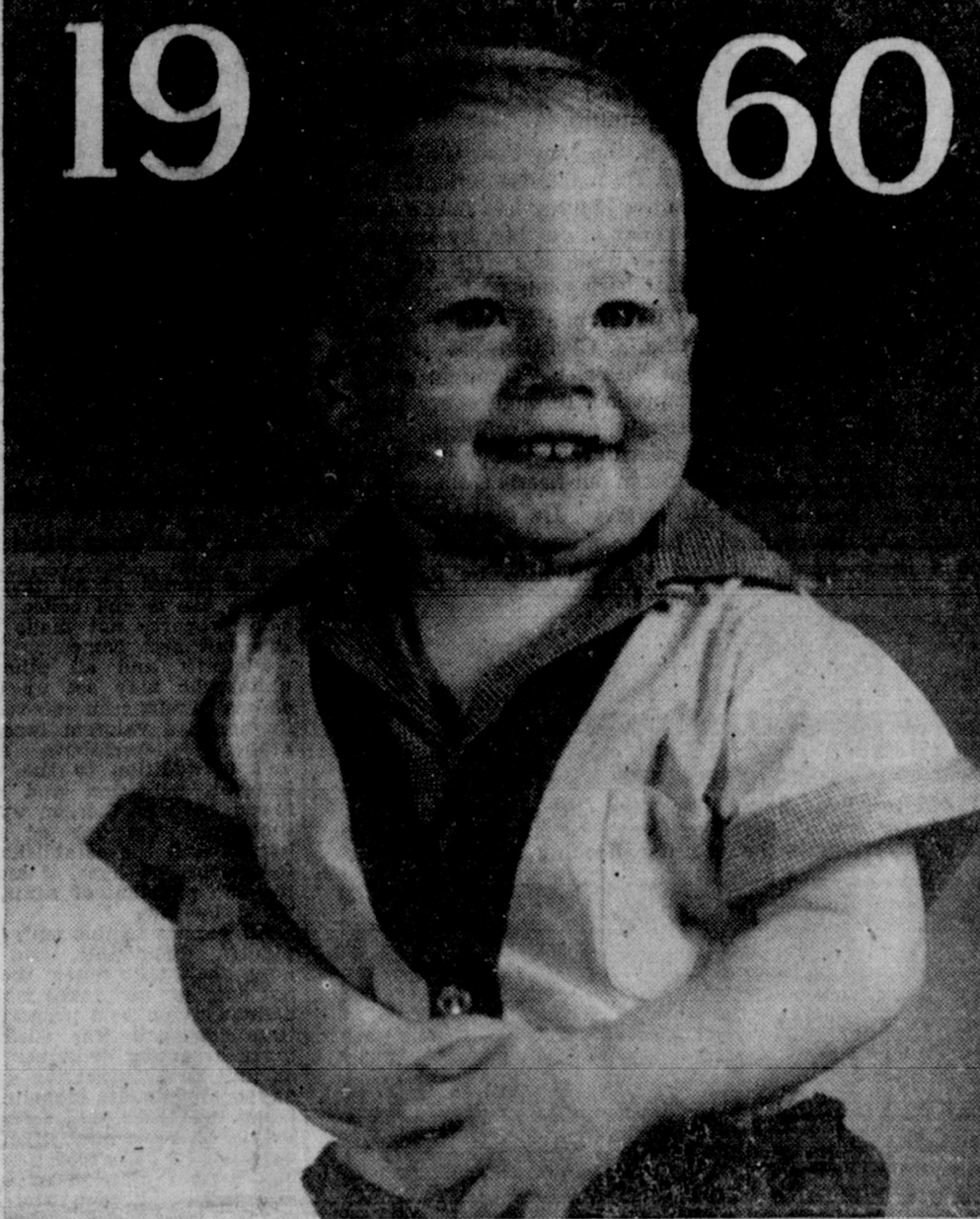
He is married to the former Miss

## Council Okays Plat of Redin Heights

Plat for Redin Heights, a 300-  
home addition northwest of the  
city, received approval from the  
Iowa Park City Council at a spe-  
cial meeting Wednesday morning.

The \$3,700,000 housing develop-  
ment here was announced Tuesday  
by officials of Lincoln Enterprises,  
2504 Ninth, Wichita Falls.

Homes in the 100-acre site will  
range in price from \$9,500 to \$25,000  
Rama C. Stanford, president, and  
John C. Hooper, vice-president,  
said. The three-bedroom brick  
structures will have central heat-  
ing, 1 1/2 and 2 baths, and single  
or double garages.

Standard homes will be priced  
from \$9,500 to \$13,500 with custom  
built homes in a restricted area  
ranging up to \$25,000.

The new elementary school to be  
completed next year will adjoin  
the development on the east. Border-  
ing on the north will be the  
Red River Valley expressway, to be  
finished in early 1961.

Completion of the new highway  
will put Redin Heights within six  
minutes of Sheppard AFB.

Five acres on the northeast cor-

ner of the area have been tenta-  
tively reserved for a shopping  
center.

Land for the housing develop-  
ment was bought from Mrs. Emma  
Redin and daughter Mrs. Joy L.  
Cannedy at a price of approxi-  
mately \$100,000. First house of the  
addition, built for Mrs. Cannedy,  
is scheduled for completion next  
month. Mrs. Redin plans to build  
a home in the area soon.

Stanford and Hooper announced  
they will have from 25 to 60 homes  
under construction within 60 days.  
Biggs & Matthews of Wichita Falls  
have been retained as land plan-  
ners, and the architect is expected  
to be secured soon.

Water, sewer, gas, electricity and  
telephone facilities will be avail-  
able to residents of Redin Heights,  
company officials said.

Houses will be Southwestern  
ranch style with custom homes to  
be constructed to owners' plans.

Redin Heights is the second and  
largest major housing development  
announced for Iowa Park this year.  
First was Country Hills Estate,  
immediately north of the Redin  
Heights area, being developed by  
N. E. Guthrie Jr.

## 78 New Homes

City of Iowa Park has issued  
building permits totaling \$875,800  
in 1959, according to Miss Dostie S.  
Smith, city secretary.

Of this amount \$218,800 was for  
construction of school and business  
buildings. Permit for the new ele-  
mentary school was \$176,000. The  
additions to the City Hall will run  
\$18,000.

Forty-five permits totaling al-  
most \$23,000 were for additions and  
repairs to present homes and busi-  
ness buildings.

The remaining \$633,000 was for  
78 new residences. Most of these  
have been built in the Harlin ad-  
dition, Barbour addition, D. O.  
Smith addition and Lincoln Enter-  
prises addition. However, several  
beautiful homes have been built  
in other parts of town.

The City has laid a great deal  
of new water and sewerage mains  
this year to take care of these  
new homes.

So far, Lake Iowa Park has  
taken care of the water situation  
quite well.

As we look back on 1959, the  
City has done an excellent job  
serving the people with water and  
sewerage service and with fire and  
police protection.
