**Achievement in a 4-H home economics project produced 1959 state honors for Jorja Hue Blackmon, 19, of Shallowater.**

The Texas winner, she attended the 38th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago as the guest of Montgomery Ward.

A sophomore majoring in home economics at Texas Technological College, she won seven blue ribbons in dress revue during her 10-year 4-H career.

Miss Blackmon is Lubbock county council secretary and a junior leader. The Cooperative Extension Service judged her 4-H records.

## 4-H Winners in '59 Projects

Two 1959 project winning boys from Texas, both 17, attended the 38th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

They were G. C. Dean Jr. of Bishop, dairy project winner whose Chicago trip was provided by the Oliver Corporation, and Herky Killingsworth of Paducah, the state's best on 4-H entomology projects, who went to Chicago as guest of Hercules Powder Company.

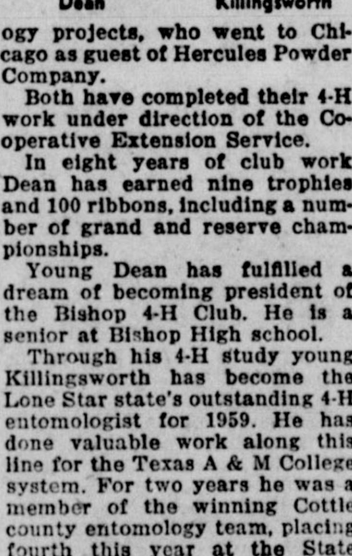
Both have completed their 4-H work under direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

In eight years of club work Dean has earned nine trophies and 100 ribbons, including a number of grand and reserve championships.

Young Dean has fulfilled a dream of becoming president of the Bishop 4-H Club. He is a senior at Bishop High school.

Through his 4-H study young Killingsworth has become the Lone Star state's outstanding 4-H entomologist for 1959. He has done valuable work along this line for the Texas A & M College system. For two years he was a member of the winning Cottle county entomology team, placing fourth this year at the State Round-Up.

A junior at Paducah High school, Killingsworth has organized and is junior leader of an entomology club for younger girls and boys.

## Garden Valley to Have 300 Homes

Iowa Park has brighter prospects in 1960 than any other year so far as housing is concerned.

Another 75 acres, plus, of land owned by D. O. James and D. O. Smith have been sold to the Al Lens Construction company of Abilene.

This property is south of town near the Kama highway adjoining the south city limits, just north and east of the D. O. James home.

Lenz bought 69.06 acres from James and 6 acres from Smith. Deeds to the property were filed Tuesday with Mrs. Dora Davis, county clerk.

Lenz and partner Tom Lewis are long time home builders and construction men. They plan to build 300 homes over a three-year period, 100 each year.

These houses will be in the \$8,250 to \$8,500 price bracket with full FHA approval. Down payments will be \$250. Monthly payments will approximate \$62.

## Service Set for Geo. Russell

Funeral service will be conducted for Mr. George W. Russell, 84, Friday morning, Dec. 8, at 9:30 in Wichita Falls with interment at Hubbard.

Mr. Russell died Tuesday afternoon after an extended illness. He had resided in Wichita Falls since Feb. 7, 1919.

He was a retired employee of Texas Electric Service company, having worked in Iowa Park 27 or 28 years for the company before his retirement.

Mr. Russell was born June 25, 1875, at Cave Creek, N.C., son of Mr. and Mrs. John Stewart Russell. He later moved to Tennessee before coming to Navarro county, Texas, Nov. 1, 1882.

Mr. Russell married Mrs. Beulah Owens of Iowa Park, March 10, 1944. He was a member of the Wichita Falls Masonic Lodge No. 635 and a former member of Iowa Park Lions club.

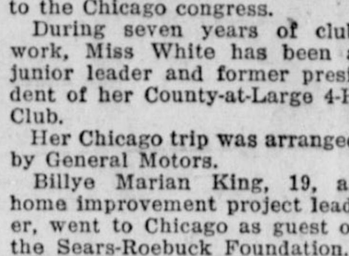

A practical county-wide water survey as part of her 4-H project helped Nancy White, 17, of Greenville, to become a delegate to the Chicago congress.

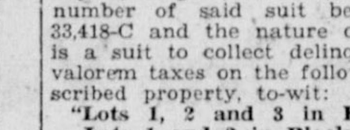
During seven years of club work, Miss White has been a junior leader and former president of her County-at-Large 4-H Club.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**



Heavy fall rains made farmers more conscious of the need for conservation practices, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park work unit conservationist for SCS.

Many waterways are needed before terraces can be constructed, Sargent said. Paul Dowdy, M. E. McCullough and L. C. Jarvis of Wichita Falls are busy

constructing waterways for their farms in Cashion community.

Each of these will seed to small grain, mow small grain at boot stage and seed to ER bluestem.

Wichita County ACP, under leadership of Stanley Williamson, county committee chairman, approves up to 80 per cent Federal cost share.

Terrace specifications now being used by the SCS vary with the cropping system and rainfall. To local small grain farmers using stubble mulching and legumes, terraces will be spaced at a wider interval than that used in the past, according to Sargent. If terracing on a wider spacing is acceptable to you, Soil Conservation Service requests your inquiry.
