Churches Back Boys Ranch

First Baptist, Christian and Methodist churches of Iowa Park have joined with other churches in this congressional district in pledging support to the North Texas Boys Ranch to be located in Clay county. Directors of the project are asking churches to pledge 50 cents a member per year to support the Boys Ranch, which will have a 700-acre tract donated by a Clay county couple. They have also offered \$50,000 for the first building. If this project becomes a reality it will mean the boys of District 13 will have the opportunity of going to this Boys Ranch instead of a state school because of some misdeed they have committed.

Pay Poll Tax Before Jan. 31

Iowa Park Jaycees have launched their annual poll tax drive and are trying to get as many local people qualified to cast ballots in 1960 elections.

According to Dub Rowntree, Jaycee president, the main purpose of the drive is to get as many citizens interested in casting ballots in local, county, state and national elections as possible. They collect the taxes on a non-partisan basis and do not endorse any particular individual or party.

Poll tax receipts will be issued by Jaycees at City Cafe, Clyde's Market and Parker's Food Store this coming Saturday and again on Saturday, Jan. 30.

Rowntree also pointed out that Fred Hays, a sustaining member of the Jaycees, is issuing poll tax receipts at his drug store all during the week.

Poll taxes will not be collected after Jan. 31. As part of her duties with the county tax assessor-collector, Mrs. Esther Thornberry collects poll taxes in the Chamber of Commerce office, temporarily doing business in the Sullivan-Kroettinger building just east of State National Bank.

Marching Mothers to Collect Facts, Funds

"If you can answer no to the questions inside, be thankful! If you must answer yes, take hope!"

American mothers will carry this message to over 30 million homes this month. The mothers, volunteers in the annual Mothers' March for the New March of Dimes, will be seeking information and support for The National Foundation's fight against birth defects, arthritis and polio. These crippling, initial targets in The National Foundation's campaign to prevent crippling disease, affect the lives of one of every four American families.

Two Million in March
An estimated two million women will join the nationwide mothers' appeal for facts and funds. In most communities the mothers will march Thursday evening, Jan. 28, bringing to a climax the New March of Dimes January campaign.

The mothers will present each household with a copy of "Door Count," a concise fact-finding folder in which a family may indicate if any of its members has a birth defect, arthritis or polio and how many have had three or more Salk vaccine shots. Each family record will be confidential.

Salk Shot Reminder
The Mothers' March door count will focus family and community attention on the majority of Americans still without Salk shot protection against paralytic polio. It will remind the unvaccinated to start shots in time for summer polio protection and it will help communities plan local programs to further encourage

the widespread use of Salk vaccine. Although the house-to-house poll is in no way planned as a statistically valid survey, the sum of information taken in the door count will provide a working estimate of the number of persons suffering from arthritis; the number born with birth defects and the number who have been victims of paralytic polio. This tabulation will help guide National Foundation county chapters in formulating local programs to aid the disabled.

Mothers making the house-to-house door count will also seek contributions to the New March of Dimes for its attack on birth defects, arthritis and polio. The New March of Dimes is combating these disabling disorders with the same effective weapons used to conquer paralytic polio: medical scientific research to find causes, cures, preventives; patient aid for medical care; and training for medical workers needed to treat the sick and disabled.

Farmers having suitable seedbeds will soon start seeding adapted grasses in their waterways, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist.

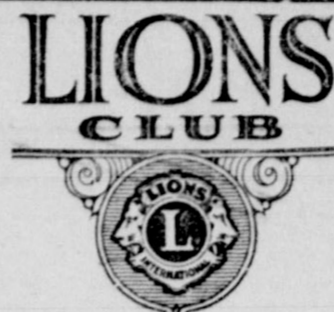
A dead cover of sorghum stubble is the most satisfactory cover for seeding, Sargent said. Richard Fritsche of Punkin Center has such a cover and will seed a mixture of KR bluestem and buffalograss. Fritsche has shaped the waterway and grown a sorghum litter as steps in establishing a waterway to receive water from a terrace system that had outlets into a county road ditch.

Mrs. Grace Jennings of Electra has three waterways ready for seeding; Leo Wolf of near Iowa Park has two sorghum litter waterways; Frank Foster, Saline Foster and Sam Barwise of Electra have one each.

Soil Conservation Service is attempting to contact all co-operators of W-W SCD in Iowa Park who are known to need waterways, Sargent said. Farmers who need this type of improvements should contact the SCS office.

Proper planting procedure, orchard site location and pruning will be demonstrated next Tuesday, beginning on the Willis Martz farm, which is located in the Friberg-Cooper community on FM Road 1177, approximately 2 miles east of the Burk Burnett highway.

A complete orchard will be planted and will be set up as a variety demonstration. All fruit-minded individuals should plan to attend this demonstration, which will be conducted by U. A. Randolph, director of the Montague fruit experiment station.

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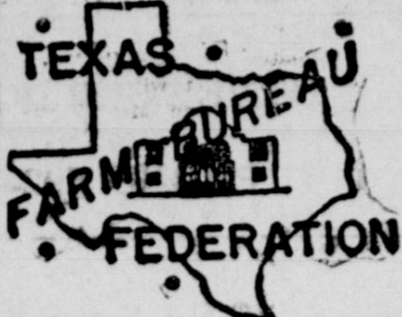
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Pay your poll tax before Jan. 31 if you want to have a voice in selecting those who govern you, Frank Krajca, president of Wichita county Farm Bureau, is urging all farmers and ranchers in the county.

He said the Farm Bureau on all levels is planning to carry on an intensive citizenship program this year.

"Individual participation in the election of public officials is especially important this year since it is a presidential election year. Also there are important local and state and congressional offices to be filled," said Krajca.

The Farm Bureau itself is non-partisan and takes a stand only on issues. Policies for the county, state and national Farm Bureau

were decided last fall and winter in conventions held on those levels.

"However, we do urge that each citizen of voting age participate in the party of his choice, not only in casting ballots, but also in individual participation in precinct conventions. It is on the precinct level that the citizen has opportunity to have a real voice in selection of candidates and in formulating policies of his party."

Krajca said that preserving the present form of representative government in a society when individual freedom is guaranteed is the objective of the Farm Bureau citizenship activities.

"I am glad I obeyed God, and my father was glad, too," he says.

Drivers with a record of accidents and traffic violations will be penalized by paying higher premiums and in some cases the penalty can be as much as 100% increase in their premiums.

This PLAN is mandatory and all Insurance Companies and their Agents doing business in Texas must adhere to the rules and rates as promulgated by the State Board of Insurance including the securing of the signed application.

All policies dated after January 1, 1960 will be issued only upon a written application completely filled out and signed by the applicant for insurance. Your Insurance Agents listed below, members of the INDEPENDENT INSURANCE AGENTS ASSOCIATION of Iowa Park, will assist and cooperate with you in the preparation of these applications.

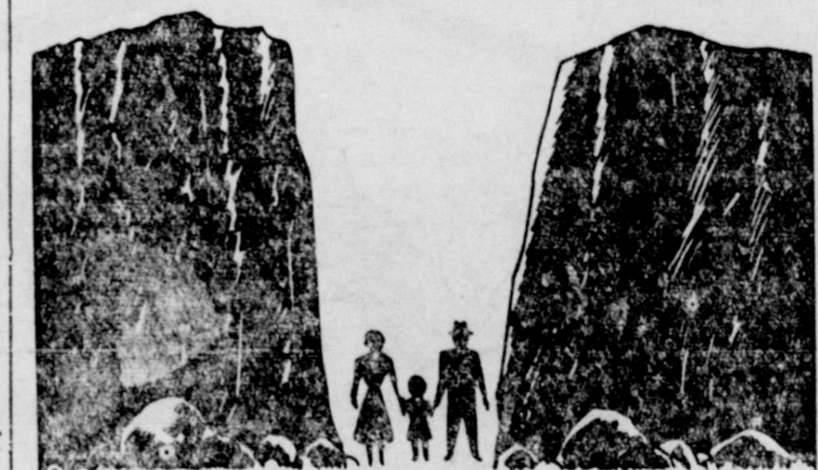
