Iowa Park is facing two important jobs—and we have need to start studying both of them. They are expansion of the City Limits so our growing outlying district can get City services—police protection, water and sewer facilities.

We don't know enough municipal law to advise how to go about it, but the City Council can and should do something about this important expansion need—now.

Our second growth problem is expansion of the Water Control and Improvement District from which the City buys water. As originally developed and authorized, the Water District was described by metes and bounds. Expansion of the City Limits does not carry with it an equal expansion of the Water District. If we are wrong in this assumption—fine.

Anyhow, the City Council and the Water District board of directors should start kicking their individual obligations around and get something done—pronto.

Mrs. Lehman died in a Vernon hospital Wednesday afternoon after a lengthy illness.
Born July 11, 1877 in Comal county, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Shehan, she was married to Albert Lehman in 1894. He died 30 years ago, just before the family moved from Hamilton county to Iowa Park in Jan. 1930.

During World War II, at the age of 65, Mrs. Lehman began to travel. It was at this time she began making her home with her daughter and son-in-law Col. and Mrs. H. T. Tucker. Since that time she had traveled through 40 states and had resided in Texas, New Mexico, Utah, Mississippi, California, Hawaii. Only 18 months ago she returned to the States from the Philippine Islands.

On her 81st birthday Mrs. Lehman was enroute to the Philippines by boat with her daughter and granddaughter Maryland. Mr. Tucker was stationed there with the armed forces.

Mrs. Lehman often said her later years were the happiest because she loved to travel. She made trips by train, bus, plane, boat and car. She traveled on the Atlantic and Pacific oceans and the Gulf of Mexico.

Surviving are two daughters: Mrs. Tucker of Sacramento, Calif.; Mrs. W. J. Griffith of Ft. Worth; two sons: Earl and Rex Lehman of Iowa Park; three sisters; one brother; 14 grand- and 21 great-grandchildren.


