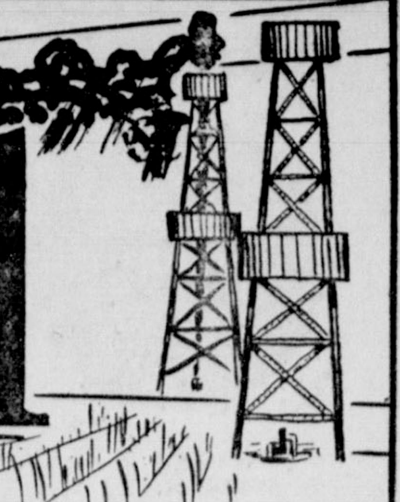

## Firemen Move

Volunteer firemen completed last week the move into their new fire station and hall.

For the past 23 years W. F. George has permitted the Fire department to use his building (rent free) next to the Herald office as a Fire Hall and housing for one fire truck.

Saturday, Fire Chief Loyd Bell accompanied by Taylor George, Herman Mahler and T. C. Scott, will go to Oklahoma to get a new T-850 Ford Cabover 750-gallon pumper truck purchased by the City from Shaw Motor company. It will be delivered to Fire Appliances of Texas in Wichita Falls to undergo the state test Tuesday, March 8.

Several local firemen will be in Wichita Falls to witness the test. A number of towns in the surrounding area have requested permission to attend this test.

The new truck will be brought to Iowa Park sometime next week after the test.

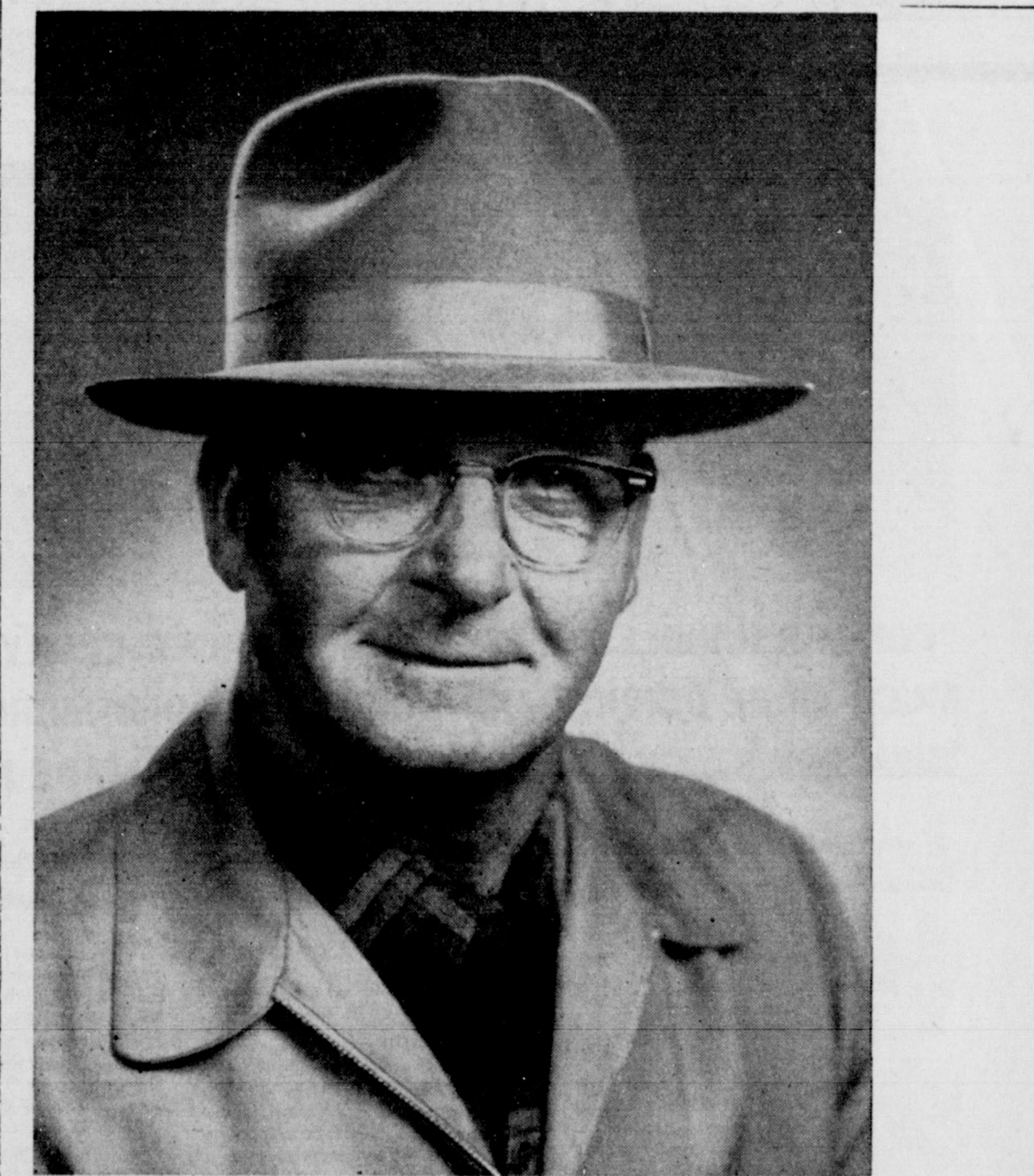

### ABUNDANT LIFE

THERE IS NO DISTANCE IN PRAYER

God is here where I am; He is there where you are. God is everywhere. Because He is, there is no distance in prayer.

When you pray to God, or someone prays to God in your behalf, no matter where you are or that person is, God hears.

Since God is everywhere, faith—wherever it goes into operation or wherever it is released—works! It moves God here where I am and there where you are. I believe here, and He works there, performing the miracle of deliverance where it is needed.

Recently I made a recording of a radio program in Tulsa, preaching the sermon on deliverance and praying the healing prayer. When this program was later put on the air over more than 300 stations in America and several powerful foreign stations, the power of the gospel preached in Tulsa carried through to the listeners.

I heard later that a woman who had been seriously ill in Norway had heard my voice over Radio Luxembourg. My program was in English, and, although she could not understand me, she reported that she felt compelled to listen closely. As my voice uttered a prayer, the woman said she felt the surging of God's power enter her body. In the flash of a second, God had healed her!

This woman related her experience through an interpreter, and I was given the message sometime after her healing.

There is no distance in prayer! The Bible was written thousands of years ago in different

places on earth by different men. All were moved by the Holy Spirit. The words of these writers are put together on today's printing presses, bound in one volume and sold to us in book stores. We open that book and read the words of God—words God had men write down for us.

Widely separated from the time and place it was written, the Bible has the same effect upon us today that it did the day it was first revealed.

Believe the Bible today, believe that God answers prayer and God will deliver you completely—in soul, mind and body.

God loves people. He wants to be near us. He gave us Jesus to speak with us face to face, to touch us with His hands and heal us, to bless us and give us His power—abundant life!

That is why God sent Jesus, who got as close to people as He could with His hands, His voice, His robe. Then He died for people, rose again, ascended back to Heaven, interceded for men, gave gifts to them, promised to come back for them.

One thing Jesus made clear—there is no distance in prayer! Jesus' hands laid upon the sick were powerful to heal. But His spoken word was just as powerful as the touch of His hands. He could heal in person, and He could heal at a distance.

Jesus can heal you now and give you abundant life if you will only believe and trust Him. There is no distance between you and Christ. There is no distance in prayer.

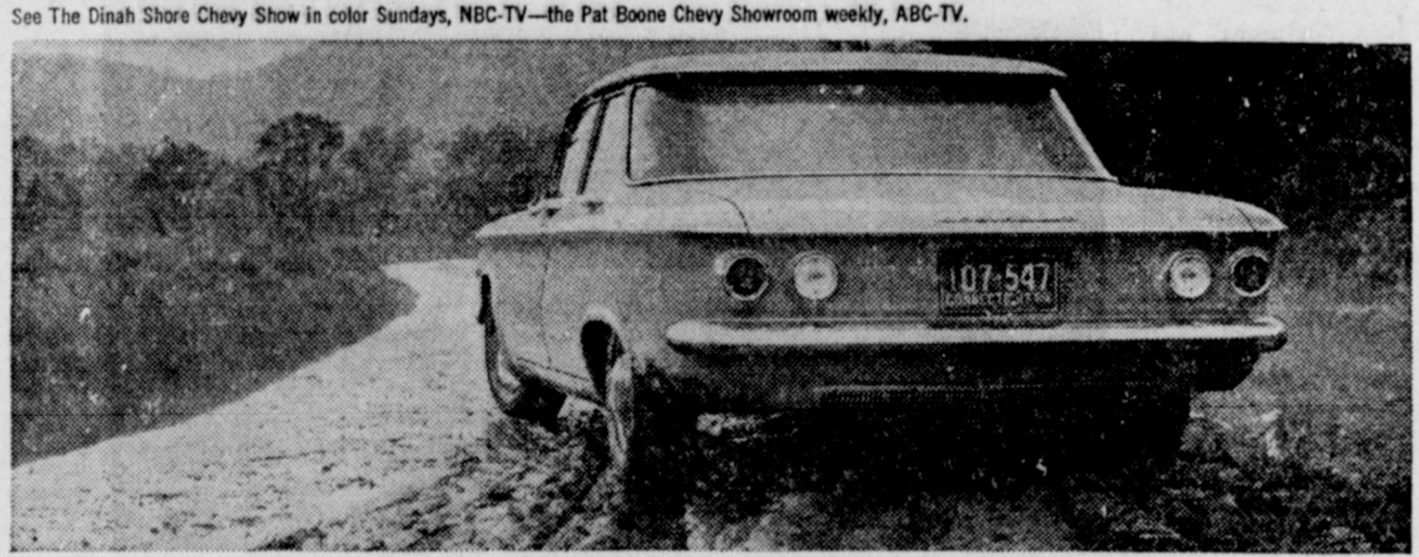

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## Around the World and Back to Iowa Park

For 14 years, along the mountain and river trails, there was nothing to follow except a coon-dog and my nose.

On a stormy night, I used an unfinished rawhide rope to slide from a two-story window. Two years passed before any one knew my whereabouts.

Two weeks later, bewildered and hungry, a railroad cop pulled me from a freight train in San Francisco, gave me a fatherly tongue lashing and paid for my breakfast. Four days later I was working as a deckhand on a freight ship to China.

In port at Shanghai, the skipper gave me two tens and told me to "hit" dirt. Accompanied by an English-speaking native, I walked many miles along the Yellow river where thousands of frail children splashed the shoreline for a bit of food, anything that chanced to drift ashore during the monsoon season. Hundreds of parents strolled through the acres of tiny graves, a single flower, shell or colored vase, in search of the "certain" mound. Obviously they wanted to eat, live and play.

My host talked at length and with great concern about the "Giants," his meaning that the wealthier countries were stripping his homeland of its natural resources. PIRATES, he called them.

Down Formosa strait to the South China sea. Mayala, Singapore—others, on and on, the veteran deckhands named the ports. At some ports, white-suited brass, shiny boots and helmet, shouted orders, kicked curious, spindly children right and left.

Azores, Algiers and Tunis. On the edge of the desert where Montgomery and Rommel locked horns during War 2. I bought 20 bags of parched corn for a group of hungry children. One has only to give a morsel of food, or a smile, to those starving millions to see

their heart and soul—they have both—jump out at one like a Kenya cobra.

Bombay, Poona, the Red Sea; Aswan and Port Said. Even along the Gold Coast with billions in diamonds and nuggets under their feet, natives gnawed on charred goatskin and dried fish; while groups of sophisticates lounged in luxury, guffawing in many languages and dialects.

I remember what I saw, and from extensive reading for 40 years, yet there is very little of it that I really understand; other than those looted countries, for centuries are now the real powder kegs of modern times.

The so-called goodwill ambassadors have brought very little other than boots and beggars. Who am I to say whether or not American giant corporations have grown rich through the faulty business tactics so much hated by the natives in Asia and Africa? It seems regrettable that world leaders and scientists may have waited a bit late to cope with the very thing that threatens to kick civilization back to the head-hunters.

I have no moral attitude toward wealth. Managing for financial security is one of the most noble traits to be found in man.

Statistics prove that even in our own free America, the country is stagnant with political and labor corruption. When a public servant can steal many thousands of dollars of public money and serve less than three years in the clink; some degenerate young punk steal a hundred dollar hot-rod and get the "book" thrown at him, it's high time that we, all of us, start looking down our nose.

### TAX FACTS FOR THE HOMEOWNER NO. 3

## The Home As An Income Producer

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

IF YOU rent all or part of your home, the income you receive is taxable. However, the government is only interested in taxing the amount you gain over and above your expense for maintaining the lodging. You can save valuable tax dollars by being aware of the expenses you can deduct from the rent you receive.

Assume that you own an eight room house. Since you only need six rooms, you decide to rent the other two rooms as a furnished apartment. You will now have two kinds of deductible expenses, those expenses that apply to the house as a unit, and those expenses that apply particularly to the apartment.

As a home owner, you can deduct any property taxes you may have to pay. You can also deduct the interest on a mortgage. This is true whether you rent part of the house or not, but there are some additional deductions you can take from the rent you receive for the two rooms. You can deduct such items as insurance, repairs, collection fees, depreciation, and brokerage commissions. But remember, these deductible expenses must apply directly to the two rooms you are renting. In other words, if you make repairs to the whole house you can only deduct from rent income the cost of repairs applicable to the two rooms being rented.

If you supply any utilities such as gas or electricity to your tenant without making a separate charge, you can deduct a portion of the amount you pay for these utilities from the rent you receive.

Income from renting all or a part of your home should be reported on Schedule G of Form 1040. However, if you perform any substantial services for your tenant, then the rent becomes business income and should be reported on Schedule C. For example, you may be supplying hotel-type services such as breakfast, laundry or cleaning. If such is the case, then you are actually receiving payment for the use of both your property and your services. In effect, you are in the hotel business and must report your income as business income.

### Home as a Business Office

If you can show that it is necessary for you to work at home as a part of earning your income from a business, profession, or job, you may be able to deduct a portion of your household expenses as business expenses.

It may be that you use a room as an office. You have equipped it with a desk, a couple of chairs or other materials for performing your work. You can deduct a portion of the following expenses as legitimate business expenditures: depreciation of your home, heat, light, insurance and so on. You can also deduct any portion of your telephone bill applicable to your business affairs.

If you happen to be renting your home from someone else, you cannot deduct an amount for the depreciation of a portion of the house, but you can claim a share of the rent you pay as a deduction.

Some of the expenses for your home office are fully deductible. These are expenses that relate exclusively to your business, such as supplies, postage, depreciation of your office furniture, and so on.

Whether you are renting your home or using part of it as an office, remember to keep records of as many of your expenses as possible. Although you are entitled to deduct the expenses discussed in this article, the Internal Revenue Service may ask for an explanation of some of the items you deduct. It pays to have whatever information you can gather to support the expenses you claim.

You can get additional information on deductible expenses from the free instruction booklet issued each year by the Internal Revenue Service. A copy will be sent to you together with your income tax forms.
