GET ON THE WING!

God says He deals with people in the same way the mother eagle deals with her young. The eagle has a strong and powerful wing. She builds her nest on high places, in high trees or on high, rocky ledges. She hatches her eggs and raises her little ones in the nest, which is made of sharp briars to ward off intruders. The eagle is a wonderful mother.

The Bible speaks of the mother eagle many times. In the Scriptures (Exodus 19:4; Deuteronomy 32:11, 12) God compares Himself to the mother eagle. He says: "As she taketh them and beareth them on her wings, so I, the Lord, did lead thee"; and, "As an eagle stirreth up her nest, fluttereth over her young, spreadeth abroad her wings over them, taketh them and beareth them, so I bear you on eagles' wings."

When you accept God into your soul, you enter a different atmosphere. You are too big to come down to something little. You have a new outlook on life. God loves us and wants us all to have life in abundance.

Are you sitting on the briars of the eagle's nest? Ask God to lift you up onto His wings, so that you, too, can enjoy life more abundantly.

remains of five of the bomber's crewmen. A diary was found which told the story of the plane's fall and of the ordeal the crew members endured. Several articles and pictures have appeared in magazines and newspapers. In the March 7 issue of Life are several good pictures of Sgt. Moore and the rest of the crew.

Moore, of New Boston, Ohio, was among the second group and the first 500 men to come to Sheppard in 1941. He and Sgt. Royce Kimberlain, now a resident of Iowa Park, became good friends at Sheppard. They were frequent visitors in the C. L. Reeves home here. The two airmen were later sent to Nevada and still later were sent to different bases.

Kimberlain has since married Miss Nell Reeves, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reeves. Moore was sent to Africa. The Kimberlains wrote letters to him but all were returned.

Sgt. Moore was assistant radio-man on the "Lady Be Good," a B-24 bomber, when it took off for a raid on Naples in April 1943.

The ship was lost on its way back to the base in Libya. Neither the bomber nor its crew was heard from again.

Last May a British oil prospector came upon the Lady Be Good, crash-landed but well preserved. There were canteens of water still fit to drink, and edible rations, but no trace of her crew. In February another oilman found the

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Time is drawing near for farmers to enter the Winter Legumes division of the Bridwell Soil Builders Awards program. Entries are to be sent to Wichita Falls chamber of commerce with March 20 as the deadline.

Lester Brooks, superintendent of the Iowa Park experiment station, says it is not too late to plant legumes. He points out that Madrid sweet clover works well in rotation with small grain. It is a biennial and does its best job when seeded in the spring and allowed to complete two full seasons of growth. It can be planted on a prepared seedbed or over-seeded on oats now. When seeded in the fall it acts as an annual and while occupying the land for a full season, results are sometimes disappointing. Seeding rate is 20 pounds per acre.

Judging will begin sometime after the deadline date.

The Iowa Park FFA Chapter will sponsor the 3rd annual Rabies Clinic, Saturday, March 12. Pets may be brought to the Vocational Agriculture Building, Iowa Park High School, from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

A veterinarian from Wichita Falls will be present to vaccinate cats and dogs and the fee will be \$2.00 per animal.

At the close of the campaign all who have attended 10 of the 12 Sundays will receive an award.

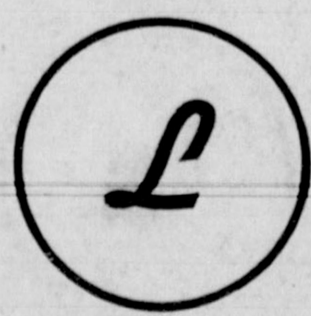

23 Study Club

A required Texas Day program highlighted the 23 Study club meeting at the home of Mrs. Noel Troutman, Thursday afternoon with Mrs. Rollins Woodall sharing hostess duties.

During the business period under direction of Mrs. Homer Blacklock, a \$5 contribution was voted to "Need for More Nurses," a project of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Proceeding the program Supt. Keith Swim spoke to club members concerning an educational problem that affects school, both on a local and state basis. He showed how the problem should be of vital concern locally because of the fast-expanding community.

Mrs. Homer Thompson presented the meditation on "What makes a great state." Mrs. C. L. Metz, leader for the afternoon, gave interesting historical facts about Texas to introduce the program. Topical discussions emphasized three divisions of the Texas Heritage Department.

Mrs. L. E. Brooks, wild flowers chairman of First District, with a figurative brushstroke painted a beautiful picture of the Lone Star state colors and tones of wild flowers native to the state. Reference material for the talk came from Jewell Casey's book "A Hundred and One American Wild Flowers" and W. A. Bridewell, a Texan who spent 30 years studying wild flowers. When Mrs. Brooks had finished, her listeners appreciated to the fullest her opening quotation "Wildflowers are smiles of God's goodness" (Wilberforce).

Mrs. R. R. Brubaker discussed "Old Forts and Missions." She explained that in the 1840's the government began to establish military posts at strategic spots to furnish protection for settlers and travelers. In Texas, from Brownsville to El Paso and from the Rio Grande to the Red three separate lines of forts were established as the frontier moved west.

Today there is a bill in Congress to make Fort Davis a national historic site and Fort Bliss is the only active fort remaining in Texas, according to Mrs. Brubaker. She reminded club members that two of the old forts were in this section of the state: Fort Belknap, 10 miles northeast of Graham, and Fort Richardson, near Jacksboro.

In describing what missions mean to civilization, Mrs. Brubaker said "They embrace the cradle of Texas history; a heritage immortalized by deeds of daring and sacrifice is enthroned in the old monuments."

Among Texas missions, the Alamo is the most prominent but not the oldest. Concepcion is the best preserved, and San Jose has some of the world's most beautiful carving and unusual architecture.

Concluding, Mrs. Brubaker said "We know our missions to revere them. May we be ever faithful to the trust left to us by those valiant pioneers and heroes, and always remember the Alamo."

Climax to the program was reached through a history of Iowa Park given by Mrs. Taylor George. To enhance interest, she displayed a large map of the original townsite, which was preserved for her by her grandfather, the late G. T. Akers; an 1896-97 school roll; and many pictures of early days and people in Iowa Park.

A member of pioneer families, Mrs. George related humorous experiences not found in the town history, that were handed down to her.

Others attending the meeting were Mmes. W. G. Steele, T. M. Thaxton, C. E. Birk, C. J. Thurber, Richey Abernathy, Earle Denny, Fred Widmoyer, Dave O. Harbour, Florence Sherwood, Sam Hill, and James A. Sewell.

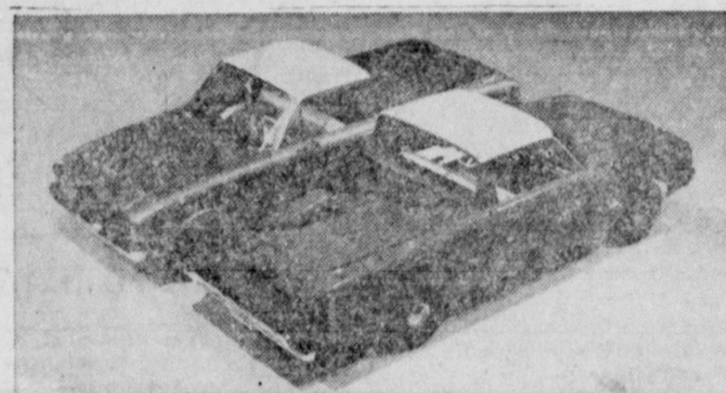

When your nimrod bags the limit—in grouse, quail, duck, dove or pheasant—put the birds you can't use at once in your deep freeze. Then, you can surprise and delight your guests by serving wild game out of season.

But before you freeze the birds be sure to check your state game law. Some states prohibit keeping game after the season has ended.

Remember, wild game should be cleaned, wrapped and frozen just like domestic chickens and geese.

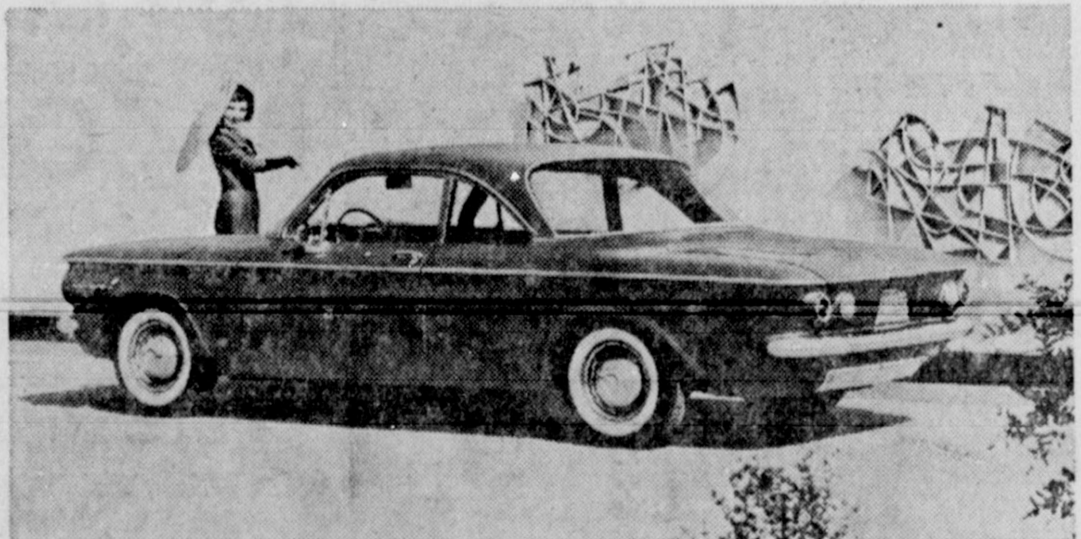

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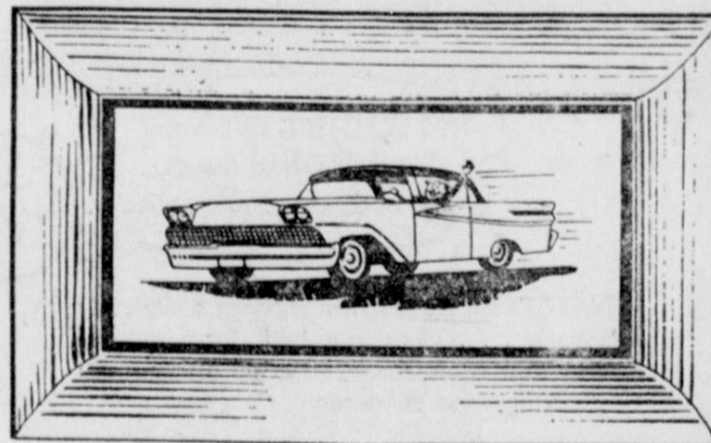
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
