State Champs

On Friday and Saturday, May 6 and 7, Iowa Park Hawks scored a total of 96 points, to win the State Class A track and field meet.

Anahuac was second with 37. The Hawks' total was more than any team ever has scored at the state meet.

Individual heroes were many, but it was team strength that led to complete domination by Iowa Park.

The 440 yard relay team composed of David Parkey, Donald Thompson, Bobby Gilbreath and Tony Waters won first and set a new record of 43.4 seconds.

Tony Waters beat the field with a mighty lunge to win the 100 yard dash in 10.3 seconds.

In the field events Gilbreath won 1st in broad jump with 22.1½ and Waters was 6th with 21.4.

Lyndell Glenn threw the discus 145 ft. 6 in. for second place. He also tied for 4th place in the shotput with 51 ft. 7¼ in.

Gilbreath won the 440 yard dash and tied the state record of 56.2.

Waters placed 3rd in the 180 low hurdles and Donald Thompson ran 2nd in the 220.

At this point Iowa Park was presented the Class A team trophy although all events had not been completed.

In the final event of the day David Parkey, Jim Gard, Donald Thompson and Bobby Gilbreath set a new state record in the mile relay—3:25.5.

The team is coached by Joe Warren and Bill Carter.

Iowa Park will be in Class AA in 1961 and are looking forward to competition in this new class. Boys who return are Bobby Gilbreath, David Parkey, Jim Gard, Jackie Brooks, David Brown, Otha Woods, Gilbert Stogsdill, Jimmy Gillespie, Mike Caldwell, Richard Rauschuber.

That same year Iowa Park was host to the district meet and continued for the next six years.

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 89th District Court of Wichita County, at the Courthouse thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, by filing a written answer at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 20th day of June, A.D. 1960, to Plaintiff's Petition filed in said court, on the 13th day of May, A.D. 1960, in this cause, numbered 65,425-C on the docket of said court and styled Charlie Alvin Long, Defendant, vs. Opal Mae Anglin Long, Plaintiff.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that he and defendant were married on or about February 24th, 1960, and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about February 28th, 1960, when by reason of cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment on the part of the defendant toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation was of such a nature as to render their further living together insupportable; that there were no children born of this marriage and that there is no community property;

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof he have judgment for divorce and for such other and further relief, in law or in equity, to which he may show himself justly entitled, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

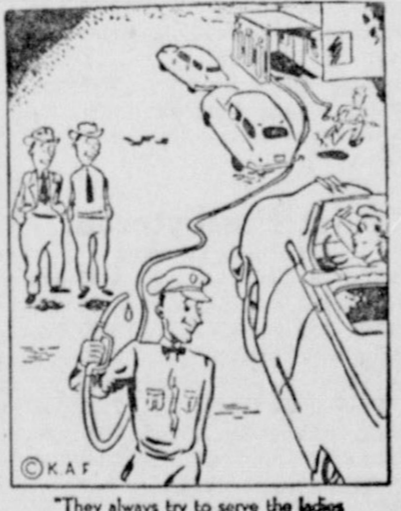

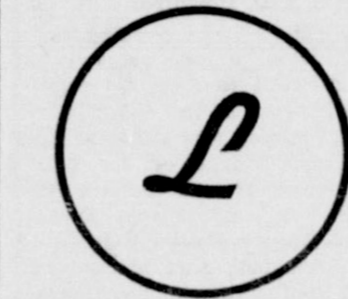

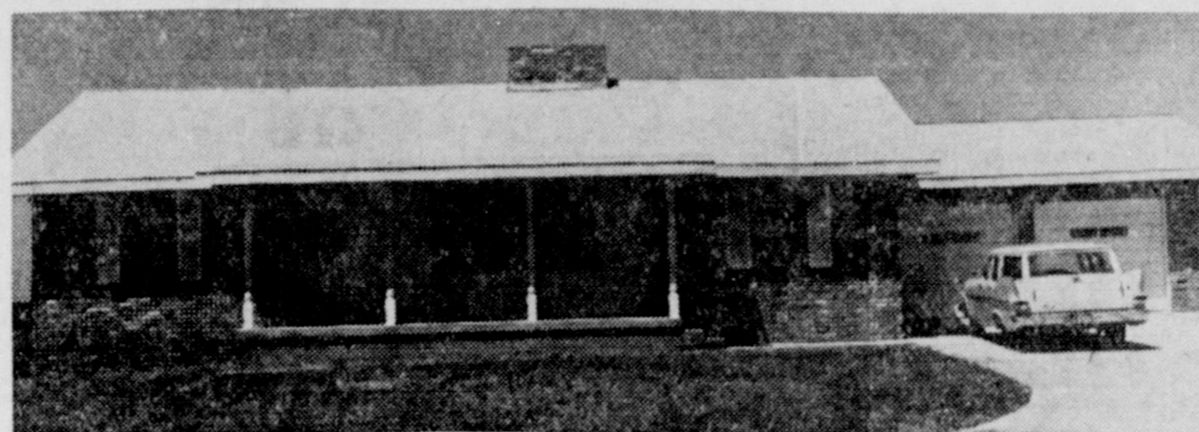
