SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Stubble mulching is the most urgent soil conservation practice in the Iowa Park area, according to Elvy Sargent, soil conservationist with the Wilbarger-Wichita SCD. Farmers are harvesting a good wheat crop, and ample stubble is now on the land to give protection to soil if properly managed, Sargent says.

Conservation plans approved by the SCD must have either stubble mulching or proper residue use planned. Land protection requires a stubble cover.
Stubble Mulching Jamboree on the Louis Sikes farm in south Wichita Falls, June 16, will give all attending an opportunity to see the combination plowing that will best mulch the land.

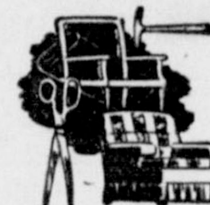

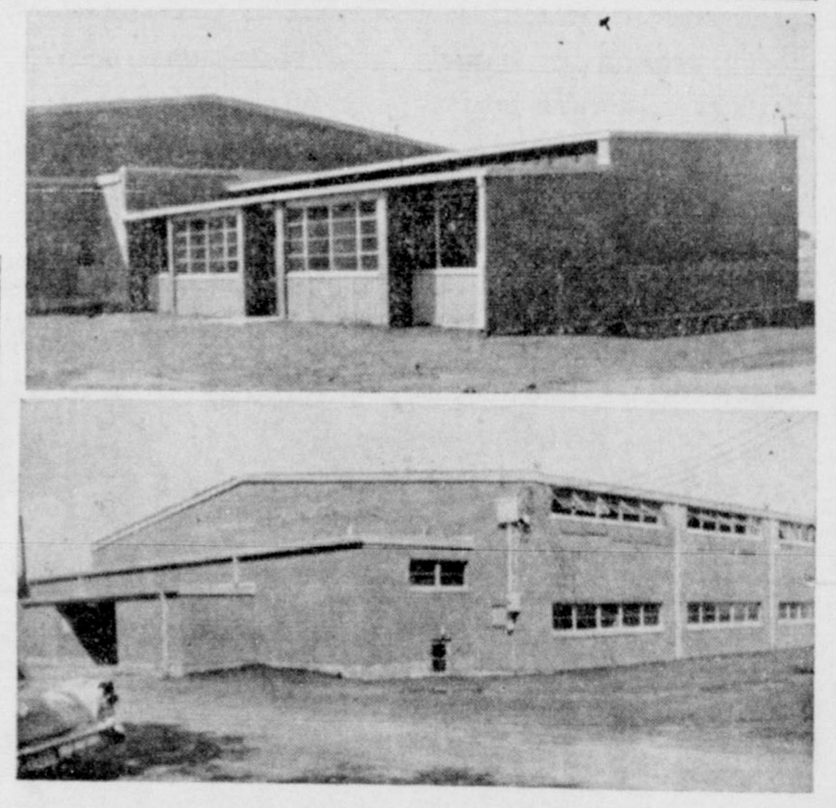
After a picnic lunch, the group was privileged to see the control room of the Fire Department.
