Farm Income Too Low
 By Ralph W. Yarborough
 U. S. Senator from Texas
 Increasing hard times on the farms of Texas and America forewarn a serious recession, a possible depression.
 The 24 per cent drop in farm income since 1952 is partly to blame for the loss in population in 145 Texas counties shown in the 1960 census.
 The farm problem is one of the most complex and vital problems now facing the Congress. It is not just something for the farmer to worry about. When farm income falls off while other income rises, the only result can be that all other business also will suffer.
 The reason is clear. American agriculture uses more finished steel in a year than is consumed in the output of passenger cars. Farm operations use more oil and gasoline than any other industry, and farmers constitute a major user of electric power.
 When farm income declines, virtually every business—particularly in the rural areas—loses proportionately. That's a major reason farm counties of Texas lost population the past 10 years and that we had 350 small business failures in Texas last year.
 The farm program as it is now administered, is a failure to the farmer and to American taxpayer. This is true despite the fact the government is spending three times as much money in the name of agriculture as it was eight years ago, and Agriculture Secretary Benson has increased his staff by 28 per cent in that period.
 Price support cuts advocated by Benson and forced by Administration vetoes have resulted in a 20 per cent cut in price support levels and a 15 per cent increase in production. This has caused a fantastic grain surplus and staggering storage costs to the government.
 A House appropriations committee study, signed unanimously by Republicans and Democrats, found that farm problem "cures" urged by Benson have cost taxpayers almost \$30,000,000,000. To achieve a balanced and healthy economy, the Congress must legislate and the Agriculture Secretary must


