Lower Rate

All that can be done is getting done here to get the Key Rate on fire insurance adjusted downward, according to Morris V. Jacks.

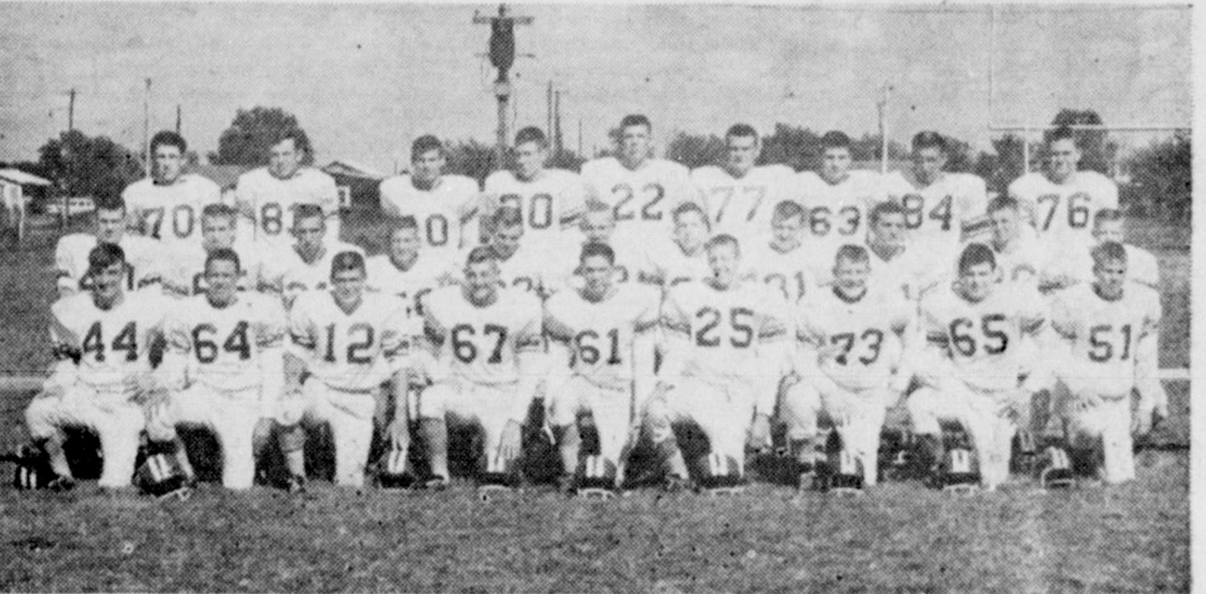

Samuel Wesley Drowns in Railroad Tank Pond

Iowa Park Volunteer Firemen located the body of George Samuel Wesley, who drowned in the railroad water tank about 1 1/2 miles west of town Sunday. George Huckaby dived and brought up the drowned man after he had been found by probing with long poles.

R. R. Brubaker rendered a verdict of accidental death by drowning after an autopsy at Wichita General hospital.

Wesley, 27, of 612 Sullivan, Wichita Falls, was swimming with a companion Charles W. Allmon of Iowa Park.

Terry Austin of Burkburnett, a witness to the accident, was of the bank of the pond, fishing. He said Allmon and Wesley had been fishing and paddled out to the middle of the pond on a raft and began swimming.

A breeze came up, blowing the raft away from the men. Both started toward the raft, then Wesley fell behind, swimming in circles, and yelled to Allmon that he couldn't make it. He made no

attempt to come ashore, which was about 50 yards away. Said Austin, "It seemed he had plenty of time to make it, but looked like he was confused and scared."

Austin ran to his car and got the spare tire as a life preserver and attempted to rescue Wesley, but before he could get into the water Wesley had disappeared. He and Allmon, who by then had recovered the raft, arrived at the spot at about the same time, too late to help.

Allmon was in shock as a result of the tragedy. He and Wesley formerly worked together.

The victim was employed with Hall's Food Market in Wichita Falls most of the past 15 years, working in the stockroom.

He is survived by his widow Beatrice, his father U. S. Wesley, both of Wichita Falls; two sisters: Ceola Estes of Wichita Falls and Juanita Blackmon of Cleveland, Ohio; two brothers: Ulysses Wesley jr. of Wichita Falls and Willie Wesley of Amarillo.

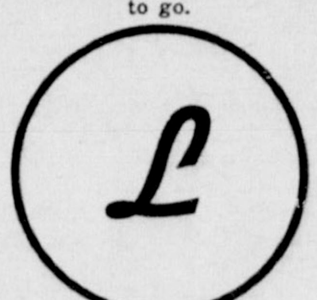
This courtesy is being extended by Frank in appreciation of the moral and material assistance the local congregation has given him in the past.

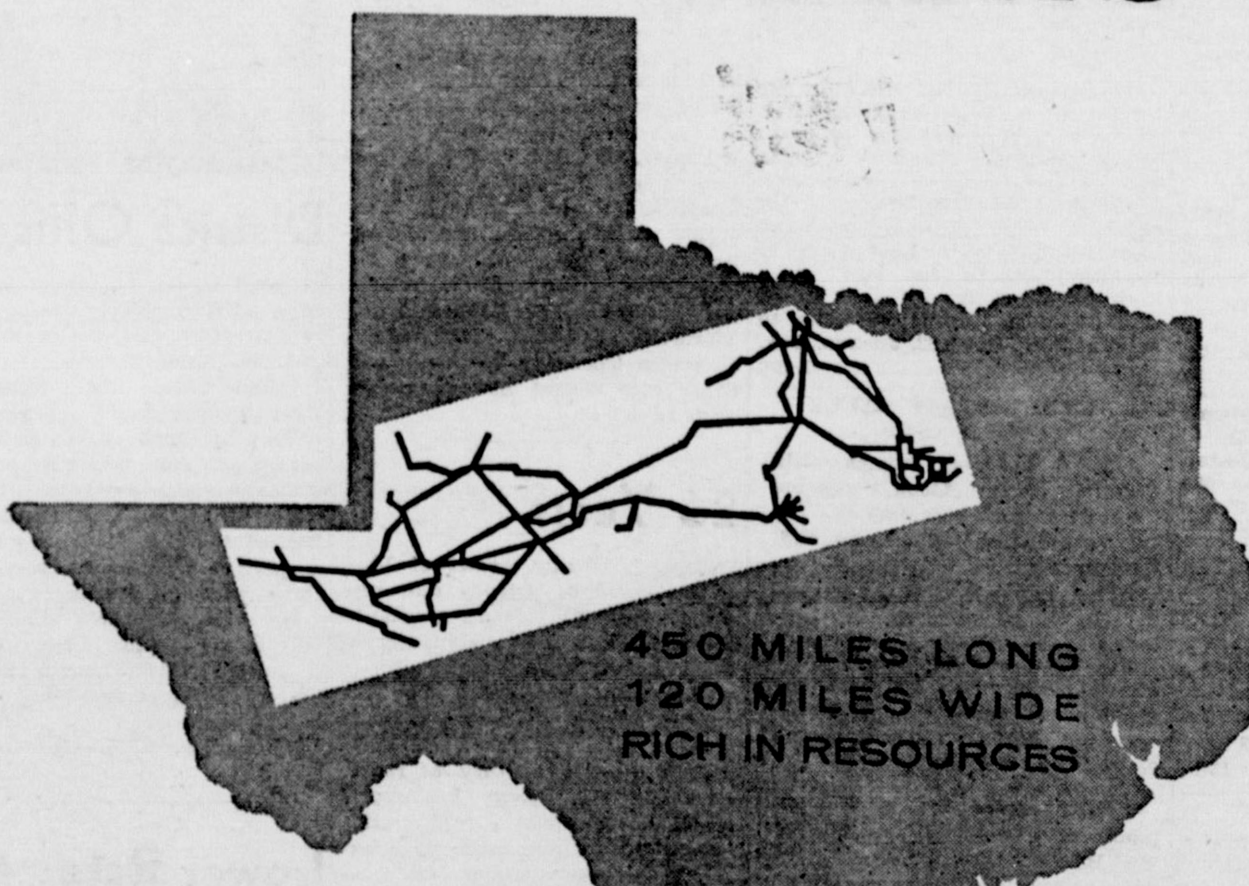

Future Farmers of America is the national organization of, by and for boys studying vocational agriculture in public secondary schools. The FFA is a non-profit, non-political, non-sectarian rural youth organization designed to offer leadership and citizenship training to boys.

Local chapters elect officers annually. Members by studying parliamentary procedure learn to take part in public meetings and assume civic responsibility.

Four degrees are available to FFA members. Two are awarded by the local chapter, one by the state association, and the highest by the national organization. A student must meet certain requirements to qualify for these various degrees.

The FA motto is: Learning to do; Doing to learn; Earning to live; Living to serve.

Boys enrolled in vocational agriculture must have a crop or livestock project for six months to meet provisions of the National Vocational Education act. A project affords opportunity to assume responsibility, secure adequate finances and learn to keep records.

In classwork students study how to produce crops and livestock. They learn how to select, feed and care for the different classes of livestock. Field trips are taken to give practical training in dehorning, branding, vaccinating and castrating livestock.

Students of vocational agriculture spend about 50 percent of the school year in the shop. They study the use of hand tools, power tools, soldering, electrical work, tractor maintenance, concrete work, painting, and welding.

Livestock judging, poultry, dairy land and grass identification are some of the contests vocational agriculture students may participate in on a district, area, state and national level. Various leadership contests are also available. Banners are awarded to winning teams in these contests.

John E. Sibley will begin his seventh year next week as vocational agriculture instructor here. He received the BS degree from Texas A & M and MEd from Colorado A & M. He is a veteran of World War II and the Korean war.

Some of the honors John has received are the Honorary State Farmer degree presented by the Texas FFA in 1957; and a Distinguished Service award from the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers association in 1958. He has served as president of the District Agriculture Workers council and chairman of the agriculture committee of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

FFA teams and members have won many banners and honors under leadership of Sibley. Six teams have entered state judging contests and one team has won a banner in state competition.

Sibley is one of the few vocational agriculture teachers in the state who have completed all five of the Farm Mechanics Short Courses offered at Texas A & M. In 1954 he presented many useful suggestions on shop safety that were used by Bob Craig, professor of Agricultural education at Texas A & M, in his workbook "Modern Farm Shop." He has been given an acknowledgment in the book.

How About You?

by Claude C. McDonald
It is interesting to note that one of the greatest stories told about our Lord's earthly ministry is absent from every Greek manuscript dated earlier than the sixth century. Furthermore it is worthy of note that no Greek writer for a thousand years after the Gospel of John was written comments upon the story which speaks to every generation.
I speak of course of the first 11 verses of the 8th chapter of John. The story is about the woman caught in adultery. As Jesus was teaching, the scribes and Pharisees brought this woman to Him hoping to place Jesus in an impossible position. But much to their surprise, the Master Teacher in a very real way brought home to them that even as the woman, they too were sinners.
It would seem that if there is a single message all of us need hear today, outside of the fact that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, it is that each of us is a sinner and as Paul pointed out, "... fall short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). It is high time that those of us who profess Christianity realize there are other ways a person separates himself from his Creator in addition to the one the woman of this story had committed. None the least of these is callousness toward another person. And actually this is the main point of this story placed in the fourth Gospel.
After witnessing several events of this past week, I am wondering if many of us don't need to voluntarily place ourselves before our Lord and be sensitive to His gentle but cutting remark: "Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her" (Jno. 8:7). As we think about it let us not especially, Jesus did not say, "Let him who is without sin..." God grant that each of us this day may open up our hearts that the Holy Spirit may speak to us through this passage, then let us not only forgive but seek to find a real love in our hearts for those who for some reason or other up to this time have seemed to us to be unlovely.
Finally then let us ask God's forgiveness for our sins of pride and callousness, and thank Him, knowing that as we are truly repentant He has forgiven us. Jesus said: "... go, and do not sin again" (Jno. 8:11).
