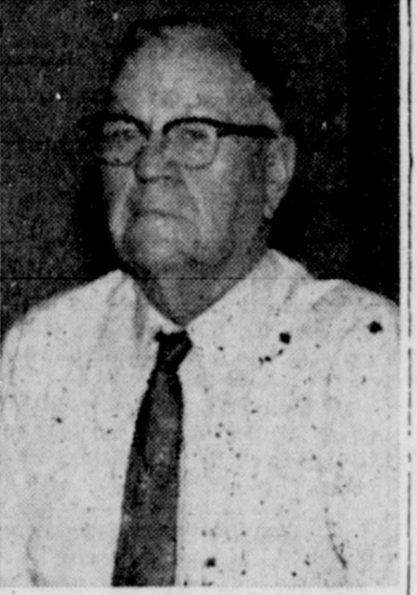

School Traffic Safety Week

Third annual Texas School Traffic
 Safety Week will be observed
 during the period Sept. 18-24.
 Iowa Park has joined with many
 cities in observing this statewide
 campaign to help save lives—espe-
 cially of school children.

 The approach of National Safety
 Week reminds us of the many pre-
 cautions we should take to safe-
 guard the lives of our school chil-
 dren. Parents and teachers should
 take the time fully to explain to
 the children the things which
 many of them already know but
 need to be reminded constantly of
 for their protection to and from
 school.

There are several dangerous
 crossings in town, not necessarily
 dangerous if everyone would ob-
 serve traffic signals, but unfortu-
 nately, that isn't always done.
 Since this is true, we are looking
 forward to the day when a safety
 patrol system can be set up in
 our town sponsored by the city and
 state police force.

When and if this happens we,
 as teachers and parents, will be
 able to overcome the uneasy feel-
 ing we share from 8:00 a.m. until
 4:00 p.m. each week day.

School children should certainly
 assume some responsibility for
 their own protection. Too often
 they pay little or no attention to
 the traffic around them. Because
 of this much of the time an ac-
 cident is not the fault of the driver.

This is especially true of bicycle
 riders. They cut in front of cars
 in most dangerous fashions, some-
 times riding much too close to the
 cars. Here again parents and in-
 structors should impress upon them
 the fact that safety is a matter
 for all concerned and not just for
 the driver.

 It isn't necessary to look far
 to see the vital need for educating
 young and old in the rules for
 traffic safety. We need only to
 read our paper to find that once
 again the automobile has taken
 its toll in lives of the people of
 our state. Texas traffic crashes
 have taken more than 2300 lives
 each year during the past 5 years,
 bringing injury to 119,000 persons
 each year.

For several years a drive has
 been underway to cut the number
 of accidents due to carelessness
 and fast driving. Our schools work
 side by side in this drive. Safety
 education is taught in each seg-
 ment of our curriculum.

Probably the outstanding course
 offered in high school which em-
 phasizes traffic safety is the driver
 education course. Through this
 course our young people learn the
 art of safe and sane driving.

Graduates of this course have an
 excellent record in that their ac-
 cident rate is far below average.
 Insurance companies recognize the
 value of this course in their rate
 reduction for students who have
 completed the course.

Each of us has a responsibility
 for maintaining safe driving hab-
 its for ourselves and our families.
 Let Texas School Traffic Safety
 Week extend past the bounds of
 school and be observed by each of
 us. The facts we learn may save
 someone's life.

 safety rules to learn and follow.

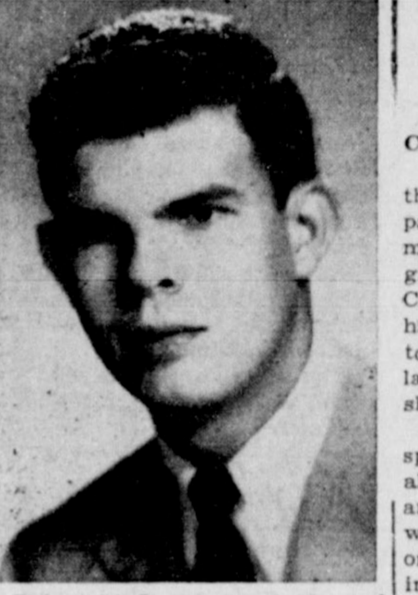
When we realize 545 of the 2,453

 24 hold about 18.3 per cent of all
 Texas drivers' licenses but their
 part in traffic accidents outside of
 cities is 27 per cent.

Parents, encourage your child
 to take this course offered in high
 school so he will receive the proper
 training and knows the rules and
 regulations of safety driving.

We know our boys and girls in
 Iowa Park and Texas are anxious
 to become good drivers and good
 citizens and will be willing to help
 save lives wherever they drive.

Guthrie & Miller General Contractors recently moved into their new air conditioned office and storage building located on Johnson Road in the Country Hills Estates. The 24x48 building is constructed of red stann metallic steel.

The front office and reception room is of buff fabric and mahogany paneling. The floor of vinyl tile has a cream and brown spatter pattern.

There are a large mahogany desk, ample closet space, file cabinets and portable coffee bar in the main office. Other furnishings are two comfortable swivel chairs covered with black and orange leather; with matching curtain at the windows.

The powder room is also done in tan fabric with mahogany paneling board.

The offices of N. E. Guthrie Jr. and Chester Miller, co-owners, are of ash paneling. The desks are buff in color with formica working surfaces. There is a large slanted draftsman board with storage shelves above. A plan rack for blueprints also has storage shelves. The room accommodates many file cabinets.

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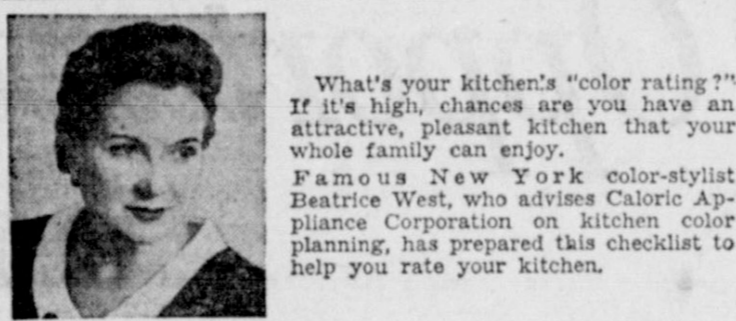
