### Entertainment

The 1960 Texas-Oklahoma Fair and Southwest Oil Exposition will swing its gates open for business next Monday morning at 9:00.

Judging of various department entries will begin and last through the day.

Junior high school band contest will be held at 3:00 and the Opening Day Parade will begin at 5:30.

At 7:15 the mighty Midwestern university Cavalcade of Music will be presented in the Fair Auditorium. Other free shows will follow.

Each night there will be a free show on stage in the auditorium.

The Fair has the largest entry lists of exhibitors in all departments in its history. The Fair will close at midnight Saturday.

Claude McDonald offered the invocation. The singing five—Rosemary Clark, Jeri Goss, Frances Clark, Bertha Barnett and Elaine Sawyer—presented luncheon music.

Guests introduced by Lion Tamer Taylor George were Tom Pace, Mrs. Virginia McManus, Mrs. R. R. Brubaker, Mrs. Claude McDonald, and Mrs. Martha Greer and Mrs. Beulah Ellison, both of Arlington.

Royce Echols reported the Lions club float will be ready for the Fair parade.

W. R. Bradford served as program chairman.

The speaker has devoted many years to this outstanding exposition. He said "I come to you to talk about the T-O Fair because I like the Fair. Fairs started 130 years ago in New England and it has come down through the years with the same excitement and thrill."

The Iowa Park Fair has grown into one of the largest and best of its kind. The junior livestock show draws entries from as far away as Norman, Okla. The Pioneer Day program is the best attended event anywhere.

Redin Heights, northwest just off the Electra highway, has several construction firms building a large number of homes.

Brick-Time Homes, with J. T. Parker and Clyde Douglas as contractors, have completed 31 three-bedroom homes in the \$10,750 price class. They have 10 more under construction.

Frank Harlin Sub-Division has completed 51 homes and has five more under construction. These three-bedroom houses are of brick and brick-trim and range in price from \$10,500 to \$14,000.

Lincoln Enterprises has completed approximately 10 homes in the west part of town.

Sullivan-Krottinger Addition in the northeast part of the city, near the Youth Center, has completed 12 brick homes in the price range of \$11,900 to \$16,500.

At present this addition has 31 brick homes, with 10 more under construction. These 3 and 4 bedroom homes range in price from \$15,000 to 30,000. Most of these homes are owned by local residents who formerly lived in town or in the area.

Plans for Country Hills Estates call for a shopping center, a school site, park and swimming pool, two church locations, hospital, and a large bowling alley. Plans also allow for a modern shopping center. The bowling alley will get under construction soon.

J and J Construction Co. (John Crow and John Thompson of Electra) has completed 10 houses in this restricted addition and has more under construction.

A plat just east and north, adjoining the Country Hills Estates, for 785 homes is to be opened in the near future. All are FHA approved.

Highland cemetery has also received a face-lifting. Members of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sponsored the project, so now the cemetery has three attractive entrances.

With all its expansion, it is our belief that Iowa Park will remain "the town of friendly living."

### Dedication of Fair

To Congressman Frank Ikard, honorable representative of the State of Texas, the officers and directors of the T-O Fair respectfully co-dedicate this 1960 Fair.

Being a native of Clay county, the massive 6 ft. 4 in. lawmaker has made his home area proud of his many accomplishments. A relatively young Congressman, he was a war hero in World War II.

Twice wounded while serving as a front line rifleman in the infantry, Frank along with most of his company was captured by the Germans. While being held prisoner, he dropped from 225 to 135 pounds.

After returning from the war, Ikard in 1951 was elected to Congress. A member of the ways and means committee, which decides on all questions dealing with federal taxes and tariff duties, the soft-spoken representative has been at the forefront in the fight for mandatory import quotas on foreign oil.

To Honorable Frank Ikard, the congressman, to Frank Ikard the war veteran, and to Frank Ikard the man — Texas-Oklahoma Fair pays tribute.

During World War II, Albert served in the Pacific, rising from private to lieutenant colonel.

To Carl Albert, the Sooner state's brilliant representative, to Carl Albert, House majority whip, to Carl Albert the scholar, and to Carl Albert the outstanding citizen—Texas-Oklahoma Fair pays tribute.



**Services Have Exhibits**

Visitors at the Fair next week will get first-hand opportunity to learn about the latest missiles in the US army's arsenal for defense. Arrangements have been made to have the exhibit transported to Iowa Park with specialists on hand to answer questions concerning the missiles and space program.

Within the exhibit are two actual missiles—the Hawk and the SS-10. Tracing the history of rocketry from A.D. 1232 to the present era of missiles and satellites, the exhibit will feature colorful paintings and photo murals depicting launchings, man-in-space research and the Pioneer IV — now in orbit around the sun.

A color motion picture showing actual firings of army missiles is also included. Admittance is free.


Parents of the bridegroom are Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Clements of Wichita Valley Gardens.






**Let Me Off Here.. a Plea for Sanity**

by Boyd Schlenther

The bandwagon has gone much too far, and I want off here! It is the "stop a Roman Catholic for President Bandwagon" that I am leaving. And I am not stepping off to jump on an "Elect Kennedy for President Bandwagon" either. It is just that the company has gotten so bad.

I am a thorough, through and through Protestant, a "son of the Reformation," a determined Presbyterian. Some of my long-ago generations forefathers were Scottish Presbyterian ministers. But I do not believe that this in any way forces me to participate in the activities of what I must call "the Protestant underworld!"

The pulpit for the preaching of the Word of God, Jesus Christ,

under whom Christians live, has been defamed, dragged down into half-truths, and weakened by being used as the sounding-board for Protestant preachers' prejudices. Some non-Roman-Catholic churches (not all of whom we could call "Protestant," thank goodness) have thrown their entire time and energies into a campaign which has been studded with hysteria, half-truths, and sometimes, just outright lies. It seems that any method, any ammunition, is justified, as long as we can keep the nuns off the White House lawn.

This community has certainly not been exempt from such bitter attacks, all the way from the perverted pulpit to printed material which would revolt any intelligent person. Much of this claims to be "official" Roman teaching, but in

reality has been written or "interpreted" by some anti-Roman-Catholic bigot.

Now, none of this is to say that there can be no asking of questions regarding a candidate's religion, or that we are bigots if we do. Hardly. There are important questions to be asked of a Roman Catholic, simply because his church has such a strong control in its members' lives. Those people who say that we have NO right to question a candidate on the relation of his church to his government are wrong. But Senator Kennedy has stated as clearly as he will be able to state, HIS position on the relation of church and state. He has declared categorically that he will not follow the church if its judgment on political issues differs from his own. He has stated without reservation that he does not believe in public support for parochial schools, in the appointment of an American ambassador to the Vatican (a policy favored by an Episcopalian and a Baptist incumbent of our highest office), and so forth.

Now, the risk lies in the fact that the Roman Catholic church officially has another understanding of the relation of church and state. But I honestly NO LONGER believe that the risk would be such a great one. Do we really think that the Roman Catholic church would exert pressure on a Roman Catholic President? It would be generations before another Roman Catholic could even be nominated to high office. Adenauer in Germany and De Gaulle in France, both Roman Catholics, have shown no sign of the "hidden Roman Catholic plot to take over the world."

I am not appealing for a light-hearted, light-headed look at the issues involved; there ARE issues, and the Roman Catholic candidate

should be questioned. I AM pleading for a bit of sanity from our side. If present tendencies continue, many intelligent and responsible citizens will conclude that Protestants are the narrow-minded ones, and that they, RATHER THAN ROMAN CATHOLICS are characterized by bigotry or an exclusive position. If the Roman Catholics ever become a majority of our American population (and that looks highly unlikely now) what would they remember?

Would they remember Protestants as those who defended the rights of a democracy? Would the Roman Catholic have learned to appreciate something of the freedom of a democratic order which they will want to defend and expand for all people? Or would the Roman Catholic remember that he has been treated as a second-class citizen, subjected to the bitterness of generations of oppression and deprivation growing out of a class judgement? And will he have the temptation, then, to repay in kind?

The threat of the Pope running the United States through a Roman Catholic President sounds to me quite like the threat of intermarriage the racists constantly present to rationalize their insecurity into a tenable position. And I suppose the thing that we should really be asking ourselves has to do with our insecurities. Is our ULTIMATE fear that the Pope will run this country, or could our fear be that by having a President who is a Roman Catholic, we will have a positive and picturesque reminder that WE PROTESTANTS DO NOT RUN THINGS ANY LONGER, and that we and the Roman Catholics will have to learn to live together, side by side. What is our motive; and what is our fear? We had really better ask ourselves that.

I believe that JUST BECAUSE WE ARE PROTESTANTS we will want to hop off the bigots' bandwagon right now. And it is not because we are theologically soft, but because some of the company we have been keeping (mainly the leadership) is such questionable company. We are Protestant Christians, and this means that we will not be herded into mass hysteria. And, besides, we need to have time to think.





## Iowa Park Depot Being Razed

As Iowa Park grows she must lose some of the old landmarks. As she expands with new additions and larger population, the city limits get larger.

The latest landmark to go is the Ft. Worth and Denver depot.

Some oldtimers think the original building constructed in 1889 was still part of the depot. Others say the original building was replaced about 1919. Anyway, as our town grew, the depot was expanded until it had a large waiting room, large office space, freight room and loading dock.

In the past several years most of

the building had not been used much. With cars and buses and other modes of travel of today, Charlie Thurber (a character all his own) the last of the depot employees (agent, freightman, janitor etc.) found time hanging on his hands. He reported passenger ticket sales were few and far between.

After FW&D installed the automatic signal system from Wichita Falls to Childress, the Western Union office was moved from the depot.

Even though the closing of the depot followed approval of the Texas Railroad Commission, there will always be a vacant spot and happy memories for all oldtimers who used to gather at the depot to "see the train come in." It was the gathering place to see newcomers, friends and relatives get off at Iowa Park.

The old FW&D train depot has seen happy occasions as well as sad ones. In the early 1890's some families took their first train ride to come to Iowa Park and establish homes and rear families.

A true oldtimer, Uncle Aaron Brubaker was here to see the first train arrive and helped load it with cattle. A Mr. McHugh was

one of the first ticket agents here. A modern metal tool shed will be built on the location to house motor cars and other equipment for the Iowa Park section gang under the foreman J. A. Berg.

Lumber being removed from the old depot will be used in various structures in and around Iowa Park.

What happened to Thurber? He retired after more than 40 years of railroad service.
