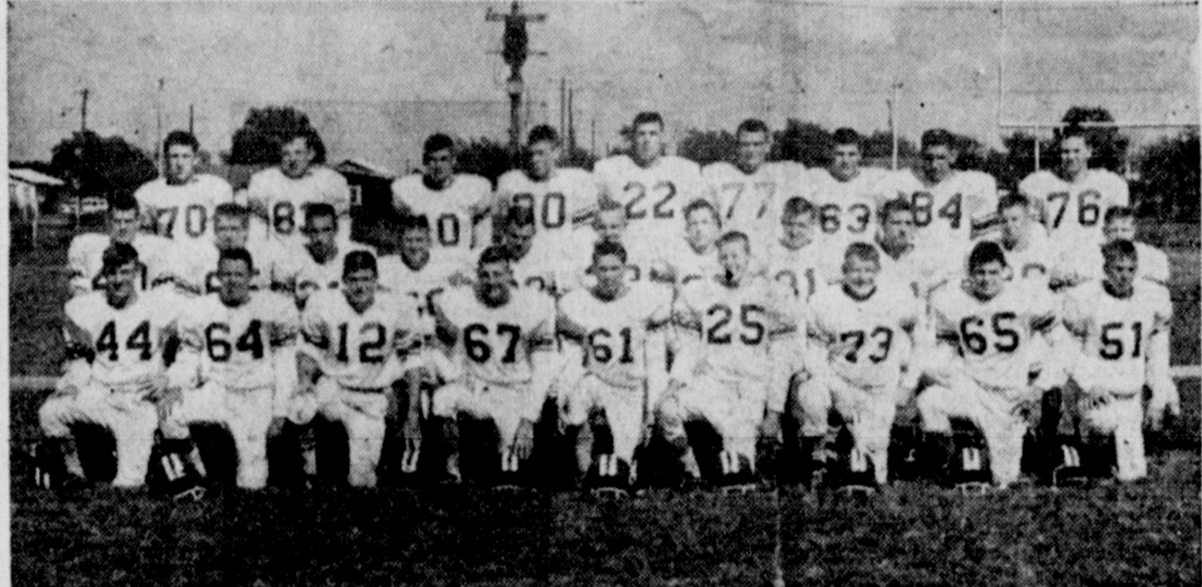

## Who's Confused?

Henry Cabot Lodge has added a new brand of pepper to the  
 Republican campaign recipe in his speeches and press state-  
 ments as GOP vice-presidential candidate. Lodge presents the  
 voter with problems that have not been solved publicly.

Lodge has endorsed federal financial assistance to parochial  
 schools. He has promised that Nixon, if elected president, will ap-  
 point a Negro to his cabinet, not because of the Negro's ability  
 but because the presence of a black man in the cabinet would be  
 good medicine in Africa and Asia.

And Lodge is remembered in the US Senate as author of an  
 unsuccessful attempt to remove the depletion allowance from the  
 oil industry.

We can spare a spring of sympathy for Tricky Dick, whose bland  
 recipe for campaign soothing syrup has been so rudely spiced up  
 by his campaign partner. It probably was jolting enough when the  
 official spokesman for the Ku Klux Klan endorsed Nixon-Lodge.

It may be painful for him that religionists continue fanning an  
 anti-Roman-Catholic crusade against John F. Kennedy, the Demo-  
 cratic nominee. These blows, however painful, might be fruitful of  
 votes in parts of the nation.

But then here comes running mate Lodge to hold up the other  
 side of the signboard, unannounced in advance.  
 It must be painful indeed.

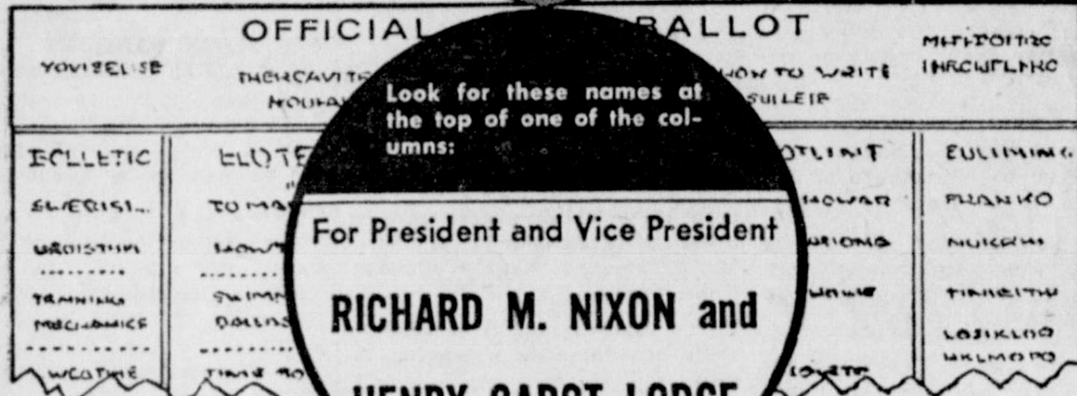

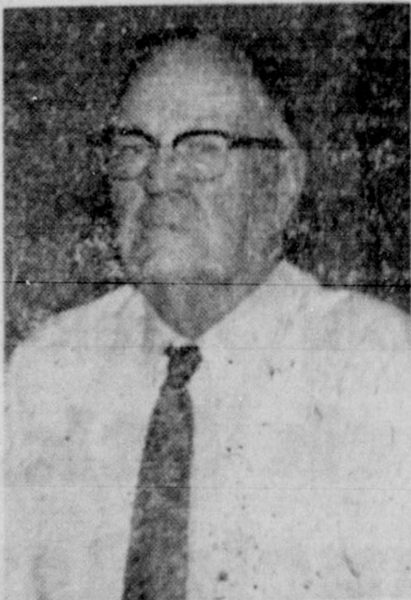

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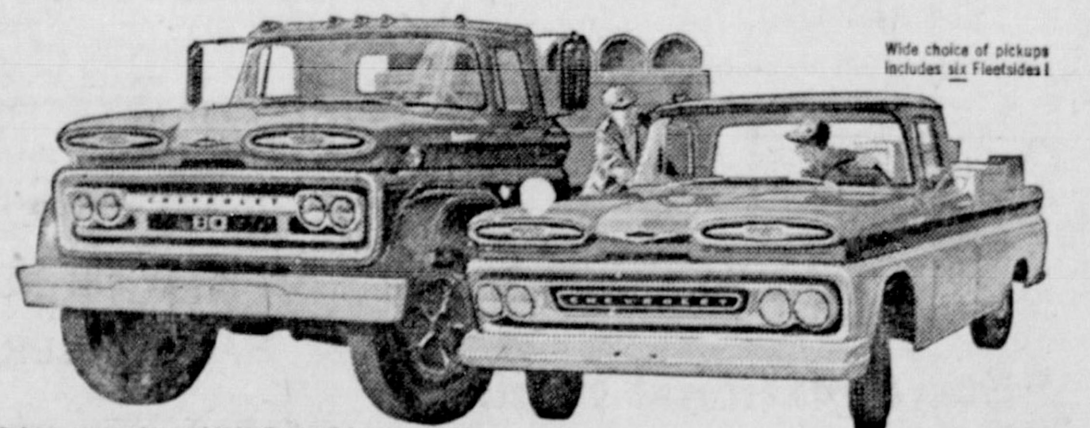
