## ABUNDANT LIFE

### DOES IT MATTER?

What if David had said, "My neck is too valuable to risk under the sword of such a mighty warrior as Goliath?"

Would it have mattered? What if Abraham had said, "Ask anything, but do not ask the life of my son Isaac?"

What if Esther had said, "I dare not face King Ahasuerus, for he will destroy me?"

What if the lowly widow had said, "Elijah shall not have the little measure of meal and oil which stands between my son and me and starvation?"

Who would have blamed any of them for refusal under their circumstances, and would it really have mattered if they had acted otherwise? Does it matter how you act in your circumstances of life?

We know the great spiritual significance of Abraham's willingness to kill his own son in obedience to God. We know the course of the history of the physical world would have been changed if Goliath had slain David. Esther's decision was in behalf of a great people. Perhaps, more than they realized it, we now realize the significance to others of their decisions. But did it really matter? Couldn't it have been worked out some other way?

And what about the widow? Certainly whether the widow lived or died made no difference historically or otherwise. Why ask the life of a lowly widow? Did it really matter that much?

Notice that in each case, God called for a life. Notice, also, in each case, that God gave what He requested. He asked for life, and He gave life.

If life matters, it matters what we do about our call from God.

In the sight of God, the widow's life was as precious as the life of Isaac, or of David, or of Esther. If this were not so, God would not have called for the life of the widow. If this were not so, God would not call for you. God calls only to save. Only precious things are saved.

One soul lost is a tragedy of momentous concern to that soul and to God. A lost soul is the greatest of all tragedies because it is the only thing in existence which has no remedy. After death there is no salvation, no hope for a lost soul.

Whether king or shepherd, whether mighty or lowly, God calls for every life in order to save every soul. The only way to save your life is to give it to God. Isaac, David, Esther and the widow lived long lives on earth, and they live today because they trusted God with their most precious possessions.

Does it matter? It is the one thing that really does matter.

## Camp Fire Candy Sale

It is Camp Fire Candy Time in North Central Texas. Next Monday afternoon, hundreds of Blue Birds, Camp Fire girls and Horizon girls will go forth with boxes of Golden Jubilee chocolates to try their talents as candy salesmen.

This sale is important to the Camp Fire program. It helps provide resident summer camping for girls of this area by helping in building and improving Camp Le-toll near St. Jo. The camp is well equipped to take care of 125 girls per session, providing swimming, horseback riding, camp craft, Indian lore, hiking and many other wholesome and character developing experiences. It offers these to girls of this area at a moderate fee each summer.

Through the sale, the girls also add to their own group treasuries and contribute to a fund for special all-council activities. They also earn camp memberships or parts of their camp tuition.

To make the candy sale part of the educational program, leaders use various methods in preparation for the event. Some groups visit stores, letting merchants show them other products and demonstrate selling techniques. Others use puppets they have made to reenact good and bad ways to meet the public. Some groups work on posters about the sale, the purpose of it and the ways it helps the girls. Through these training devices, girls learn the values to them personally in working on the project, i.e., in developing self-confidence and poise, in learning to work as a team, and in getting practice in making change and keeping accurate records.

The Bloodmobile from American Red Cross Blood Bank in Wichita Falls and sponsored by the Iowa Park Junior Chamber of Commerce will be in our city on Nov. 30 from 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m.

Jim Cunningham, blood program chairman, requests that anyone who is eligible to donate blood visit the bloodmobile and give a pint of blood to be used exclusively by citizens of Iowa Park and vicinity, which includes Valley View, Kamay and Kadane Corner.

Anyone between the ages of 18 and 59 who passes the physical checkup is eligible to give blood. Written permission of a parent is required for unmarried persons under 21.

Cunningham emphasizes that no blood is ever wasted. If it is not used for transfusions within three weeks, it is made into plasma or blood derivatives which keep indefinitely. One of these blood derivatives is gamma globulin, commonly known as "GG."

A small child in our city, Gary Hutson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Hutson, 115 James Drive, requires from one to two injections of GG monthly. This fluid is the part of the blood system of the body of a normal person which prevents polio and other dread diseases. Without these injections Gary could not live a normal life.

Cunningham points out that you may eat normally up to four hours before donation time, and that black coffee, toast without butter, or carbonated beverages are accepted after that time.

The group saw pictures of both ancient and modern Israel. Explaining the country is of great extremes, he showed rocky, arid desert-like country and beautiful lakes and green fields.

An unusual plant called fodder beet, often weighing as much as 20 pounds, is raised for cattle feed. An acre will often produce 40 to 50 tons of these beets.

Fertilized and irrigated soil is helping Israel to raise tomatoes. They are grown on trellis like poles much like our grape arbors. In the spring, plants are covered individually with plastic to ward off the cold.

Israel is spending much money and time on poultry. The houses for poultry are often four stories high.

Marshes are being drained and lush farmlands developed on formerly useless land.

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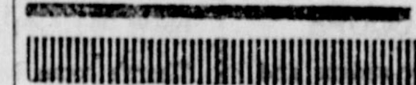
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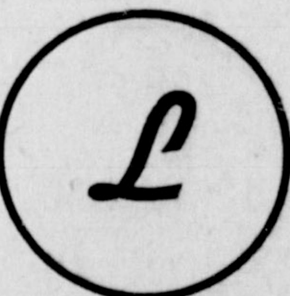
