First, let us say it is a great experience to go places with men who are deeply interested in their work. Elvy Sargent, who invited us to make the trip, talks, eats, drinks and probably even dreams Soil Conservation and its blood kin Water Conservation.

Ralph Swinford, chairman of Wilbarger-Wichita SCD board of supervisors and a dedicated conservation farmer, is concerned in all phases of the work and gives freely of his time for the benefit of the district.

Joe Brown, farm editor of the Wichita Falls newspapers, talks the language of the farmer and is truly interested in all agricultural advances and reverses.

Arriving at Dallas, we went directly to the auditorium, registered and began taking an active part in the conference. To this writer the displays of machinery and fertilizer had more meaning than the talks of guest speakers.

But to the agriculture folk the speeches were important and they drank in great gulps of information. In fact even the speakers' best jokes received only polite applause—they seemed only roadblocks in the flow of information traffic.

We enjoyed the press conference Friday afternoon with Congressman Bob Poage. There's a man who seems to know the agriculture score. Burden of his comment was—Soil and water conservation finally has been sold to the farmer; now it must be sold to the city dweller so he will understand its importance and support its program.

We don't own a plow or a cow, but if we did we'd like to have the help of soil and water conservation folk like Sargent and Swinford. And we believe newspapermen like Brown will finally get the story told to us city blokes.

Invocation was offered by Homer Thompson. A guest Douglas Feazel, minister of education of First Baptist church, was introduced by Lion Tamer Taylor George.

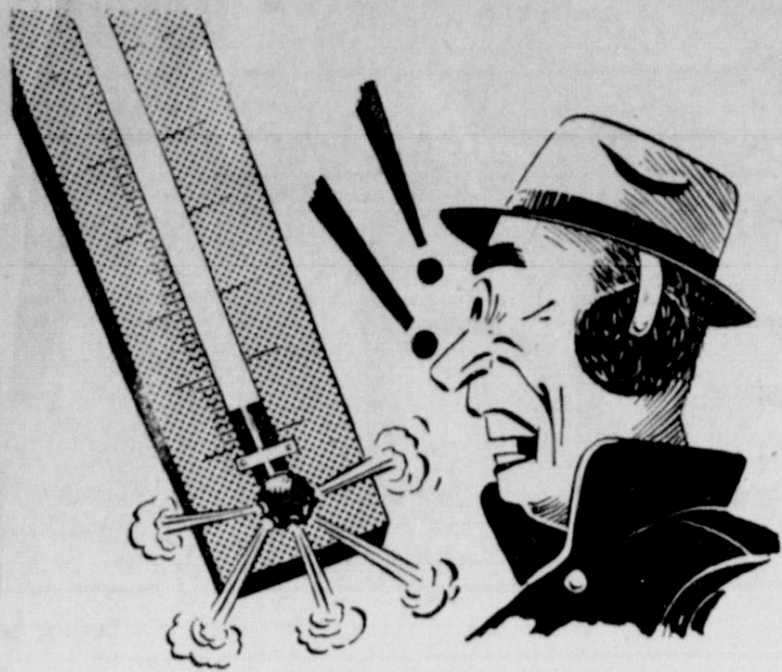
The club voted Bud Mercer and Bill McNeely into membership.

In most major crimes today, stolen cars are used. Do as much as you can to keep your car safe. Lock it when parked to prevent auto theft and theft of clothing or merchandise you may carry in it. Almost every stolen car is one in which the keys are left. Don't leave yours!

Think safely! Drive safely. Only you can prevent accidents. Streets become unsafe mostly because careless, thoughtless, discourteous drivers make them that way. A courteous driver, using common sense and good judgment and co-operating with the police, will reach his destination safely. It's careful driving by you that saves lives and prevents damage to other cars and property. Incidentally it's while driving that most people come in contact with their police force.

Reputable people have nothing to fear from the police; that's why you should not be offended if the police should stop you to inquire about your identity and business in a specific area. The officer is not enjoying stopping and questioning you any more than you are enjoying the situation—it is just another part of his job of protecting someone's security, maybe your own. Be glad he is alert and aware of his responsibility.

Your police department is anxious to help you, but can do so only in direct proportion to the help you give it. Co-operate with your police to the fullest. See for yourself that they are doing the best job they can; that they are helping to keep yours an orderly, law-abiding community and a safe and happy place in which to live.

The security of your person, family and household, your neighborhood and community rest largely in your own hands. Police forces have been established to give organization to this security, to give plan and effectiveness. Your police force alone and unaided cannot make lives or property secure.

There is much that you as an individual can do. This is a good community and we are proud of it. Your police force will help keep it safe for the citizens to work in and live in as friends and neighbors.

Garden Club

Highlighting the business session of a meeting of the Iowa Park Garden club Friday morning was election of officers. Mrs. Clyde Hutchinson was named president. Serving with her will be Mmes. I. W. Corder, vice-president; David Dodge, secretary-treasurer; L. C. Hill, parliamentarian; Homer Blalock, reporter.

Mrs. O. N. Newman, president, announced that the Feb. 10 meeting will feature an address by Mrs. Jack Farley, president of the Wichita Falls Audubon society. Another special event will be the two-day workshop conducted Feb. 15-16 by Mrs. K. Bruce Davidson of Wichita Falls.

Mrs. L. E. Brooks contributed an interesting program on "The Love of My Life," her own words describing her feeling for the iris she grows. Mrs. Brooks, whose husband is superintendent of the experiment station near Iowa Park, has an iris garden with between 700 and 800 varieties. She was appointed judge by the American Iris society in 1944 and a garden judge in 1956.

She was introduced by Mrs. W. G. Steele, program chairman. Mrs. Brooks noted that the iris is the busy person's flower and the man's flower and observed that because it is a man's flower, fast progress has been made in the breeding work.

In describing its historical background, Mrs. Brooks mentioned that historians of antiquity believe the lily of the valley that Christ referred to was a native white iris. She stated that some type of the flower is adapted to the entire northern hemisphere.

The French court uses the fleur-de-lis as the official flower. In England, iris seeds have been used as substitute for coffee. In Japan it is felt that brushing a baby girl's face with iris seed powder will cause her to be beautiful.

During the 6th century the Greeks and Mohammedans almost worshipped the iris. It has been used for medicine and for the removal of freckles.

Mrs. Brooks mentioned that the Dutch iris and the bearded iris are adapted to this area. She explained how to prepare the beds and the culture of the plants.

"Styles change in iris just as they do in everything else. Trend now is toward the frilly variety," the speaker said. To augment the program, Mrs. Brooks showed slides of famous iris gardens in Nashville, Tenn.; Portland, Ore.; Dallas, Gainesville, Wichita Falls; and her own lovely garden.

**An Editorial
Business Men In Politics**

Personal sacrifice is expected when a man puts aside his business or professional career to assume the responsibilities of public service. The comfortable security and substantial financial rewards for success in private industry are thus laid away for the heavy burdens and fierce complexities of government administration in this uncertain period of our history.

Nothing in recent times brings this fact into such sharp focus as the appointment of Robert S. McNamara, president of the Ford Motor Company to the post of Secretary of Defense in the cabinet of President-Elect John F. Kennedy.

Mr. McNamara was president of Ford for approximately one month, a job which reason suggests must have been the goal toward which he strove during the previous 15 years he was with the company. In the brief span of a few days he was able to resign his job at Ford, divest himself of all Ford stock and options to buy more and accept the Kennedy appointment.

It is estimated that this decision will cost Mr. McNamara about three million dollars. The new job pays \$25,000 a year. At Ford his earnings approached \$500,000 a year.

How many of us could exhibit this kind of zeal for our country?

What is more remarkable, however, is that both Mr. McNamara and Ford are practicing what they preach. For some years past Ford Motor Company through its chairman and now president, Henry Ford II, has urged all its employees to take an active part in political affairs, to work for better government, strive for elective office where necessary to achieve it and accept appointment to office where it is necessary, regardless of sacrifice.

This has not been lip service to an ideal. It has been a working campaign which involved many Ford people at all levels and always strictly in behalf of the individual's own party.

Our country can use men like Mr. McNamara and American industry would do well to take a long look at Ford's unselfish policy of encouraging political activity among its people.

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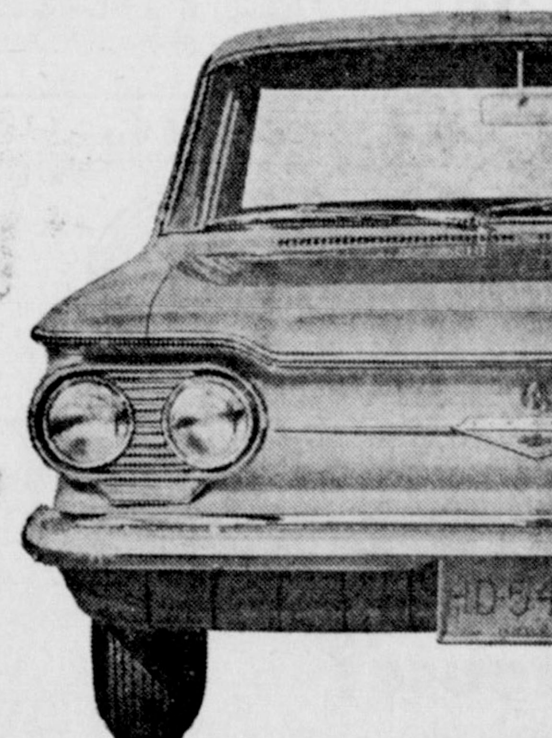

For the first time in my life, I wanted to be saved.

My desire for healing caused me to study the Bible. I discovered that Jesus spent two thirds of his earthly ministry healing the sick. I began to believe in divine healing. Lying in my bed, I accepted Christ.

After my conversion I received my complete healing in a revival meeting where I was prayed for by an evangelist who asked God to make me completely well. As he prayed, a wonderful feeling swept over me, and suddenly I realized

that the tuberculosis was gone. I started to walk and run and tell people that I was healed. Suddenly, I noticed that I didn't stammer and stutter any more.

Shortly after this I began my ministry. Soon I was pastoring small churches. The crowds were small; the results meager. I was dissatisfied, knowing that if I ever moved people toward God, I would have to try to be like Jesus and minister to the needs of the people. One day, sitting in a college classroom, I realized I could do for the people of my generation what the disciples had done for the people of the first century because Christ had promised healing to all people of all ages.

I plunged into the ministry of divine healing wholeheartedly. In the past 13 years God has, blest, and thousands of people have received help.

What would divine healing mean for you? Would it mean a new life in the world and a chance to accomplish something worth while? You can be healed. God has this blessing for you. Expect to receive it.

I do not know how God performs a miracle and heals from rampant disease and completely changes a life. I only know He does. It happened to me.
