Even more distressing, the local governments are spending the money faster than they're taking it in! While the average rate of increase in expenditures was 9.4 per cent, the average rate of increase in revenues was 8.4 per cent for every year since 1950. Estimated revenues for 1960 were \$37.8 billion, compared with \$17 billion in 1950 From another source, the National Research Bureau, Inc.,

comes word that the total state and local debt has also been steadily rising, from \$22.7 bil-lion in 1950 to \$54.6 billion in 1958, the last year for which figures are available. Here's what the National Research Bureau pamphlet adds: "Many state and local gov-

ernments find themselves faced with tremendous pressures of extended spending. This spending may be in the form of a new school, new road, or relief program. The only way that these programs can be financed is through increased revenue. This revenue may come in the form of higher taxes, or in the form of a rise in tax assessments, which amounts to the same thing. The cost will still be borne by the people. This fact makes it absolutely essential that every citizen carefully examine each new spending measure that is introduced into state and local government.'

That is basically the same message Home Owner Tax is trying to get across. H.O.T. attempts to induce the taxpayer to make known to his local officials what he does, or does not, want to buy and pay for in local government. When taxpayers are heard, they generally ask for less government spending, reduced taxes and the honest attention of public of-ficials to their problems. H.O.T. was founded on the theory that many local government functions and services can either be eliminated or performed just as well or better by private

individuals. There is certainly a need for a voice on the side of individual initiative vs. expansion of gov-



In some areas, the cat has been skinned another way. Any each other. This usually hap-pens in markets where more chains have an item at a special price. The usual method, for example, when coffee is being sold 20 cents, or more, below cost, is to limit sales to 1 or 2 pounds to limit santoner.

Yet, it only takes a simple law to make it illegal to restrict the offering of any item. While a chain may not particularly mind losing 20 cents on one or two items to lure a customer away from somebody else, they will not make such bankruptcy producing offers if they cannot limit quantities.

Here is how this works. If they cannot limit quantities, there is nothing to stop a competitor from backing up a truck and paying case after case of the merchandise for less than he can buy it for, and turn around and selling it at high prices, or even the same price.

In the parlance of the old western prairie days, this was called fighting fire with fire.






