Mr. Lindsey died in a Wichita Falls hospital Sunday after suffering injuries as he stepped in front of a moving automobile Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 15, at the corner of Alameda and Wall.

Born Oct. 13, 1867, in Lima, Ill., son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew L. Lindsey, he was married to Miss Frances Lucy Reager on Dec. 22, 1891, in Lima. They moved across the river into the Mississippi valley near Quincy in 1894, traveling by wagon.

In 1908 the Lindsey family came to Millett, Lasalle county, Texas, and resided there until 1911, when they moved to Iowa Park and settled on a farm northeast of town. He did extensive farming until 1943, when he retired. Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey moved into town and bought a home at 422 North Bond. They celebrated their 68th anniversary in December 1959.

Mrs. Lindsey died in October of last year. Both were long time members of the local Christian church.

For many years Mr. Lindsey entered the Old Fiddlers contest of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, receiving honors for playing the piece of music he played for President Grover Cleveland's inauguration.

Surviving are three daughters—Mrs. John B. Barbour ar of Iowa Park, Mrs. Nina McCombs of Bakersfield, Calif., Dr. Maude Campbell of Chicago, Ill.; nine grandchildren and several great-grandchildren. A son William died in 1938.

Our Senator

Sen. Ralph Yarborough reports: "I'm privileged to be one of the senate co-authors of the Area Re-development Bill, SB No. 1, the Administration's major proposal aimed at helping people develop new industry and to create new jobs for their own labor force."

"Here basically is what this bill is designed to do:

1. It will send technical specialists to the affected areas to help plan needed improvement.
 2. It will provide low interest rate loans for construction of new plant facilities.
 3. It will establish vocational re-training programs for jobless workers with subsistence payment during this retraining period, to prepare them for new jobs in the new local plants requiring new skills.
- "This is a responsible, self-help program that is vital to our national economy. To wipe out these pockets of poverty, we have a choice. We can either seek to stimulate the overall economy so that those people without jobs can move to some other place. Or, we can rebuild the economy of that distressed town and help the local people establish and develop new industry to create new jobs in their home town environment—in other words, help local people rebuild a new community using the natural resources and strong, deep-felt ties with the past."

Farmers Union

A new study of all kinds of subsidies, published by the Joint Economic Committee of Congress, contains much information of interest to those who think that only farmers are subsidized. It should be especially useful to the new Administration for putting government programs in proper perspective in the public mind.

Entitled, "Subsidy and Subsidy-like Programs of the U.S. Government," the booklet is available for 25 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C.

The congressional study takes up 8 of its 80 pages just listing the subsidy and subsidylike programs. More than 200 programs are listed. There isn't an individual or group that isn't aided by one type of subsidy or another. Many of them are termed "double subsidies," as they aid more than one group.

For example: Tariffs and farm support payments. Although they were created in effort to allow the businessman or farmer to compete equally with other forces, these subsidies work in two ways. As important is the fact that these programs indirectly subsidize the consumers by holding down prices. Another example is the school milk and school lunch programs. Subsidies for these programs are of great benefit to the farmers and they also provide free or inexpensive milk and hot lunches to millions of growing youngsters.

Government subsidy programs began with the first Congress in 1789 when the first maritime and tariff subsidies were enacted. Farm subsidies are relative latecomers.

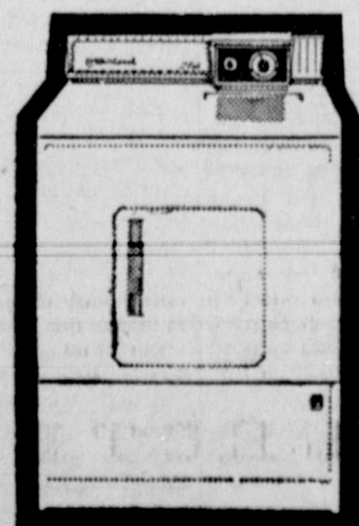
