## Service Held for Dr. Crawford

Funeral service was conducted for Dr. Luther Allen Crawford, 61, Monday morning, Feb. 27, in the local Church of Christ with Ray Marcum, minister of the Pecan Heights Church of Christ in Dallas and formerly minister here, officiating. H. W. McClish, minister of the Iowa Park church, assisted.

The body lay in view at the church before the service.

Burial was in Riverside cemetery in Wichita Falls under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park. Pallbearers were W. A. George and A. W. Bedford of Iowa Park; P. T. Parker of Valley Farms community; I. W. McShan and Terry Broyles of Wichita Falls.

Dr. Crawford, local chiropractor and naturopath, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Thursday of last week after several months of ill health from a heart ailment.

Born in 1900 at Coalgate, Okla., son of Joe and Lula Crawford, he was married to Miss Ethel Stagner, April 2, 1938, in Wichita Falls. They resided in Valley Farms community for several years before moving into Iowa Park in 1948. He had been a resident of Wichita county since 1908.

He was a member of the Church of Christ, the Iowa Park Masonic lodge, the Wichita Falls Commandery and Maskat Temple.

Dr. Crawford served over 16 years in the civil service at various times. He served with the 13th air force in the South Pacific in the 1940's.

Dr. Crawford received chiropractic training at Palmer - Gregory college at Oklahoma City; Spears Post-Graduate College of Chiropractics in Denver, Colo.; and his naturopathic degree from Western University School of Naturopathy of San Diego, Calif.

For many years Dr. Crawford has been a strong supporter of Iowa Park football teams and has given assistance to other area athletes.

Surviving are the widow of Iowa Park; a foster son Monroe Wiggins of Iowa Park; a brother John of Austin; and two sisters—Mrs. Ann Crawford Curtis of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Fred Wise of Iowa Park; several nephews and nieces.

## Expansion Program

Texas Electric Service Company and three other major electric utility companies operating in this state have announced plans for construction of a super power transmission line between Houston and the Fort Worth-Dallas area. The three are Texas Power and Light, Dallas Power and Light and Houston Lighting and Power.

This line will connect with high-voltage lines which TESCO will build from Fort Worth to the Permian Basin area in West Texas and TPL will build to a new plant site south of the Red river.

These lines will link together 6,500,000 kilowatts of electric power generating capability of the four companies into one of the nation's largest and strongest reservoirs of power. They have a total of 27 steam-electric generating plants.

These projects will provide a power highway stretching some 800 miles from the Permian Basin through Fort Worth-Dallas area to Houston and from the Fort Worth-Dallas area to Red river.

Construction of the 345,000 volt line from Houston will begin in 1962 and will represent an investment of some \$25,000,000. Studies and plans for this line have been underway more than three years.

Texas Electric Service has already begun construction of its line from Fort Worth into the Midland and Odessa area. First segment from Fort Worth to Graham will be completed this year.

The new "super power highway" will make ample power available to meet the growing requirements of many Rural Electric Co-operative systems now served wholesale power by TESCO and the other companies.

The 345,000 volt "power highway" will be six times greater in power capacity than any other line now in operation in the Southwest and one of the largest in the United States.

Greater security of electric service throughout the areas served will result, since power available in one area can be transmitted to the other areas in the event of an emergency.

Texas Electric Service company, which serves Iowa Park and its neighbors, now has more than 1,300,000 kilowatts of generating capacity—more than 10 times what it was in 1947—and the company expects that by 1975 its system-wide generating capacity will be more than 4,500,000 kilowatts.

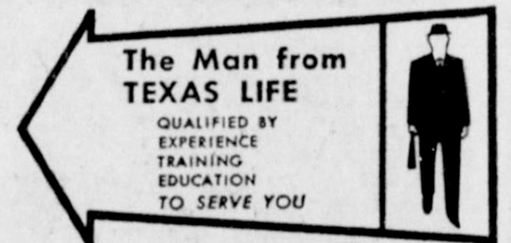

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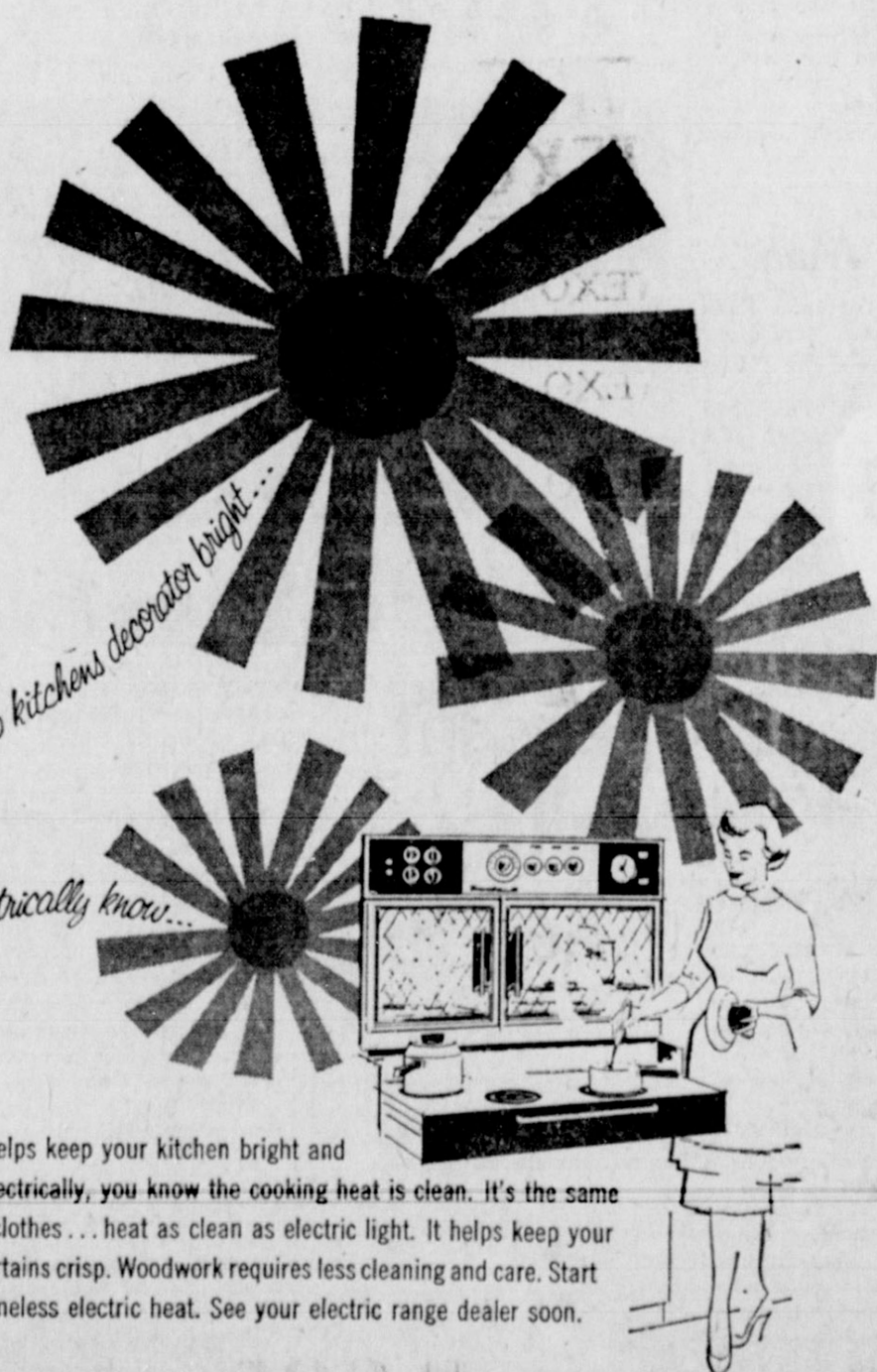
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## S.S. Campaign

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



One of the more important steps in soil and water conservation is that of assisting farmers to work out a plan covering each acre of the farm or ranch and treat it according to the land needs and potential productive capabilities, states James Park, soil conservationist of Iowa Park.

Main basis for sound conservation planning is a range and soil survey on each acre of land. A range survey is best made while working with the landowner in making a forage inventory of grass found growing on a particular site, as certain land types support different kinds of vegetation due to soil depth and moisture relationship.

Generally, shallowland soils support short and mid-type grasses and bottomland soils support mid and tall grasses. Random clippings in different sites can be weighed and calculated into total pounds of forage produced per acre. This give a good estimate of expected forage production in adjusting rate of stocking to maintain proper range use over a long period.

A soils map of farmland can assist a landowner in locating the hills or hazards that might be unprofitable in farming a certain area due to soil depth, types of parent material underlying the surface, slopes of land and degree of erosion taking place, and the ability of a particular soil to absorb water.

Such planning will help govern what measures may be necessary to maintain each acre in accordance to needs and capabilities of the land.

Many organists were grieved to hear of the death of one of their favorite masters of the keyboard. He had suffered a heart attack while in the pipe chambers of a large pipe organ and had died before he could be taken to a hospital.

The organist had been trying to stop a "cipher." A cipher occurs, I am told, when a pipe sounds without any pressure on its corresponding key.

On this occasion the organist had been asked to fix a cipher for another organist.

The irony of this musician's death lies in the fact that he finished his distinguished career as a master organist just as he had started it—in the pipe chambers, trying to stop a cipher!

The musician literally "died at the switch," for he had devoted his life to the organ. Here was complete dedication.

In the New Testament we read how Christ was completely dedicated to His Father's work and how His task, which He fulfilled completely, cost Him His life.

Jesus was put to death for our sins because He was dedicated to the task of fulfilling the mission that God, His Father, had sent Him to do on

earth. He died that we might have everlasting life. He died for our sins—the sins of the whole world.

But Christ gained victory over death itself and arose from the dead. He broke the bonds of death and is alive today. He is with us now in spirit and in truth.

Jesus went about doing good. He spent two thirds of His earthly ministry healing the sick and the lame and casting out devils. He went about the countryside, preaching that repentance is essential to salvation.

The living presence of Jesus Christ is as real right now as His physical presence was to those who lived during His time on earth.

Christ was completely dedicated. He fulfilled His task as set out for Him by His Father. And because He went all the way, we today can have eternal life by accepting Him as our Saviour.

What about your task? Are you completely dedicated to it? Face up completely to your own responsibilities. And if the going gets rough, lean on Christ. He is near to assist you. Just call upon Him, and He will answer.

Ferguson, as Lessee, covering all of Subdivision No. 19 of Specht Colony Lands containing 196 acres, more or less, and the North 115.8 acres of Subdivision No. 21 of Specht Colony Lands, Wichita County, Texas, and which is recorded in Volume 107, page 421 of the Deed Records of Wichita County, Texas, has expired of its own terms and is of no further force or effect for the reason that said lease is not now nor has for more than the past several months produced oil or gas in paying quantities and plaintiff prays that said lease be declared terminated, cancelled and forever held naught. Plaintiff alleges in the alternative in the event said lease has not expired of its own terms that the defendants who are the owners of the leasehold interests by various assignments of said oil and gas lease have failed to properly develop the lands covered by said lease for oil and gas and plaintiff prays that defendants be ordered to develop the lands covered by said lease by immediately commencing the drilling of a well thereon and by following a continuous development program and that at such time as defendants fail to comply with the orders of said Court, that said lease terminate except as to a set amount of acreage around each producing well. All of which is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety (90) days after date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.
