Tornado

Last Saturday afternoon this area suffered some tornado and hail damage. A small wind storm made a hop-skip-jump run from Kamay to SAFE, destroying several garages, barns and unroofing some houses.

At Kamay the new telephone building, just being completed for dial telephones, was completely destroyed; the post office was unroofed; and other property was damaged.

As it traveled northeast the tornado hit in the south and east area of Iowa Park.

China B. Smith's house and barn sustained considerable damage. Mrs. M. E. Reed's home windows were sucked out and various articles exchanged places in the house. The family was in the cellar during the storm.

Wichita Valley Airport received an undetermined amount of damage and Mrs. Lee Ora Davis' garage was destroyed and the house was damaged. The Miller barn nearby was unroofed.

A house trailer that was being pulled along the highway at the time was overturned.

No one in Kamay or along the path of the tornado was injured. On Sheppard AFB a man was injured when a roof was thrown on his car.

One person was injured in Archer City, and some property loss was suffered there.

Purpose of the meeting is to complete the organization and program for the year and also to set up schedules for games this season.

Little League regulation ballpark, located on the old Electra road, west of the city limits, is to be one of the finest in the Southwest. A chain-link fence for the park has been completed. The permanent concession stand and the dugouts are finished. All light poles are finished except installation of lights.

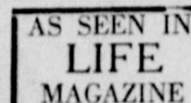
