## First Baptist Expands SS Facilities

First Baptist church is making preparation to minister to the spiritual needs of many of the newcomers to Iowa Park.

The Sunday School has been enlarged to include two new departments (an Adult and a Beginner) and five new classes (two Young People, two Junior and one Adult). Twenty-one new workers have been enlisted.

The church has completed a \$6000 renovation of the basement of the present building. Thus the Sunday School will accommodate 200 more than the 325 presently attending.

The renovation includes folding partitions and fluorescent lighting.

An extensive program of visitation through which each member is challenged to contact one prospect each week is being carried through the Sunday School.

Sunday, April 30, was "Move-in Day" and during the month of May a "Crown Him King" attendance campaign is being conducted.

Funeral service was conducted Wednesday afternoon for Mr. R. A. Mathews, 65, in Phoenix, Ariz. Mr. Mathews, a former resident here, was a brother of Mrs. L. C. Denny jr. of Iowa Park.

Born in Tishomingo, Okla., he came here with his parents the late Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Mathews in 1918 after serving in World War I.

He left here in the early 1930's and in 1940 went to Phoenix. He had been employed as engineer for the Westward Ho hotel in Phoenix for many years.

Mr. Mathews died in a Phoenix hospital Monday after several months of failing health.

Surviving are the widow Gladys; two daughters, four sisters and a brother.

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## 3-Day Pre School

Miss Ethyle Kidwell has announced Pre-School will be held for next fall's first graders Monday through Wednesday, May 29-31.

All children six years of age or before September 1 are to report to school. The Iowa Park elementary school runs from Jackson St. east; Ethyle Kidwell elementary school is from Jackson street, west.

All children entering school this fall must have shot records, but they are not required for the pre-school period. However, birth certificates must be presented.

Pre-school will begin at 8:30 on Monday, but the other two mornings, it will begin at 9:00. Refreshments will be served at 10:00 each morning, and the children will be dismissed at 11:00.

On Wednesday morning at 10:30 TB Skin Tests will be given by Dr. Gordon G. Clark at the Kidwell school. Students will be transported from the other elementary school by bus and parents can pick up their children at the Kidwell school between 11 and 11:30.

This test is not compulsory but is recommended, and it is hoped parents will co-operate with the school and permit children to take this painless test.

Iowa Park is the first school in this area receiving this free test. Members of the PTA's will assist in this program.

Supt. Keith Swim is vice-president of the county tuberculosis association and Rollins Woodall is Iowa Park chairman.

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## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Most wheat farmers will produce sufficient stubble for soil protection, according to Elvy Sargent, work unit conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service here.

Average wheat has produced 100 pounds of stubble for each bushel of grain, Sargent said. Before planning tillage methods, a farmer will do well to consider how much stubble he has and minimum requirements for land protection. The difference may be mixed into the soil by tillage.

Research has found that one-way plows will cover about one-half of residue each tillage operation; a disc harrow covers about a fourth; small sweeps about 10 per cent.

Three farmers participating in the Great Plains conservation program are establishing conservation on their farms now. Clear Lake Stock Farm of Kanay, owned by Mrs. Ramon Wood, has seeded 192 acres to native grasses, sodded 47 acres of coastal bermuda, dozed 69 acres of mesquite and reseeded the pasture, leveled 47 acres of land, and constructed a pond.

James R. McKinney of Wichita Falls has completed leveling 37 acres and is currently leveling 40.

Mike Baxter of Vernon is terracing.

Fred H. Lalk of Electra is constructing two waterways and will sod to bermudagrass.

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## Clean-up, Paint-up Week

In proclaiming the week May 22 through 27 as Clean-up, Paint-up and Fix-up Week in Iowa Park, Mayor C. L. Metz made the following comment:

"Spring and cleaning. These are words which have become practically inseparable. The mop, bucket and scrub brush are as symbolic of this season as the bluebonnet and the June bug.

"Nothing is quite so satisfying as the wakening from winter doldrums to the constructive action of cleaning, scrubbing and polishing.

"If we add to this spring mixture the further ingredients of repairing steps, roof, electrical appliances, painting interior and exterior surfaces, planting flowers, and hauling off trash, our community will reflect Nature's reawakening.

"So, let's clean-up, paint-up, fix-up, and plant-up today for a sparkling tomorrow."

Litter thrown in the street by pedestrians and motorists is more than paper and trash—it's taxpayers' money, Luther Shaw, street department head advised this week.

"No citizen would throw money into the streets and highways of our community, yet that's exactly what litterbugs are doing," Shaw said. "Debris that is tossed away means additional sanitation employees and equipment must be utilized and these extra clean-up jobs are paid out of tax funds.

"It's just good sense to prevent these needless expenditures. Pedestrians should spot trash receptacles and use them; motorists should carry a litterbag in their autos. During Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up time, make a resolution that you won't be a litterbug—or a spendthrift of your tax dollars," Shaw ended.

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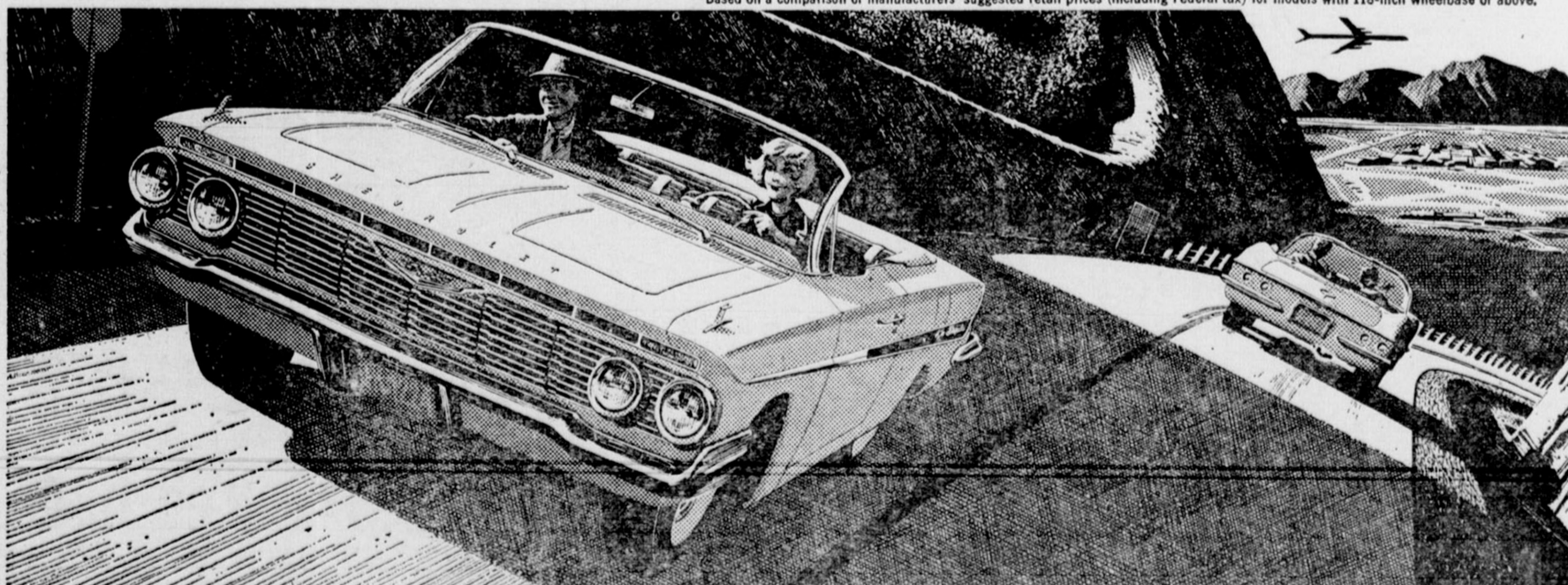
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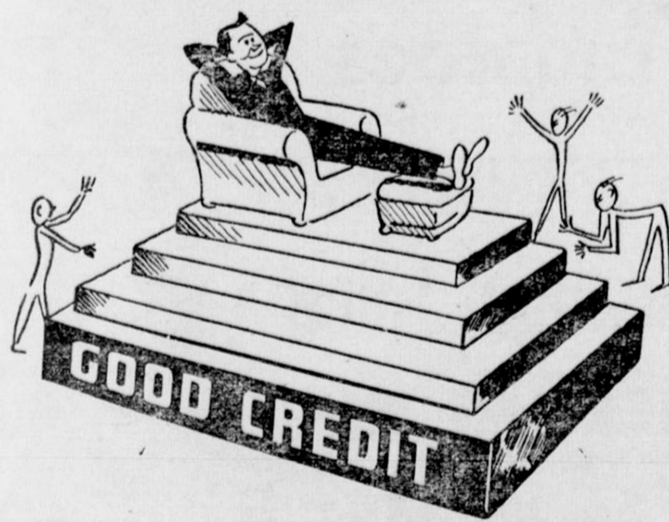

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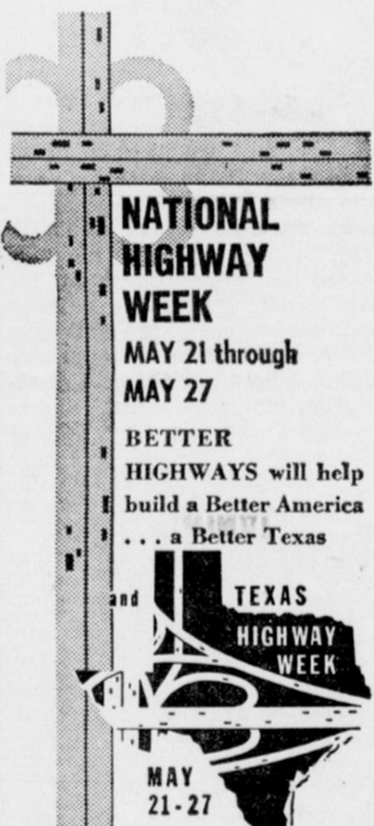
