Service Held for Mrs. Weaver

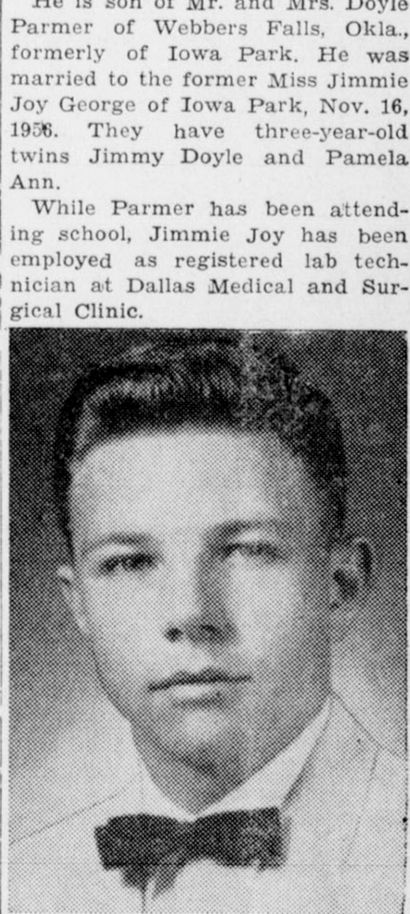

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County, at the Courthouse thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, by filing a written answer at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 10th day of July A.D. 1961, to Plaintiff's Petition filed in said court, on the 8th day of May A.D. 1961, in this cause, numbered 67,806-A on the docket of said court and styled Mildred Seymour, Plaintiff, vs. Robert Seymour, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:

After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about June 13th, 1960, and continued to live together as husband and wife until or about December 7th, 1960, when by reason of excesses, outrages and cruel treatment on the part of said defendant toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation, was of such a nature as to render their further living together insupportable; that there were no children born as a result of said marriage and that there was no community property acquired during this marriage.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that on trial hereof, she have Judgment for Divorce and for such other and further relief as the Court may deem proper. As is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

4-H Girls Prove Culinary Ability; Win State Award In Foods Project

A high school junior and a college freshman were selected for state awards in the 4-H dairy foods demonstration competition. Both winners were presented 19-jewel wrist watches, donated by the Carnation Company of Los Angeles, in recognition of their achievement in the individual and team categories.

Patricia Simons, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Simons, Burkburnett, took top honors in the individual dairy foods demonstration. The winning entry, her first in the annual state contest, was a presentation showing the use of Neufchatel cheese in a "Dip to Delight a Teenage Appetite."

Patricia and her family produce their own dairy foods on their wheat farm. She stresses milk and milk products as one of the stable products in the human diet, and accomplishes this in her home by the use of cheese dips, casseroles, frozen salads and sauces.

During her six years in 4-H work, Patricia has served as president of her local 4-H Club for four years, been active in community affairs, and has

added many county and district level awards to her record.

For their demonstration on "Dairy Foods Party Refreshments," Carol Bennett and her co-worker won the number one spot in the Team division at the county, district and state levels. Included in the demonstration were cottage cheese cookies, a ribbon loaf sandwich and a sour cream dip.

Carol, a freshman at Texas Women's University, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. K. Bennett, Texarkana. She is in her ninth year of 4-H work, and has been enrolled in the dairy foods project for the last four years.

Miss Bennett has participated in many projects during her 4-H career. She is presently coaching a group of younger 4-H members in foods and nutrition, and after encouraging them to enter the junior dairy foods demonstration, they placed first in the county and district contests.

The Cooperative Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College System supervises the 4-H program, and annually selects award winners.

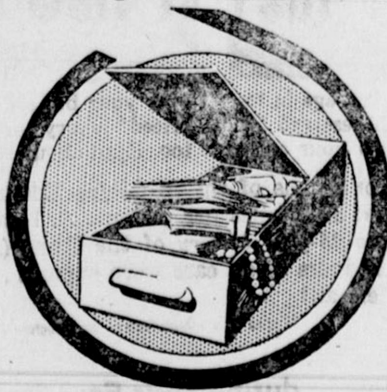

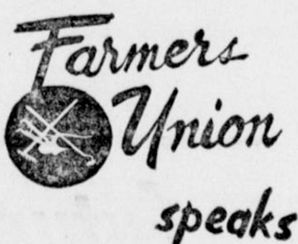

Compassion at Work

An animal shelter two miles east of Iowa Park is providing a home for all kinds of animals that have no home and are not wanted. Here they find love and good clean shelter with Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Moore and daughters Levita 14 and Joan 18.

About four months ago the family decided to start the shelter after they saw a man shoot two dogs near their home because he didn't want them.

The Moores have been raising German shepherds for breeding purposes for some time. About six months ago decided to start a boarding kennel for dogs. They bought the old kennels from the Humane Society, which had gone out of business. "Kindness in Action" was printed in large letters across the front of the building. People began bringing stray cats and dogs to the Moores to help find homes for them.

Soon they had almost 100 canines of which most were sick, many were near starvation. Today they have about 50 dogs and 20 cats. The past two weeks the Moores have taken in about 50 animals and placed fewer than 40 in homes. A. J. this costs the family between \$150 and \$200 a month, money which comes out of their own pockets. Although Mrs. Moore gives all the animals distemper shots, there is no charge for getting a dog from the shelter. Some contributions are made.

The family breaks about even on expenses. Money to buy food for the animals comes mainly from the fee they receive for boarding four horses. Levita and Joan clean the pens daily and feed and water the animals. The grounds are limed to protect against worm infestation.

This week the animal shelter has baby skunks ready for adoption; also some puppies which are part shepherd.

Mr. Moore is employed with the City disposal plant. The animal shelter phone is 592-4542 and listed under the name Mrs. Mary L. Moore.

Farm income should increase by more than \$1 billion this year over last, due to the Kennedy administration program. This would be the first substantial increase since 1938 and the second time in 10 years that farm income has gone up appreciably.

A third of the increase in farm income will be the result of higher support prices put into effect by Secretary Freeman on such commodities as milk and other dairy products, cotton and other oil-bearing crops. Another third of the increase will come from payments the agriculture department is making to take corn and small grains out of production.

Freeman warns that if farm income does not go up with the rise in farm productivity, the Family Farm may disappear altogether and the country will suffer for it.

Freeman recently told a newsmen that the biggest surprise in his job was the indifference, ridicule and contempt for the problems of the farmers he had encountered. He said it is found in Congress, among the public at large and among special groups.

He said, "I am fearful that if this condition keeps up, we won't have any agricultural program at all, and if we don't there'll be a price drop of 20 to 40 per cent, and the rest of the economy will be hard hit also.

"The most distressing thing is the misconception that the farmer is getting more than his share of the national income. The farmer is not getting his share, and the better manager he becomes, the less he gets.

"Farmers will be able to maintain their freedom of action only by learning how to act collectively. The new do-it-yourself farm program before Congress will provide the machinery for collective action."

"God has given men gifts of healing, wisdom and discernment," said Dr. Reed in his address. "These are the attributes every doctor and patient want. These are the signs of health and wholeness. I remember one particular patient whom I helped through God's gift of wisdom.

"It had been proved by other competent physicians that the man had leukemia. Everything proved it. I accepted the diagnosis myself in complete negativism. When the patient sought medicospiritual help, we prayed to God. 'Heavenly Father, heal this man who has given his heart and soul to thee.' God answered our prayer, but it didn't happen the way you might think. God gave, in this instance, not the gift of healing but the gift of wisdom. Six days after I first saw the patient, God said to me, during the time of prayer in church one Sunday night, 'What if he doesn't have leukemia?' It was just as if a blackboard had been erased. He said, 'Now, let's start afresh. Here are the signs; here are the symp-

oms. Now, if he doesn't have leukemia, what does he have?"

"Blood dyscrasias are not my specialty. Leukemia is far from being any kind of specialty for a surgeon, because it is not a surgical disease. But the Lord said to me clearly, 'It is a clinical entity which mimics leukemia.' With this inspiration it suddenly became apparent that the patient had Felt's disease. Why hadn't anybody thought of it? Because we were so imbued with negative ideas that we were unable to see the truth.

"I took the man down to our University Hospital. They proved that God was right. The man did not have leukemia. His spleen was removed and he is well today. Everybody says, 'That was no miracle. After all, he didn't have leukemia.' But the patient says, 'Well, if I had died, my death certificate would have said leukemia.'

"So God helped because both the man and I opened up to Him. We didn't try to limit Him in the way He solved our problem."

Let us open up to God as Dr. Reed suggested. My friend, I know God wants to give you more than you have. He wants you to be more than you are. He wants to give you abundant life because He is a good God.

Jesus Christ is the answer to all your problems. Open up to God today. Start your life abundant in Him, now!

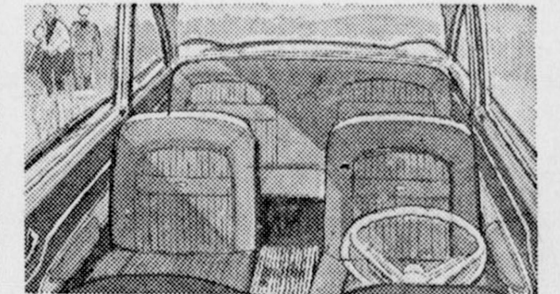
