Wheat Crop Was Short

90 to 95 per cent of the wheat crop has been harvested in this area. Due to the hail, Wichita county wheat was greatly damaged.

Farmers were expecting another year almost as good as last, when hailstorms hit early in May.

Bob Crocker, county ASC office manager, says the average is 15 bushels to the acre. Some farmers have harvested 30 to 40 bushels to the acre where they used special insect control methods and Austrian winter peas-wheat rotation of crops.

The two grain companies here report a large drop in wheat receipts this year.

Ed Holder has handled some 28,000 bushels; Williams and Son have handled about 30,000, which is considerably less wheat than handled here last year.

Hail hit north, northeast, northwest and east of town pretty hard. Some farmers plowed most of their crop under and considered it a total loss.

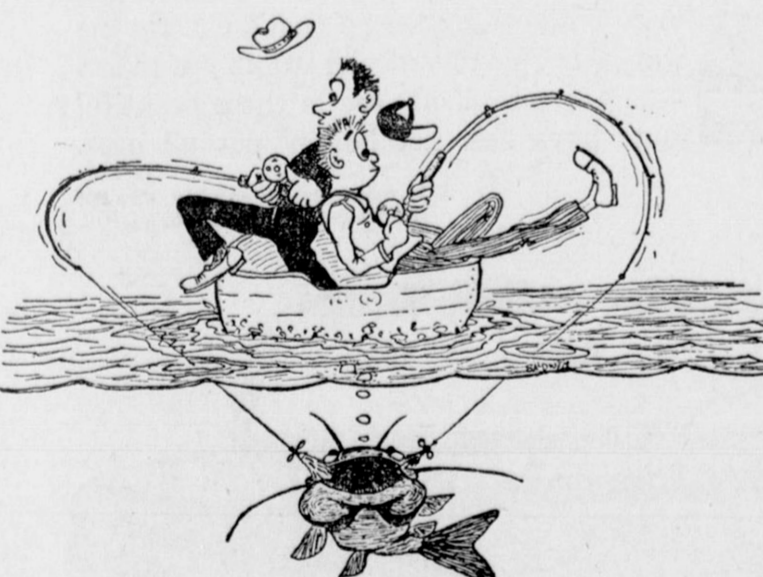

The person who dedicates himself to helping others is a happy person. He is happy because he is doing good. In his own small way, he is making his part of the world a better place in which to live. And since God is the author of good things, the helper becomes a partner with God, ministering to the world.
