Deposits on Oct. 1 reflected a drop from the second quarter of 1964 -- normal for most banks. Second quarter totals for the county was \$10,308,409.

Oct. 1 deposits by banks included \$4,749,939 in First National of Baird; \$3,225,814 at Citizens State in Cross Plains; and \$2,170,471 at Peoples State in Clyde.

A year ago, deposits were \$4,747,244 at First National; \$3,253,391 at Citizens State; and \$1,954,983 at Peoples State. Citizens State is the only one of the three to show a drop from 1963's third quarter to the 1964 third quarter.

Loans are also up. On Oct. 1, loans from Callahan County banks included \$1,312,926 at Citizens State; \$1,306,839 at Peoples State; and \$1,296,201 at First National.

## Census Jobs Set in County

An examination for persons interested in becoming an enumerator in the 1964 Census of Agriculture for Callahan County will be given at 9:30 a. m. Nov. 13, in the commissioners courtroom of the county courthouse.

Five enumerators will be selected from the county. The county has been divided into five districts for the census, and enumerators must live in the area in which they will work.

The census will involve about three weeks of work, with enumerators to be paid \$1.75 per hour, plus eight cents per mile of car mileage.

The examination will include simple arithmetic, map-reading, and a fill-in-the-blank section.

Census of Agriculture will be taken during November and December, and is designed to show the amount of land used for crops and pasture, quantity of crops harvested, number of poultry and livestock on farms, kinds of equipment on the farms and number and characteristics of people who live on farms.

Additional information concerning the positions of agriculture census enumerators for this year may be obtained from A. E. Dyer Jr. of Baird.

That wild final play was a fitting end to a game which was a thriller all the way, however.

Both Baird's early touchdowns also came on long pass and run plays. The first one, with the Bears trailing by 8-0, came on a 45-yarder from Steve Stanley to Thomas Robbins, while the second was on a 35-yard toss from Childers to Stanley.

Barton passed to Robbins for two points after the first Baird TD to knot it at 8-8.

De Leon held a 22-14 margin at halftime, but Windham's short blast in the third period capped a Bear march and narrowed the gap. Barton passed to Jones for two points to tie the score again, this time at 22-22.

## Eula FFA Sets War on Rodents

Eula Future Farmers are sponsoring a rat and mouse eradication campaign in and around the Eula community.

The chapter plans to contact farmers and ranchers within the next two weeks in an effort to remind them that now is the time to establish bait stations and kill the rodent population before winter weather cuts down on their activity and makes them harder to reach.

It has been estimated that each rat on the place will do \$20 worth of damage in a year.

The Eula chapter has plenty of Fumarin bait on hand that is safe to use, because it must be eaten for five consecutive days before it kills.

The average farm should use around four pounds at the start and the bait should be kept in the station all year round to prevent further build up of the rodents.

The bait may be bought at the Vocational Agriculture building or by contacting any member of the Eula FFA Chapter.

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# Laco Oil Co. Planning Test Well In Callahan Regular Oil Field

Laco Oil Co., Abilene, has slated drilling of a test in Callahan County regular field.

No. 7 Mrs. Max L. Logan Estate, located 15 miles southeast of Abilene, is spotted 2,556 feet from north and 220 feet from west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey.

Drillsite is 210 feet from north and west lines of a 100-acre lease.

Operator will drill to 1,600 feet with rotary, to test the Moutray Sand.

A wildcat re-entry project has been completed as a Mississippiian discovery four miles southwest of Baird in Callahan County.

It is H. L. Chamberlain, et al, of Monahans No. 1 A. J. Sharp. Location is 660 feet from the north and west lines of Sub-division 18, Victoria CSL Survey 336.

Daily potential was 120.6 barrels of 42.8 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water. It is pumping from eight perforations at 4,540-63 feet, treated with 3,000 gallons of acid. The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 4,595 feet, the original total depth.

Location is one mile southwest of Oil & Gas Property Management No. 1 C. H. Latimer, re-entry completed as the discovery for the McCurdy-Blair East (Mississippiian) Field.

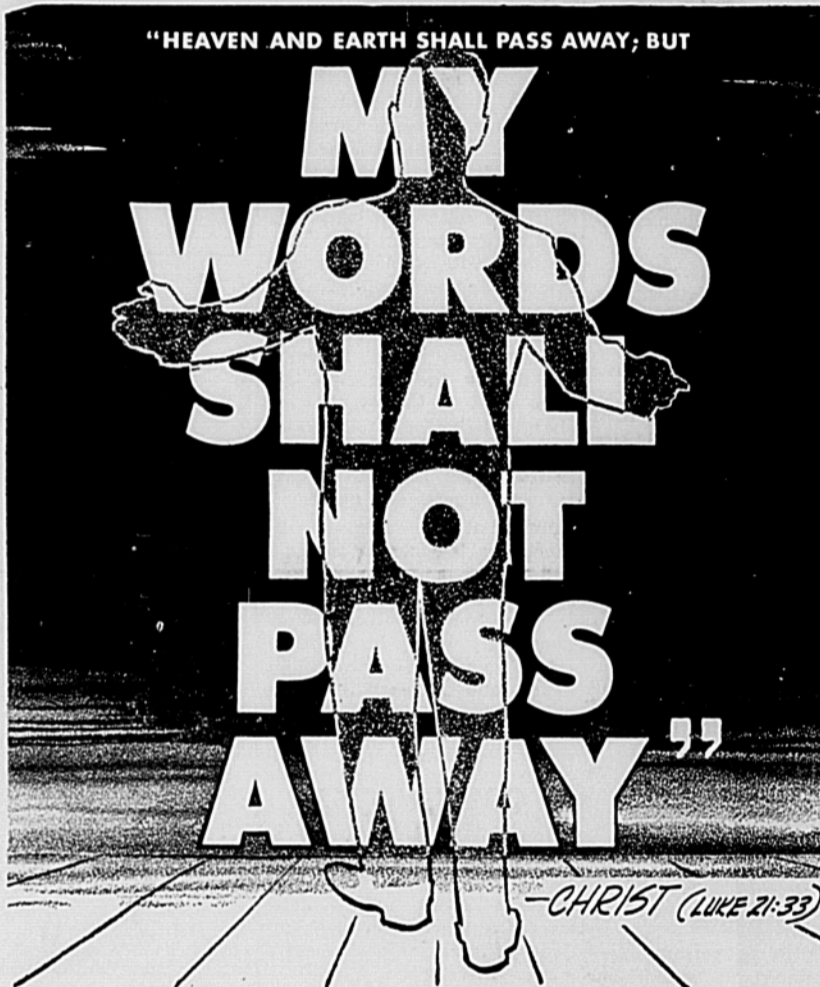
