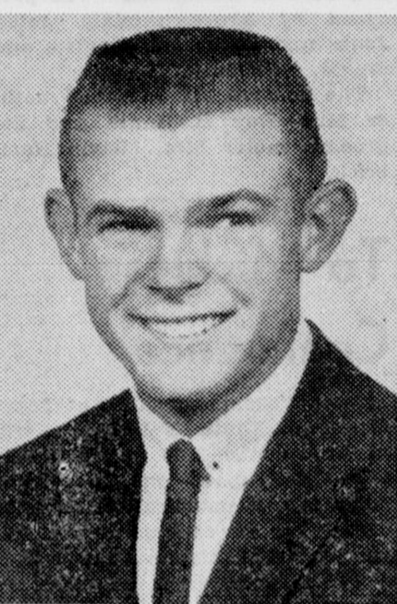


Bob Dawson, who has been with the local schools for several years, has been elected principal of the junior high.

Gun Accident Kills Wester Kin

Mr. and Mrs. G. O. Wester and sons Bennie and Glen recently returned home after attending the funeral service of her nephew Jerry Kiker Dickerson, 19, former Guymon (Okla.) high school athlete, who died of accidental gunshot wounds while visiting two former school mates at Straight community near Guymon.

Young Dickerson, one of the most popular members of the 1960 graduating class of Guymon high school, was on leave from the army at time of death. He enlisted in November and took basic training at Ft. Hood. After completing his duties at Ft. Campbell, Ky., he was enroute to Oakland, Calif., and subsequent assignment to duty in Korea.

Graveside military rites were performed by the 807th Quartermaster company, US army reserve. Born Nov. 14, 1941, at Megargel, he moved to Guymon with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Ray Kiker Dickerson in 1953 from Snyder, Texas.

Jerry won all-district honors in football and lettered in basketball. Five years ago he received an award for heroism in saving the life of a neighbor who would have burned to death except for the quick thinking and action of Jerry. Other survivors besides his parents are a brother Richard of Boulder, Colo., and a sister Mrs. Dan Kersey of Dalhart.

All teachers are required to have TB tests before they are permitted to teach here.

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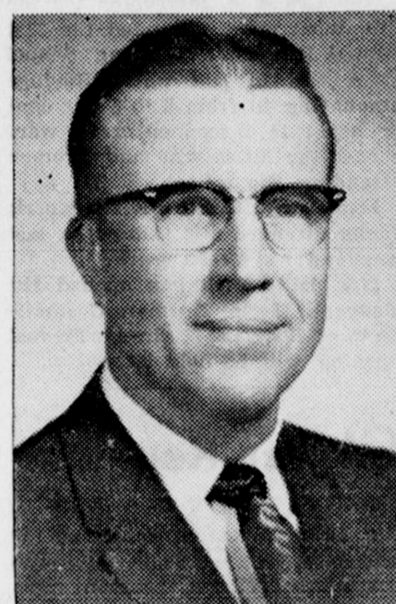
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IPHS Principal

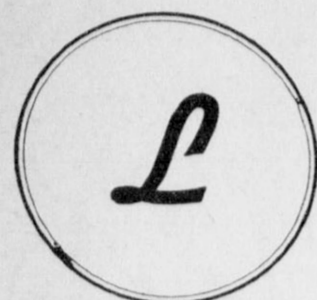

Farm Trailer Law

House and Senate agricultural leaders said this week the new Farm Trailer Law will save farmers and ranchers of Texas millions of dollars annually by reducing the license fee.

HB 1082 was passed during the regular session and became effective May 29. It requires that farm trailers of from 4,000 to 10,000 lb. gross weight be registered with the county tax assessor. It provides that owners must secure a license plate for a \$5 annual fee.

Farm trailers up to 4,000 lb. gross are not required to have tags, and farm trailers up to 10,000 lb. gross are exempt from brake requirements.

Before the new law was passed the license fee for a 10,000-lb. trailer (gross) was \$55.

Under the new law, farmers who fail to obtain license tags will be subject to fine and must register their trailer as a commercial trailer and obtain a commercial license plate.

The new law exempts farm trailers from the annual vehicle inspection requirement and from the Certificate of Title Act. Lighting requirements for farm trailers have not been altered since 1947.

Swim Heads TB Association

School Supt. Keith D. Swim of Iowa Park was elected president of Wichita County Tuberculosis association at a meeting of the board of directors recently. He has been a member of the board seven years.

Swim said, "We want to inaugurate programs as rapidly as the funds are available for the entire county, starting in the areas that have the highest incidence of tuberculosis. It is necessary as soon as cases are found to get them isolated, in clinics, or under treatment."

The sternneedle gun, a new case finding device, has been received with enthusiasm by workers of the association. It was used to test pre-school children in Iowa Park in May by Mrs. Dorothy Robinson, health unit tuberculosis nurse. Plans have been made to use the painless device in Wichita Falls, Eurkburnett and Electra shortly after the reopening of school.

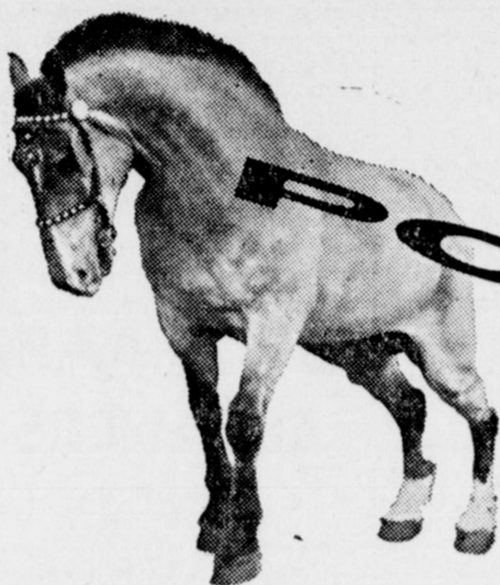

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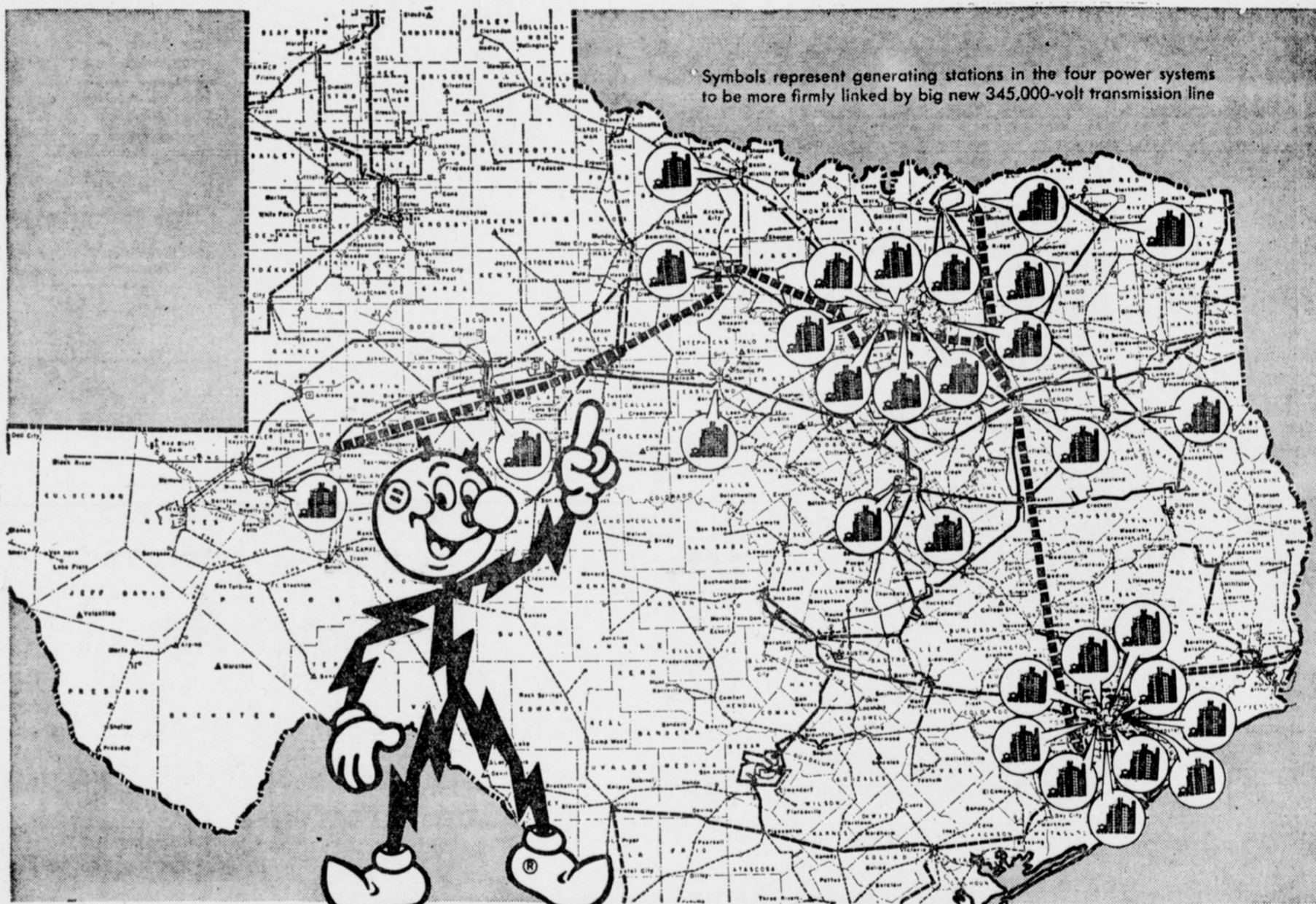
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Customers of the Texas Electric Service Company power system will benefit by construction of a strong electric power "tie-line", which will extend from the Permian Basin area through the Fort Worth-Dallas area and to Houston. This will bring about one of the nation's largest and strongest reservoirs of power.

The new "tie-line"—a 345,000-volt transmission line nearly 800 miles long and six times greater in electric power capacity than any other line now operating in the Southwest—is to tie together more firmly the power systems of Texas Electric Service Company, Houston Lighting and Power Company, Dallas Power and Light Company, and Texas Power and Light Company.

Added efficiency and economy of operation will be possible for each of the companies when the line is completed, and it will mean that, in the event of

an emergency in any of the four utility systems, much larger blocks of power will be available from the other areas than through present interconnections.

Texas Electric now is building its part of the line from Fort Worth to the Permian Basin area in West Texas. It will be part of the company's integrated power system and operated initially at 138,000 volts.

The section of the "tie-line" from Houston to the Fort Worth-Dallas area will be started in 1962 and will be pushed to early completion.

This new transmission "tie-line" is another example of planning and building ahead to assure plenty of dependable, low-cost electric power for continued progress of the more than 100 cities, towns and rural communities served by the power system of Texas Electric in The Opportunity Frontier of Texas.

Gas Refunds

Farmers are reminded of their eligibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline purchased between July 1, 1960, and June 30, 1961. Claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 not later than September 30.

Gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for farming purposes and includes most normal production operations. Exceptions are: gasoline used on highways even though for hauling farm products; that used for processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations; and that used for non-farming or personal purposes.

Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate or excessive

claims. Form 2240 does not apply to diesel and special motor fuels. Farmers who have questions regarding taxes on these fuels are advised to contact an Internal Revenue Service director.

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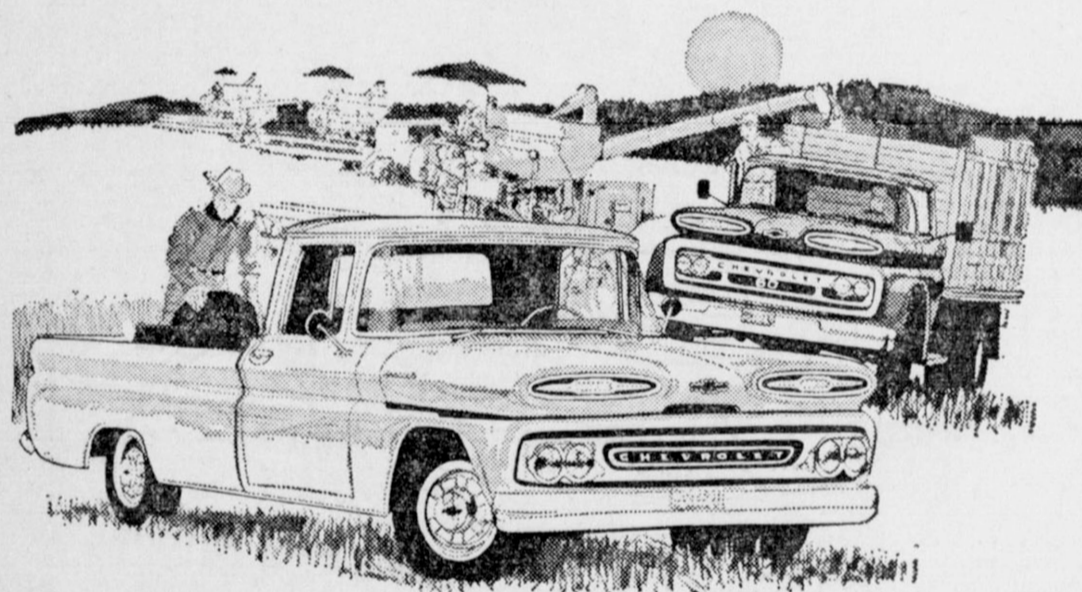
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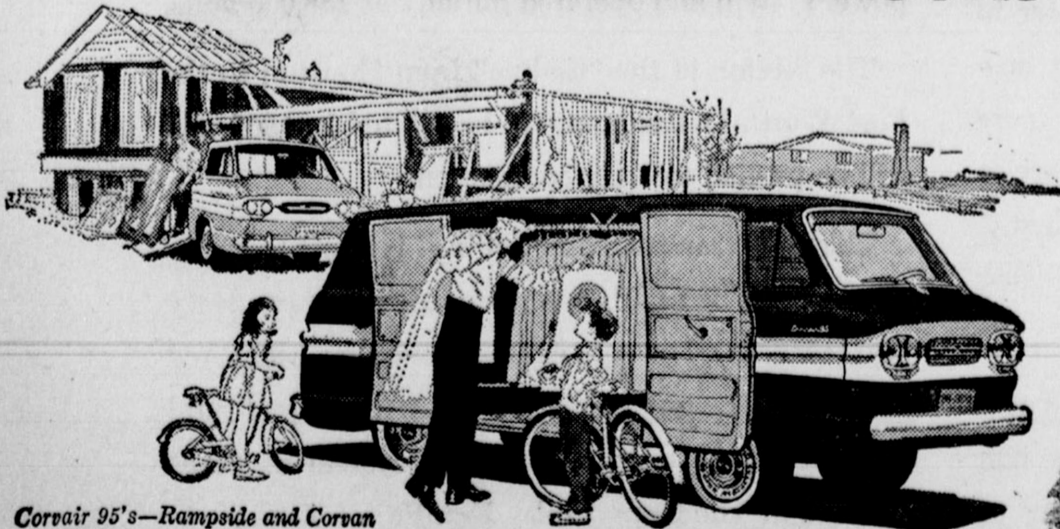
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
