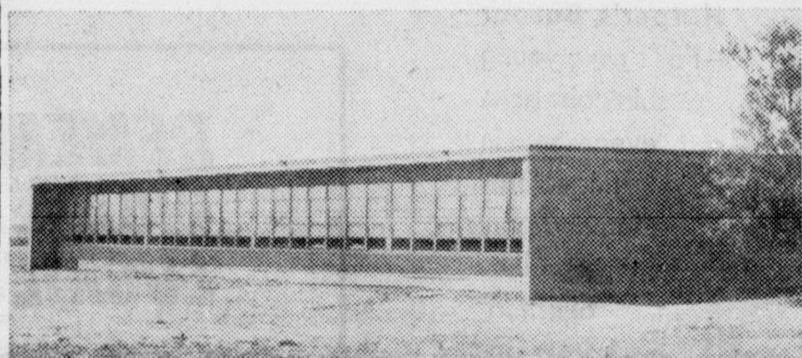

Hosts at Openhouse of Addition to School

South Wing, Ethyle Kidwell Elementary School

Some 200 interested patrons attended the openhouse of the new wing of Ethyle Kidwell elementary school last Sunday afternoon. The school board members and their wives served as hosts for the occasion. They were assisted by Miss Kidwell, principal, and Keith D. Swim, superintendent.

The attractive seven-classroom addition is located south of the cafeteria. It also houses a boiler room and restrooms for the boys and girls.

Interior of the building has glazed tile as wainscoting and has terrazzo flooring in the halls and vinyl flooring in classrooms. The building has a lightweight concrete roof, which makes it structurally sound, fireproof and well insulated. The wing has aluminum acoustical ceilings.

Each classroom has approximately 900 square feet.

A covered walkway connects the addition and the cafeteria. The new structure cost \$105,000 including furnishings, Swim said. Iowa Park received \$37,500 in federal funds to apply on this work, and the school district has enough money left from a \$385,000 bond issue to build another unit when need arises.

Kidwell Elementary School PTA has scheduled a Get Acquainted Night meeting at 7:00, Thursday, Sept. 7. There will be no formal program and opportunity will be made for parents to get acquainted with teachers and with each other, and vice versa.

Mrs. Joe Bell is president and Mrs. Henry Parsons is membership secretary.

Mrs. B. J. Solomon, publicity chairman, says regular meetings of the club will be held the first Thursday of each month at 3:00 p.m. at the school.

Student lunches will be the same price as usual this year—27 cents for elementary students and 32 cents for high school students.

There will be no sales tax on student meals but a sales tax will be collected from patrons who eat at the school cafeterias.

Cafeteria personnel at the main building will be Mmes. Blanche Brown, Lloyce Pryor, Catherine Stephens, Clara Lee, Hazel Walker. Workers at Kidwell school cafeteria are Mmes. Grace Chastain, Opal Watson, Freddie Skinner and Johnnie Combs.

A general faculty meeting will

be held in the high school auditorium at 9:30 a.m. Friday. Principals will hold conferences with the teachers from 10:30 until noon.

School personnel will hold a luncheon in the Fellowship Hall of the Methodist church at noon.

Coffee Stop

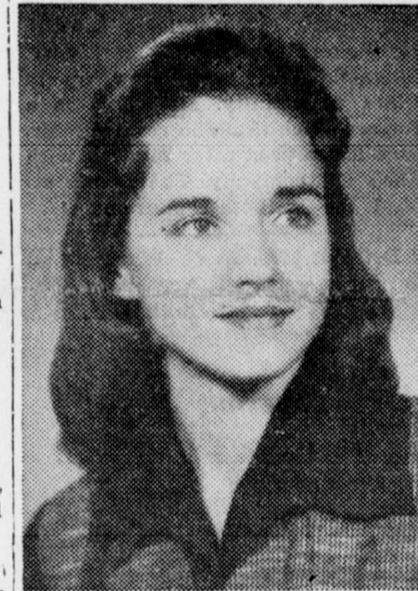

Funeral service was conducted Monday morning, Aug. 28, for Mr. Edward C. Schildt, 63, in Wichita Falls with Rev. J. A. Brooks of First Free Will Baptist church of Port Worth officiating.

School Term Starts Next Tuesday

Iowa Park schools have been holding pre-enrollment this week and increases have been noted in all the system.

Supt. Keith Swim announced a total of 1203 pupils are enrolled, an increase of 150 students.

This is a heavy pupil load and school administrators ask students and parents to co-operate with the school personnel in making the adjustments that will be necessary. There will have to be some transfers after opening of school next Tuesday.

All students are to go to the buildings where they registered this week unless otherwise notified by school officials.

School will begin at 8:30 Tuesday morning with dismissal at 2:30. Lunches will be served. The buses will run a little early Tuesday morning.

Beginning Wednesday the buses

will run on schedule and school will be dismissed at the regular time.

Swim asks any student living beyond the regular bus route to notify him at 592-4811. The buses go only on approved routes. This is the state law:

1. Students must live at least two miles by the most direct route from the school to which he is assigned.

2. No student is allowed bus transportation when living within the city limits.

Bus drivers are Watkins Walker, Curtis Simmons, Dewey Steed, Bob Howington, A. B. Stermer.

The first day of school work books and a list of supplies to be purchased will be handed to students.

Remember, all students are required to have polio vaccination certificates before being permitted to attend school next Tuesday.

Gil has been a resident here since 1945 and has worked in the engineering department of the Soil Conservation Service office for the past 16 years.

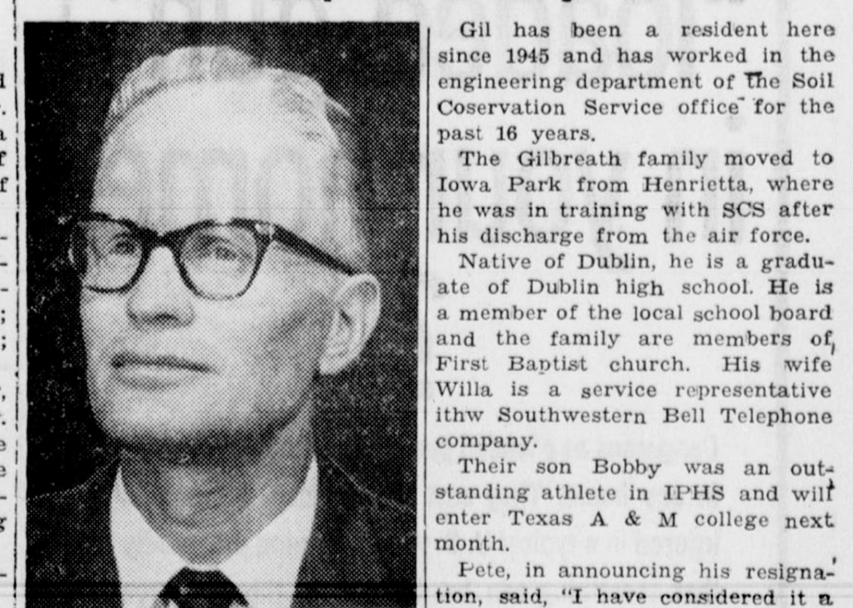
The Gilbreath family moved to Iowa Park from Henrietta, where he was in training with SCS after his discharge from the air force.

L. J. Lane of Valley Farms has brought honor to himself and Iowa Park this week by producing the first bale of cotton in Wichita county. It was hand pulled from approximately 4 acres of land.

Lane took the 1860 pound load of cotton to Farmers Co-op Gin in Burkburnett, Monday. It produced a 556 lb. bale of lint and 800 lb. of seed.

Watson-Stonerville variety, the cotton was planted April 22 and 23.

In recognition of the first bale, the Farmers Co-op Gin donated the ginning, bagging and ties. The compress also donated its services to Lane, and the Burk chamber of commerce gave him \$25. A. G. Earp, manager of the gin, made a special award of \$10.

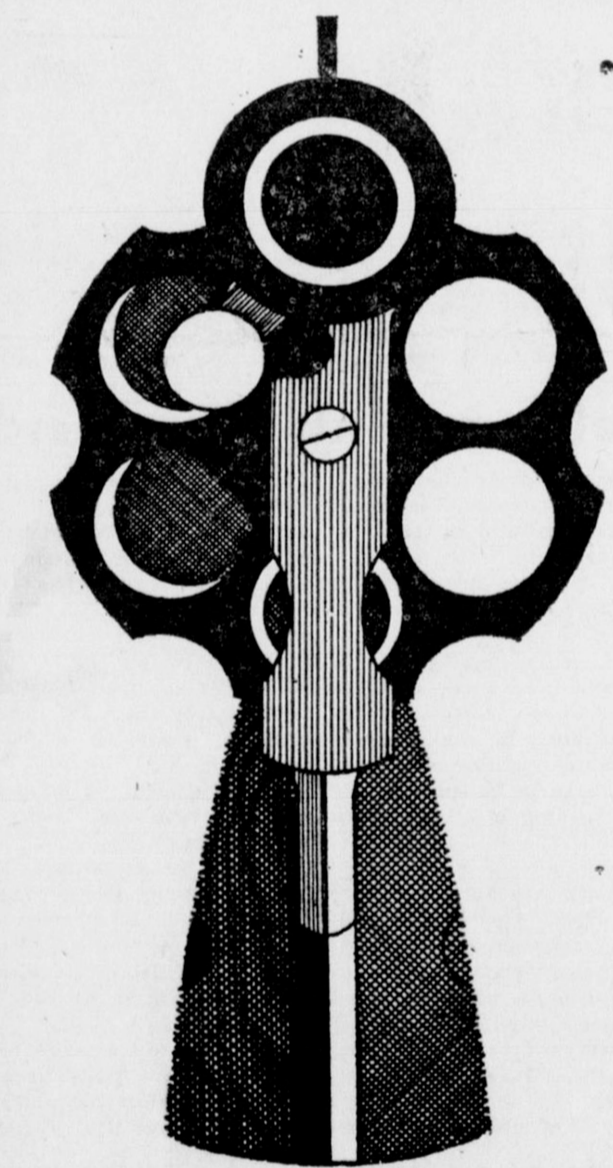

Clear Lake Stock Farm owned by Mrs. Ramon Wood of Electra Ranch, has about 1500 acres of range deferred since June. Deferment is made possible by grazing newly es-

tablished coastal bermudagrass. Control of mesquite makes all the moisture available for grasses, and with holding of grazing permits most desirable grasses to compete with grasses not readily eaten by livestock.

Burnett ranch and Clear Lake stock farm are participating in the Great Plains Conservation Program.

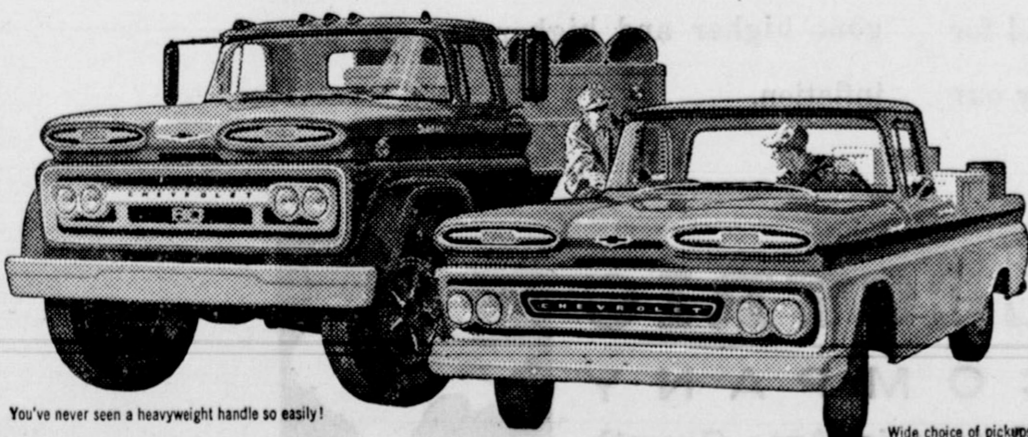
