### HOW TO CONTROL A BAD SITUATION

A young fellow was having a lot of trouble with his mother-in-law. Every afternoon when he came home from work, she was in a peevish mood. She was constantly nagging, complaining and accusing him unfairly.

At first he took it meekly. But then he could no longer bear it in silence. Unknowingly he began to reflect her mood like a mirror. If she complained that she and her daughter had too much work to do, he griped right back about how hard he had worked at the office. When she accused him of not making enough money, he would quickly inform her that he made more than the average person, but that she and her daughter would have bankrupted a very wealthy man.

In fact, every time she yelled, he yelled. His wife, who was caught in the middle, yelled first at one and then at the other. The children joined in and just yelled.

The home became so tense and edgy that divorce seemed to be the only solution.

Finally, he decided he must have help. He went to his pastor and talked the situation over with him.

They discussed who was setting the tempo and emotional mood of the household. They both agreed that the mother-in-law was.

Then the pastor told him this: "You are simply reflecting whatever mood your mother-in-law establishes. There is only one way to ensure peace and har-

mony in your home. You must be the one who takes control of the situation. And there is only one real way to make the environment of your home what you want it to be. You must show your mother-in-law by your actions how you want your home to be. For instance, you want it to be courteous. Well, you be courteous. In this way, half of your environment will change instantly."

The young man asked, "How do I start?"

The pastor said, "The next time she complains, courteously tell her you are sorry."

And so the young man went home determined to try this. The first time he said, "I am sorry," his mother-in-law was speechless. How could she argue with someone who would not argue with her? For if a person is determined to be courteous, he will be and others cannot help being affected.

Eventually the type of environment this young man desired was established in his home.

And he made this resolution: Whatever happens, I am determined, by my own conduct, to affect that situation so that the outcome will be exactly what I want it to be.

This will work for anyone. The Bible declares that "a soft answer turneth away wrath" (Proverbs 15:1).

And many of the heartaches and tensions that exist in homes across America could be healed if more people would adopt this philosophy.

### Those "Simple" Little Shot Shells

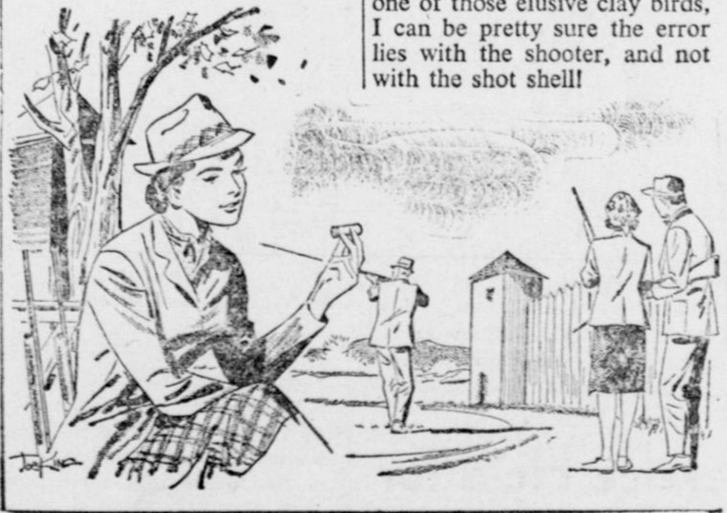


Out at our local trap club a few days ago . . . after a series of disgraceful misses . . . I got to wondering about shot shells. How is a shot shell made? What makes it function so dependably? Staring at the familiar little red tube in my hand, I thought, "I'll bet it's not so simple to make." So that night I sat down and wrote to one of our oldest and most respected ammunition manufacturing firms. The answer I got astounded me!

The company's shot shell

manufacturing processes employ sixty basic operations, during which there are perhaps one hundred and twenty inspections. There are forty-two visual and seventy-seven mechanical tests on basic materials, partially finished components and completed shells . . . and every year the plant shoots up one million three hundred thousand rounds just to see how the loading machines are running!

All that to produce an ordinary (?) little old shotgun shell! It certainly convinced me of one thing . . . next time I miss one of those elusive clay birds, I can be pretty sure the error lies with the shooter, and not with the shot shell!

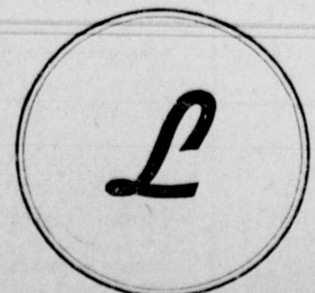
The group heard a last year's minutes and a financial report from Mrs. Ruth Gard, secretary.

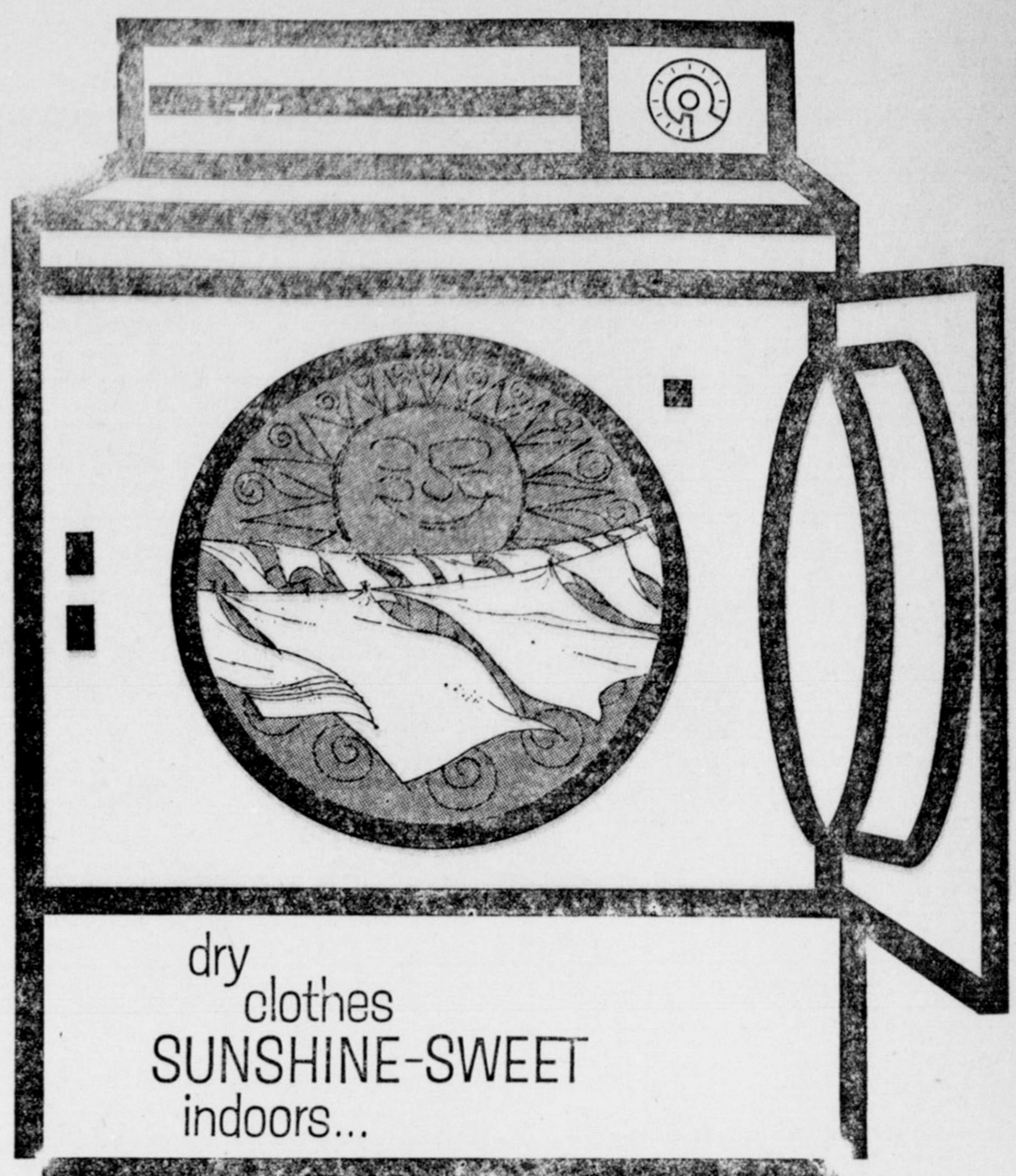

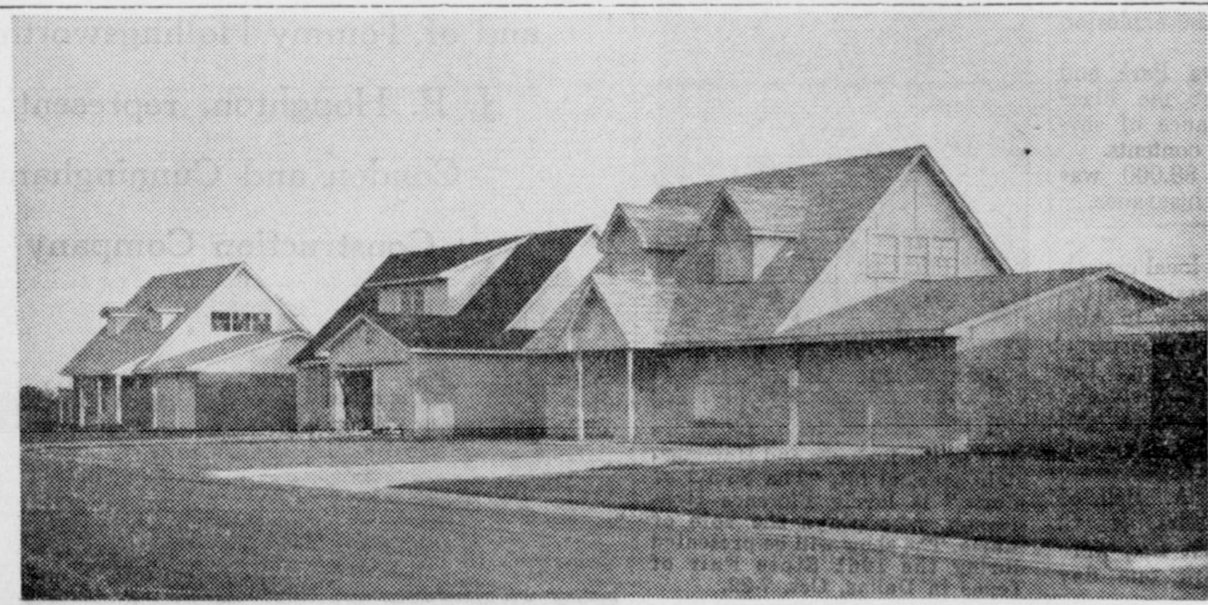
