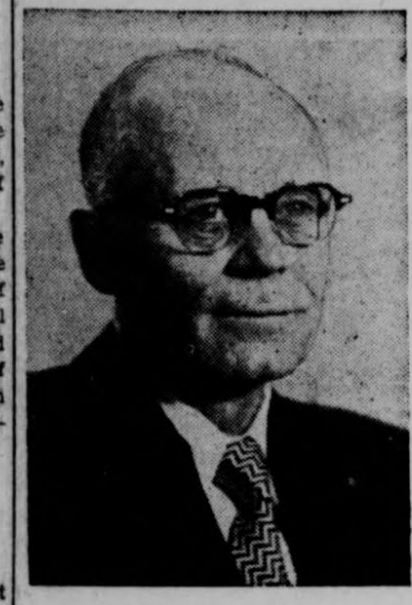
One student Ann Parkey, who is confined to her home at this time, had a happy birthday when the children stopped by and sang the birthday song to her.

## The Meaning of Easter

It is one of the glories of the Christian faith that it has often taken common customs and sometimes even sordid ones and made them to shine with holy meanings. That is true of Easter. We get our word *Easter* from the old Anglo-Saxon *Ostara* or *Eastre*, the name of the goddess of spring.

In the pre-Christian era pagan festivals were held annually in April to celebrate the new burst of life in all nature that comes with spring. When the Christian faith came with its wondrous story of the Christ who died and rose again, bringing assurance of life after death for all who follow Him, this celebration of new life in nature was lifted up into the realm of human longings for immortality, and so became the great Christian celebration of life after death.

Of course this tremendous Christian belief stems directly from the resurrection of Christ. The apostle Paul states it clearly: "Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive." And it is interesting that Christ's death was so timed that it coincided exactly with the day and hour when the passover lamb was slain, and his resurrection so timed that it coincided with the festival of spring. How inescapable is the suggestion that just as the all-provident God quickens nature into life again, so he will "also quicken our mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in us."

It is not surprising that Easter has been universally accepted as the greatest day of the Christian year. Leo I called it "the day alone great," and Gregory Nazianzen called it "the most royal of days" and "the festival of festivals" and "the happiest of days."

But the most moving of all the writings that came out of the ancient church is the one by John of Damascus in his resurrection hymn:

*The day of resurrection, earth, tell it out abroad,  
The passover of gladness, the passover of God.*

Frank has lined up a fine squad for competition in the Oilbelt circuit, which starts April 24 with Iowa Park visiting Burk in the league opener.

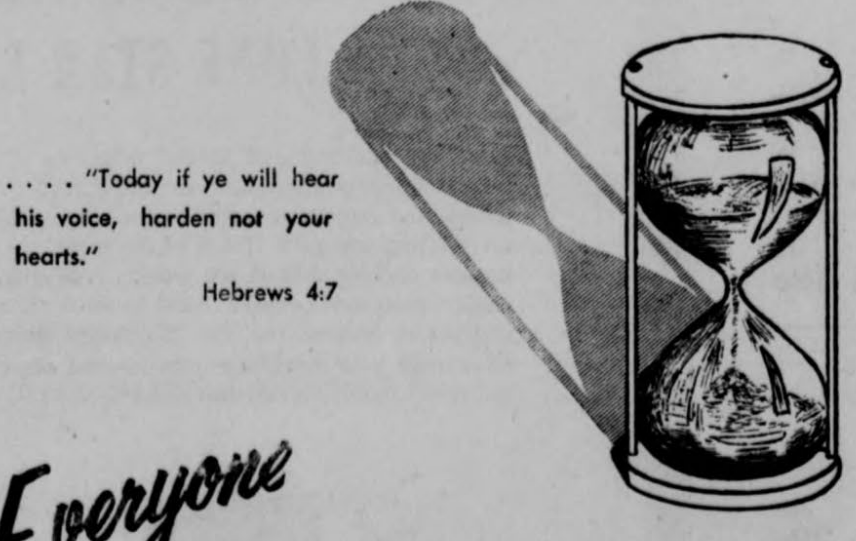

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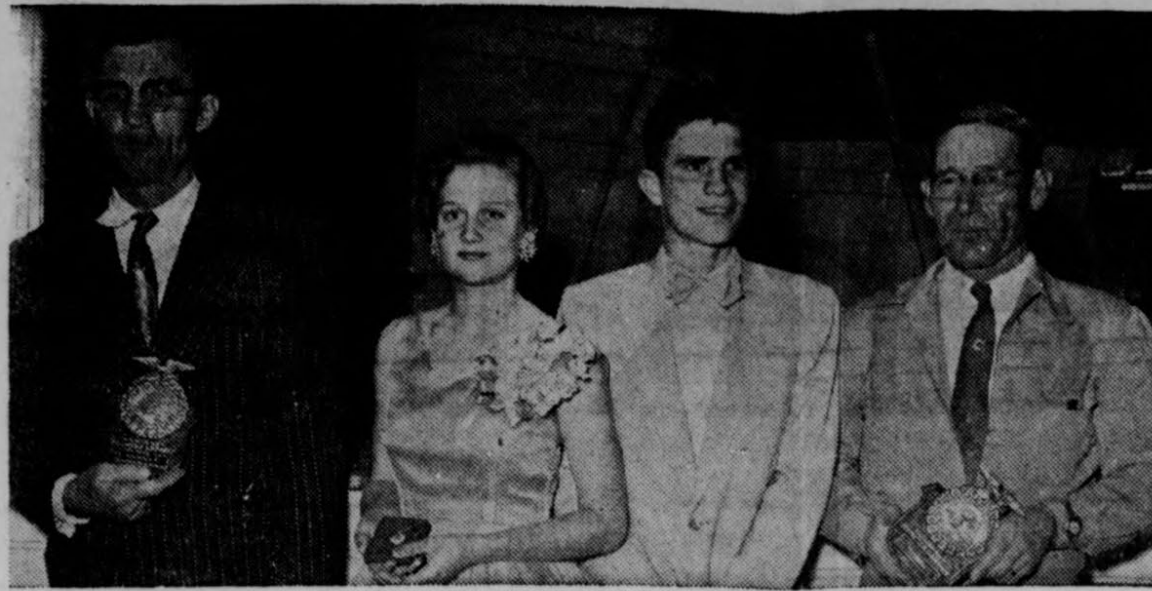

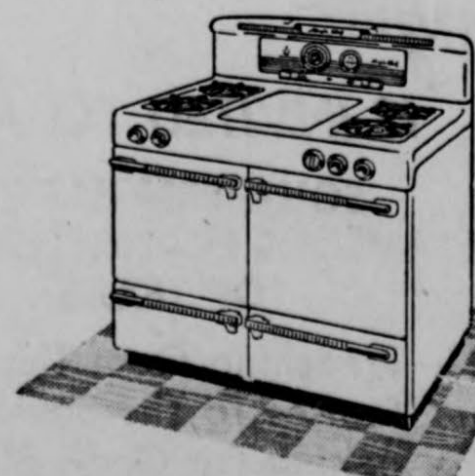

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## FARMERS UNION SPEAKS...

Benson's refusal to sell surplus farm commodities at competitive prices in world markets are criticized in House debate on the department of agriculture appropriation bill.

This side-issue was raised in the report by the agriculture sub-committee which was adopted by the 50-man appropriations committee.

The report charged that "political and other considerations predominate" to prevent action by the government to sell its surplus.

"These actions are hard to understand unless CCC costs and losses are for use to support their efforts to change the price support program," the report went on.

"The CCC has authority to sell its products in world markets at competitive prices. As of Feb. 1955 nearly \$3.7 billion of such commodities have never been offered for sale abroad at competitive prices. And storage charges are rapidly increasing the Corporation's investment in these stocks."

The House by voice vote approved the appropriations committee's bill for expenses and loans by the department of agriculture in 1956. Main feature was an \$18½ million increase over the amount recommended by Ike for several "action programs" to help farmers.



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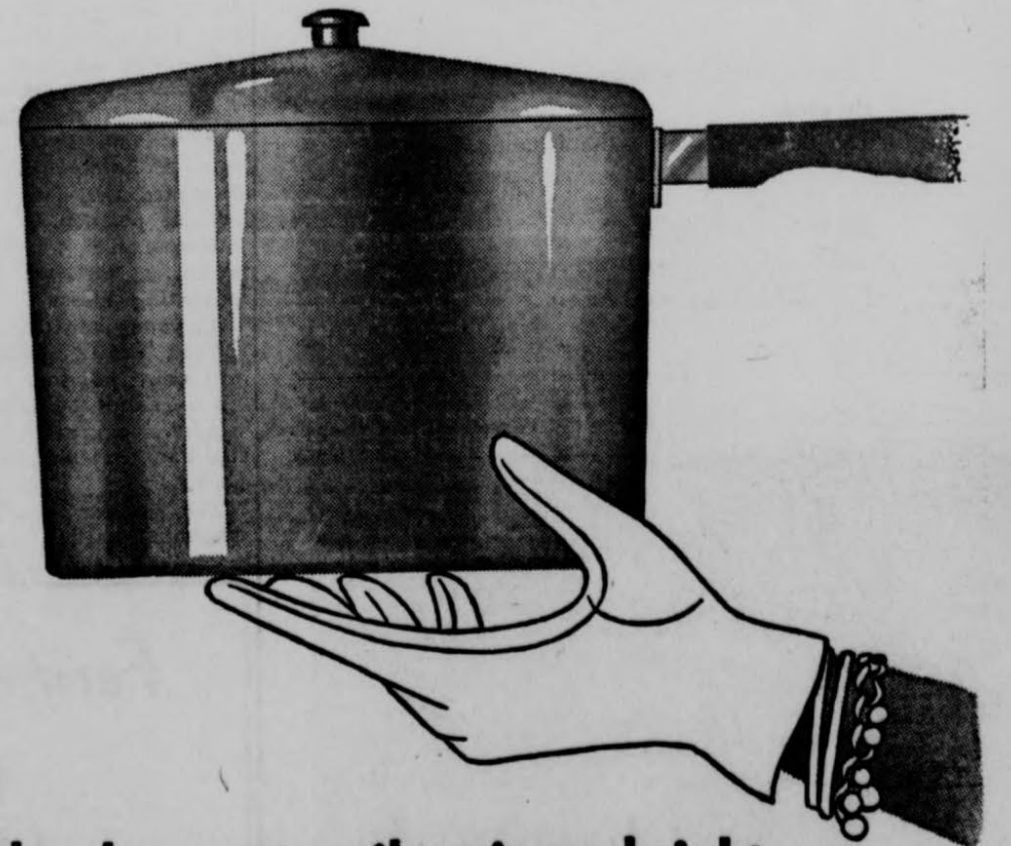
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**Easter Meditation**

"Do not be amazed: you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen, he is not here; see the place where they laid him." Mark 16:6.

A garden, a cross, a tomb, a life; these are Easter and its meaning. The kingdom of God is reached by gardens of decision in which the individual is dedicated to God's will; by crosses of death upon which other sons of God reveal a love so divine; by tombs from which true servants of God rise to live forever.

It is not death, but life, that is found in a garden, a cross, a tomb, by Christianity. Dejection, despair, hopelessness were the feelings of the disciples until . . . until at the Open Tomb dejection was replaced with delight, despair with discipline, and hopelessness with eternity. And thus has Christianity lived . . . men and women who will never die, drug to the place of death by the selfish, intolerant and the bigoted . . . crucified and buried but not dead.

Men of religion and science, men of devotion and enlightenment may be killed by men of dogma and enslavement, cloaked in garb of creed and class; but they do not die.

The seal of Caesar is broken; the stone rolled away; the grave clothes folded; and a voice from the Open Tomb saying, "Not here . . . Risen." Thus all liberty, privilege, our all is associated like Easter with the garden, the cross, the tomb and the life.
