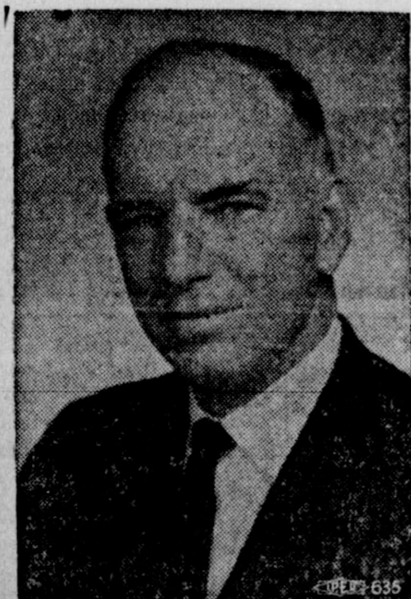

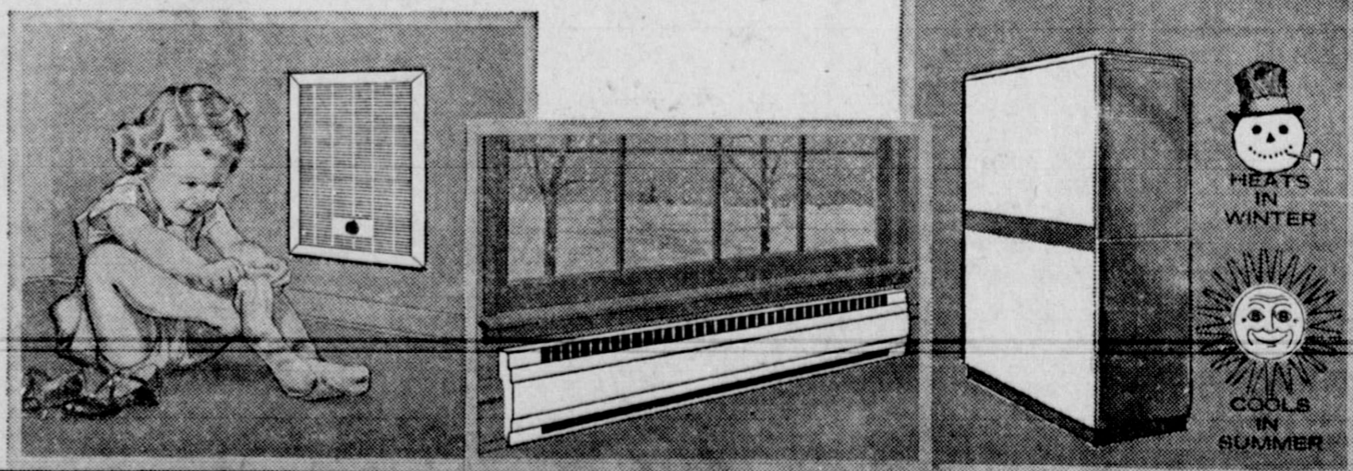

Program for a meeting of the 23 Study club recently was highlighted with the showing of a film "Time and Two Women" and a lecture by Dr. Earl Watson. The meeting took place in the home of Mrs. T. M. Thaxton with Mrs. L. E. Brooks as co-hostess.

Mrs. Roger Giegling of the cancer society showed the film on uterine cancer, the second most common cancer in women. The cases of two women were described. One neglected to see her

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physician even after she had discovered symptoms of cancer, and she did not recover. The other went for periodic checkups, and when the pathologist discovered cancer cells, treatment was administered which resulted in cure.

Dr. Watson stated that 23,000 women in the U.S. die annually of uterine cancer. He also said that one out of every four persons will develop some form of cancer at some time in his life. He said that many thousands of Americans are being cured of cancer every year because they go to doctors in time.

The speaker listed some warning signals and told of efforts to educate people of the necessity of seeing the physician at the first sign of trouble, or, better still, of making a habit of having a health checkup each year.

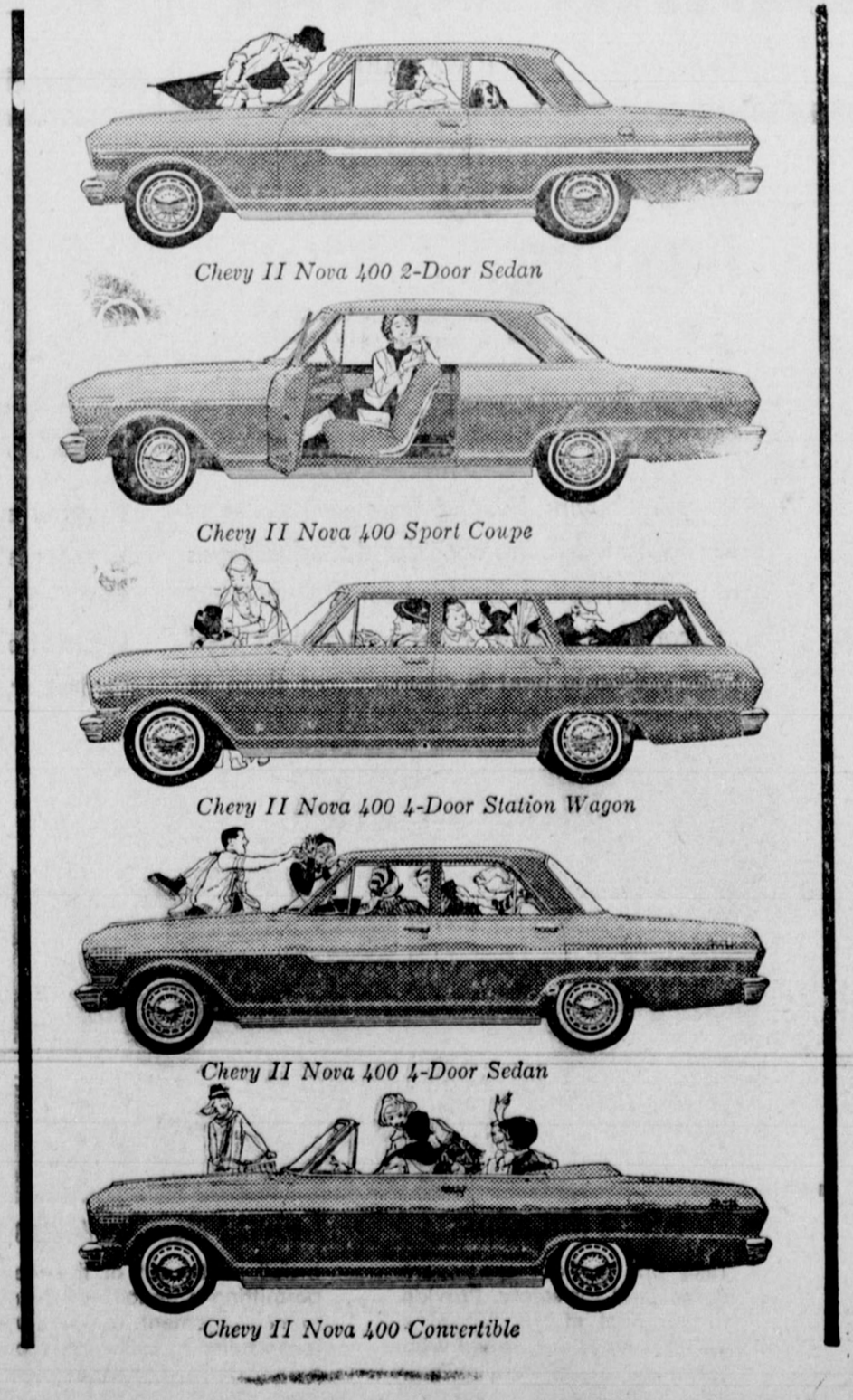
