## 1,291 Customers Use 1,678 Phones Here

New telephone directories for Iowa Park were delivered here this week. The book also contains listings for Burkburnett, Henrietta, Charlie and Wichita Falls.

Joe Cochran, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., is pictured above presenting a copy to Mayor Charlie Metz.

The 1962 directory reflects the steady growth of this area. It has 408 pages compared with 396 in the old book. There are 144 white pages and 264 yellow pages in the new directory. Of these, 130 contain alphabetical listings compared with 124 pages of alphabetical listings in 1961.

Iowa Park listings begin on page 133, including 1,291 customers. Cochran revealed there are 1,678 phones in use here.

First listing is K. P. Abernathy, who lives on Johnson Road. Last Iowa Park listing is Floyd Zion, 500 W. Aldine.

Telephone users will notice several changes in the directory. Blank spaces are left for emergency numbers such as police, sheriff and fire department. Spaces for these numbers are at the top of the first page. Blanks were left due to the fact different numbers apply in the several areas, Cochran said.

The directory also has three pages of area code numbers for cities all over the US. This is another step to speed completion of long distance calls.

In placing long distance calls, customers can merely give the operator the area code instead of the town name. For example, if a customer wishes to call Denver, Colo., he merely tells the operator, "Area code 303," and then the telephone number.

Code for this area—317—is listed on the cover of the directory. If an Iowa Park telephone user places the code 817 in front of his telephone number, he has his own personal long distance number. There isn't another like it in the world.

## Miss Kidwell Nominated Teacher of Year

23 Study club has submitted the name of Miss Ethyle Kidwell in Santa Rosa district of TFWC competition for Teacher of the Year.

Miss Kidwell is not only a teacher and school administrator of note, she is an outstanding citizen. Her interest in people is not confined to children in the classroom. Boys and girls she once taught, now grown, frequently seek her counsel in affairs of their lives. Believing that friends constitute a great treasure, she constantly strives to be a friend of youth and adults alike.

Miss Kidwell has taught in the local school 40 years. Two years ago the new elementary school in the northwest section of town was named for her, attesting to the esteem in which she is held here.

Miss Kidwell received the BS degree from East Texas State college in Commerce with majors in English, history and elementary education; and minors in art and social science. She was awarded the MS from North Texas State university, Denton. Her major was elementary education and minor was philosophy.

She has studied in summer sessions at the University of Colorado, the University of Denver, Peabody college, West Texas State college and the University of New Mexico. She continually attends reading clinics, English clinics and art workshops to keep abreast of modern teaching methods.

Miss Kidwell is a member of the Parent-Teacher association and is a regular attendant at the executive board meetings and regular monthly meetings. She is a life member of Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers. This membership was a gift from the Iowa Park elementary school in recognition of her fine work as teacher and principal.

Ethyle has been a member of the Chamber of Commerce and



has served on the city beautification committee. She served for years on the welfare board here. She has served as chairman of children's exhibits for the T-O Fair and has been charge of the children's entries in the parade which opens the Fair.

For the past three years she has been director of the city's summer recreation and crafts program for children 9 to 12 years of age. She is an active member of Modern Music Study club, having served as president. She is a tireless leader within her school in various drives such as Red Cross, Heart, March of Dimes and the like.

As an active member of the Methodist church Miss Kidwell is currently president of Wesleyan Service guild and member of the church's education committee.

She has served as superintendent of the Junior Sunday School department for many years and works with Vacation Bible school each summer, sometimes as director.

## \$102,477 Grant for School

Iowa Park Independent School District has recently been granted \$102,477.00 of federal aid from the department of health, education and welfare.

This money is for federal impacted areas and since Iowa Park is adjacent to SAFB and has a 13.6 priority, the money has been allocated here.

This assistance is to be applied on a new building. We are expected to have an increase of 184 federal students by 1963.

The school board has bought a 12-acre site in the south part of town and will hold a special meeting soon to make plans for building on the site. The board has asked that a survey be made of children on the south side of town, and the number of rural children who ride school buses.

The school board held a meeting Tuesday evening in the superintendent's office with John Clapp jr. presiding. They voted to send Prin. Faris Nowell to St. Louis for a convention of secondary school principals Feb. 23.

The board had previously voted to send Keith Swim to Atlantic City for the NEA convention. He will leave this Thursday with a group of school men of this area.




