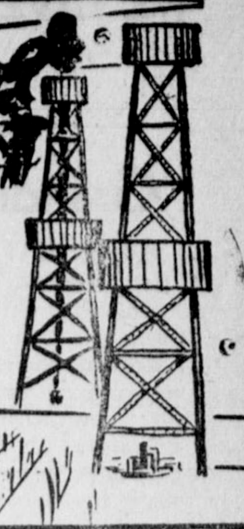

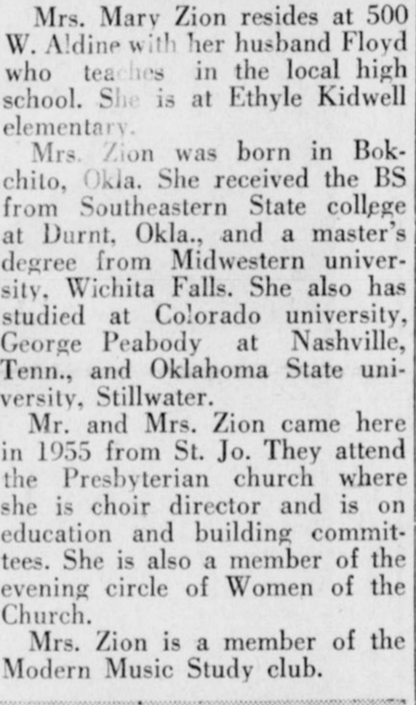

This week the 5th grade teachers of Iowa Park are introduced. They teach 117 pupils in the two elementary schools.



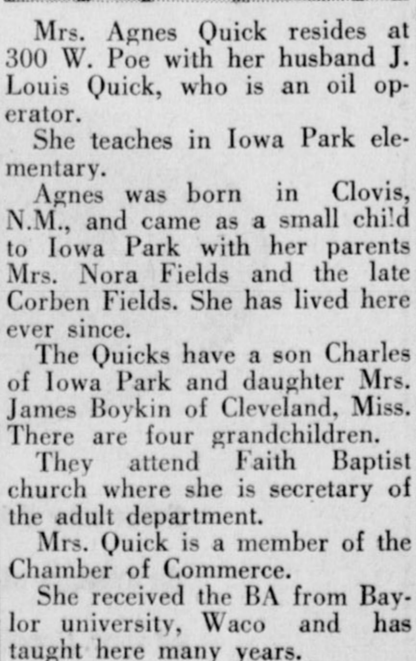

School News

A threatened student walkout occurred at Iowa Park High last Friday afternoon. Apparent cause was the method set up last week for selection of cheerleaders. In the screening of applicants for these positions, members of the Student Council eliminated some names under a new set of rules suggested by the Student Council, approved by the school administration, and adopted by the school board.

Tuesday night, April 17, the board of trustees met in the superintendent's office to receive reports from the superintendent and high school principal on the situation.

Many patrons and parents heard of the proposed meeting and, under the impression it was to be a public meeting, went to the school building. Some had matters to take up with the board and some were present because of their interest in what was taking place.

After a few minutes of deliberation, the board decided to invite any individual or set of parents who had problems to discuss to enter the superintendent's office and talk with them about the problems. The board did not think a public meeting would accomplish much since they were not yet fully informed on the situation.

Several parents availed themselves of the opportunity to meet with the board. Those who had no particular problems and were present simply to find out what was going on—because they are parents or patrons with a real interest in the school—left the building.

Just before the board meeting closed, they authorized the Herald to state that they were still backing the rules made last week with a minor change, and still backing the faculty in applying the rules to the current selection of cheerleaders. Naming of the cheerleaders, as originally planned, will be done under actual tryout conditions by out-of-town judges. The selection is currently set for Thursday, April 26.

Iowa Park track and field team placed 4th in the Regional meet last Saturday at Denton. Although Coach Bill Carter's squad earned 43 points, only two boys will be eligible to go to state, and both are discus throwers; Jimmy Gillispie won 1st with 165 ft. 6 inches; Mike Davenport won 2nd with 158 ft. 8.25 in.

By winning 2nd in slide rule at Denton last weekend, David Low, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Low, is entitled to compete in State at Austin.

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Grandma's Rocking Chair

The past weekend has been one several people in this city would like to regard as never having happened. Unfortunately, it did and its consequences have been far reaching and will be felt for years to come.

Things have come to a sorry state when the entire school system is divided to the extent that in order for the student body to get the attention of parents and school patrons as a whole it became necessary to take drastic action. Last week's action on the part of the student body was not the result of the week's happenings. These conditions have been growing for at least two years, possibly longer, and the action of the students last week was a result of the straw that broke the camel's back.

I have said it before and I'll say it again, there is nothing wrong with our Teen Angels that the parents can't handle if they will take the responsibility. Too many parents refuse to believe that their child could do anything wrong. Most kids will be kids.

You were a kid once and so was I, and we did do things our parents would never have believed. On the other hand, had we needed to talk things out with our parents, we knew we could.

We had their confidence and they had ours.

The same was true with our teachers.

Today things have changed and I cannot see that it is for the best. Last week's trouble at school was the direct result of the failure of people in authority to assume authority in the correct way. The authority was not handed by the adults, the burden and the blame were placed on the Student Council, who apparently were used as dupes and now the situation is that the student body and the Student Council are at odds. This is a real good way to get the upper hand.

Divide and conquer. Hitler used it as did many others who desired to take over a society or a nation.

It seems strange that now the criteria for a child to be elected to a school office are decided by anyone but the student body; or that what a child wears to school or where her father is employed or what the family income is makes any difference as to establishing the necessary qualifications to hold a class office or be cheerleader. Our nation certainly would have been lacking in leaders if the clothes on their backs or the money in the family bank account were the criterion for

whether some of them became our leaders.

I am not one of those leaders, but I am one of the former students of this school. My notebooks and papers went to State in order to "affiliate" the school so that we in high school then and those after us would be accepted in the colleges of our state without having to pass entrance examinations.

I was on the honor roll, valedictorian of my class and editor of the school paper. And do you know what—my Dad was hard pressed to keep up in school. I had one dress to my name. I wore it all week and laundered it on Saturday, wore it to church on Sunday and back to school all the next week.

But to my classmates and the school officials, my clothes made no difference. It was what was between my ears that they regarded as important, not what was on my back.

My popularity was not unanimous either, and some of the teachers maybe didn't like me; and goodness knows I wrote notes and did all the things that kids have done at school since time began, but I was not prevented from making my way because of these things. I daresay the adults responsible for last week's trouble did all the things mentioned above when they were that age.

They certainly might never have reached places of authority had they been "screened" in some areas.

It is beyond my comprehension that people who have been trained to teach young people, who have spent hundreds of dollars and years of their lives can be so stupid as to use the tactics exhibited last week. Members of our student body are not dumbbells. They could have been called into assembly, asked to submit or even review the proposed requirements and they probably would have accepted them.

The manner of approach, that of trying to cram something down their throats, is unacceptable to the student body and to American people. We fought and won the Revolutionary War because we wanted to be represented properly. It's too bad the kids had to stage a "Boston Tea Party" in order to bring conditions to the attention of parents and school patrons.

Heretofore a few parents at a time have gone to the school to see what was going on. Nothing was done then to get to the cause

of the trouble. The kids have been accused of all sorts of things—maybe they are guilty of some, but they do not get a chance even to tell their side of the story.

There are always two sides. Talk things over with your kids. They are sharp and they could tell you a lot, but most parents are too busy to listen, or pass it off as kid talk. You'd better listen. Our school system is going to suffer, and we are going to lose boys and girls to other school districts if things are not settled.

It is to be hoped that the school board will have the intestinal fortitude to act like fathers for once and lift this situation to the bottom. They haven't been exactly on their toes either, or maybe this sore would not have been festering for several years.

And one more thing, Who screened the screeners?

ORDINANCE NO. 295
An ordinance authorizing and directing the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, or the Wichita Health Unit, to require physical examinations when indicated and enforce this ordinance: Making it unlawful for any person to accept employment in a food establishment, without a health certificate; Making it unlawful to employ a food handler without a health certificate; Providing for the issuance of health certificates to those found to be free of transmissible conditions of infectious and communicable diseases; Providing for laboratory test for blood; Providing for chest x-ray; Providing for permanent records; Authorizing the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit to issue health certificates; Providing a penalty of not to exceed \$100 for violations of this ordinance severable.

Whereas, it is found and determined by the governing body of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that in order to promote the public health and prevent the spread of disease the licensing of individual food handlers is necessary and expedient as provided in this ordinance; Now, Therefore,

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section 1: All such persons employed or seeking employment in any food establishment as defined in this Ordinance shall, upon request of any employed, or any legally appointed State or Local Health Officer or their duly authorized representative, secure an adequate examination of themselves by licensed physician and secure in evidence thereof a certificate signed by such physician stating that such examination has been made and that the best of his or her knowledge, the person examined was found on that date, to be free of any transmissible condition of any disease or local infection commonly transmitted through the handling of food or drink. Such examination shall be actual and thorough and conducted within the framework of practical scientific procedures for the determination of the existence of communicable disease which may be transmissible through the handling of foods.

Section 2: It shall be unlawful for any person to accept employment in any food establishment, as that term is herein defined, without securing from the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit a Health Certificate. No person, firm, corporation, or organization operating or managing any food establishment as defined in this ordinance shall employ a person as a food handler unless that person has obtained a Health Certificate as defined in this ordinance. Any person working as a cook, maid, or baby sitter for hire in private homes shall secure a Health Certificate as defined in this Ordinance.

Section 3: For the purpose of this ordinance "food establishment" as defined by any hotel dining room, cafe, restaurant, grocery store, fruit stand, drug store, soda fountain, bakery, meat market or any other establishment selling or serving or exposing for sale by retail any food products intended for human consumption.

Section 4: Any person who is required to have a Health Certificate under this Ordinance will make application to the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit. When an application is made for a Health Certificate the Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit shall direct the applicant to obtain a Serological Test for Syphilis and X-ray of the chest, which studies must be repeated at least once yearly. The Serological Test for syphilis must be performed and reported by any laboratory approved by the Wichita County Medical Society. X-ray of the chest may be obtained from any hospital, private physician, or other source approved by the Wichita County Medical Society. The hospital, private physician or other source shall agree to hold such x-rays available for examination by the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit for at least six months after the date the Health Certificate is issued. In lieu of an immediate Chest x-ray a report from a source approved by the Wichita County Medical Society of a Chest X-ray made within the four months preceding application shall be accepted.

Section 5: When reports to the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit of the blood serology and x-ray of the chest reveal no evidence of communicable disease, the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit may issue a Health Certificate, which certificate shall expire 12 months from date of issuance. Either the face of the Health Card or reverse side thereof shall describe the color of the eyes and hair, height, weight, race, sex and age of the licensee.

Section 6: It shall be the duty of the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park or the Wichita Health Unit to provide for the keeping of a permanent record, together with the date and issuance, of all "Health Certificates" issued to persons under provisions of this ordinance.

Section 7: If any provision of this ordinance or the application

thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the provision or application of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 8: Any person violating any of the provisions of this or-

dinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).
