United Way goes over the top

With Iowa Park contributors bettering last year's mark by 12 per cent, the United Way campaign passed its 1977 goal by raising a total of \$1,113,120.

Total goal for the drive was \$1,112,805.

The final tally was the second largest percentage increase over a previous year in the history of the United Way organization in Wichita County.

More than 200 volunteer workers and agency representatives Tuesday attended the victory luncheon in Wichita Falls, climaxing the six-week-long drive which reached businesses and individuals in the Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Sheppard AFB and Wichita Falls area.

"We feel this campaign was a

tremendous success and assures the continued services and expansion of the agencies funded by the United Way organization," said Dick Waggoner, campaign chairman. "We feel very secure about the coming year."

The contribution from Iowa Park residents showed a 12 per cent increase over the amount contributed last year, said Charlie Lee, chairman of the effort in Iowa Park.

"The drive here was very successful," Lee said.

"Our citizens believe in the United Way and the work it does. They have given freely to this drive to show their overwhelming support. We're very proud of them," he said.

Agencies funded by the United Way in Iowa Park include the Friendly Door and the Rec Center.

Division leaders for Iowa Park were Keith Aulds, advance gifts; Wayne House, major firms; Bill Steger, Faris Nowell and Gene Britton, public services; Joe Singer, professional; and Bobbie Shaw, metro.

Budget hearing for proposed allocations for agencies ranging from Girl Scouts, Boys' Clubs and youth centers to the Children's Home and Individual Development Center, will be started the third week in November and run for two weeks.

All agencies must present their programs and projected budgets to members of the United Way budgeting committee to receive allocations for the coming year.

The committee is composed of community volunteers and is headed by J.M. "Jeep" Ellett of Burkburnett.

Building permits exceed \$1-million

Building permits issued during October for five new homes helped boost Iowa Park's construction total to over the million-dollar mark for the year.

Permits amounting to \$161,275 put the 10-month total at \$1,080,426. September's \$241,000 helped consid-

erably. The city failed to reach the million-dollar level last year, finishing with \$987,699. But 1975 was the biggest year in construction this decade, when \$1,547,648 was reported.

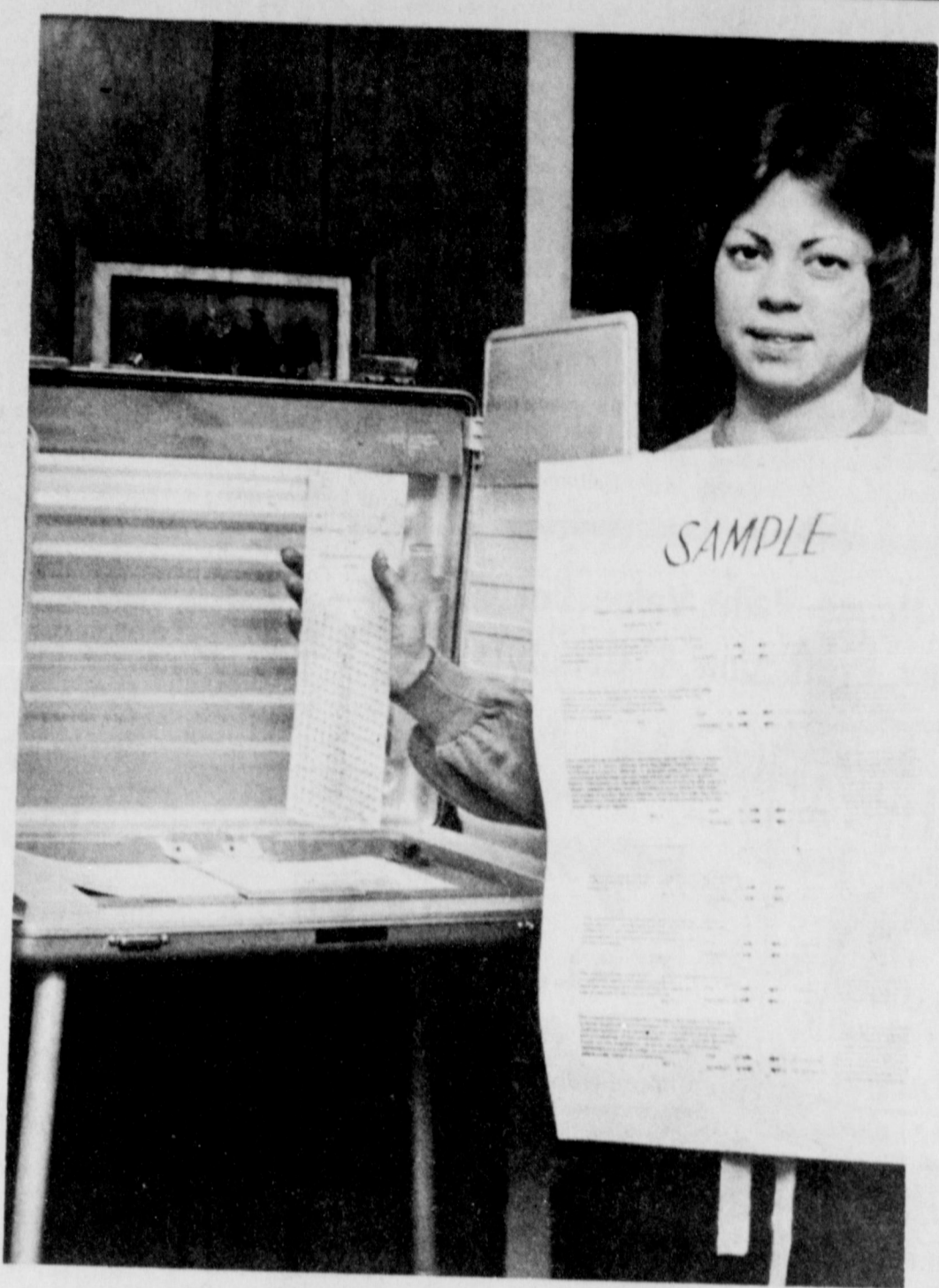
Registration will start at 5 p.m. and dinner will be served around 6:30. Those who attend are asked to bring a picnic lunch. The public is invited.

New voting system used in election

Seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will not be the only issues at stake Tuesday.

Another election of sorts will help decide the method by which Wichita County voters cast their ballots in the future.

This year the standard 14 inches by 22 inch ballot will be replaced by cards measuring 3 inches by 12 which will be fed into Vote-A-Matics.

The ballot card will be fed into a slot on the machine, and voters will mark their decisions by punching holes by corresponding alternatives.

It's all very simple, but for those who fear they might punch a wrong hole in their ballot, the system allows room for mistakes.

If a voter incorrectly punches his card, all he must do is ask the election judge for another card.

"They can have up to three cards," according to Jerry Padgett, assistant county clerk. After voters have marked their ballots, they will be asked

to reply to a questionnaire which will quiz them on whether they enjoyed the new voting machine, was it easy to use, would they like Wichita County to use such a system in future elections and age of the voter.

Wichita County Commissioners Court is expected to use the questionnaire as a basis of their decision whether to buy the system.

The county is renting the system for \$3,850. Purchase of the entire option - including voting machines and a computer to count the cards, would run about \$135,000, Padgett said.

True test of the system's effectiveness will come on Tuesday night when election judges report to Wichita County Courthouse to feed their ballots into the computer for counting.

The computer can tabulate 600 punch cards per minute, considerably faster than individually counting the old, bulky paper ballots.

However, election officials do

not expect the machines or computer to be overworked on this election.

"A 20 per cent turnout is what we're looking for," Padgett predicted, explaining Wichita County has 60,000 registered voters.

Since the low voter turnout is predicted, persons in Iowa Park's Precincts 32 and 33 both will cast ballots at the ASCS office here. Although a single polling place will be used, ballots for the two precincts will be kept separate.

Precinct 32 voters will have access to five of the voting machines, and four machines will be available to avoid a bottle neck of voters in Precinct 33.

Voting hours will run from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday.

Elsewhere in the area, voting machines will be set for use at Valley View School in Precinct 34, at the Community House in Pleasant Valley for Precinct 60 and at the Kamay Community Hall in Precinct 35.

Proposed constitution amendments detailed

Absent any public office races that would add the excitement of personality clashes, Iowa Park voters Tuesday will join an anticipated low turnout of Texans to decide seven proposed amendments to the state constitution.

Amendment No. 1 would change the court of criminal appeals from a court consisting of four judges and a presiding judge to a court consisting of eight judges and a presiding judge. The proposal would authorize the enlarged court of nine judges to sit in panels of three judges for the purpose of hearing cases with two judges constituting a quorum and the concurrence of two judges necessary for a decision.

Arguments for Amendment No. 1 are that immediate unburdening of the court of

criminal appeals is a necessity to achieve speedy justice, and that the proposal provides the most efficient and economical method of relieving the pressure on Texas' system of appellate review.

Arguments against the first proposal come from some authorities who believe the expansion of the court cannot solve the case load problem and favor two levels of review for criminal cases by providing for intermediate appellate review of criminal cases.

Amendment No. 2 would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$200-million in bonds. The additional \$200-million in bonds or obligations authorized would extend the maximum amount of bonds or obligations to the state for the Veterans' Land

Fund from the existing \$500-million to \$700-million. Also, the unmarried surviving spouse of a veteran who died in the line of duty would also become eligible to apply for purchase of a tract through the board.

Primary argument in favor of the second proposal is that in order to continue the program and to extend its benefits to those veterans who were eligible under the program but for whom money was unavailable for a loan because of the fund's depletion, it should be approved.

Surviving spouses should be given the same privileges of acquiring land for themselves as has previously been available only to veterans.

Those against the second proposal claim the federal government already provides

HOMEMADE NOODLES

4 cups flour
4 beaten eggs
1 t salt
Mix and sift salt and flour. Add gradually to beaten eggs until a stiff dough is formed. Knead a few times on floured board. Roll out to 1/16 of an inch thickness; let stand 1/2 hour. Roll and cut in strips. Dry thoroughly. Yield: 6 cups noodles.
Very good with boiled beef or chicken.

1/2 cup shortening
1/4 cup sugar
2 t salt
2 t nutmeg
1/4 t cinnamon
4 3/4 cups flour, sifted
2 cakes yeast softened in 1/4 cup lukewarm water
2 large eggs, about 1/2-1/2 cup
Bring milk to boiling point. Add shortening, sugar, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. When mixture is lukewarm add yeast, eggs and flour. Beat until well mixed. Cover and let stand one hour. Roll out and cut. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 375° for 12 minutes.

HOT DISH

Combine the following ingredients:

2 large diced potatoes
1 large diced onion
1 lb. rare hamburger
1 can tomato soup
1 can mixed vegetables
Salt and pepper
Bake at 350° until done.

OVEN BAKED RAISED DONUTS

1 1/2 cups milk

liquid. Add enough milk to equal one cup for each can of salmon. Combine all ingredients. If not stiff enough add 1/2 cup flour and 1/2 cup corn meal. Pack into greased loaf pans and bake at 375° for 15 minutes. Then add cheese on top of loaves and add any excess liquids. Bake another 25-30 minutes until brown.

Optionals may be added if desired:
2 T soy sauce
1 1/2 cups white sauce or cream gravy
Parmesan cheese
Onion salt, garlic salt or Worcestershire sauce

UNBAKED GRAHAM CRACKER BARS

Line a buttered 13x9x2 pan with whole graham crackers. Combine and boil the following for 10 minutes:
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup milk
1 cup grated coconut
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
1/2 t salt

Spread mixture on top of graham crackers in pan. Place another layer of crackers on top. While slightly warm ice with:
2 cups powdered sugar
2 T cream
5 T melted butter

Wheat demonstration planted at Barbour's

The wheat variety demonstrations are being planted by Loys Barbour on highway 287 between Wichita Falls and Iowa Park and by Don Holtzen of FM 240 between Burk Burnett and Punkin Center. Barbour's

trial will be field size while Holtzen's test will be small plots evaluating many varieties.
Some of the top varieties for the area are being shown the Barbour demonstration. These include TAM 101, Caprock, Tascosa, Strudy, Tex Red, Maverick, Dekalb

589 and 544, and Pioneer 915 and 940. These are planted with a drill and will be harvested with a combine. The fertility program is 80 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Barbour's seeding rate is 90 pounds of seed per acre. This demonstration site is clean land free of wild oats.

Screen of varieties for this area is the purpose of Holtzen's demonstration. Wheat varieties to be tested are Tascosa, Caddo, Concho, Scout 66, Lancota, Sage, Payne, Rall, Lindon, Centurk, and Sturdy.
Improved Triumph, Tam 101, Caprock, Tex Red, Agent, Maverick, Vona, Larned, Tam 103, Tri-64, and Osage.

Oak varieties are Cheota, Cimaron, Nora, Harpool 422, Walken, Coker 234. These oat varieties will be measured for both forage yield as well as grain.
Time is running short for wheat growers who are thinking about trying Carbyne for chemical control of wild oats. Carbyne is a selective herbicide which gives approximately 85 to 90 percent control of wild oats, provided the application is made at the right time.
Timing of application is critical. The material must be applied while the wild oats are in the two leaf stage. It won't work in either the one leaf or the three leaf stage. The wild oat plant develops a leaf every 4-5 days. If a wild oat plant has 1 1/2 leaves on Monday, it may have 2 1/2 leaves by Friday, thus making it too old to spray. This means daily inspections are required as soon as the wheat comes up. Dr. Allen Wiese of the Bushland Research Center says the wild oats are usually ready to spray about 1-1 1/2 weeks after the wheat comes up.
The Carbyne is applied at the rate of 3 pints per acre. This represents a cost of \$6.60 per acre plus the cost of application. I am interested in establishing a demonstration using wild oat control chemicals. I can make arrangement for the chemicals with the grower making the application. We will need to leave a check plot in the treated field. Any grower who would like to work with me on trying chemical controls, please give me a call.

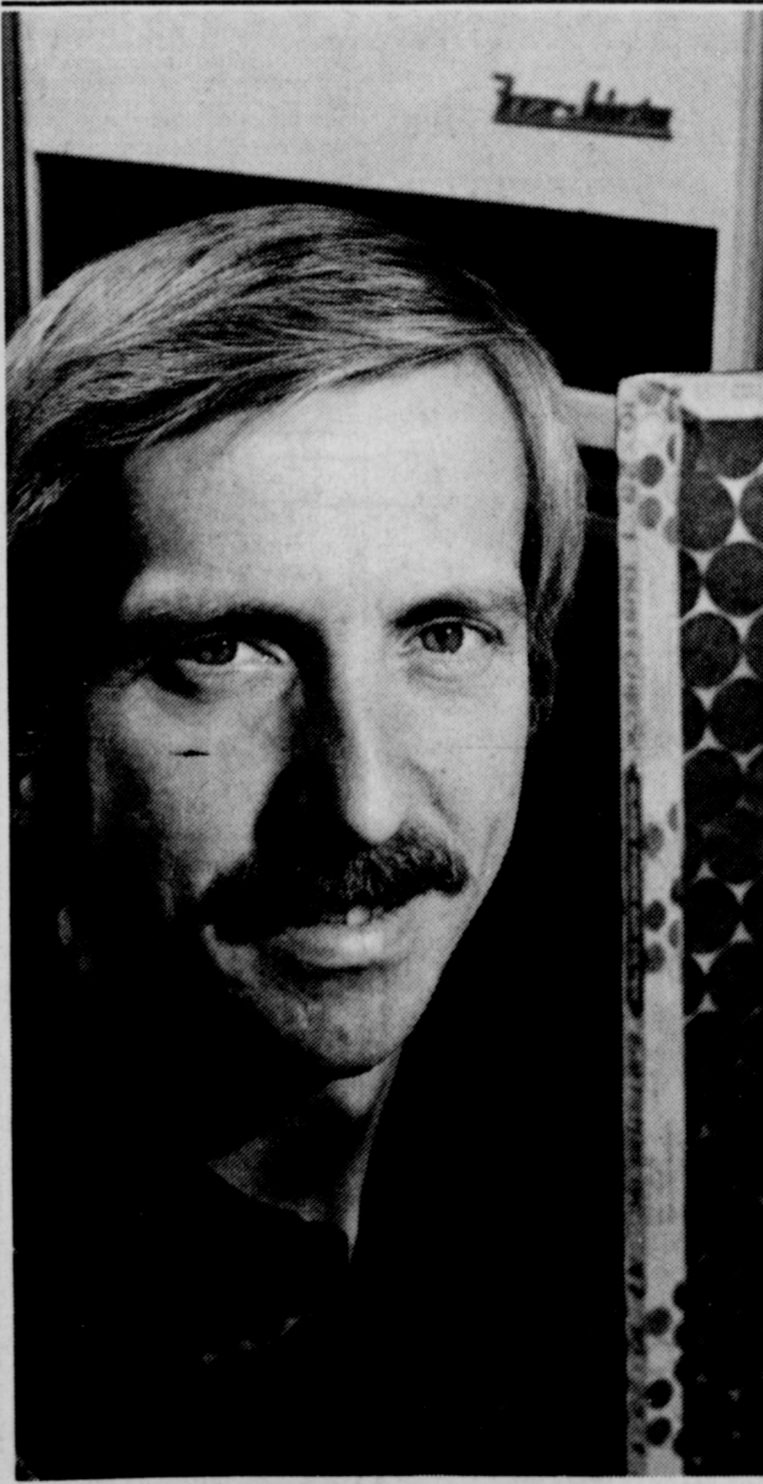

PUC ruling to affect local rates

The Texas Public Utilities Commission (PUC) yesterday approved a system-wide rate increase of 15 percent for Texas Electric Service Company.

TESCO had requested an increase of 23.6 percent, which would generate

an additional \$79.1-million revenue for the firm. The PUC increase reduced the new income to \$44-million annually.

At the meeting of the Iowa Park city council last week, members

passed an ordinance setting rates here which would allow an 8.3 percent increase in rates. This will be changed due to the PUC ruling, but at what time is not now known. The council does not have another meeting scheduled until Nov. 14.

generous benefits for veterans, and compensation of veterans is a federal rather than state responsibility. Another argument is that the program was designed to benefit veterans, not their families.

Amendment No. 3 would allow a district court to deny bail to a person accused of a felony committed while he was on bail for a prior felony indictment or to a person who has been previously convicted of a felony and is accused of using a deadly weapon in the commission of a second felony.

The amendment would prevent career criminals from taking advantage of the time between indictment and trial to commit additional offenses while on bail, is a primary argument in favor of Amendment No. 3. The proposal also would eliminate the danger to the public which exists when a person with a felony record who commits a subsequent felony involving a firearm is released on bail.

Chief arguments against the amendment is that the purpose of releasing a defendant on bail is to preserve the presumption of innocence while ensuring that he will appear for trial. The proposal would provide for

incarcerating persons who have not been tried or convicted as well as incarcerating persons on the basis of a past conviction for which they have already been punished.

Amendment No. 4 would authorize the legislature to provide for tax relief for cultural, historical or natural history resources -- regardless of ownership -- as means to encourage preservation.

Tax relief for these resources would contribute significantly to their preservation, according to proponents.

Oposing arguments are that the proposal would erode the tax bases of school districts and local governments, and that special tax treatment for one group would be inequitable and discriminatory and would result in shifting a greater tax burden to those who are not granted such exemptions or relief.

Amendment No. 5 would authorize producers of poultry, livestock and other raw agricultural commodities to form associations and collect assessments on their product sales.

Supporters say the amendment would benefit all producers of a particular commodity who decide to establish a board and levy the assessment.

Arguments against Amendment No. 5 claim it would take money out of the hands of the individual producer who could better conduct his own research and market development.

Amendment No. 6 would give the legislature power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges and other privileges which are incidental to banking by use of electronic terminals at remote locations.

Arguments in favor of the proposal are that electronic fund transfer terminals would provide

the consumer with a convenient optional method of payment. A consumer would have a choice of paying cash or by check, credit card or electronic fund transfer. Routine business and retail transactions would be speeded up and paperwork and mailing costs would be reduced. Insufficient funds to cover benefitting the merchant and saving the customer from a potential overdraft charge.

Opponents say the cost of installing a network of electronic fund transfer terminals would probably be passed on to the consumer, raising prices. Electronic fund transfers would be recorded instantaneously while checks often take several days to clear. Mixing the two systems would complicate the balancing of checkbooks and lead to inadvertent overdrafts.

Amendment No. 7 would change the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and would change the membership of the commission to include four citizen members instead of three and add one justice of the peace.

Arguments for the change say the legislature and the electorate created the commission and established a method of disciplining judges which provides due process of law for officeholders. Discipline by the commission and removal from office by the supreme court on recommendation by the commission is more economical and a better use of manpower than impeachment.

Opposition says judges are elected to public office and a position of public trust by the people and expansion of the power of the commission and the supreme court to discipline and remove judges undermines the will of the electorate.

As I See It....

The world's most noted heart surgeon, Dr. Michael DeBakey, says it doesn't matter what kind of exercise you do to help keep your heart healthy and effective.

He says what is important is whether you enjoy the exercise you undertake.

I had a rare opportunity to spend some 20 minutes in conversation with the famous surgeon from Houston Saturday morning, while attending the annual convention of the National Newspaper Association, held in that city.

Dr. DeBakey had shown up for his talk early, and since I was to introduce him to the audience, we had some time to talk. I say a conversation with him is rare, because demand of his time is tremendous.

I really don't know how old he is, but I'm aware he started practice in 1937. He's performed well in excess of 30,000 surgeries, and today figures he's had a good night's sleep if he gets five hours.

Besides "five or six" operations daily, he's up around 5 a.m., writing, and still finds time to serve as president and chairman of the department of surgery at Baylor College of Medicine, and director of Cardiovascular Research and Training Center of Methodist Hospital, both in Houston.

He is a pioneer in development of an artificial heart, and numerous people in this part of the country have

been helped by him.

But the noted physician maintains it is not the exercise you do, but whether you enjoy it, that will help you. If you don't enjoy it, find another you do.

About using a monkey or other animal's heart to support a human's, the doctor indicates he doesn't like the idea by expressing "I don't understand it".

To loosen him up a little during our talk, I asked him about his own health and when was the last time he had a physical examination.

He admitted it had been a year since his last physical, and that his blood pressure was lower than normal. I asked him how he knew about his pressure, and he said "Oh, I feel my pulse. When you've had as much experience as I've had, you can tell pretty accurately."

I'm sure he can.

His talk was one of the highlights of the convention. Another was a talk by former governor John Connally, who spoke primarily on the need to

achieve a better balance between Democrats and Republicans in Congress, and the need to have less interference of business from government.

"You lose economic freedom, you lose individual freedom. Look around the world, and you'll see what I mean," he told the delegation.

Connally said we must stop looking toward government to solve problems. It is only creating more central power of government. Politicians should not decide prices, car size or anything else, but rather it should be decided by a free market.

The third highlight of the convention, for me, was when the presidency of the national organization was turned over to my good friend, Harold Hudson, publisher of the Perryton Herald.

Harold and I have been friends more than 20 years, and it is not only gratifying to see him achieve such high recognition, but he brings the focus of the nation to our state through his leadership.

Final two minutes fatal; Mineral Wells edges Hawks

A nip-and-tuck contest that seemed to be shifting favorably toward the Hawks took a sharp, ill-fated turn during the fading minutes here Friday night as the Hawks choked down a 28-12 loop loss to Mineral Wells.

Only on the scoreboard did the Hawks appear dominated, bouncing back in the second and third quarters to overcome the biggest chunk of a 14-point deficit built by the Rams early in the game.

It was two interceptions in the final 1 1/2 minutes that proved fatal to Coach Pat Tone's birds, who dropped to 0-8 on the season as they fought unsuccessfully to crawl out of the District 4-AAA cellar.

Good fortune came to the Hawks at the outset when Terry Daniels, who went both ways as quarterback and defensive back, surfaced with a Ram fumble on the second play of the night.

The Hawks were unable to sustain a drive and were forced to punt.

Ten plays later with half the first quarter remaining the Rams staged a 73-yard drive that ended on a 20-yard TD toss from Odes Mitchell to Melvin Ray.

Ray booted the PAT and the Rams pulled out ahead 7-0 with 5:49 showing in the first stanza.

Punters for both teams were busy the remainder of

the quarter as stingy defensive units forced fourth-and-long situations.

Mineral Wells was mounting another offensive march when the scene switched to the other end of the field for beginning of the second quarter.

A 15-yard yellow flag on the Hawks kept the Rams alive, and they capped the drive with a 24-yard touchdown romp by Darryl Butler. Ray split the uprights and Rams had 14 unanswered points in their pocket.

A flag against Iowa Park during Butler's touchdown run allowed the Rams to kickoff from their 45, but Daniels brought it out to the Hawk 20.

On the running of Troy Thompson the Hawks garnered their initial first down of the night, and the skimpy hometown crowd found reason to cheer. A backfield miscue and fumble ended the drive, however.

Several minutes later the Hawks found themselves on the receiving end of a Ram fumble hauled in by Randy Gibson.

Gibson's fumble recovery marked a turning point in Iowa Park's game as the Hawks began their attack from Mineral Wells' 43.

Tone decided to try some razzle dazzle first rattle out of the box. A little shuffle pass from Daniels to Gary

Blackerby picked up 18 yards and a quick first down for the Hawks.

Iowa Park fans exploded in protest two plays later when officials ruled incomplete a pass from Daniels to Keith Hillard, who scooped up the pigskin in the end zone. Another Daniels pass skipped off the fingertips of Richard Dietrichson in the end zone.

The Rams soon got another dose of razzle dazzle as Blackerby kept the drive alive with a 17-yard gain on a carbon copy of the shuffle pass from Daniels. The Hawks were three yards from paydirt.

Kip Fuller brought it two yards closer to home, and turned around to take the call again and punched it in from one yard out.

Tone decided to gamble for two extra points, but the effort was unfruitful.

An encouraged Hawk team emerged from the dressing room after the half and appeared to be on the road to recovery when Daniels completed his third pass of the night for five yards to Eddie Cannedy. But two plays later a Ram secondary man hauled in a stray Hawk aerial.

It didn't take long for the Rams to return the favor, coughing up the ball which was recovered by Jeff Nolen.

From their own 30, the

Hawks began their second touchdown march of the night.

And a march it was with Thompson and Fuller providing most of the yardage and single carries registered by Blackerby and Daniels.

The Hawk offensive line was working like a "highway contractor, leveling Rams and paving the way.

Credits for the up-front trench work went to Sonny Cook, Barney Scott, Gregg Wallace, Billy Ray and Tommy Ross.

From 10 yards out Daniels pitched to Thompson, who took it on home with 2:54 left in the third quarter.

Again the Hawks tried for the extra points - points that would have tied the contest - but Fuller was stopped short of his mark.

Iowa Park's defense began showing its stuff as the fourth quarter rolled around. The attack was led by folks like Pat Cooke, Ray Willingham, Scott, Gibson, Sid Waldrop and Ray.

With less than half the final stanza remaining, Hawk fans again were brought to their feet when Hillard and Nolen double teamed a Ram receiver to quash an aerial in the end zone.

Moments later Waldrop forced the Rams to cough up the ball and it appeared Willingham had recovered

the fumble. But that's not the way the officials ruled it, and the Hawk stands came apart at the seams.

A play later Waldrop got his revenge when he KOed a reckless Ram lineman who jumped offside.

With the time bomb on the scoreboard ticking, the Hawks finally regained possession with 4:10 left in the game.

When Thompson broke loose for a 22-yard gain the Hawks appeared to be headed for their first victory of the year. Fuller picked up nine and Thompson garnered another four for what seemed to be a life-saving first down.

The Hawks decided to go into the air on the first-and-ten situation, but Daniels' toss was intercepted.

With the largest chunk of it coming on a 31-yard pass, the Rams took it 50 yards to paydirt with 1:34 remaining in the game.

An onside kick by the Rams gave the Hawks possession at mid-field with half a minute remaining.

On a pass play from Daniels to Dietrichson, the

Rams were penalized 15-yards.

Another first down for the Hawks.

Six seconds left.

There was no way to win, but an effort to trim the defeat.

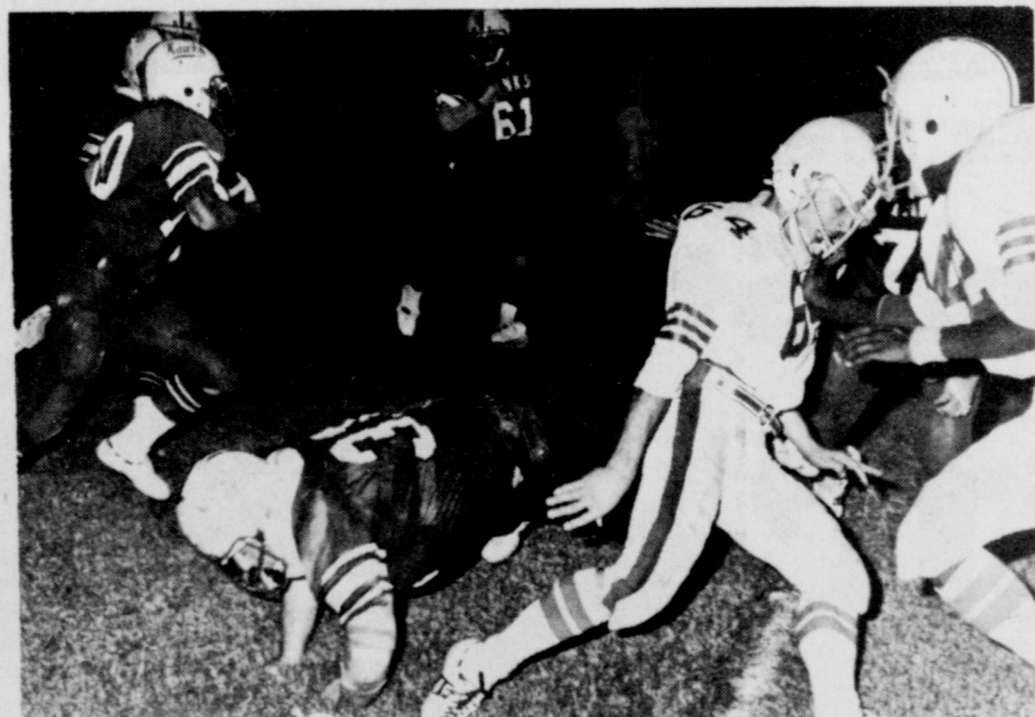
Daniels dropped back to pass, sent the ball to a spot toward the hometown sideline.

Ram John Vaughn zeroed in on the stray aerial and raced 65 yards to paydirt, and the successful PAT gave Mineral Wells the 28-12 victory.

Thompson paced the Hawk offense and broke the century mark with 107 ground yards on 26 carries. He averaged 4.1 yards per carry.

Fuller carried 18 times for 55 yards and averaged three yards per carry.

Former mayor involved in shooting incident

A Halloween weekend incident involving six Holiday youths and the city's former mayor wound up in Archer County Courthouse where a complaint was filed Monday against the Rev. Leo Chappell.

The complaint was filed by Roy McAlister, father of one of the boys involved, according to Archer County Judge Bill Holder.

The complaint was filed with Archer County Atty. Paul Wylie, who said Chappell voluntarily appeared at the courthouse Monday.

Both officials said Chappell was not arrested.

Accompanied by his attorney, Bob Russell of Archer City, Chappell appeared before Holder. The judge said Chappell entered a "not guilty" plea in the case.

Holder said Chappell was released after posting a \$500 bond on the misdemeanor charge of disorderly conduct.

The alleged incident reportedly occurred around 11 p.m. Saturday near Chappell's home on north

Bois D'Arc.

According to parents of three of the boys involved, the youths had parked their pickup truck in an alley near Chappell's residence.

When they returned to their vehicle, Chappell allegedly confronted them armed with a small caliber revolver, forcing the youths to place their hands in the air, according to Dr. Joe Wells and Mrs. Royce Coats, parents of three of the boys involved.

Chappell allegedly aimed the pistol at one of the youths sitting in the pickup truck and later fired shots into the ground near a second youth.

No one was injured in the incident, according to reports.

PUBLIC NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF TRASH AND GARBAGE, DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Holiday, Texas.

I. DEFINITION

1.01. The term "premises" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theaters, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist residences, vacant lots, and other places within the city limits of the City of Holiday, Texas, where refuse, either garbage or rubbish, accumulates.

1.02. The term "standard users" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean any standard single family unit residence in and of the City of Holiday, Texas.

1.03. The term "business and commercial users" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean any premises which conducts a standard business or commercial activity in and of the City of Holiday, Texas.

1.04. The term "industrial users" as used in this Ordinance shall be taken to mean any premises which is actively engaged in the business of manufacturing, processing or otherwise constructing goods or materials or any form of mineral development in and of the City of Holiday, Texas.

1.05. The term "refuse" shall be interpreted to mean all waste, including garbage and rubbish.

1.06. The term "garbage" as used in this Ordinance shall mean any putrescible waste, except sewage and body waste, including all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, and carcasses of small dead animals and dead fowls from any premises within the city limits.

1.07. The term "rubbish" as used in this Ordinance shall mean tin cans, bottles, papers, tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 3 feet), etc., from any premises within the city limits.

1.08. "City Health Officer" as used herein shall mean the City Health Officer of the City of Holiday, Texas, or his authorized agent.

II. DUTY OF ALL USERS

2.01. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, any place where garbage or rubbish accumulates, to provide, and, at all times, to maintain in good order and repair on any said premises, a portable container or

containers, for refuse, which shall be made of any material not easily corrodible, rodent and fly proof, with a tight-fitting lid which shall not be removed except when depositing or removing the contents of the receptacle, and with handles on the sides, and of sufficient capacity and in sufficient numbers to accommodate and securely keep all the garbage and rubbish that may accumulate between collections; provided, that each such container shall have a capacity of not less than 20 gallons nor more than 30 gallons. Provided further, that there shall be no instance be a total capacity of more than 120 gallons on any one premises. Provided further, all containers shall be kept clean and free from accumulation of any substance remaining attached to inside of container which would attract or breed flies, mosquitos or any other insect. No filled container shall exceed 100 pounds in weight.

2.02. It shall be the duty of all users to place the daily accumulations of garbage and rubbish in the container or containers as required above, and it shall be the duty of every user placing garbage in any such containers to eliminate as far as possible all water and liquid from such garbage and to securely wrap garbage in paper before placing same in such container. Provided further that all containers shall firmly fixed in a stationary position with tops thereto firmly fixed to each container so as not to allow the contents of said containers to be turned over and spilled upon the ground.

2.03. All ordinary accumulations of rubbish, such as tree limbs, paper boxes, and scrap lumber which cannot conveniently be placed in the containers required under this Ordinance shall be gathered together and tied, or staked in compact bundles and placed in a location easily accessible for the collector. Such collection will require an assessed fee over and above the normal tax for garbage collection service. A reasonable amount of material, such as scrap lumber and fire wood, may be stored on the premises but it shall be raked and stacked 10 inches above the ground.

2.04. The City of Holiday, Texas, shall collect from the standard users of the City not less than once weekly and from the business and commercial users and the industrial users of the City on a regular basis as contracted by each individu-

al user, all garbage and rubbish; provided it shall be the duty of any person in possession or control of any premises to place the containers as required above, in a location easily accessible for the collector as directed by the City Health Officer. Provided further that all collections, unless exception be granted by the City Health Officer, shall be in the alley immediately behind each and every user.

III. Exclusions to Garbage Service

3.01. The places of excessive accumulations of garbage and rubbish, such as killing and dressing plants, for fowl, may be excluded from the service provided by the City Garbage Department and such accumulations shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge, provided, that the owner or persons having such accumulations in charge shall secure from the City Health Department a written permit for removal and disposal of same. Said permit shall be issued only after a said Health Officer has satisfied himself that the licensee is capable of complying with the requirements of this Ordinance. The permit may be revoked by the City Health Officer when deemed necessary to the public welfare.

3.02. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses, and mules, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or persons having same in charge and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

3.03. Heavy accumulations, such as brush, broken concrete, ashes, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy materials, shall be disposed of at the expense of the owner or person controlling same under the directions of the City Health Officer.

3.04. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts, and other animal or fowl pens, and waste oils from garages or filling stations, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the person controlling same in the manner by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

IV. Prohibitions

4.01. The placing of garbage or rubbish or any refuse material in any street or alley within the city limits or the disposal of such refuse at any place within the city limits, except as previously directed by this Ordinance or except at the City Disposal Ground, or at such other places as may be

directed by the City Health Officer, is prohibited.

4.02. The meddling with refuse containers or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junking in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

4.03. The burning of any garbage, rubbish or any kind of junk within the city limits is prohibited except as provided for in this Ordinance.

V. Cost of Service

5.01. There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each residential premises within the city limits a monthly amount for each standard user. The business and commercial user will be taxed and so charged an amount equal to the standard user multiplied times the proportionate excess over and above the standard user. The industrial user shall contract directly with the City for the garbage collection service.

5.02. The City Council shall, from time to time, establish the standard users' rate and so declare such rate by resolution. Said resolution to be made a part of this Ordinance and, for all intents and purposes, be declared one and the same.

VI. Violation

6.01. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum of not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each day that any such person shall violate any other provision of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and be punishable as such.

VII. Enacting Clauses

7.01. This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other sanitary ordinances or regulations of the City of Holiday, Texas, unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in such case the terms of this Ordinance shall prevail.

7.02. That if any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be effected thereby.

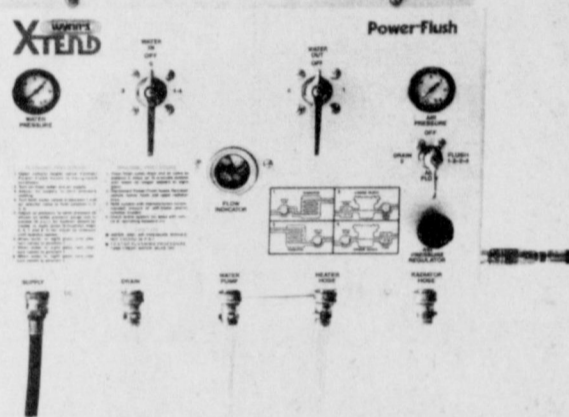

Dame and Ennis.

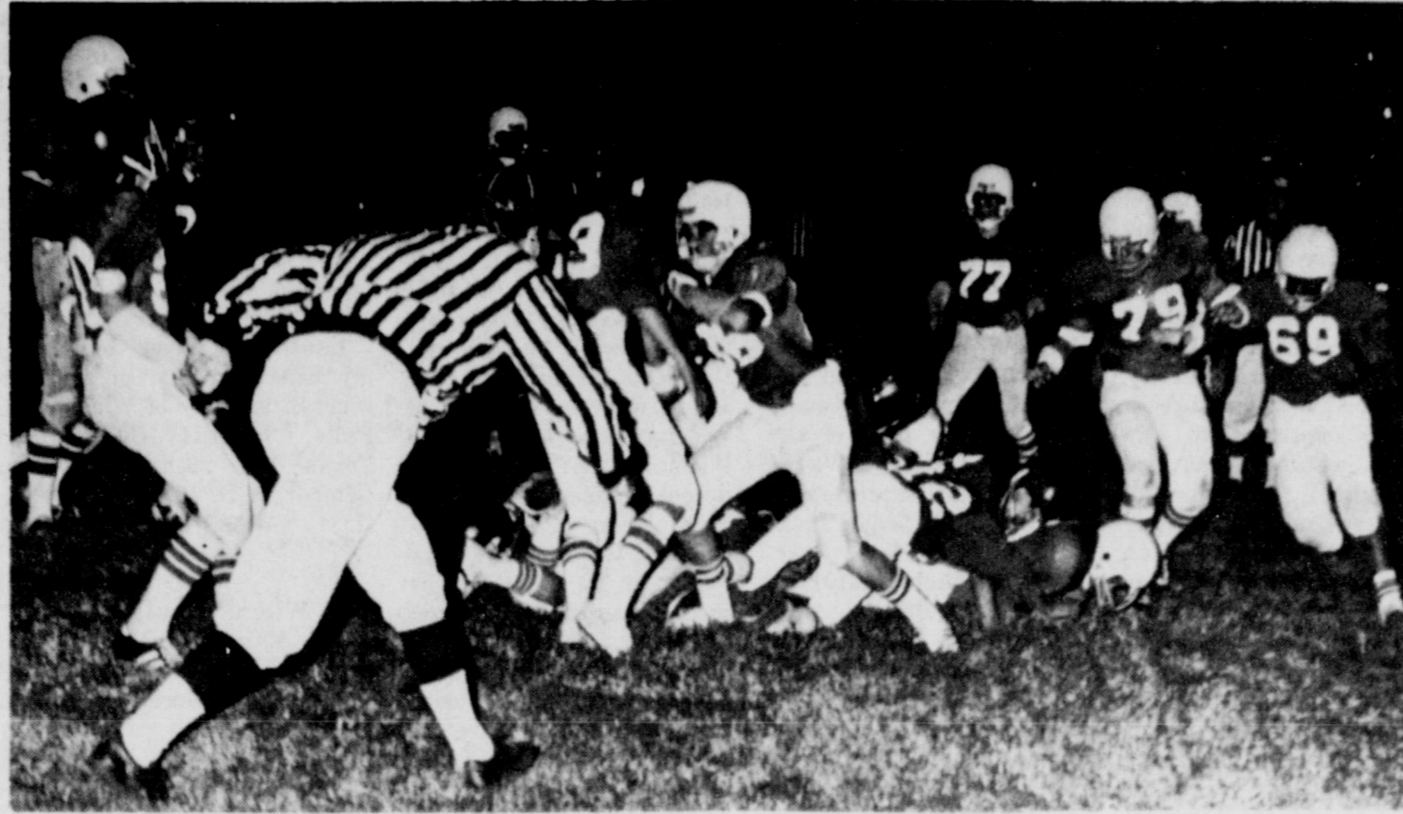
Four new teams are listed on the girls' schedule for this year. They are Azle, Byers, Henrietta, and Brownwood,

"Duck populations are down only slightly despite a severe drought in the nesting grounds.

"Goose hunting should be good. A successful hatch has been reported and enough grain is up in the North Texas and Panhandle areas to provide good hunting."

Duck season starts Nov. 1 and goes through Jan. 22, 1978 in the High Plains Mallard Management Unit (east of a line running from Del Rio, north to Vernon). In eastern two-thirds of the
