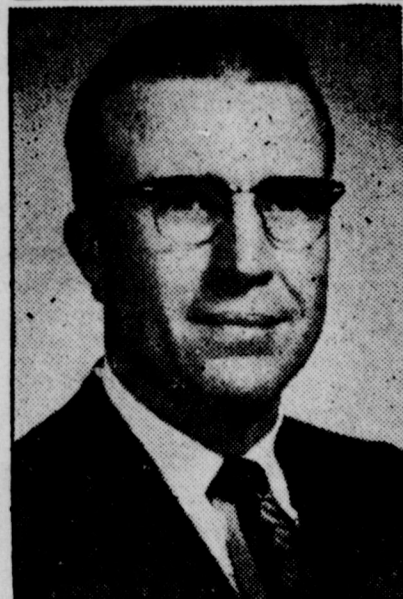

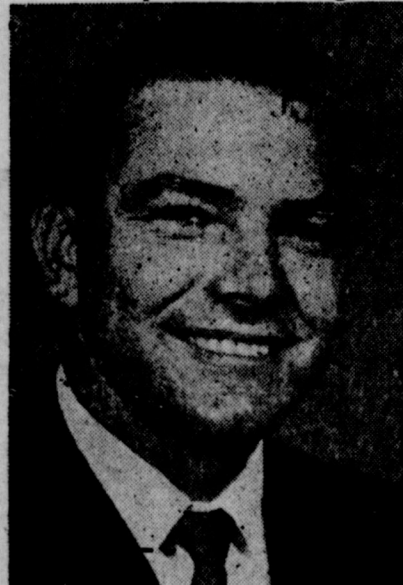

Prospects Are Good for Industrial Growth, Rubber Firm Interested

As many of you already know, we have on various occasions tried to work with companies looking for industrial plant locations. We have been working with one company for five months and at considerable expense, that will employ approximately 150 local persons.

They eliminated Iowa Park as a prospect two to three weeks ago since our water and sewerage capabilities are below the minimums required by insurance companies to supply overhead sprinkler systems.

This inadequate condition as relates to water supply, volume and sewerage capability would raise this company's insurance premium approximately \$25,000 a year. In addition thereto, "Out of Business Insurance" which is a necessity today in case a factory should burn out, could not be purchased at reasonable rates, if at all because of our inadequate water situation.

Because of our election being so near, this company has decided to reconsider Iowa Park as a possible plant site location. As a matter of fact we are presently one of two towns for final consideration. Their engineers were survey-

ing our site on August 29 and 30, and have since core drilled the property to ascertain if it is suitable for their building requirements. This survey and core work was done at a cost of several thousand dollars, so they are definitely interested in Our Town.

If our water and sewerage problems are not corrected in this election, we are automatically eliminated as far as this plant is concerned since they could not afford to even consider building a plant in Iowa Park.

We periodically drive these prospects all over the city since they always insist on seeing the entire town. Our schools and our churches are some of the very best to be found anywhere. Our streets through and to the critical aspects of a town which are analyzed for plant locations are not in the best of condition when you look at them through an outsider's eyes.

Please get behind this election to help make Iowa Park a better town. Help us sell industry on the town to create new jobs and business for the future.

Purcell Visits with Friends

Representative Graham Purcell was honored guest at the coffee in O. N. Norman home last Thursday afternoon with members of Democratic Women's organization as assistant hostesses.

Following background facts presented by Purcell, listeners posed questions for discussion. Three areas in present-day living were touched upon.

Of special interest is the housing situation. When asked about Section 235, Purcell made note of the fact that housing is being constructed and financed under the law which provides much needed housing in this area which would not otherwise be furnished because of the present tight money market.

Purcell noted that certain inequities exist in provisions of Sec. 235, but he believes it provides funds here not available from other sources.

The congressman feels sure a program for agriculture will be worked out soon.

Purcell said law enforcement must come from the local level. He does not want a federal police force. He pointed out that we are obliged to enforce a law if it is good, or change it if it is bad.

A congenial atmosphere prevailed as guests enjoyed refreshments served by Mmes Newman, Cleo Nipper, D. O. James.

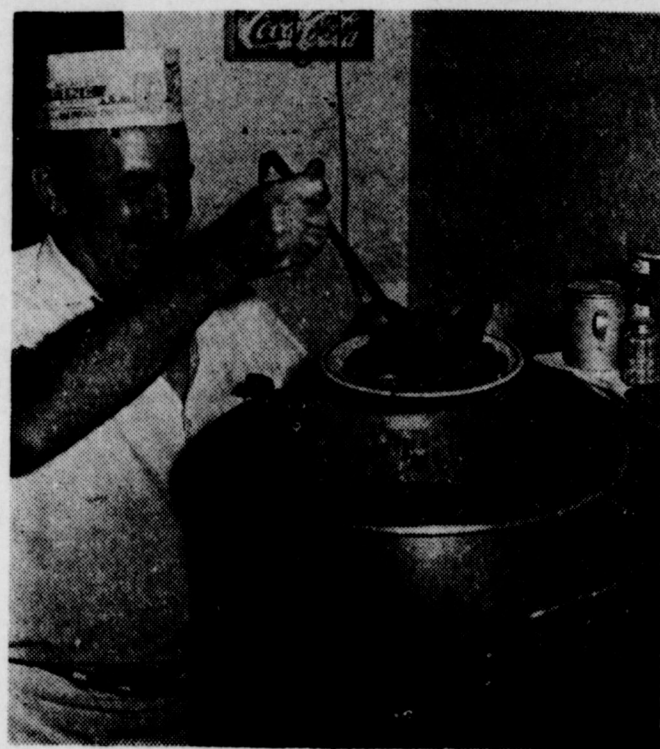

Not for Drinking

City water workers are pumping water from the ditch into the City Lake to replenish the supply for recreational purposes and to be prepared in case a special need should arise.

Do not get the mistaken idea that such an operation might affect the hardness of your water. None of that supply is being put into consumer lines.

Two factors have likely contributed to hardness of the water this summer: Evaporation is the first, because that makes the water volume decrease and leaves the mineral content behind, intensifying the residue; and second, there has been no rainfall to increase the fresh water volume.

Absentee Voting

Iowa Park residents who are registered voters here can vote absentee now in the Sept. 12 City election.

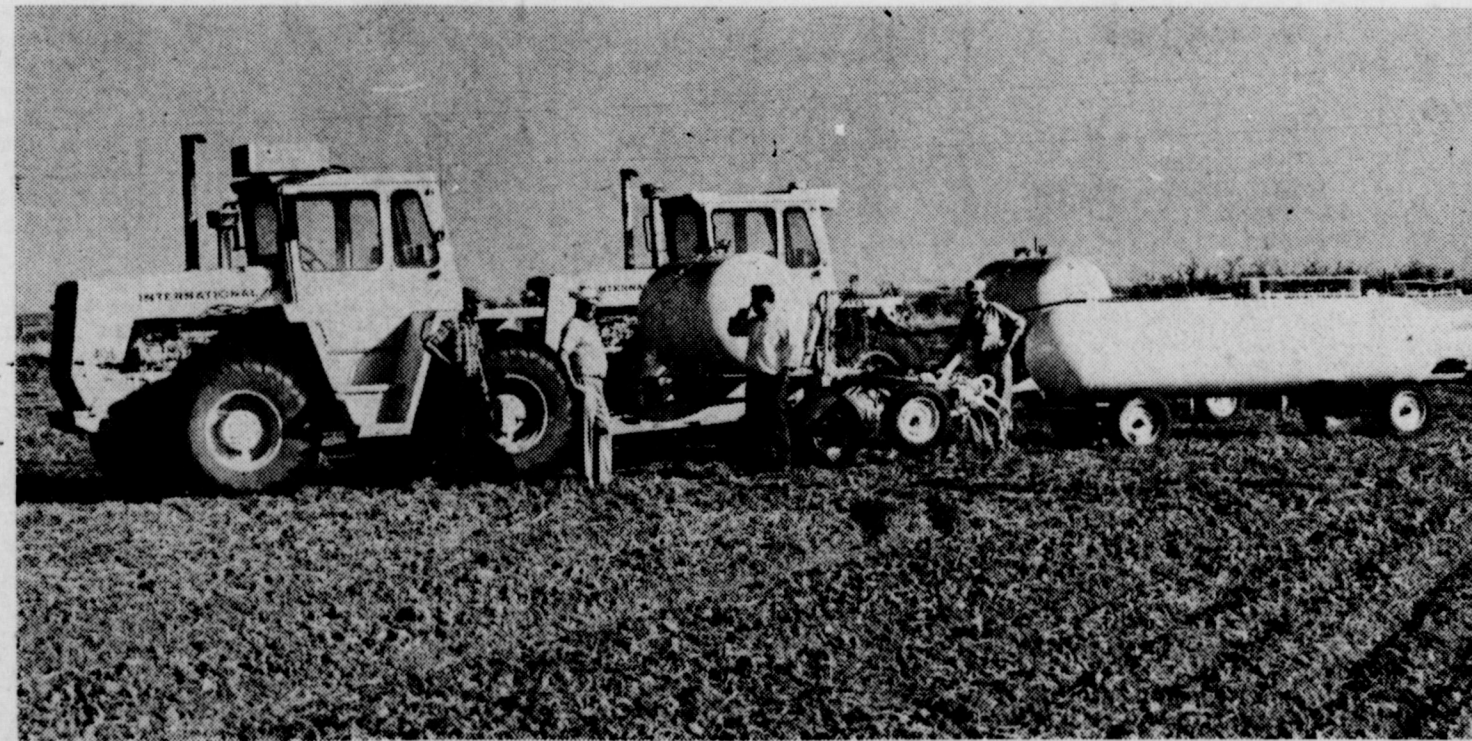

Mrs. Weiler Tells of Trip to Isles

Mrs. Chauncey Weiler left the first week in July to visit with her son Bill and family in their summer home in England. Bill is employed with Core Laboratories of Dallas and lives in Bahrain just off the coast of Arabia, but his family goes to England when school is out in the spring.

Accompanying Mrs. Weiler was her sister Miss Earle Henry of Dallas. Both have been teachers and can enjoy and appreciate to the fullest all the literary and historical sites of the British Isles.

Following are quotes from letters received by friends which indicate this appreciation and pleasure they experienced as they went sight-seeing in England and Scotland.

The first communication describes the trip's beginning: "We are having a wonderful crossing of the Atlantic on the Queen Elizabeth 2. The sea is so calm and the ship so steady that we do not feel we are moving until we look out a porthole or go on deck. Even then it looks as if the water is rapidly flowing past us, and we are standing still."

"We are enjoying every part of the boat. It is just like living in a city because everything one needs is here. There is a library of several thousand books, and I have checked out one to read in my spare time. There are all sorts of specialty shops on board, where we are not going to buy anything. I have an appointment to get my hair done next Tuesday because we land on Wednesday."

"Our cabin containing twin beds is almost as large as the hotel rooms we occupied in Dallas and New York. It is nicely furnished, has a good bathroom with plenty of hot water, two closets, so there is plenty of room for our clothes."

"There are 1900 people on board and every cabin and stateroom is taken. The food is good and of great variety, but they really serve too much of everything. I am simply going to have to quit eating so much or I'll not be able to get into my clothes!"

"We went to the movie this afternoon (still on the boat) and saw 'Oliver.' It was excellent, and I am glad I had the opportunity of seeing it since I did not see it when it was in Wichita Falls. Of course we are participating in the dancing, but sometimes we watch the dancers."

In London, July 17, Mrs. Weiler continues: "We visited the Old Curiosity Shop today. . . it was immortalized by Charles Dickens in his writings. This is a marvelous city to visit, as it is full of places you have heard about always, in both literature and history."

"Yesterday we took a morning tour through the West End of London; and in the afternoon took the tour of the Old City, which included a visit to St. Paul's, Westminster Abbey and Tower of London. In nearly every block there is something significant. And all of this is mixed in with the new, because there are many new buildings going up in London, many of them being erected for American firms."

July 18 she wrote: "Today we had a wonderful trip to Windsor Castle. On the way we stopped at Stoke Poges and visited the church and the churchyard where Thomas Gray is buried. He is the one who wrote 'The Elegy in a Country Churchyard.'"

"This little parish church where William Penn and his family also attended services was most interesting, as well as the ancient tombstones in the yard. There are some modern stones too, because any member of the parish can be buried there, but no one else."

"At Windsor Castle we got to see St. George's Chapel in which Knights of the Garter have their stalls and banners, and hold their annual meeting when new members are admitted, although the number is limited to 52."

"Another pleasurable thing was the ride for over an hour on the upper reaches of the Thames from Maidenhead down to Windsor in a sight-seeing boat. The weather was perfect and the countryside was green and peaceful. We passed through two locks as we traveled downstream. It was truly a memorable day because we also visited Hampton Court and Runnymede."

July 22, from Edinburgh, Scotland, she wrote: "We toured St. Giles Cathedral this morning. It is the finest Presbyterian church Scotland (or anywhere, I suppose) and I thought of you (the Cecil Holloways). All of our tours have been wonderful so far. We have rained every day, but it comes in showers followed by sunshine, and it has not kept us from seeing a thing."

July 23 she wrote: "We drove north by bus from Edinburgh today and spent the day among the

Trossachs (mountains) which have jewels of lakes in their valleys. We had long drives via sight-seeing boats on Loch Katrine and Loch Lomond. The scenery is fabulous."

Mrs. Weiler returned home last week and these interesting observations have been gleaned from notes she made of her two months vacation in the British Isles.

In London she lived in Crosby Hall, an international house for university women. "Here I got my first introduction to the many nationalities living, working or studying in London."

An 11-day tour through the Midlands to Edinburgh was revealing: "One cannot but be impressed by the neatness and the cleanliness and the greenness of the English countryside. I did not see a barbed-wire fence in all my travels. The fields are separated by neat green hedgerows. In Scotland the fields are marked by stone fences. We had the privilege of walking on a portion of Hadrian's Wall, the great fortified wall which the Romans built when they occupied England to protect themselves from forays by the warring Scots."

At Stratford-on-Avon they visited every historic spot connected with Shakespeare and attended one of his plays "Two Gentlemen from Verona" in the Royal Shakespeare Theater.

Visits to Cambridge and Oxford universities, with their magnificent quadrangles of buildings, evoked this thought: "When I think of my alma mater SMU, who is proud to be 50 years old. I am overawed by these ancient colleges, some of which are over 700 years old."

Ruth and Earle were in Bill's home in Somerset for two weeks. It is situated in the Quantock Hills and the view is most charming, with alternating hills and valleys devoted to farming and sheep raising.

Here they took automobile trips. One was a visit to the Lorna Doone country where they saw the moors and gathered heather. Another was to Plymouth where they were celebrating the 350th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower, and viewed the steps down which the Pilgrims trod to

board the now famous ship.

A seven-day tour of Ireland began and ended in Dublin, which is the capital of the Republic and is the largest city in Ireland. They drove to Wexford that ancestors of Pres John F. Kennedy lived. Also in Ireland they viewed the Blarney Castle, at one time a fortified structure with walls ten feet thick, but now famous only for its Blarney Stone. In a jaunting car they traveled to Killarney, really the prettiest spot in Ireland, and on to Galway, situated on lovely Galway Bay.

They flew home from London over the Hebrides, Greenland, to Chicago in a giant Boeing 747, taking an American Airlines plane from there to Dallas.

Mrs. Weiler described the trip over Greenland as the most awe-some of any ever experienced by her: "The clouds parted and we could see the peaks with snow and ice-bound, from height of 31,000 feet . . . giving me a sensation of looking down from Heaven upon God's creation."

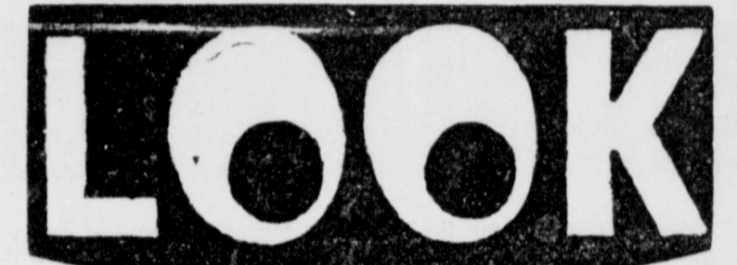

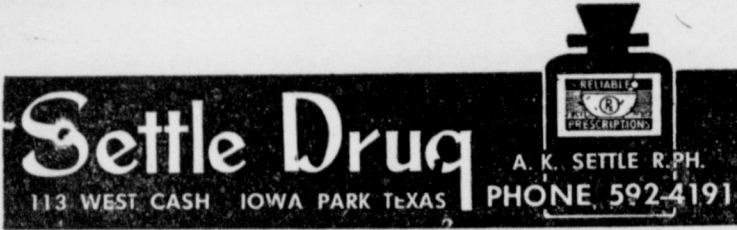

Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than three (3) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the respective Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge of his polling place shall be one of the clerks.

In election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Absentee voting shall be conducted by the City Secretary's office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of V.A.T.S. Election Code, Chapter 5.

All resident qualified electors of the City, including those who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

Section 5. That a substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted in the election precincts and in each of the City Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in said City, published therein, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

Be Sure to Vote in Bond Election

 Sept. 12 is City Election Day and it could be possibly the biggest election day in the history of Iowa Park.

Voters will go to the polls with a six-point program of progress on the ballot. Water, sewer, streets, City Hall, Swimming Pool and Library are the items up for the voters' consideration. A qualified voter can support all of these proposals or any one of them.

All of the items are listed separately on the ballot to afford the voter his selection of these items. Several of the items are of valid need to the City and its growing tendencies.

Important to be decided is the water treatment and storage and distribution capabilities. The Industrial Development Corporation committee has done considerable work and spent several dollars limelighting Our Town to several out-of-town businesses for the purpose of getting them located here.

One of those companies is Bandag, a large tire re-capping business. In 1969 they grossed over \$6,900,000. The IDC group has these people interested enough in Our Town they have sent a coring crew and equipment here to core the land and report its suitability.

Officers and directors of Bandag have expressed their desire to locate here. Everything suits their business needs except our water supply. If this water item on the ballot passes Sept. 12, we are in excellent position to land this factory in Our Town.

They plan to employ about 150 people at the start in a building that will cost about \$1,000,000 and will be equipped with \$1,300,000 worth of brand new machinery.

Expansion is planned for the new plant and equipment for building tires to FFA specifications and tires for heavy road building equipment is on order from the manufacturer.

A few of the things in favor of Our Town are our schools and churches, the Chamber of Commerce, availability of working people, nearness to railroad and the newly surfaced road that will lead to the plant.

The road to Little League ball park has been resurfaced and will be a valuable asset in the shipping done by Bandag which will amount to about 75,000 pounds daily coming in and 75,000 pounds daily going out.

Maupin Will Retire Here

Iowa Park can meet most of the water specification laid out by Bandag but must come up with some needed improvements to induce them to come here. Passage of the water section on the City ballot will give Our Town the money to provide these necessities.

Mrs. Birk at Convention

A feature on the program at the convention was a panel on music therapy made up of members of the Library of Congress division for the blind and physically handicapped. There was a demonstration on how a totally blind person had learned to play by both the Braille method and by the use of tapes. An objective of Mu Phi Epsilon is to provide the Library of Congress slow tapes for teaching the blind.

Aim of the sorority stresses musicianship and scholarship. The Sterling Staff Concert series gives auditions for members to go on tours hosted by local chapters, with proceeds going to the memorial fund of the organization.

A scholarship program is sponsored by the sorority to give a boost to musical career aspirants. The Wichita Falls chapters are participating. No scholarship is granted a student below the college level. Also, the student must be a music major.

An Open Letter

To Iowa Park Voters:

We have given serious study to the proposed bond issues being considered in the Sept. 12 election. Here are some of our conclusions:

Tax valuation of property in Iowa Park is \$5,347,000.

Six bond proposals add up to \$1,280,000. Interest will be approximately \$800,000.

The public has not been told the interest rate nor the retirement date of the bonds.

Approximate total cost of the bond issues will be \$2,080,000 or 41% of total valuation.

I doubt that all the members of the Council are as financially irresponsible as these figures imply. I am quite sure they would not handle their business so irresponsibly or spend money so recklessly for things they do not need and cannot afford.

Anticipated income for taxes is approximately \$75,000, which is just about enough to pay the first year's interest on the bonds. The principal would be \$64,000 per year for 20 years or \$51,180 per year for 25 years.

Total payment the first year would be \$140,800 under a 20-year program, \$127,980 under a 25-year program.

The salaries, utilities, supplies etc. plus either \$140,800 or \$127,980 must come from sewer and water revenues, sales taxes, fines, building permits and other incidental fees.

So let's do without the "Pie in the Sky" and just buy the essentials -- Water and Sewer Improvements. This will be a big load within itself . . . approximately \$80,000 the first year, with approximate total cost of \$1,600,000.
