Revealing secret pals by giving clues provided a humorous program. Some even had original poems and let others guess the identity. A gift exchange followed.

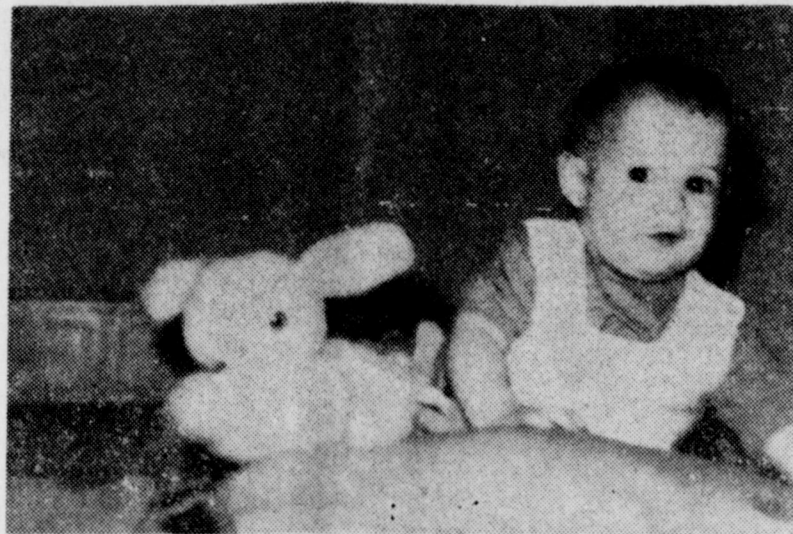
Names will be drawn for new pals at the next meeting.

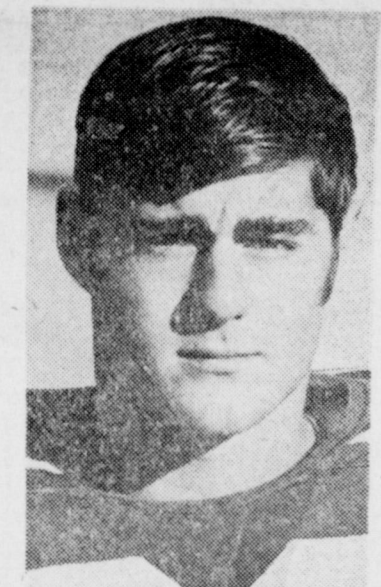
Churches in Wichita Falls, Electra, Burk Burnett, Holliday, and Temple and Tipton, Okla., were well represented.

Iowa Park and area voters turned out in only moderate numbers last Saturday.

The school trustee elections ran somewhat true to form with the three incumbents retained. Bob Wilcox topped the ticket for three-year trustee with 648 votes. Stanley Williamson had 540 votes for the other 3-year position.

In the 2-year race, C. E. Myers piled up 486 votes to hold the job to which he was appointed last year.

The City elections were entirely different. Voters replaced the two incumbents and put in their stead Bill Gilmore with 339 votes and Carl Davis with 259.

Arch Hughes and Frank Harlin were close behind, but both were defeated.

Urban Renewal went down again by an almost 2-to-1 negative vote. 243 for and 431 against.

"They are the result of careful, defensive driving. You have set a day-to-day driving example that all of us should try to follow."

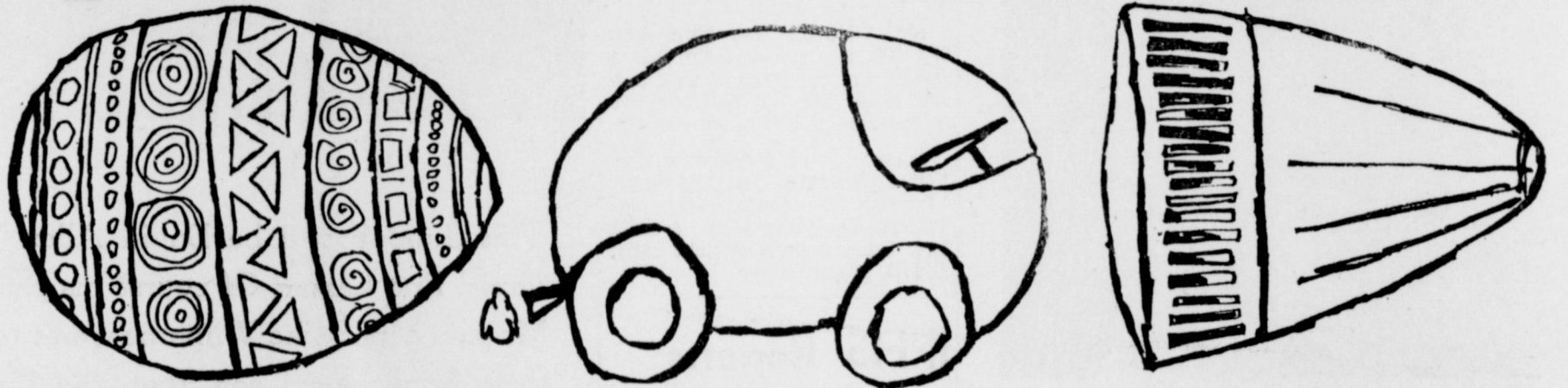
Chapman also gave the Iowa Park work unit an award for not having a preventable vehicle accident in the last 15 years.

The 3,000,000 acres in the Thicket in the 1680's are being whittled away at the rate of 50 acres a day by lumber companies and private enterprises. By 1920 much of this virgin wilderness had been reduced to stumps.

Concerted action is being made to preserve this unique wilderness for the whole nation, not just for Texas. This "classical bog" with its winding, sluggish waterways, is a nesting ground for America's water birds, and renowned for its profusion of flowers and rare plants.

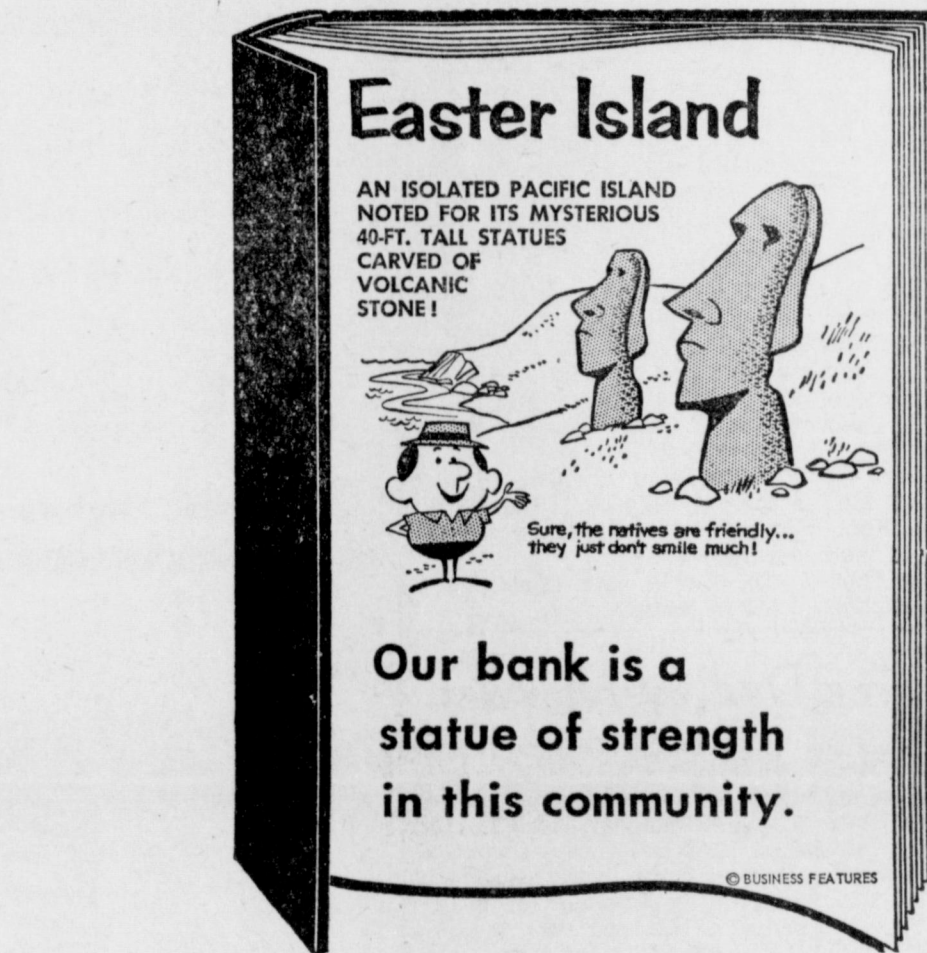

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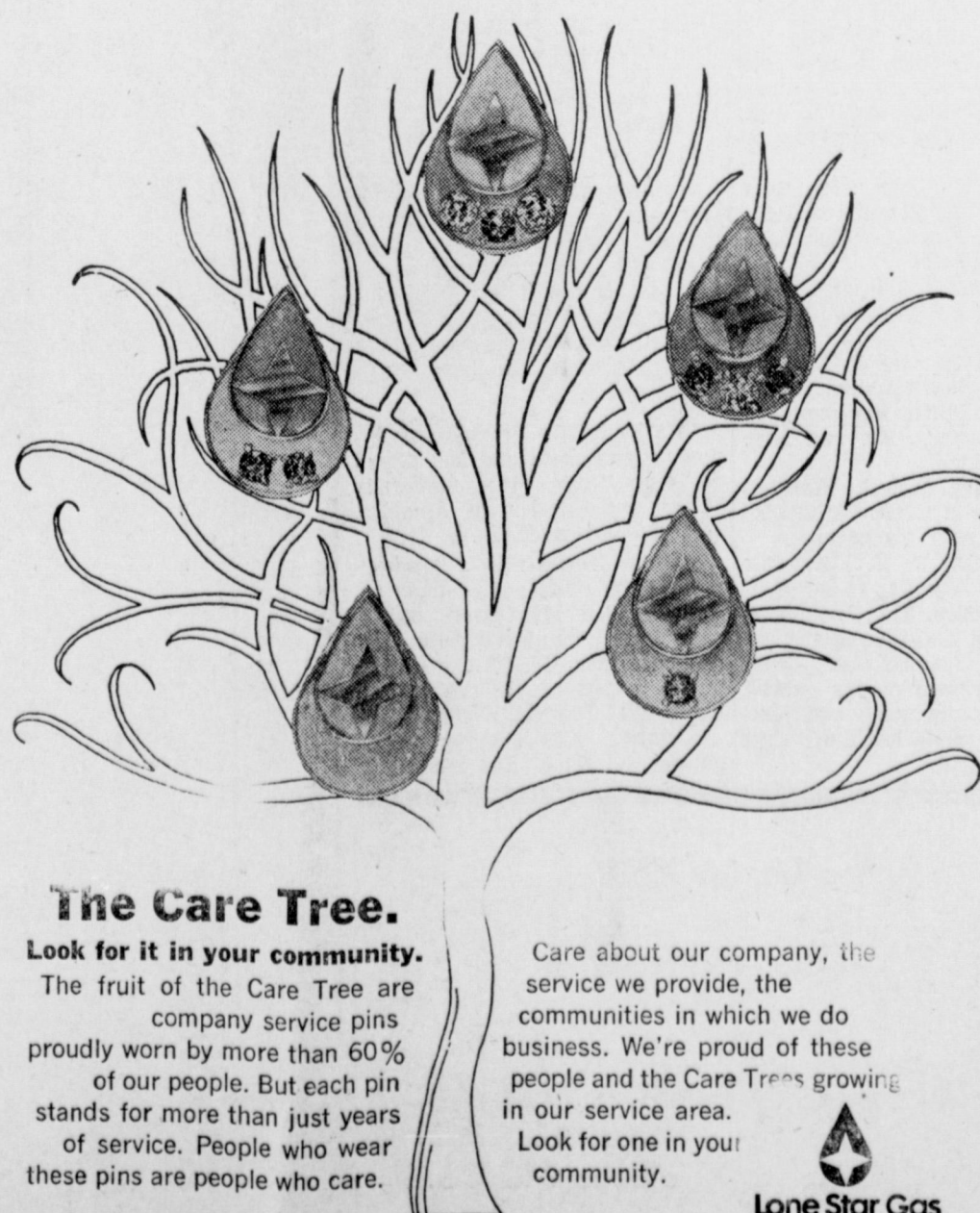
