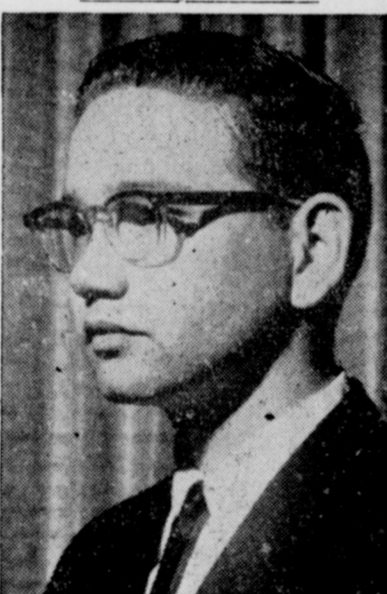

Farm Bureau

Leaders of Wichita County Farm Bureau resolved recently to set a new record for involvement of members in the organization's service-to-member program. Their goal was to enroll 50 new applicants for life insurance with the Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co. in one day.

The challenge was accepted by Carl Barnhill and Dennis Mitchell of Iowa Park, agency manager and special agent. They didn't quite reach their goal, but they did set a new record for participation by members of a county Farm Bureau in the organization's life insurance program. They enrolled 51 new applicants in 1 1/2 days—Thursday afternoon, May 20, and Friday, May 21.

This feat has never been accomplished before in the history of the twenty-five-year-old Farm Bureau Co. which serves twelve states.

Don Read of Graham is sales manager of Dist. 6 which includes Wichita county.

A celebration was held Friday, June 4, in Wichita Falls. It was attended by 44 persons including 25 of the applicants and some members of their families.

Special guests included Gene Badger of Jackson, Miss., vice-president for sales of Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co.; Justin Crowover of Waco, state sales director for TFB; Veal Smith of Waco, associate state sales director.

Badger commended Wichita county Farm Bureau for its accomplishment and said it is a good example of "local involvement" which is the fundamental basis of Farm Bureau. He said the purpose of Farm Bureau "is not to build big insurance companies, but to build companies that serve the members."

Farm Bureau Life company has paid over \$41,000,000 in dividends to its policy-holders during its 25-year history, which is \$7,000,000 more than the \$34,000,000 paid in death benefits, Badger added.

Crowover and Smith spoke briefly and praised the local men for their accomplishment. "If we

could get our members as solidly involved on state and national social and political issues, the organization would be stronger," Crowover commented.

Coincidentally, the "Files of the Times" column in the Wichita Falls Times for Tuesday evening, June 1, contained an item announcing that Wichita County Farm Bureau members "have gone over the top of their insurance quota by \$10,500. Subscriptions now stand at \$62,500."

This was in reference to the period of organization of the FB life insurance company when each county Farm Bureau was given a goal of charter life subscriptions. The item in the Times credited the announcement to Loys D. Barbour of Iowa Park, who was then District 3 director of Texas

Farm Bureau. Barbour was present at the Friday breakfast and reviewed the early history of the company. He said the organization of the company "would never have been possible without the participation of members." He said this kind of loyalty was demonstrated in the accomplishment by members of Wichita county Farm Bureau in enrolling a record number of applicants for life insurance.

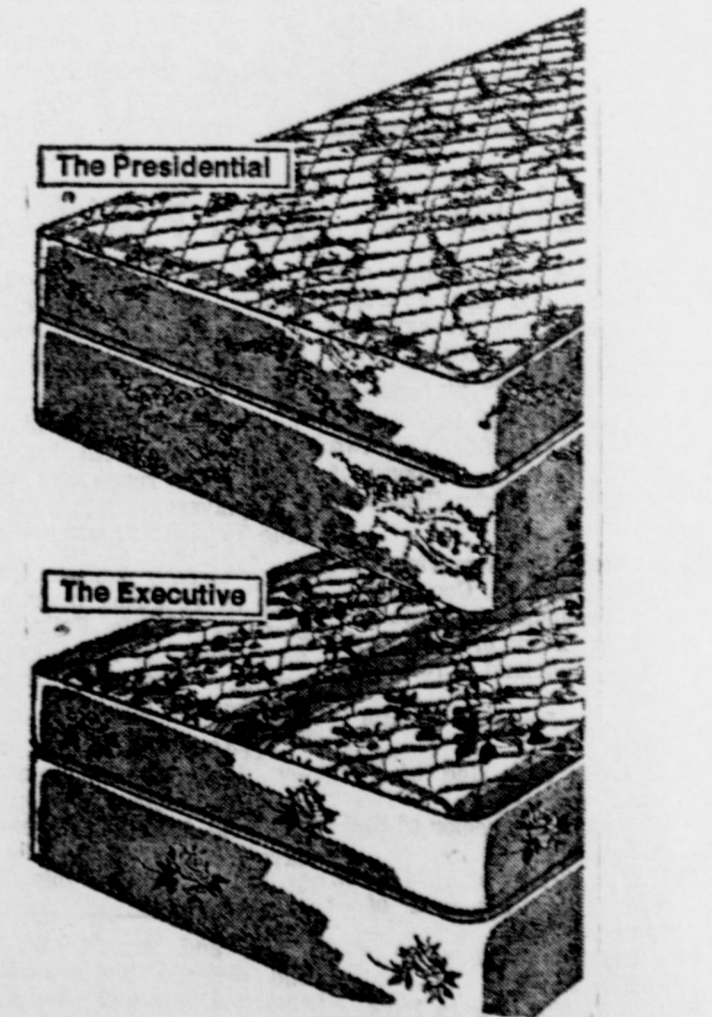

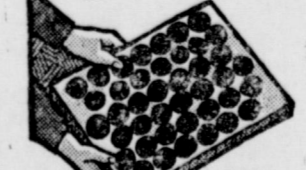

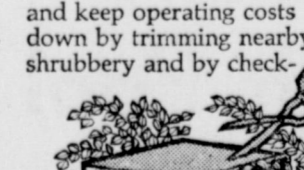
