## Many Present-Day Parkans Attended 1st School Here

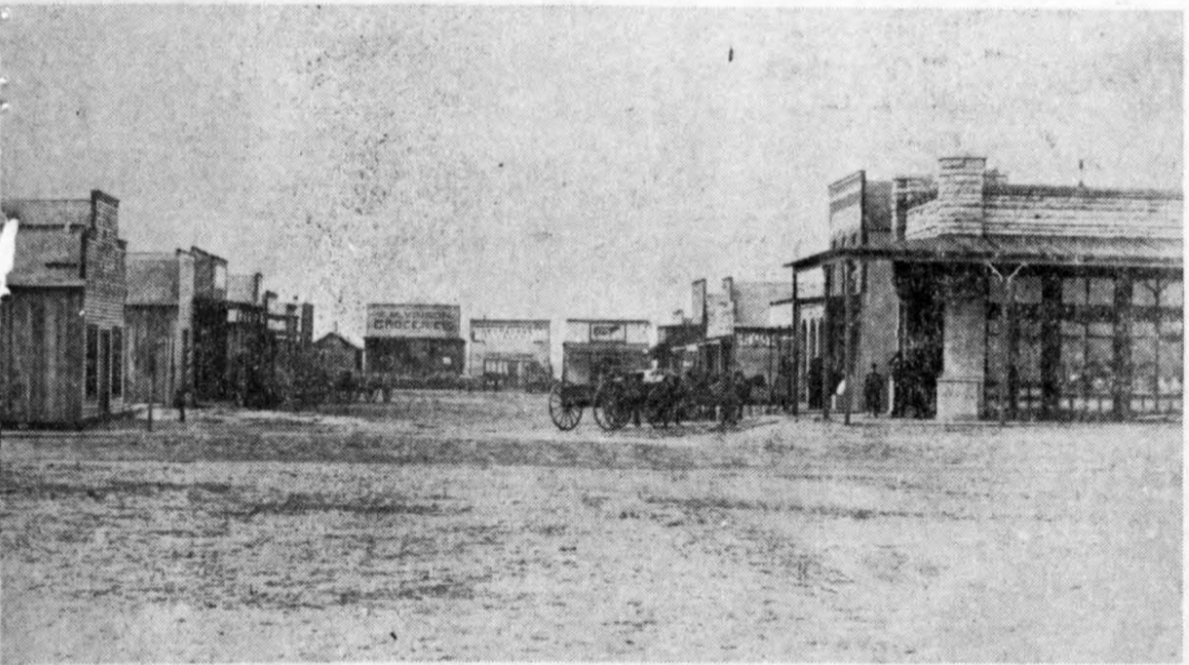
Some of the former early day students of Iowa Park schools who still live here, lined up recently for this picture, taken by Chauncey Weiler.

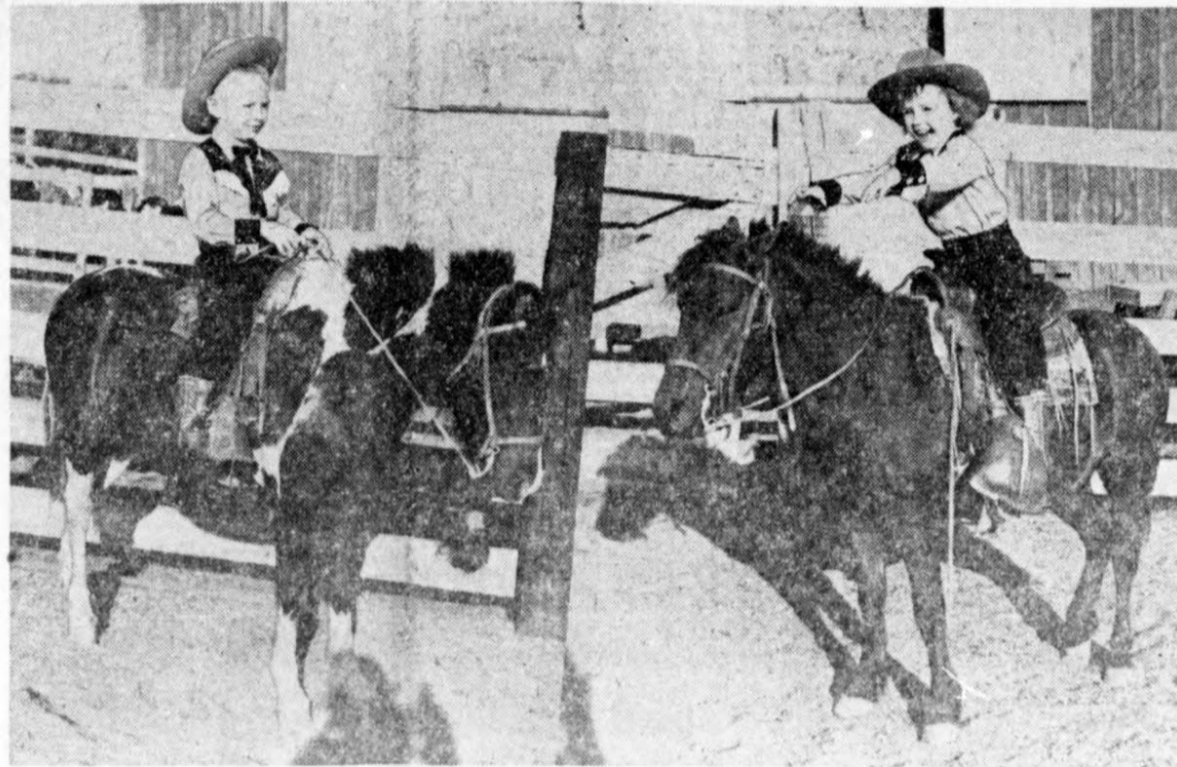


## Cash Street at the Turn of the Century

A picture of happy children and gentle ponies perfectly symbolizes the spirit of this year's Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Iowa Park, which is due to open Sunday with an All-Faiths Religious Service in the air-conditioned Fair Park Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Gordon G. Clark, president of the Fair association, and his competent staff of co-workers, have designed the whole week of entertainment for the benefit of the whole family, from the pre-school youngster to the oldest pioneer in the area. Shorty Sullivan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harrel Sullivan, and Ann Huckaby, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Huckaby jr., don't own horses, but they got a big kick out of visiting the Earl Lehman home south of town, where Mr. Lehman graciously furnished mounts for their outing. Dixon Boot company of Wichita Falls furnished the hats and boots, while the Saddle Shop on Sheppard Access road furnished the western wear worn by these youngsters. ## Fair Parade to Form at School Building

Another mammoth parade will be put on again this year to open the T-O Fair.

Entries will form at the high school at 5:30 p.m.

The Sheppard AFB colors and band will lead the parade down Cash street, up Yosemite to West Park, turn east to Wall, make a U-turn in front of the Christian church, and go west to the Fair Grounds.

Marching order of the parade is as follows:

(These bands will be judged on marching and awards will be made at the Fair Grounds later in the evening.)

## Free Programs Slated for Every Day Next Week in T-O Fair Auditorium

The 1954 Texas-Oklahoma Fair will present more free entertainment than any previous Fair.

Next Monday at 6:00 p.m. will be formed a large parade consisting of units of industrial, agriculture, livestock and automobiles, with the junior high school band contest in this area. The junior band contest will be the first one to be held here.

The auditorium will be the busiest part of the Fair. Starting Monday evening at 7:15, the opening ceremonies and a group of shows from all civic, schools and clubs of the Fair area, and continuing each day from 2:00 until 5:30 p.m. and from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m., including an organ interlude each day from 5:00 until 6:00 p.m.

Tuesday, Pioneers Day, registration will start at 8:00 a.m. A program and the crowning of the Pioneer Queen are set to begin at 10:00 a.m. in the auditorium. At noon there will be a free chuck wagon feed served by the Electra Chuck Wagon Gang, and more entertainment including the famous Billy Mitchell Square Dancers. All this will make Pioneer Day one to remember.

Wednesday gets started with the Hereford judging at 9:00 a.m. The Hereford show of the T-O Fair is rated by the American Hereford association as one of the Blue Ribbon shows of the nation.

Judging of the Junior Livestock Show will be another interesting spectacle. So many students have entered this competition that one half of it will be brought in the first three days of the Fair, and the remainder in the last three.

The American Quarter Horse show begins on Wednesday and continues through Saturday.

Women of the great Fair area take one of the biggest parts in production of the Fair. The Women's Exhibits building has thousands of exhibits each year, with chairmen and committee workers numbering in the hundreds.

The Women's Community exhibits are always outstanding, and again hundreds of women take a part along with the 4-H Girls exhibits, with many homemaking displays.

The auditorium program committee consisting mostly of women will see that programs are presented on time, and serve as hostesses to all those engaged in an auditorium program.

With many projects sponsored by civic, school and other organizations, the women play an important part in food and drink booths.

Officers and directors of the T-O Fair are fortunate to have the support of the women's organizations, civic and service clubs.

We all realize that the Fair must depend on people like this to make it a success each year!

## Bible Booth Is Fair Feature

Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance, with co-operation of several churches, the American Bible Society and the United Drays will sponsor the Bible booth again at T-O Fair.

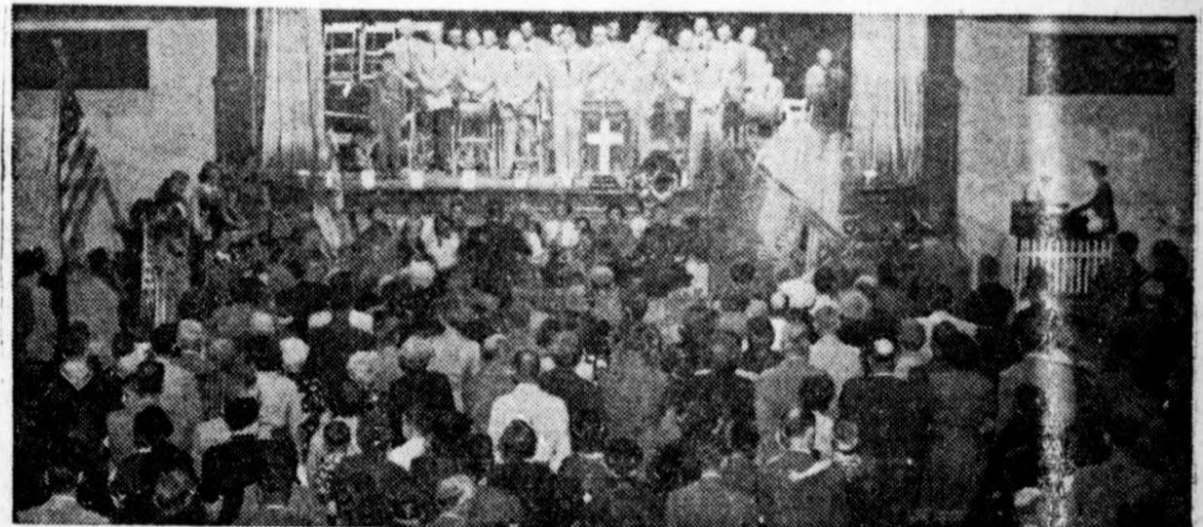
The booth will be in the section between the auditorium and the agricultural exhibits, which is the first door south of the main entrance to the auditorium.

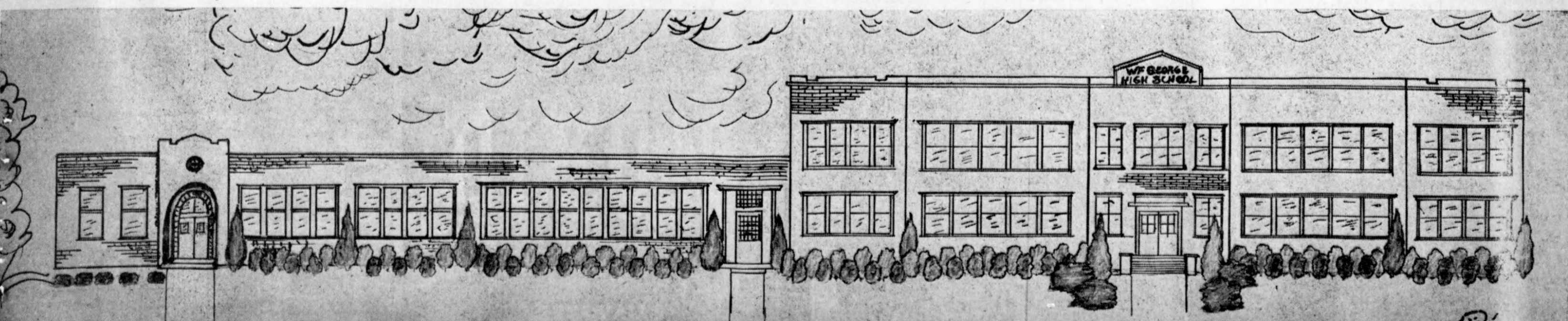
