Weatherford announced to the world in general and Iowa Park Hawk team and fans in particular that the Kangaroos had not come on the field last Friday night to have their pouches picked.

On the opening kickoff, Brooks Werthington gathered in the ball and struck out for paydirt. At the 40 he pitched out to Brad Stroud who raced the remaining 60 yards to TD territory.

Mike Wigginton kicked the PAT and the Hawks were trailing 0-7 before most of the fans had settled in their seats.

The Kangaroos completed dominated the game in the first half and lost chances to ice the game as they raced up and down the field against a porous Hawk defense. The host team stayed in Iowa Park territory most of the half but the Hawks rallied and contained them, finally giving up a 23-yard field goal by Mike Wigginton to make the score 10-0 Weatherford.

The Hawks mustered some offense just before the end of the half and drove deep into Weatherford territory before the clock showed halftime.

Coach Watkins must have boiled the Green a little during the intermission because the Hawks came out and received the kickoff and marched straight downfield for a TD. The scoring play was a beautiful pass from Greg Frazier to end Jackie Perkins that covered 15 yards. Hawks' passing play on the conversion was no good and they trailed 6-10.

The Hawks kicked off and the Kangaroos ran one play. Then they threw a pass which was picked off by Jerry Burghart. He ran 30 yards untouched for the go ahead points. Again Iowa Park failed to convert the two-point play and had only a 12-10 lead with over 16 minutes left to play.

The Hawks stymied the 'Roos most of the third quarter; and the Greer offense could not punch out much yardage against the Blue defense. In the late stages of the 4th stanza the Weatherford boys put on a good march following a Hawk punt. They started on their 20 and marched steadily downfield to inside the Hawk 10.

With 1:23 left the 'Roos were 3rd down and 4 yards to go. They rumbled the Hawk line and the Green held them to a short gain. On 4th down Weatherford again struck the line. The Hawks left no hole and held, taking over with a minute remaining.

Greg Frazier pulled the Hawks out of trouble some great effort, and by the time the game was finished the Hawks were knocking on the door of TD land.

This week the Hawks will play the Hirschi Huskies on Thursday night at 7:30 in order to make Hawk Field available for the Class A playoff game between Holliday and Albany on Friday night.

cert in San Angelo on Jan. 8.

The top four of each voice part
will be classified as All-Area and
will go to another audition ses-
sion for All-State Choir — each
selected in the above procedure.

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Letters from Rhodesia

The following statements are excerpts from two recent letters from Mickey and Larry George, missionaries to Rhodesia from the Iowa Park United Methodist church. Many friends here are interested in their work and welfare. They arrived in Rhodesia, via Paris, the middle of October.

"Dear Mother and Daddy: "It was a long trip but at last we are here... at the orientation center for new missionaries. We were disappointed when the lady at the airport told us we were coming here and not going directly to Mrewa, but we are glad... because the missionaries from England, America, and New Zealand are just great.

"We are learning the Shona language, making field trips all over Rhodesia, and having lectures on subjects important to Rhodesia, such as history, economics, and Shona customs. I guess we initially reacted negatively out of our selfish desires, but as always the Lord had a blessing in store for us.

"Our trip in Europe was beautiful! We had sunny skies every day, even in London. You can't imagine the beauty of Paris in October. Millions and millions of flowers were blooming everywhere.

"When we left the airport at Salisbury, one of the first things we saw was a beautiful jacaranda tree... hundreds of them. They are native to southern Africa, line the streets and highways... and now are absolutely covered in bright colored blooms. In fact, something is blooming here all the time. The climate is heavenly. We love what we have seen in Rhodesia.

"We are really getting into the British swing of things. Everyone stops for tea at 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., and of course each meal is concluded with tea... (some drink coffee)."

Several days later another letter described the place where they will be working and living:

"Well, we have seen it! We've been to Mrewa. The mission is quite large since there is an elementary school, secondary school, all of the teachers' houses, boarding units for students, the church, the administration building, and home for some member workers. The principal and his wife are the greatest and we felt perfectly at home staying with them.

"Mrewa has two menaces. One is malaria. The couple we knew are just getting over it, and other missionaries have had it. So we are taking our anti-malarial tablets every Friday, hoping not to get it.

"The other problem is snakes. The black mamba is one of the deadliest snakes in Africa and they killed one in the chicken pen behind our house last week. You can bet we won't go out at night without a flashlight!

"Missy is scheduled to teach Form 3 cooking, junior girls, and she has three gas and three wood stoves. Presently I am assigned to teach two classes bookkeeping, four classes typing, two classes commerce; and I have been appointed school chaplain and must be available for individual counseling. I think we should be quite busy.

"We hope the circulation of our address sparks some communication from homefolk. We have heard from only two or three.

Too bad about the Hawks; and what has happened to TU?

"Tell everyone we are fine.
