Park Banker Earns Night Study Award

Malcolm Mills of Iowa Park, an auditor at the Wichita National Bank of Wichita Falls, was honored with an award Wednesday evening at the fourth annual banquet of the Wichita Falls chapter of the American Institute of Banking held at the Wichita Falls country club.

The award was a standard certificate signifying completion of eight AIB courses. Malcolm is the only one to complete eight courses out of a membership of 200. Three other members have finished four.

The four men were presented certificates by Bernard J. Lunt, vice-president of AIB and assistant vice-president of the Fort Worth National bank.

The courses are from a national school and are offered through the banks. Mr. Mills attended night classes several nights each week for about three years to complete the eight courses. He has been employed by the Wichita National for about eight years.

Malcolm was graduated from Iowa Park High School in 1941 and attended Baylor university at Waco. He played football in high school and was on the freshman squad at Baylor before entering the air force during World War II, serving three years.

Mr. Mills was treasurer of the Wichita chapter of AIB and this year will serve as membership chairman.

Mr. and Mrs. Mills and their sons Mack, Monte and Mark live on West Aldine here. They attend the Baptist church.

Guest speaker at the banquet was R. E. Jackson, professor of history and government at TSCW, Denton.

Miss Mary Ellen Johnson, also of Iowa Park, another employee of the bank, served as chairman of the women's division, decorations and menu.

Fall from Rig Kills W. E. Kee, Son of Area Resident

W. E. (Bill) Kee, 51, of Electra was killed instantly last Thursday afternoon, Sept. 2, when he fell from a drilling rig seven miles south of Electra.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday at the Church of the Nazarene in Electra with interment in the new Electra cemetery. Officiating at the service were Rev. C. F. Laferney, pastor, assisted by Rev. George Davis of Electra and Rev. Arthur Clemons of Arlington.

Mr. Kee's mother, Mrs. Lucy Kee, who lives with her daughter W. A. Watkins at 2522 Iowa Park Road, is 94 years old and is well known and loved in this area.

Some six months ago Mr. W. A. Watkins died suddenly of heart failure, and this is the second tragedy in their lives in half a year.

Mr. Kee has been associated with oilman W. H. Hammond for nine years. He lost his footing while helping tear down a rig, and fell 45 feet to his death.

Mr. Kee, father of seven children, had lived in Electra 26 years. He was reared at Harrold and was a member of the Nazarene church.

Mr. Kee is survived by his widow Isabelle Kee; four sons Troy Ray, 19, John Russell, 9, and Aaron, 11, all of Electra, and Billie Earl, 21, a paratrooper stationed in Japan; three daughters Mrs. Velma Lee Moore and Lois Myrtle Kee of Wichita Falls and Reva Jo Kee of Electra; two brothers J. T. of Electra and H. W. of Harrold; two sisters Mrs. Annie Haven and Mrs. Watkins of Wichita Falls; and his mother.

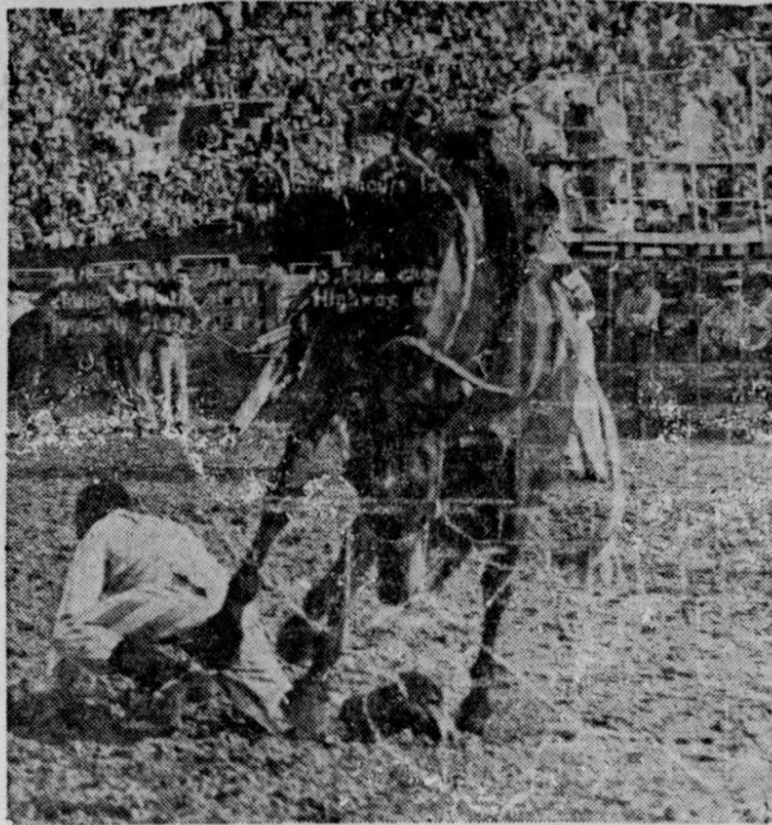

Fluoridation of Water Proving Its Worth

Through the efforts of Dr. C. J.
 Simpson, local dentist, Iowa Park
 became the second city in Texas
 to add potassium fluoride to the
 city water. There has never been
 any serious objection here to this
 added protection against tooth de-
 cay for the young people.

There has, however, been much
 controversy in other communities,
 and Dr. Simpson gave us this week
 some additional information on the
 use of potassium fluoride in pre-
 ventation of caries. Excerpts from
 an article on the subject follow:

"Scientific opinion expressed at
 the recent hearings in Washington,
 D.C., on the Wier anti-fluoridation
 bill was unanimously in favor of
 fluoridation as a caries preventive
 measure. Extensive and numerous
 surveys and studies in recent years
 have proved the effectiveness of
 fluoridation.

"But interest in fluorine as a
 caries preventive is not new. An
 article entitled "Potassium Fluor-
 ide for the Preservation of the
 Teeth," printed in November 1874
 by a German medical journal.

"Iron has long been used for the
 blood. Lime and phosphate are given
 as materials for the bones. Simi-
 larly, it has been possible to ad-
 minister fluorine for the enamel of
 the teeth in a form soluble through
 juices, a form in which it can be
 absorbed. It is fluorine which gives
 hardness and lasting quality to the
 enamel of the teeth and so pro-
 tects them against caries."

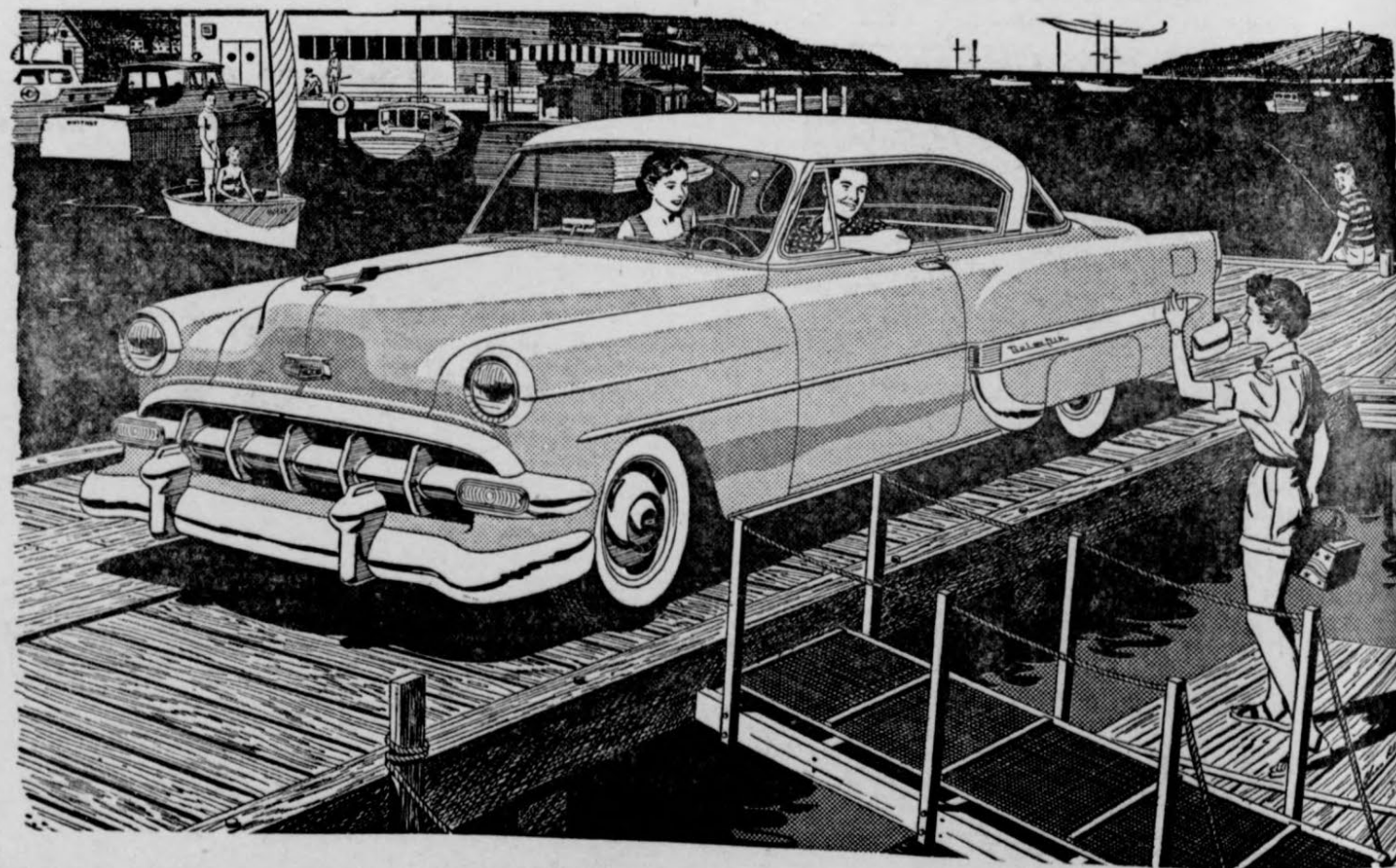

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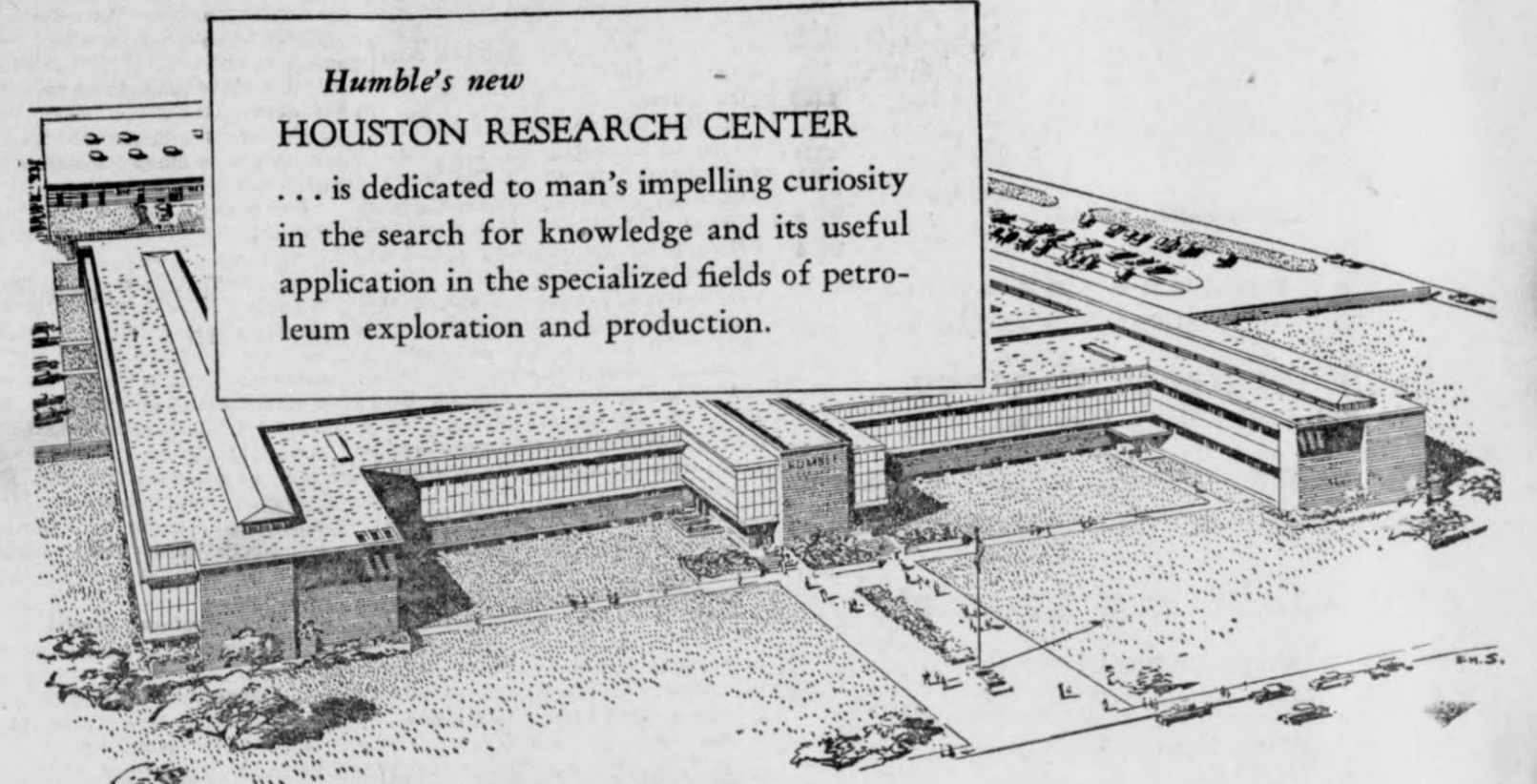
