Chess Favorite Game, Whole Village Plays

Berlin. - Virtually every inhabitant of the little village of Stroebeck, near Halberstadt in the Hars mountains, can play chess. Proficiency in chess playing ranks with reading. writing and arithmetic in the Stroebeck village school.

Every year just before the Easter vacation the school conducts a chess tournament. The winners receive chess boards donated by the village.

Tradition has it that the Stroebeckers have known how to play chess since the Eleventh century. At that time Bishop Arnulf of Halberstadt defeated his opponent, Count Gunzelin, with the aid of the villagers of Stroebeck. The Stroebeckers held the count captive in an old tower, still known as the Chess tower, until he was ran-somed by friends. To while away the time Count Gunzelin began to instruct his guards in chess.

The guards passed the knowledge agers, until everybody kn the game. Since then it has been a matter of communal pride to instri ict each succeeding generation in the art.

REFUSING TO VOTE, WOMEN QUOTE BIBLE

They Nearly Stump Judge, but Are Fined.

Brussels .- From the little town of Zeist in Holland, not far from Doorn, confes a story of forty women who would not vote. Not only did they neglect to vote, but they refused to do so on conscientious grounds, and courtroom scene which followed taxed the Scriptural knowledge of the

All forty were summoned to appear before the local magistrate of Zeist to explain their delinquency. But thirtyeight of these wise women decided not to lower their dignity, so they sent a man delegate to present a written pleading to the effect that their consciences would not permit them to go to the polls.

Excuse Astonishes Judge.

"True Puritan women cannot do unwomanly things just because the pope and the Socialist leaders would be pleased at this," wrote the nonvoting thirty-eight. That in itself sufficiently astonished the good judge. Then, on behalf of the women the delegate quoted a verse from Proverbs: "Her husband is known in the gates, when he sitteth among the elders of the land." The women added that nothing was said in the Bible about a woman sitting in the gates.. "It is not a fit place for her and she has nothing to debate with the elders of the land."

The judge was searching his memory for a suitable quotation from the Scriptures which would show why women should sit with the elders when a woman appeared before the bench carrying a huge family Bible.

"This man has been pleading on behalf of thirty-eight of us," she declared to the judge. "I will plead myself for the two remaining women who didn't vote."

She opened her Bible and began to quote, first one verse from one book. then another from a different book. The judge tried to intervene, but the woman who would not vote had no trouble at all with her speaking facul-She repeatedly silenced the judge and proceeded with the next quotation. Unquestionably she had her case well prepared.

"Let your women keep silence be for the community," she read from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. "For it is not permitted unto them to speak . . . and if they will learn anything let them ask their husbands at home, for it is a shame for women to speak before the community."

Court Quotes Bible.

But the judge had now recovered to parry quotation for quotation.

"You have quoted Proverbs 31:28," he stated with dignity. "Will you allow me to quote Proverbs 31:26?" The Dutch woman was still in the middle of Corinthians and tried hurriedly to get relocated. But the judge

had already started. "She openeth her mouth with wisdom," he read solemnly, "and her tongue is the law of kindness."

Quite uninfluenced by the judge's come-back, the defendant picked a verbal missile from Genesis. "And thy desire shall be to thy husband and he shall rule over thee," she declared emphatically, only to follow that up with half a dozen quotations so rapidly that the judge found it impossible to speak a word,

But courts have wa Seeing he couldn't hope to outquote his antagonist, especially since she be trayed no great aptitude for standing by her plea that women should keep silence before the community, the judge finally found an opportunity to announce he would deliver his verdict by writing.

His decree stated that each of the forty women who would not vote should pay a fine to the state-fifteen or twenty florins each. But the judge included no Biblical quotations.

Blackbirds Enrage

New York Village

Olean, N. Y .- Four and plenty blackbirds are making a most unpalatable dish for the villagers of Gowanda. No one can sleep since thousands of the birds descended on the hamlet in northwestern Cattaragus county. And now their chattering is being punctuated by the firing of shotgun shells, especially devised to make the most noise possible.

The exasperated villagers appealed to the local officials who in turn appealed to the bureau of blological survey in Washington. The prescrip-

tion it furnished was to this effect: Take shotguns, load with shells making loud reports, and open fire when the birds first appear in the evening. They are then most easily frightened. Repeat dose every night until the birds move on.

The onslaught is now on, with no one, it seems, objecting to the lack of faith in the aim of the Gowanda gunners, which the prescription shows

PARALYSIS SPREAD ALARMS SCIENCE

Increase Seen as Threat of Epidemic.

Washington .- Are we on the verge of another infantile paralysis epidemic like that of 1916? Late summer and early fall are the times when this little understood disease is most prevalent, but the number of cases reported to the United States public health service in the last few weeks have shown a decided gain over those reported for the same period last

The figures for the week ending August 6 show 180 cases as opposed to only 66 for the corresponding week of 1926. Ohio reports several widely scattered cases, while Callfornia has 66 for one week alone.

Like influenza, poliomyelitis, as infantile paralysis is known to medical men, is one of the unfinished problems on which scientists are still hard at work. It is believed to be caused by a filterable virus, which is spread by contact with articles that have been touched by the infected person. From the way in which epidemics have spread in the past it is thought that it must be transferred either by animals or human carriers, but at this time little has been definitely established on this point.

In the big epidemic in New York city that occurred eleven years ago it was clearly shown that prompt hospitalization of all cases that could be safely moved checked the spread of the disease more effectively than any other measure. Another outstanding point that emerged from this experience was the fact that isolation of groups of children from contact with other children or adults, even when carried out in the midst of areas where the disease was prevalent, sufficed to protect almost absolutely

from inform.

At the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research attempts have been made to immunize monkeys to pollomyelitis but the results were too variable to be useful.

French workers have tried to use pieces of dried spinal cord after the same procedure as that followed in rables treatment, but the results were too uncertain to be practical. Dr. E. C. Rosenow of the Mayo clinic has used an antistreptococcos serum to treat acute cases, but this has not received any general application.

Ship 500,000 Canaries a Year From Germany

Berlin .- Germany, the world's market for canary birds, annually ships about 500,000 of the little feathered warblers to America.

Since the beginning of the Sixteenth century, when these songsters were brought from the Canary islands, they have been carefully and extensively bred in Germany. Within the last century the "Harzer rollers" in the Harz mountains have acquired world-

Through careful breeding the original green color of the birds has been charged to a bright yellow, while incessant and careful training has markedly enhanced their original marvelous vocal qualities.

The features of the canary-bird exhibitions regularly held in Berlin are the "song tournaments," at which the birds' vocal abilities are carefully appraised by expert breeders, who have made the surprising discovery that the green birds-resembling in color their wild tropical progenitors-are frequently better singers than their yellow brethren.

Sliding Doors Coming Back in Paris Homes

Paris.-Sliding doors have been built throughout in a dozen modern homes by a Parisian architect. His view is that the hinged door is an antiquated waster of space. This view has found a good deal of support.

Those commenting on the idea express surprise that people never have rebelled against the swinging door.

"How ridiculous it is," says one, "to have to step backward to open or

The old-fashloned door destroys the harmony of a room if left open at right angles to the wall, says another, and it is ugly and kills good wall space if it is swung back against the


World Leisure Seen "When Atom Is Split"

Domestic Tangles Do Not Involve Shooting or Expensive Court

Les Angeles, Calif.-Tray I articles Illustrated with photographs of African natives clothed in little or nothing have created an impression that these natives are immodest; on the contrary, they actually wear more clothes than most American girls.

E. K. Gade, cotton ginner from Dar es Salaam, German East Africa, made this comment at the Biltmore on the popular conception of the Swahili vomen in his country. These women actually are quite shy and modest in the cities where they mingle with crowds, he said. They wear a thin shawl that covers them from neck to ankles as a general thing, and they are as fond of gaudy colors as gypsies, he declared.

Back in the jungles where the negroes live by themselves without mingling with the whites, the native men and women appear as they do in the travel pictures, he said. And here he had another observation to make on a popular fallacy. Many people defending present dress of women have declared that familiarity with legs causes them to lose their attraction and have pointed to the scantily-clad Africans as proof of their statement. These negroes are very moral and

faithful to their spouses, they say.

All wrong, says Mr. Gade. The negroes are not moral, but he hastened to add that he doesn't lay the blame to the lure of the legs for this condition. Men there buy their wives, paying perhaps \$25 for them, and they look on them as property, not as sweethearts. Frequently the wife later meets some man who attracts her and poor hubby is forgotten.

Does he get out the old bow and arrow or spear and rid the tribe of the home wrecker? Not a bit of it, says Mr. Gade. He goes back to the girl's papa and gets his \$25 back.

But with all its interesting features, Africa is a disappointment to one who is seeking to develop a country, Mr. Gude said. He has lived there for 21 years and declares that progress there is so slow as to be almost negligible. Gade declared he has sold most of his interests there and plans to locate in the United States or England. He is in Los Angeles visiting his brother, Svend Gade, a viction-picture director.

HOME OF ADAMS TO BE MADE SHRINE

Historic Structure Is to Be Crened to Public.

Quincy, Mass .- America is soon to have another national shrine, the historic old Adams home with its wide grounds, old trees and old fashioned garden, beloved of two Presidents of the United States and their distinguished descendants.

Although the old home is to remain in the ownership of the Adams family, as it has since the very early days of the republic, the grandchildren of Charles Francis Adams have decided to give up the house to the public and it will be opened soon as a national shrine.

Tradition has it that Abigall Adams sat down on the horse block before the house and cried when she saw that the house was not large enough for the new furniture she bad bought in France. That was why John Adams, the second President of the United States, added some rooms to the original structure, built in 1732 by Leonard Vassall, a San Domingo

Vassall was a Loyalist and he fled the country at the time of the Revolution. The new American government bought the house and John Adams in turn bought it from the government.

Five generations of the Adams family were rocked in the cradle that is still in the house. In the wing chair that stands in the study upstairs the President died a year after his son, John Quincy Adams, had been inaugurated President.

In the stone library which Charles Francis Adams built in the garden in 1872, is the desk at which John Quincy Adams dled in the house of representatives in Washington.

In addition to the furniture brought from France by Abigail Adams, are two chairs of Dolly Madison's that came from the White House. There is the old sofa on which President John Adams sat at 90 to be pointed by Stuart. There is a bed that was obtained

from Daniel Webster for a bad debt. This is in the middle room in which Lafayette once slept.

The house always has been lived in and the passing years have seen each generation of the noted Ameri-can family add to its heritage.

1 dijah's Flight (vv. 1-14).

dpon Ahab's return from the excitement on Mount Carmel, he told his wife all that Elljah had done, that even all her prophets had been hewn to pieces by the sword. This so enraged her that she sent a message of death to Elijah, who seems to have been waiting at the gate (vv. 1, 2). Though Elijah had courageously stood before the king and the priests of Baal, he now cowered before this woman, and fled for his life. Let us beware lest when we think we stand, we fall (I Cor. 10:12),

1. Elijah under the juniper tree (vv. 3-7). The juniper tree was a shrub of the desert which afforded shelter and protection to travelers from the burning sun by day and the cold wind by night.

(1) His request (v. 4): This was that he might die. This was no doubt a foolish thing for him to say, but let us be as considerate toward him as was God. The discouragement, and even despondency, of Elijah, was due to the nervous strain of about four years of unusual service for God, which culminated on Mount Carmel. Such nervous reaction is to be expected, and surely the heart of this lesson will be missed unless we see it in that light, and see God's tenderness toward

his overwrought servant. (2) God's tender treatment (vv. 5-7). a. He gave him sleep (v. 5). "He giveth His beloved sleep" (Ps. 127:2). b. He sent an angel to cook Elijah's meal (vv. 6, 7). The angel of the Lord is usually understood to be the second member of the Holy Trinity. If this be correct, then we see Jehovah-Jesus preparing food for His servant Elijah, as He afterward did for His discouraged disciples by Galilee.

2. Elijah at Horeb (vv. 8-14). God had kindly ministered to His discouraged prophet so that he would be in a fit condition to receive the needed instruction and correction.

(1) God's interview with Elijah in the cave (vv. 9, 10). a. God's question, "What doest thou here, Elljah?" (v. 9). This was a stinging rebuke, though most kindly given. It implied that his appointed messenger was now far away from the field of duty. How blessed to know that "A God-forsaking saint is not a God-forsaken saint"! b. Elijah's answer (v. 10). Elijah tried to vindicate himself by asserting his jealous loyalty to God-that in spite of all this the people had not only rejected his message and dishon ored God, but sought to destroy him.

(2) God's interview with Elijah on the mount (vv. 11-14). While standing before the Lord on the mount, God caused a mighty demonstration of wind, earthquake and fire to pass before him, to show unto him the nature of the work he had been doing for God and to show him what was lacking in his work for the fullest attainment of success. Elliah had about him much of the whirlwind, earthquake and fire. His work had been terrifying and alarming, but it lacked in gentleness and love. This object lesson in the days of God's working is a needed message for this age, which is so wonderfully characterized by noise and clamor. The world is not "taken for Christ" by the fleshly energy and enthusiasms of conventions and com mittees, but by the quiet hearts who go forth proclaiming God's Word in

DELEGATES' HALL BECOMES SHRINE

Virginia Will Restore Room Where Great Historic Events Occurred.

Richmond, Va.-The historic hall of House of Delegates in Virginia's old state capitol is to be restored as shrine of American tradition.

Except for bronze tablets relating creat incidents in its history and for statute of Robert E. Lee, which Governor Byrd has suggested to commorate his acceptance of the Contederate command, the hall's appearance will be made as much as possible like that preceding the Civil war.

In the hall now is the ancient chair of the speaker of the house of burgesses, used at the capitol in Wil-Hamsburg as early as 1700, and efforts are being made to return as much as possible of the old furniture used in the Black and Tan and Scala wag Constitutional convention, which has been scattered about the state.

This building was designed by Thomas Jefferson, and he determined the interior arrangements. The corperstone was laid in 1785. It has been used longer as a capitol than any other building in the United States. On October 1), 1789, the general assembly convened in it. The famous statue of George Washington, which is seen on entering, was placed in the capitol on May 14, 1796. It is the work of Houden.

Aaron Burr Tried.

Probably the first great event taking place in the hall of the house of delegates was the adoption of the famous resolutions of 1798-99 drafted by James Monroe as the true interpretation of the Constitution of the United

Aaron Burr was tried for treason there in 1807. It was necessary that the trial take place in the hall of the house of delegates because the courtroom immediately above was entirely too small to accommodate the crowd. as was the hall of the house of dele gates itself. This was one of the most celebrated trials in the history of the United States. Chief Justice Marshall presided, and for a part of the time Judge Cyrus Griffen, also a Virginian, of the United States Circuit court. sat with him. The most learned lawyers of the day were assembled-Caesar Rodney, George Hay and Alexander McRae for the prosecution; Edmund Randolph, John Wickham, William Wirt, Benjamin Botts and Luther Martin for the defense.

On June 26, 1813, a public meeting was held in the hall of the house of delegates to kindle the enthusiasm of the citizens in the conduct of the war with Great Britain. A vigilance committee was appointed to look after the defense of the city. William Foushee, John Marshall, William Wirt, Philip Norborne and Thomas Ritchie were among members of this committee.

On February 7, 1822, Henry Clay and George M. Bibb, commissioners from Kentucky, appeared before a joint session of the general assembly of Virginia to speak in reference to the meaning and execution of an act of Virginia in 1789, entitled "The Erection of the District of Kentucky Into a Separate State."

Scene of Saccssion Convention.

In 1824 General Lafayette visited the city of Richmond for three days. It was the occasion of the greatest rejoicing. Chief Justice Marshall delivered an oration on behalf of the officers of the Revolution, the exercises being conducted in the hall of the house of delegates.

In 1829 there was assembled in the hall of the house of delegates the famous Constitutional convention which continued into 1830, and which gave the western nonslave holding counties of Virginia increased representation in the general assembly. In attendance on this convention were Marshall, Madison, Monroe, Giles, John Randolph, Benjamin Watkins, Leigh and Littleton Walter Tazewell.

A neeting was held on July 9, 1831, to arrange for public manifestation of sorrow at the death of James Monroe, which had occurred in New York. The ceremonies were held at the northeast end of the capital. Public meetings were held there later in memory of Thomas Jefferson, Chief Justice Marshall and James Madison.

In 1844, in the great explosion on the U. S. S. Princeton near Alexan-dria, ex-Gov. T. W. Gilmer of Virginia, then secretary of the navy, was killed. The remains of Governor Gilmer lay in state in the hall of the house. The remains of John C. Calhoun also were brought to Richmond, taken to the hall of the house and placed in state on the clerk's desk.

The great secession convention met there in February, 1861. It was before this convention that Gen. Robert E. Lee appeared and accepted appointment as commander of the military and naval forces of Virginia. It was in the hall of the house of delegates that the Confederate senate met and conducted Jefferson Davis to a platform beside the Washington monucom which he read his inaugress to a great and enthusias-mbly. Gen. "Stonewalf" Jack-dy lay in state in the old see-The body of ex-Presi also lay in state there.

room, above the hall of the house of delegates, to be present at a trial by the Court of Appeals of the Richmond mayoralty case. The gallery of the Supreme court gave way, then the main floor, and a mass of humanity was precipitated to the floor of the hall of the house. A bronze plate records that 62 were killed and 251 injured.

How much of the old furniture can be found is problematical, but it is known that a few of the old chairs and desks are still in existence. Several were acquired by individuals after the constitutional convention. held in the old hall in 1902-03. When the Capitol building was modeled in 1904 two desks which occupied a position directly in front of the desk of the clerk of the senate were purchased by the men who had used them at this important convention. One of the two desks is now in Richmond.

At the same time a resident of Richmond acquired the desk built for the use of the newspaper men reporting the sessions of the house of delegates. This desk accommodated four men and stood to the left of the desk of the clerk of the bouse. is four feet long, of solid walnut. with a walnut top from twelve to fifteen inches wide and an inch thick. The desk has massive supports, all of walnut, and the top is A-shaped, with two drawers to each side, in which are written the names of men who worked there at various times. It is believed that this desk was first placed in the hall during the sessions of the Confederate states congress, or when the Black-and-Tan used this place for its meetings. This piece was made into two smaller ones and they are now in use in a home in Richmond. Though the historic value was not known at the time of the purchase, they have been carefully preserved for their association, and are in excellent condition.

London Built on Sand. News Scares Populace

London,-London has discovered that its house is builded upon the sand. Not since the German air raids of ten years ago has there been such trepidation over the possibility of a catastrophe.

In the last few weeks a half dozen buildings in various parts of the city have crumbled and fallen to the ground, great holes have opened in the streets and a tremendous cavity was found beneath Piccadilly, which is in course of reconstruction.

London builders have made application for a revision of the standard form of agreement between builders and architects, and the national physical laboratory is studying the effects of vibration on buildings.

The top thirty feet of London's surface ground is composed of shifting strata in which endless subterranean burrowings has gone on and on. FARM LAND VALUES STILL DECREASING

THE TEXAS STATE FAIR Average Is 50 Per Cent Lower Than in 1920.

> Washington.-Farm real estate valnes continued to tumble during the crop year just ended, marking a continual depreciation during the last seven years, the Department of Agriculture said recently, adding that there are plenty of farms for sale with buyers few and cautious.

Present values are about at the level of 1917 values, being placed at 119 per cent of the prewar level, while 1920 values were 169 per cent above the prewar figure. The decline in the last year was not to be wholly unexpected, according to the department, on account of the marked decrease during the year in the price of certain of our major farm products, the sharp drop in farmers' incomes, and a generally inactive farm real estate market.

The South Atlantic states showed the largest decline, being 137 compared with 148 in 1926, and 198 in 1920. In other state divisions values were:

East North Central, 103 against 110 in 1926 and 159 in 1920; West North Central, 115 against 121 and 184: East South Central, 133 against 139 and 199; West South Central, 139 against 144 and 177; Middle Atlantic, 111 against 113 and 136; Mountain, 101 against 103 and 151; New England. 127 against 128 and 140, and Pa-

cific, 143 against 144 and 156. Values for the United States as a whole have gone down 50 points, from 169 in 1920 to 119 in 1927.

Beetle Ruins Beams in Castle of William I.

Maidstone, Eng.-The death watch beetle has ruined the wonderful oak beams, hewn in the days of William the Conqueror, in Leeds castle, now being restored.

History is being vivisected every day with pick and shovel in order that the interior of the castle near here may be rebuilt in its medieval form for its new owner, Arthur Wilson-Filmer. The cost of the work is estimated at \$500,000.

The castle is built on three islands and connected by stone bridges, from one of which Edward II, hanged a former governor, Thomas de Colepep-

Mr. Wilson-Filmer does not want the work hampered by crowds of sightseers. When the restoration is completed he and his wife, who is a daughter of Lord Queenshorough, will live there.

Among the discoveries is a hidden torture chamber in the walls, with an publiette in its stone floor, through which the body of the victim could be shot into the moat after the rack and thumbscrew had finished with him.
