Sales Tax Rebate Check Shows Continuing Revenue Decline

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$104.6 million in local sales tax to 1,033 cities that levy the one-percent city tax a few days ago. Bullock said 1986 payments to date were down 1.7 percent as compared to the payments to date in November of last year.

Muleshoe's check is reflecting a 14.39 percent decrease from payments received to date at the same time a year ago. Muleshoe received a check in the amount of \$13,950.52, down from the payment for the same period a year ago of \$24,477.48. The latest payment brought

Muleshoe's total for the year to \$179,875.25, down from the total payments at the same time last year of \$210,102.93.

From Cochran County, Morton received a check for \$5,185.75, up slightly from the \$5,027.00 at the same time last year. To date, Morton has received \$48,411.21, up by 2.12 percent over last year's figure of \$47,408.32.

Littlefield is reflecting a 7.07 percent decrease during the year from last year's figures. At this time last year, Littlefield had received \$245,835.45, down to the figure of \$228,461.72, for this year. Littlefield's current payment was \$25,197.45, compared to \$28,125.16 for the same month a year ago.

In Parmer County, Friona received a check, for \$11,995.29, compared to a payment of \$12,061.54 for the same period a month ago. This brought their total payments for the year to \$98,914.44, compared to the \$104,291.14 a year ago, a decrease of 5.16 percent.

Houston's check was the largest -- \$16.1 million -- bringing total payments in 1986 to \$132.9 million, down five percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$12.7 million for a 1986 total of \$99.2 million, a five percent decrease from 1985.

San Antonio's payment of \$6.8 million, pushed payments for 1986 to \$53 million, up .5 percent. Austin's check for \$4.8 million brought total payments

this year to \$39.2 million, a five percent decrease from 1985. Con't Page 6, Col. 4

Healthy Heart Program Begins At Kindergarten

Janie Moynihan, development chairman for the Bailey County Heart Association and vice chairman, Deanna Rasco, met with the MISD Board of Trustees Monday night to present them with a new hands-on teaching tool called Heart Treasure Chest.

Mrs. Moynihan said this is a teaching curriculum that will be used in kindergarten classes at Dillman Elementary. She added that the purpose is to promote heart healthy habits for youngsters. The entire program is designed to fulfill one of the main goals of the American Heart Association, which is to prevent heart disease.

The chairman reminded that heart disease is a progressive disease that has its origin in childhood, most times. "This is an effort to teach good habits so when the youngsters grow up, they will have already established heart healthy habits," said Mrs. Moynihan. "The curriculum includes exercise, rest and nutritional information. The Board had a very positive attitude about the new program and the kindergarten teachers are very excited about teaching it."

building finished soon.

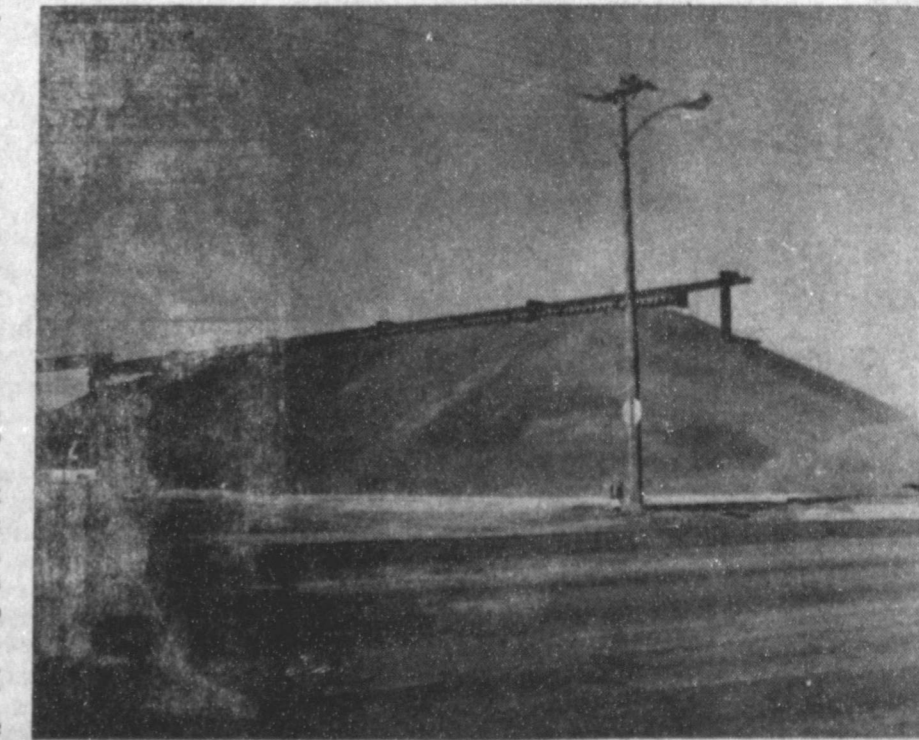

Dear editor:

Now that the elections are over and it's safe to bring it up, a lot of Congressmen and Senators are worried, right out in public, about the national debt, which is now either one trillion dollars to two trillion or maybe three, I forget which. But it doesn't matter, if you can't swim and are in water over your head, whether it's 10 feet or 20 feet deep doesn't matter.

As some politicians are now timidly pointing out, the bulk of the national debt was acquired in the past six years, between 1980 and now.

But there's another debt which may be more worrisome than the national one.

According to some figures I read while a TV football commentator was trying to tell me what I'd just seen, the total debt owned by businesses and consumers has jumped between 1980 and now from \$3.6 trillion to a record \$7 trillion.

This is dangerous news. When politicians find out the people are spending more than they are, no telling where the national debt will go.

Interest on the national debt is now \$137 billion a year, not counting what the government borrowed last Monday. What the interest is on the business and consumer debt, not counting what one corporation borrowed yesterday to buy out another corporation to keep a third corporation from buying it out, and not counting what went on credit cards yesterday from sea to shining sea, leaves the mind in what is called boggled.

Banking Calories and Light Snacking Can Ward Off Holiday Weight Gain

"Calorie banking" is one way to ward off the holiday weight gain that so often sends us into the New Year with that inevitable resolution to go on a diet.

"To survive the holidays with no weight gain, most people must simply plan ahead," says Betty Alford, Ph.D., Dean, College of Nutrition, Textiles, and Human Development Texas Women's University, Denton, Texas.

Cutting back just 100 calories a day for a week prior to a big holiday party or Christmas dinner gives you a calorie bank account of 700 calories toward such tempting holiday treats as eggnog, bread stuffings, sauces, pies and cookies.

When banking your calories to save for a big event, Alford recommends eliminating "extra" foods first—those high in fat, sugar or salt, that have little nutrient value. By simply cutting out a glass of wine, a can of beer or one soft drink a day you can save from 100 to 150 calories. Reducing portion

sizes can also cut calories significantly.

For example by eating a fourth of a pound of steak instead of a half-pound for dinner, you can save from 250 to 500 calories depending on the type of steak. Eating one pork chop instead of two can save around 300 calories. And eating two pieces of chicken without the skin, rather than with it, will save about 100 calories.

Reducing the amount of salad dressing you use by just one tablespoon could save anywhere from 50 to 100 calories, depending on the type of dressing you use.

One of the pluses of calorie banking is that it helps alleviate the guilt many of us feel when we eat a big meal. And it's the guilt that so often leads to stress and frustration and even more overeating. It is also good way to cut back on calories in general, without starving yourself or eliminating important, nutritious foods.

"It's very important to look ahead and plan," said Alford. "Eat less and add high fiber, bulky foods to your diet before going to a party where you know there will be a tempting array of foods. This way you won't feel starved when you

reach the party."

Another way to get through the holidays without gaining weight is to eat nutritious snacks between meals. These will give you an added energy boost often needed during the busy holiday season.

If you keep the body revved up with frequent snacks or light meals for constant energy, you will not opt for high fat snack foods to settle those gnawing hunger pains.

The solution to maintaining energy and controlling weight, especially during the busy holidays, is to choose snacks which supply extra nutrients to the diet. According to Alford, milk, for example, supplies complex carbohydrates and fat for energy. The fat in milk is digested very slowly and helps a person feel satisfied longer from a small amount of food.

EGGNOG-MINCMEAT CHIFFON PIE One 9-inch pie

Crust:

1 1/2 cups almond Windmill cookie crumbs (about 15 cookies), 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter, melted

Filling:

1/2 cup sugar, divided, 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 1/4 cups dairy eggnog, 3 eggs, separated, 2 tablespoons light rum, 1/4 teaspoons cream of tartar, 1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped 1/2 cup prepared mincemeat Whipped cream

For crust: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Combine crumbs and butter. Press onto bottom and sides of 9-inch pie plate. Bake 10 minutes; cool completely on wire rack. For filling: Combine 1/4 cup sugar, gelatin and salt in medium-sized saucepan. Combine eggnog and egg yolks. Gradually stir into sugar mixture. Heat over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved and mixture is thickened. (Do not boil.) Add rum. Chill until mixture mounds when dropped from a spoon. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar until foamy. Fold egg yolk mixture into meringue. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into cooled crust. Refrigerate several hours or overnight.

Just before serving, spread mincemeat in a 3-inch circle in center of pie. Pipe whipped cream through a fluted pastry tube around outer edge of pie, about 1-inch from edge. Pipe a rosette of whipped cream on center of mincemeat. Serve immediately.

"Lowfat milk is preferable to nonfat, because that little bit of fat makes you feel full longer in between meals," she said. "It also inhibits fast absorption of alcohol if you plan to have alcoholic beverages at a party."

Cheeses and frozen yogurt also make good snack foods, and are high in calcium, a nutrient many women lack if they are consuming fewer than three daily servings of dairy foods.

Other fast snack foods include fresh fruits such as bananas, apples or oranges, nuts, whole grain breads, carrot sticks, or cheese and crackers.

"If you are going to be someplace where these foods are unavailable, many of them can be taken along with you," she said. "If you are hungry, eat a little bit of something good for you. You will feel better and probably get a lot more holiday shopping done as well."

Here are some other weight-saving tips to help ward off that New Year's diet:

* Fix an herb/bread dressing for the turkey instead of one with sausage. You'll save about 185 calories per half-cup.

* Instead of gooey candied sweet potatoes full of sugar, marshmallows and butter, try eating just a plain baked sweet potato.

QRB: MINI COURSE IN REFINISHING
(Five easy steps to Beautiful Furniture)

The first and most important step to beautiful furniture is to obtain the proper refinishing

supplies and know how to use them before you begin. Some of the common refinishing terminology includes: **REMOVER**: a solution applied to the old finish on the furniture so that this finish will soften and may be removed. **STAIN**: A coloring agent designed to enhance wood grain, change the color of the wood or mask inferior grades of wood. **FINISH**: material or coating applied to the wood to bring it to a desired state; a finish should protect the wood from the environment; examples of finishes include varnish, shellac, tung oil, paint, etc. **PATINA**: the natural color that wood attains as it ages.

THE REFINISHING PROCESS
Step 1: Removing the Original Finish

There are two basic categories of removers; caustic and non-caustic. Each may be liquid or paste. There is no such thing as a perfect paint remover. However, there are certain good qualities to look for. A good paint remover should do as little harm to user and the wood as possible. It should remove the old darkened, discolored finish without bleaching the natural color of the wood or the stain. It should not raise the grain of the wood thus eliminating the need for sanding. It should not loosen glue joints or separate veneer. It should have a broad range of solvency with little evaporation.

Step 2: Repair
Once the old finish has been removed and the bare wood is exposed, several determinations must be made:

1. Is the color of the wood acceptable?
2. Is the wood in need of repair? (i.e. cigarette burns, water marks, raised grain, loose veneer, etc.)

Repairs should be completed prior to staining and/or refinishing.

Step 3: Bleaching (Optional)

A mild bleach can be made at home. This bleach will remove water-spots and make the wood lighter in color. Laundry bleach is stronger than oxalic acid and will bleach almost white. This step may be repeated as necessary. Be especially careful with veneered pieces. Several problems can occur at this point.

Step 4: Staining (Optional)

There are two types of stain: opaque and translucent. Each stain, having different characteristics, should be used for different purposes.

Step 5: Finishing
The final step in the refinishing process is applying a new finish. There are a variety of finishes available, including varnish, lacquer, tung oil, paint, etc.

The factors that should be taken into consideration when purchasing a finish are durability, ease and method of application, color of the finish, and how easy will it be to clean and care for.

Essentially, a finish should provide a protective barrier between the wood and the environment.

The cleaning and care for your newly refinished piece of furniture should require nothing more than dusting with a water dampened soft, clean cloth. If you have applied a quality finish, you will never need wax.

These are just a few of the tips Lynn Gerhart will share when she appears on "Creative Living" on November 25 and 29.

Turkey Cost About The Same As Last Year

Prices for whole turkeys should be about the same as last year, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service poultry marketing specialist.

According to Dr. David Mellor, the cost for plain store brand turkeys should be in the range of \$.60-.70 per pound, while national brand basted turkeys will cost \$.90-1.00 per pound.

Although this year's turkey stocks are higher than in 1985, he says this shouldn't affect the retail price, since most turkey is now processed into parts or other food items.

"For greatest economy, the consumer's best bet is to look for holiday sales on plain, store brand turkey," Mellor advises.

Extension nutritionist Marilyn Haggard notes that the cost-per-serving may also vary according to what type of turkey you buy.

"Many smaller families are choosing to cook a turkey roast or parts," she says. "The cost per pound may be higher, but it may be worth it on a per serving basis, especially if it reduces waste from leftovers aren't used."

The nutritionist says you can expect the following 3 1/2 ounce cooked edible servings per pound from different types of turkey:

- * Whole turkey - 2 1/2
- * Bone-In Breast - 2 1/2-3
- * Boneless Breast - 3 - 3 1/2
- * Netted Turkey Roast - 3 - 3 1/2
- * Deli/Cooked Turkey - 4 1/2
- * Hind Quarter - 2 1/2
- * Boneless Pan Roast - 3 - 3 1/2

Prepare Heat Pump For Winter

Like any other heating system, a heat pump needs regular maintenance to perform efficiently.

"In addition to maintenance on the blower, the outside condenser should be cleaned," says Dr. Susan Quiring, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service Housing specialist.

If either side of the coil is dirty, she advises cleaning it with a coil cleaning solution or having service personnel do it for you.

Then lubricate the blower motor with a few drops of lightweight oil if it is required.

Quiring also recommends changing disposable filters and cleaning washable filters.

It's especially important to check the outside coil for signs of oil, she says, since that would indicate a freon leak which should be repaired by service personnel.

Remember to shut off the power before attempting to do any cleaning or service work on the heat pump, cautions the specialist.

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Land Bank Announces Lower Interest Rates

Farmers and ranchers who finance with the Federal Land Bank of Texas will pay lower interest rates beginning December 1.

Variable interest rates on long-term farm and ranch loans will be 10.75 percent, down from 11 percent. Rural residence and farm-related business loans will decrease to 11.25 percent, down from 11.50 percent.

According to Bill Liles, president of the Federal Land Bank of Muleshoe, the reduction, due to the drop in money cost, will save Texas farmers and ranchers more than \$6 million a year in interest.

The bank and its 44 Federal Land Bank Associations have more than \$2.5 billion outstanding to 40,000 Texas farmers and ranchers for terms of up to 30 years.

"Lower interest rates will give Land Bank borrowers some financial relief," says Liles. "We feel that each time we bring interest rates down even a

few basic points, we are helping stabilize the overall farm economy and Texas land prices, in particular."

Since August 1, the bank has lowered interest rates three-fourths of one percent. This represents almost \$19 million a year less in interest rates for farmers, according to Liles.

"The Texas Land Bank mortgage loan portfolio continues to earn money," Liles said. "Almost 98 percent of our loans are current. Only two percent or about \$14 million of our loans are delinquent. We view this as acceptable considering the bank has \$2.5 billion in loans

Liles warned that even though the Land Bank continues to make money, third quarter earnings will be negative because of aid to other ailing Farm Credit districts.

He emphasized, however, that recent legislation passed for the Farm Credit System would alter these figures. Special accounting methods and spreading losses over a 20-year period will allow the bank to reverse some payables to other districts, changing year-end earnings for the bank significantly, the association president said. The Land Bank, this year, has averaged almost \$2 million a month in net earnings, before aid to other districts and loan loss reserves.

Fort Worth received \$4.1 million for a total of \$32.5 million in 1986, up two percent. El Paso's payment of \$2.5 million brought its total to \$21 million, a seven percent increase from 1985.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$48.7 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA payment of \$19.3 million pushed 1986 payments to \$155 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$18.6 million brought its total to \$148 million this year.

Austin's Capitol Metro received \$5 million, increasing this year's payments to \$39.5 million. VIA in San Antonio received a check for \$3.8 million, a total of \$29.1 million for 1986. Fort Worth's MTA received \$971,655 for a \$7.7 million total this year. Corpus Christi's MTA check for \$937,815 brought total payments this year to \$5.4 million.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales in September and reported to the Comptroller by October 20.

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



Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.

In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it is important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it is already broken it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.

Lower packer arm as far as it will go before moving module builder.
