

SELECTIVE ARMY HAS BEEN DRAWN AT WASHINGTON

Order for Liability for Service Established by Historic Lottery.

258 FIRST NUMBER OUT

Secretary Baker Takes Out Initial Number—Drawing Continues All Day Friday and Throughout Night.

Long List of Numbers Given in Order as Drawn, From Which Those Who Will Be Called to Serve in First Army Will Be Selected.

Washington, July 21.—The drawing for the big United States army was not completed until early Saturday morning. The drawing began at 9:45 Friday morning, and continued throughout the day and night. Altogether 10,500 numbers were drawn from the big fish bowl. It was officially stated that the first 1,000 numbers drawn represented more than 1,000,000 men, and it is not considered probable that men representing any number drawn after the first 2,000 will be called before any exemption board for the first army. The first eight numbers were drawn respectively by Secretary of War Baker, Senator Chamberlain of the senate military committee, Congressman Dent of the house military committee, Senator Warren and Representative Kahn, ranking minority members of the senate and house military committees; Maj. Gen. Tasker H. Bliss, acting chief of staff of the army; Maj. Gen. Enoch Crowder, provost marshal of the army; and Major General McCain, adjutant general of the army. After the first eight numbers had been drawn the regular tellers took hold, and worked through until the long task was completed.

In only a small number of the largest districts will the numbers above a few thousand affect registrants. Of the 4,557 registration districts throughout the country the largest has something over 10,000 numbers, while the smallest has only about 185, and the average is about 3,000. As the drawing proceeded, 157 numbers were withdrawn before one low enough to affect the smallest district came out. It was 126, placing 4,557 men numbered 120 on their local lists as 157th in order of liability.

The following list shows the numbers in the order in which they were drawn. The first number in each case represents the order in which the second, or red-ink registry, number was taken from the bowl. Four numbers are given in each line. Beginning with the first number, which was drawn by Secretary Baker.

A pessimist is an unwelcome visitor wherever he goes.

A few senators at Washington, by their continued opposition to every measure proposed to carry on the war get mighty close to disloyalty at times.

Hard times! Yes we have heard of him all our life and spent much time in his company, but most people are responsible for their own hard luck, but they prefer to lay it on the government.

Napoleon I was the product of the French Revolution. He saved France, but became a menace to the peace of Europe and they had to combine against him for self-protection and finally destroyed him.

Wonder how many of those senators at Washington, that slam conscription every chance they get, would volunteer or allow their sons to volunteer to go to Europe in the army if the conscription law was repealed?

Sometimes when things go awry it is hard to keep smiling; but it is better always to look on the bright side. No matter how bad things may be it is possible for them to be worse.

The "old grrouch" you have known him. He is never satisfied with anything or anybody, and very naturally no one cares to meet him or have anything to do with him. Don't be a "grrouch."

The row between Gen. Goethals and Mr. Denman of the ship building department goes right along while the work of building ships is stalled, and we need ships worse than anything in the world right now. We do not know who is to blame, both are good men, but even good men have no right to quarrel in time of war, in a way that will endanger the success of the government.

There is danger in Russia and we have never been fully persuaded that Russia will not at a critical time lay down on her allies. Russia has one heroic figure, Kerensky, that is doing all he can to save Russia and stand by its Allies in the war, but the outlook is dark again for Russia, notwithstanding the brilliant success gained by her soldiers last week.

The new German prime minister says Germany is ready for a "victorious" peace, and the new prime minister of Austria chimes in too, by saying Austria is ready for a "glorious" peace. If these two outlaw nations can get all they started the war for of course they will make peace. If the nations of the world are ready to become vassals of the hightoned (?) German Kaiser then it is time to end the war on whatever terms his High Mighness may dictate. It becomes plainer every day that the only way to end the war is to smash the German Kaiser just as Europe flattened out Napoleon in 1815.

The continual bickering among the members of the Shipping Board at Washington makes unpleasant reading to most Americans. With the great and imperative demand for more ships to meet the submarine menace the members have frittered away the entire time quarrelling among themselves, about whether they should build wooden or iron ships or do this or do that. The sorry spectacle of this wrangle is enough to knock a big lot of self-conceit out of Americans who are too prone to boast of what they can

do. Gen. Goethals and another member of the board resigned. President Wilson accepted both resignations, then asked the chairman to resign and it is hoped that a board can be selected that will do something at once.

CALLED SESSION OF THE HOUSE.

Speaker Fuller has called a session of the House to consider impeachment of Gov. Ferguson. The grounds given are so flimsy we are astonished that any man having enough political pull to get into the legislature should consider them at all. We doubt if the speaker has any authority to call the House together for any purpose, because the constitution only empowers the governor to call a special session for any purpose. Suppose the House formulates charges against Governor Ferguson who will convene the Senate, the Lieutenant Governor? Where is his authority? Speaker Fuller evidently has permitted a lot of prohibition leaders in Texas to use him as a tool to vent their spite upon Gov. Ferguson. They preferred all sorts of charges against Ferguson in both campaigns in an effort to defeat him; failing in their efforts to defeat him before the people they are now trying to put him out of office by a partisan legislature. It is peanut politics gone to seed. Gov. Ferguson has doubtless made mistakes and is hard-headed and all that, but the pro leaders and press of Texas have sought in every way to discredit him and have badgered him continually since the day he went into office. We predict that Fuller's scheme to oust Ferguson will fail and that the members who answer his call will not receive any pay for their service.

It is an old adage that in the crisis of any nation's affairs "the man" is found to save the nation. England found it's Cromwell, France its Napoleon, Prussia it's Fredrick the Great, America it's Washington. Where is the man to lead Darkest Russia to the light of freedom and liberty? It is a dangerous situation Russia faces. The red flaggers are trying to gain too much and may lose all. The entente allies are deeply concerned over the Russian situation, because Russia has the power to end the war quickly or prolong it for years. A united Russia right now, as America is entering the war, would end the war within a year; a disorganized Russia may prolong the war for years, and might change the map of the whole world.

Sir Edward Carson, the fiery Ulsterite, has riled the German press and leaders by saying that Germany must withdraw its army behind the Rhine before they talk about peace. The Rhine was the boundary line for centuries between ancient Gaul and the Teutonic tribes and may again become the boundary line between France and Germany. Napoleon again made the Rhine the boundary, but when he was exiled; the Rhinish Province, west of the Rhine, was restored to Prussia, though she never had any right to it except the right of conquest. In 1870 Germany annexed Alsace and Lorraine against the advice of Bismarck and thus created more hatred between France and Germany than the enormous indemnity France was forced to pay. If the ententes win the Rhine Province may be given to Belgium. It would be a just act because of the outrageous treatment of Belgium by Germany.

Look at the map, say the pro Germans as well as the Germans themselves. Not a foot of German soil they tell us is held by a foreign foe, but they never tell you now the Germans gained about ten thousand square miles of France during the first rush of the war. By bringing on the war suddenly and mobilizing an immense army, in fact was mobilized when war was declared, and by violating its own treaty with Belgium by rushing an army across it and attacking France in its weakest point, weak because France had very little fortification west of Belgium, relying on Germany's treaty not to violate the neutrality of Belgium. That is the way Germany gained in France

in 1914. One third of the French territory fortified by Germany in 1914 has been lost to them since last fall. Not a foreign armed soldier is on German soil is another fiction. France holds more than 60 villages, embracing 280 square miles in Alsace and has held it since the war began.

The commander of the German Aviation Corps makes light of Americas plan to attack Germany by an overwhelming force of airplanes. This is characteristic of the German soldiers. They started out imbued with the belief that the German soldier was superior to all other soldiers. They treated the French and English soldiers with contempt. Russians and Italians were beneath their notice. The world knows, if the Germans do not, what a mistake they made in underestimating the fighting qualities of their enemies. That mad Kaiser thought he would dictate peace in Paris in the fall of 1914. His son, the addle-pated Crown Prince, has been pounding away at Verdun for three years and while he made some gains at different times he actually holds less French territory today than he did at the beginning. So with American troops and American airmen. The idea is to ridicule them because to admit the truth that America's entry into the war was in any way dangerous to German success in winning the war, might open the eyes of the German people to the danger the blundering military party has gotten Germany into by provoking the American government to enter the war in defense of their rights on the sea. American soldiers and American airmen will prove to the thick-headed German militarist that they do not know anything about American soldier.

Dr. Davin Jayne Hill takes a fall out of American self-importance by saying that the Germans are more loyal to the Kaiser than the American people are to their own government, and the worst of it is that he tells the truth. There is ten times more disloyalty in this country than is shown in Germany, though the world knows very little about what is going on in Germany, yet results speak for themselves. In this country strikes have been started in many mines in the west, people openly opposed the draft and every measure proposed by the government to carry on the war. Senators Reed and LaFollett would have been imprisoned in Germany for their disloyal speeches were they members of the German Reichstag in place of the American Senate. We believe this war will make America stronger than ever and when the war ends you will not hear so much bunk about this being the home of the oppressed of all nations. The immigration doors will not likely be closed entirely to foreigners, but they will never again be thrown wide open as the past. Self preservation demands restriction upon foreign immigration and if it is not done the republic will perish. There are too many anarchist in this country and they are not all foreign born either. American citizenship is held too cheaply and the day is coming that a man who does not value his American citizenship as the greatest privilege that he has will either lose it or find himself in an unpleasant position and may be invited to emigrate to more congenial climes. We believe in a free press, but there should be a limit beyond which criticism should not go. This unrestricted criticism of the government, state and national, is responsible for these disloyal speeches and disloyal press utterances in some sections of the country. In time of war every one should give loyal support to the government; mistakes will be made; our government and other governments have always made them in every war, and reasonable and fair criticisms made with a view to correcting abuses should be permitted, but to criticize everything and all officers all the time is neither fair, just or right and should not be tolerated either in congress or out of it.

THE GERMAN CRISIS.

Out of all the conflicting and inconclusive reports in regard to the German crisis one fact stands forth clearly and distinctly. The Imperial Government is now on the defensive at home and is compelled to deal in concrete fashion with the growing dissatisfaction of the German people.

The nomination of an official scape-goat in the person of the Chancellor or Dr. Zimmermann, or Heiferich, or the adoption of electoral reforms, can have only a temporary effect, for no power exists by which the German government can give to the German people the one thing that is necessary to re-establish the former solidarity. Victory alone can do that, and victory is no longer possible.

The present state of the German mind marks the first stage of German defeat. Hitherto the Kaiser's statesmen have been able to answer all questions with the simple formula "Look at the map." The Germans have been looking at the map month in and month out as they tightened their belts and adapted themselves to new privations, but the map no longer carries the inspiration to sacrifice. What the German people are beginning to perceive is that their government has been multiplying the number of enemies without giving them anything in return for the increasing odds now against them.

The submarine campaign has not produced the results promised. After five months England is as far from starvation as ever. Five months ago the German government was assuring its people that victory through ruthless submarine warfare was so inevitable that Germany could well afford to drive the United States into war in order to obtain a free hand at sea. The submarine has failed to accomplish the results that were so eagerly expected, all the military, financial and economic resources of the United States have been thrown into the scale on the side of the Allies. Russia has been rehabilitated in a military way, France and Great Britain have drawn a new inspiration from American support, discontent in Austria-Hungary has steadily increased and the German government's pledges of victory have gone to protest.

The temper of the people is reflected in the morale of the army, which is fighting with little of its former vigor and elan, as recent results on both the eastern and western fronts show. So long as a decisive German victory seemed probable, or possible, the German troops hesitated at no sacrifice, but that spirit grows weaker and weaker. A whole people cannot be indefinitely deceived as to the prospects of victory in the war. While the German troops were winning success the German people were capable of believing anything that their rulers told them, but it is different when the war takes a definite defensive turn and the enemy returns to the assault with new vigor and assurance.

No other country is so susceptible to psychological manipulation as Germany, but there are limits to the German capacity for unquestioned belief, and it has been evident from the German press that those limits have been reached. As the economic and military pressure increases, popular unrest will increase, regardless of political palliative adopted by the Kaiser and his advisers.

Germany is already beaten in this war so far as the original objects of the conflict are concerned, and the German people are beginning to realize it. When they thoroughly understand it, peace will not be far distant.—New York World.

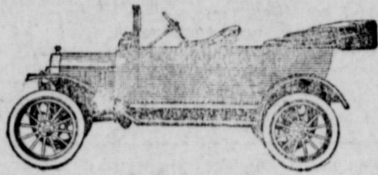

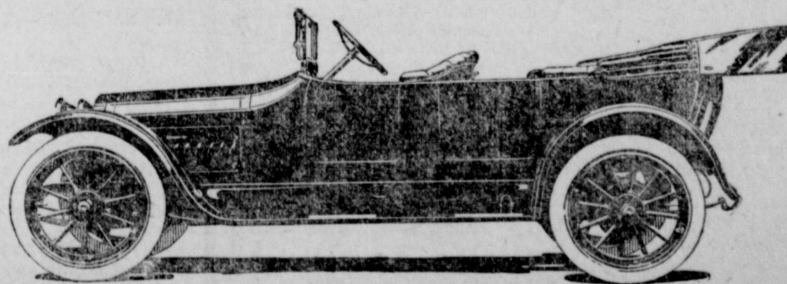

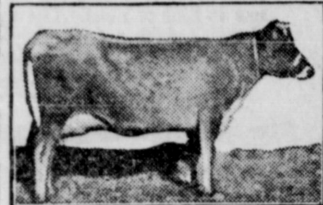

GOOD FEEDING ALWAYS PAYS

Poor and Skinny Young Cow Can Be Made to Produce Milk and Butter of Quality.

Often the young cow that is poor and skinny can be made to produce a lot of milk and butterfat. Professor Erf of Ohio State university told of such an instance. A young Jersey cow had been bred in the southern part of



Superior Milk Specimen.

Ohio and fed only the poorest kind of feed. Under these conditions she produced about 2,200 pounds of milk a year. Now, under different management, she is producing 12,000 pounds of 5 per cent milk! Good feed and proper management made the difference.

SUCCESS IN DAIRY BUSINESS

One of Best Breeds Should Be Selected and Followed, That Herd May Become Uniform.

For best success in the dairy business one of the dairy breeds should be selected and followed, that the herd may become uniform, care being taken to get good cows with which to start. There is more difference in the cows of any breed than there is in the different breeds, says one writer.

A profit can only be expected from good cows, so better start with five good cows than 20 poor ones. With five you will find satisfaction, less work and more profit. If you expect to raise the helper calves for future use be sure they are not only sired by a registered bull, but that his pedigree for great production of milk and butter runs back for five or more generations on both sides.

We cannot all see our way clear to begin with registered cows of high merit. Good grades can usually be bought costing but little more than scrubs and by careful breeding a herd will soon be raised which will be both a pleasure and a profit.

KEEP MILK IN HOT WEATHER

Whether Intended for Table or Creamery It Must Be Sweet to Secure Highest Prices.

It is no trick at all to keep milk sweet in cold weather, but in hot weather it must be handled very carefully. Whether the milk or cream is intended for the table, the creamery, or the milk market, it must be sweet if it is to bring the best price. To keep the milk sweet just two simple things must be very carefully looked after:

1. It must be cooled as completely and as quickly after milking as possible; and,

2. Absolute cleanness of pails, cans, and cows must be secured. Scurring takes place because little invisible plants called bacteria get into it in dirt or by lurking in the corners and seams of poorly cleaned pails and cans. The remedy is plain. Keep the bacteria out by using seamless pails and cans and seeing that absolutely no dirt or dust gets into the milk in the stable or anywhere else.

WHOLESOME WATER FOR COW

Whether in Barn or Pasture, Animals Should Have Free Access to Fresh Supply Twice Daily.

The average cow under normal conditions will drink about nine or ten gallons of water daily. Whether in the pasture or in the barn, cows should have access to an abundance of fresh water twice daily. Unless there are good flowing springs, the best water comes from wells and may be pumped by windmills or gas engines. It is unwholesome for them to drink from stagnant ponds or streams, but clean, running streams are not objectionable.

REMOVE ALL DISEASED COWS

Animals Not in Healthy Condition Should Be Taken From Herd and Milk Kept Separate.

Cows not in healthy condition should be removed from the herd and their milk kept separate until the animals are restored to normal health. Milk from diseased cows should not be used for human food. Serious udder trouble, causing garget or bloody milk, must be cured before the milk is usable.

LESSON FOR JULY 29

GOD'S GRACIOUS INVITATION.

LESSON TEXT—Isaiah 55:1-11.
GOLDEN TEXT—Seek ye the Lord while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near.—Isa. 55:6.

The Bible is throughout a forward looking book. No matter how dark the light, it looks forward to the dawn of a new and better day. Whenever written, the prophet looks forward toward the end of the Babylonian exile. Isaiah died about 142 years before that event. That scene is laid in Babylon. Isaiah prophesied in Jerusalem.

1. The invitation, (vv. 1-8) In order to understand the fullness and blessedness of this invitation, we should read in its connection chapters 53 and 54. In chapter 53 we have a prophecy and vision of the Messiah, making his atonement for sins, "wounded for our transgressions." Again we have in this connection a picture of the Messiah as our leader and Savior. In chapter 55 we have the invitation and joyous welcome to the beautiful city which he is establishing for us.

(1) Who is invited? The word "Ho" is perhaps an abbreviation of the word "Hold," used to attract attention. This invitation is extended to every one: (a) the "thirsty," to those who are needy; (b) the poor and the rich; those "without money," and the supply is abundant, even as the water. Every one is invited without limitation or distinction. The greatness of a man's spirit is measured by the numbers of his desires and thirsts, by their qualities and by his capacities or the intensity of his thirst. Those invited were to have "wine," a luxury, and "milk," a staple necessity, without money and without price. The currency of the kingdom of Heaven is grace (v. 1).

(2) Who Will Come? (v. 3). Only those who are listening and who are attentive. Many fall of eternal life because they do not pay attention to the claims of religion. "Come unto me," (Matt. 11:28). We go to God for salvation and help, and we find life. Life is more than mere existence. It is the natural, harmonious, joyous activity of every part of our being. The result of coming is, "your soul shall live," and the surety of it is, "an everlasting covenant." Literally, an agreement with promises which can never be broken, namely, "the sure mercies of David." (See II Sam. 12:29; I Cor. 17:7-27; Ps. 89:1-4; also Luke 20:41, 44). We are bought but we did not pay the price. The mercies of David are the antitype of our Savior; the mercy of grace. True satisfaction is in its right order. (See vv. 2, 3). Christ is a faithful witness, the exalted one, (v. 5) to this covenant.

(3) When to Come (v. 6). While he may be found, and while he is near, implying a time when he may not be found and a time when he will not be near. All of God's promises are conditional.

(4) The Way to Come (v. 7). Forsake open sin, turn from unrighteous thought, turn to the Lord and receive his "multiplied pardon." Man is everywhere depicted in the Scriptures as wandering away from the true God and there is no salvation if we insist on continuing in sin.

11. The Transformation (vv. 8-13). God's promises have back of them all the power of the universe and are as certain as the process of the seasons. In working out his transformation in the character of man, we are to think his thoughts after him. We see and know only very little of this spirit, but God sees, knows and controls the universe, which is at his command. (I Cor. 10:13; Phil. 4:19). We are to enter into his ways, and his ways are as the heavens, higher than those of the earth. Having entered into his ways we are to bring his fruits (see John 15). If the Divine seed (v. 11) is implanted within us, then we may expect to see the fruits of the kingdom of God, which are born of the spirit. (Gal. 5:22-26). This transformation involves service, for we are to have a mission, "go out to all the earth," being led by the Messiah and thus receive "joy and peace." As sure as "the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven and returneth not but watereth the earth," so is the seed of the Word in the hands of the sower, to become bread to the eater. As we go forth we have his promise (v. 11) that, "it shall not return void but shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

As a result the "thorns" (evil) shall be displaced by "fig trees" (good). God's word bears fruit in implanted lives. (John 6:33; James 1:18; I Peter 1:23). God calls this word, which is spoken of by the prophet, "My word." What the prophet says, God says. What an inspired man says, God inspires him to say. God's promise will be consummated in redeeming society, as well as redeeming creation (vv. 12, 13; Ch. 35:10; 40:9, 10; 51:11; Jer. 31:12-14; Isa. 35:1, 2). The language about the mountains and hills breaking forth into singing, is interpreted in Psalms 65:11, 13.

EFFECT OF INSECTS ON WAR

Relationship Is Closer Than Most People Realize, According to U. S. Bureau of Entomology.

Entomology, that branch of zoology which treats of insects, has a much closer relation to war problems than most people realize, and the bureau of entomology has asked that pamphlets, circulars, posters, leaflets, etc., pertaining to war phases of the field of science be sent to its office in Washington, so that they can be assembled and classified for future reference, says Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Among the questions that properly come under this head and have a bearing on the war are those pertaining to the attacks of insects on crops, the prevention of mosquitoes, insects in food and water, and so on. While many publications will not possess material of special scientific value, all will at least have a historic interest.

FULLER CALLS SPECIAL SESSION OF HOUSE

WHETHER GOVERNOR SHALL BE IMPEACHED IS SUBJECT FOR CONSIDERATION.

AUGUST 1 IS THE DATE FIXED

Governor Ferguson Will Make Statement After Considering Text of Call Thoroughly.

Houston.—Speaker F. O. Fuller of the Texas house Monday afternoon issued a call for a special session of the house to convene at Austin at noon, Aug. 1, "to consider whether or no: the house of representatives will consider a bill of impeachment against the governor of Texas, the charges to be thereafter tried by the Texas senate."

At the same time affidavits were made public as to how Speaker Fuller and Lieutenant Governor Hobby voted for the location of the West Texas A. & M. college, swearing that they did not vote for Abilene on either the first or second ballots. Beyond the issuance of the call and his affidavit Speaker Fuller refused to give out any further statement at this time. Governor Hobby also refused to further comment on the situation beyond what he had to say under oath in his affidavit.

Governor James E. Ferguson when asked for a statement at his summer home at Buena Vista, over long distance phone, said:

"I do not care to make any statement about the statement reported to have been made by Speaker Fuller and Lieutenant Governor Hobby until I am furnished with either the original or an authenticated, certified copy of the affidavit, made and executed legally by these two gentlemen. I want to see these purported affidavits. Then I will tell the whole truth to the people of Texas about this A. & M. matter."

France May Send Wounded to U. S.

Washington.—Wounded soldiers of France and England may be brought to the United States for treatment and for convalescence. War department officials have had the question under consideration for some time, and it is learned that adoption of the plan is probable. It has also been suggested that German prisoners may be brought to America instead of holding them in camps in France or England. The care of the prisoners and the wounded here would materially lessen the burden of feeding them.

Raiders Kill 11 on English Coast

London.—Another daylight raid, carried out over the east coast of England Sunday morning, resulted in the repulse of about 20 German airplanes after they had dropped a number of bombs over Felixstowe and Harwich, killing 11 persons and injuring 26. Before the Germans could reach the city they were attacked heavily by defending squadrons of air craft, which speedily caused them to change their minds and beat a hasty retreat. So far as reported, none of the Germans were brought down.

Germans Fall in Champagne Attack

Grand Headquarters of the French Army in France.—The watchword of the French troops at Verdun, "They shall not pass," has applied equally to the Champagne, and the French showed the crown prince's army that the Chemin des Dames was a closed road to it. Sunday the Germans made, in great force, their fortieth attempt since the French captured Craonne, May 4, to get possession of the famous road. This effort, one of their biggest offensive movements since Verdun, failed.

Canadians Succeed in Trench Raid

British Headquarters in France.—The Canadians carried out a daring and highly successful raid Monday morning on German trenches southeast of Avion. After heavy artillery preparation the raiding party forced its way to the second line of German defenses along a front of 700 yards, where it made determined assaults on strongly fortified German dugouts along the Avion-Merincourt railway. According to latest reports most of these positions were rendered untenable.

American Steamer Sinks U-Boat

Paris.—An American steamer recently sank a large German submarine in the English channel, according to a dispatch to the Temps from Havre. While on a voyage from the United States the steamer was attacked by a submarine and replying to its fire sent 35 shells at the underwater boat, which assumed a perpendicular position and disappeared beneath the water.

Kerensky Has Unlimited Power

Petrograd.—The council of workmen and soldiers' delegates and peasants of all Russia have voted to grant the government of Premier Kerensky "unlimited powers" under the title of "government of national safety" for the re-establishment of public order, both at the front and at home. The sweeping new powers were granted to the provisional government in a resolution adopted by a combined sitting of the executive committee of the two councils.

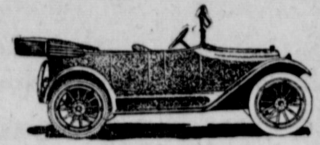
