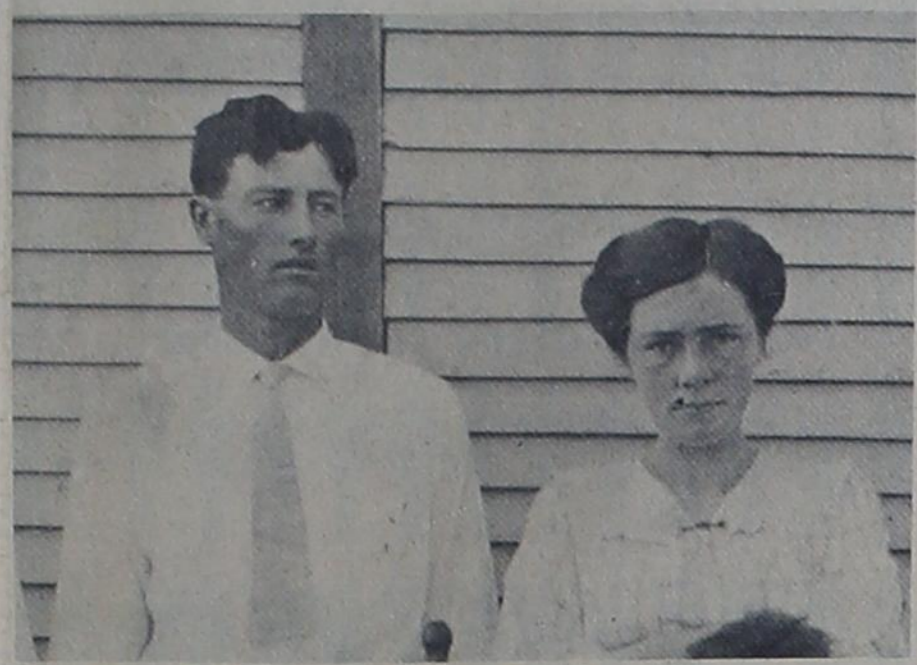


HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT



Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Barkley

Turning back the pages of time again we visit with our pioneer families of Hansford County as Highlights from the Past to the Present continues down memory lane. This week the subject of our story centers in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Muncy (Monsieur F.) Barkley.

Our story this week begins in Franklin, Kentucky where Monsieur F. Barkley was born. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Barkley. At an early time in his life at the age of only two he moved with his parents to Nashville, Tennessee where the family settled. In only three years after the move, Mrs. Thomas Barkley passed away leaving the small lad with his father and brother. Only two years later Mr. Thomas Barkley died. The young son Monsieur F. Barkley was only seven years of age and made his home with his aunt and uncle in Nashville.

Upon reaching manhood, Mr. Barkley had the desire to be on his own and to provide for himself. When eighteen years of age he boarded a train and set out west to the unimproved section of the United States. He arrived in Guymon, Oklahoma in 1908. A wagon leading south, driven by Clarence Martin, brought Mr. Barkley to Hansford County for the first time. Finding a horse he continued on for thirteen miles in search for work and also to see his relatives, at the Chris Hancock place. Becoming an employee on this farm and ranch, Mr. Barkley made \$25 per month plus room and board.

Still with a desire to have something of his own and a start on his own, he began to strive for this goal and bought three head of Mares in 1910. As the year of 1911 arrived he took his first step and rented a section of farm land from J. H. Harris. The land being located some three miles southeast of Spearman. It was with this connection that he became acquainted with Margie Harris the daughter of his land-lord, and the couple soon became sweethearts, and were married.

Margie Harris was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Harris. She was born in Donley County some sixteen miles north of Clarendon where the town of Jerico was once located. When she was seven years of age the family moved to Groom. While still a small child Margie Harris accompanied her parents to Hansford County from Groom. On September 15, 1905 the family arrived at their new home southeast of the present town of Spearman.

The Harris family moved in three covered wagons from Groom in four or five days. The Canadian River was the most treacherous part of the journey and the memories of crossing that river stands out in the minds of the families. They crossed at Plemons and of course there was no bridge. There were places in the river where quick sand lay and also places where the water would almost run into the wagon bed. There were men at the river at all times to help the families across with their wagons. During their trip the family slept on the ground at night and ate their meals from the camp fires which they built on the prairies.

When the Harris family arrived in Hansford County their home was a half-dugout and they lived here until their house was built. Miss Barkley attended school in Groom until their move and then she attended the Micou school which was 2½ miles from home. She rode horse-back until her brother Ben, was old enough to go to school and the two children took the buggy. In 1910 the Harris family moved to Amarillo where they lived for two years but they returned to Hansford County. At this time Margie Harris and Monsieur Barkley met and were married on October 6, 1912.

The couple made their home on the rented half section which Monsieur Barkley was farming. Wheat was the main crop for the family but feed was also an important crop. There was no railroad at the time and the grain after harvest was freighted to Texhoma to market. All farming and freighting was done with teams of mules or horses. At harvest the wheat would be headed and then threshed and then would be ready to be taken to market. Mr. Barkley would haul the wheat in wagons and the trip would take four days and nights. Camping out on the prairie, he would sleep on a bed of comforts or quilts on the ground. Many times he would wake up to find the bed

laying with snow or water around following a storm. Enough food would be taken from home to last until he reached Texhoma and then he would return with a food supply for the trip back. Upon returning he would bring food for the family which would be supplies bought by the 100 pound sacks or cases. He also brought the coal back. The family had no electricity, and heated their home as well as cooked on a coal stove. Their lights were coal oil lamps.

The family had their own meat and would butcher and cure their hogs. Mrs. Barkley would make their soap from the rendered lard and also had her own garden. She recalls that she never had to water the garden, that the rains supplied the needed moisture.

Nine children were born to the couple, the oldest, Hugh, died at the age of 21 months. The remaining eight are Herman, Harry, Howard, Estelle, Dayton, Doyle, Lera Mae and Leslie.

In 1920 the family moved to their farm eight miles northwest of the present town of Gruver. Herman, Harry and Howard attended the Grand Plains school until 1928 when the Gruver school was established. At that time Herman was in the seventh grade. All the children completed their education in Gruver and were graduates of Gruver High School. In 1938 Mr. and Mrs. Barkley and their children moved to Gruver and made their home here.

Mr. Barkley died June 25, 1954 in the Sanford Hospital of Perryton after a prolonged illness. Mrs. Barkley makes her home in their early established house in Gruver.

Four sons of the family served in the Second World War, and were all over seas. Herman was in the Air Force; Dayton, Marines; Howard and Doyle, Army. C. P. Archer, the Barkley's son-in-law, was stationed in France at the time of his death; he was the husband of Estelle and left one small daughter and his wife after his death.

Herman married Gladys of San Francisco, California and he is a salesman for Macys in Sunnyvale, California. The couple have two children.

Harry married Billie Dean Cline of Gruver and the couple have two children and make their home in Gruver where he farms.

The next son Howard married Verna Tomlinson of the Kimball community and have five children. They live in the Kimball community where he farms.

Their daughter, Estelle is married to Olen Chambers of Spearman and the couple have two children aside from Estelle's first daughter.

The son, Dayton, married June Jackson of Spearman. Dayton farms and the couple live west of Gruver and have four children. Doyle married Pat Duncan of Amarillo and they have one son and make their home in Gruver where Doyle farms.

Lera Mae married Allen Beasley of Gruver and the couple has three children. The youngest son, Leslie married Sharon Ayres of Gruver and they make their home in Gruver where he farms and they have two children.

Mrs. Barkley has twenty-two grandchildren and one great grandchild. Mrs. Barkley is an active member of the Gruver Methodist Church and is also active in other civic activities.

Yes, again we visited in a pioneer family home and have seen how our early pioneers struggled and strived to see our futures bright and prosperous. The Barkley family helped to make Hansford County the prosperous area it is today.

Burial Held For Fred Smith

Glen Fred Smith, 67, died Sunday December 13th in the Veterans Hospital of Amarillo after a prolonged illness. Mr. Smith, better known as "Smithy", has made his home in Gruver for some thirty years.

Burial in Wakita, Oklahoma was the middle part of the week under the direction of the Thomas Funeral

Home.

Mr. Smith was a veteran of World War I. Since living in Gruver he has been associated with the Texaco Wholesale as an employee and has been a bookkeeper for the Gruver Elevators. He made his home in Spearman before moving to Gruver.

He is survived by a niece, Mrs. C. L. Oliver of Attica, Kansas and a nephew, Joe Smith of Del Rio, Texas.

Townsmen Meet To Discuss Nightwatchman

Some thirty-five citizens and businessmen gathered Thursday night to discuss the need for a night watchman, or city marshal for the town. The majority were in favor of the idea.

Sheriff J. B. Cooke and Deputy Sheriff Orville Walker were on hand and answered questions which arose among the group. The two county officials, favored the idea and related several needs for the town to have some form of police

force. Sheriff Cooke commented that in most situations there was one law enforcement man to every 1,000 people. Gruver's population would be about 1,550.

It was decided that a raise in the city taxes would be the way to provide for a man. At the general election there will be an issue on the ballot, so each voter may express his opinion by voting on the taxes to provide for law enforcement.

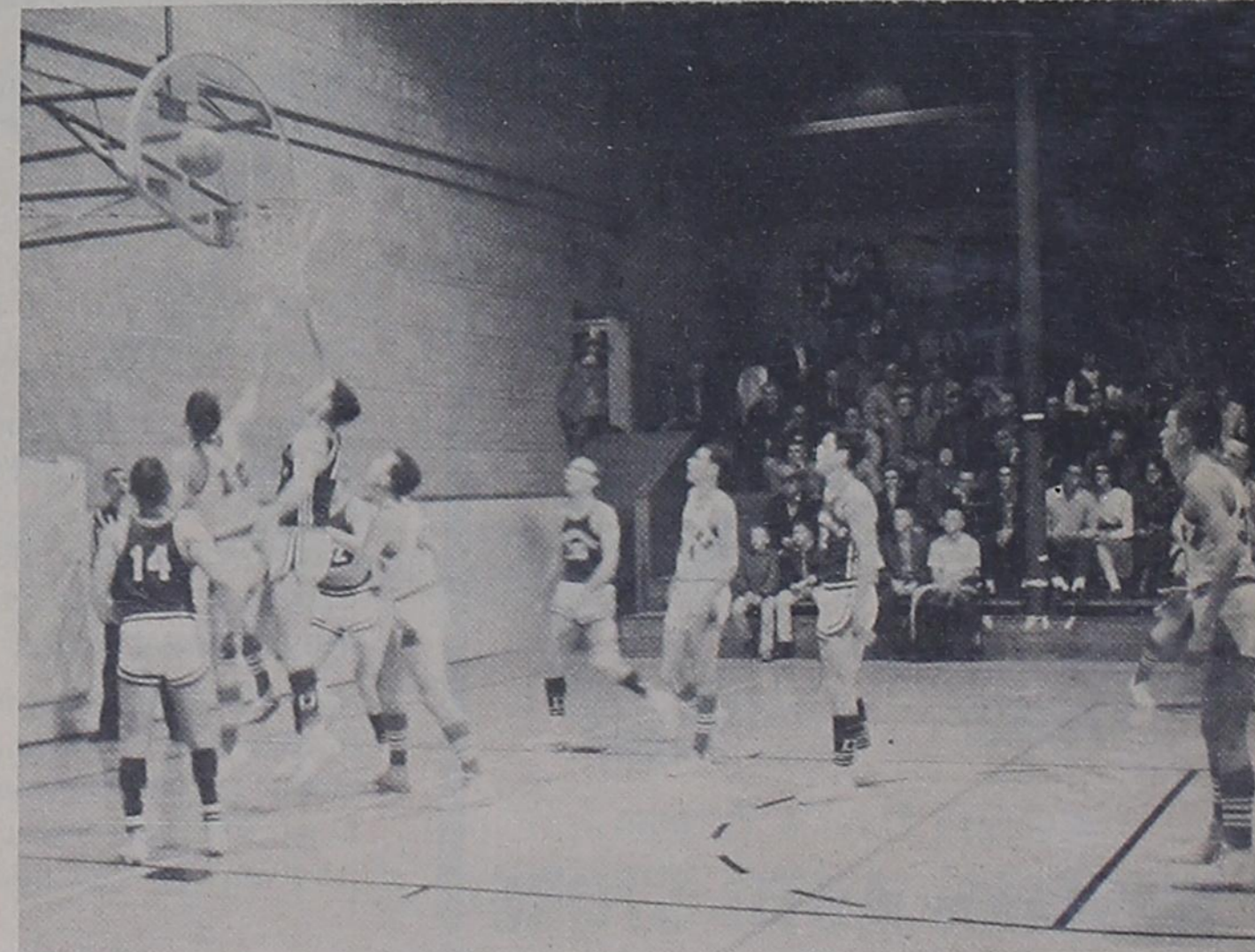
ABOUT TOWN

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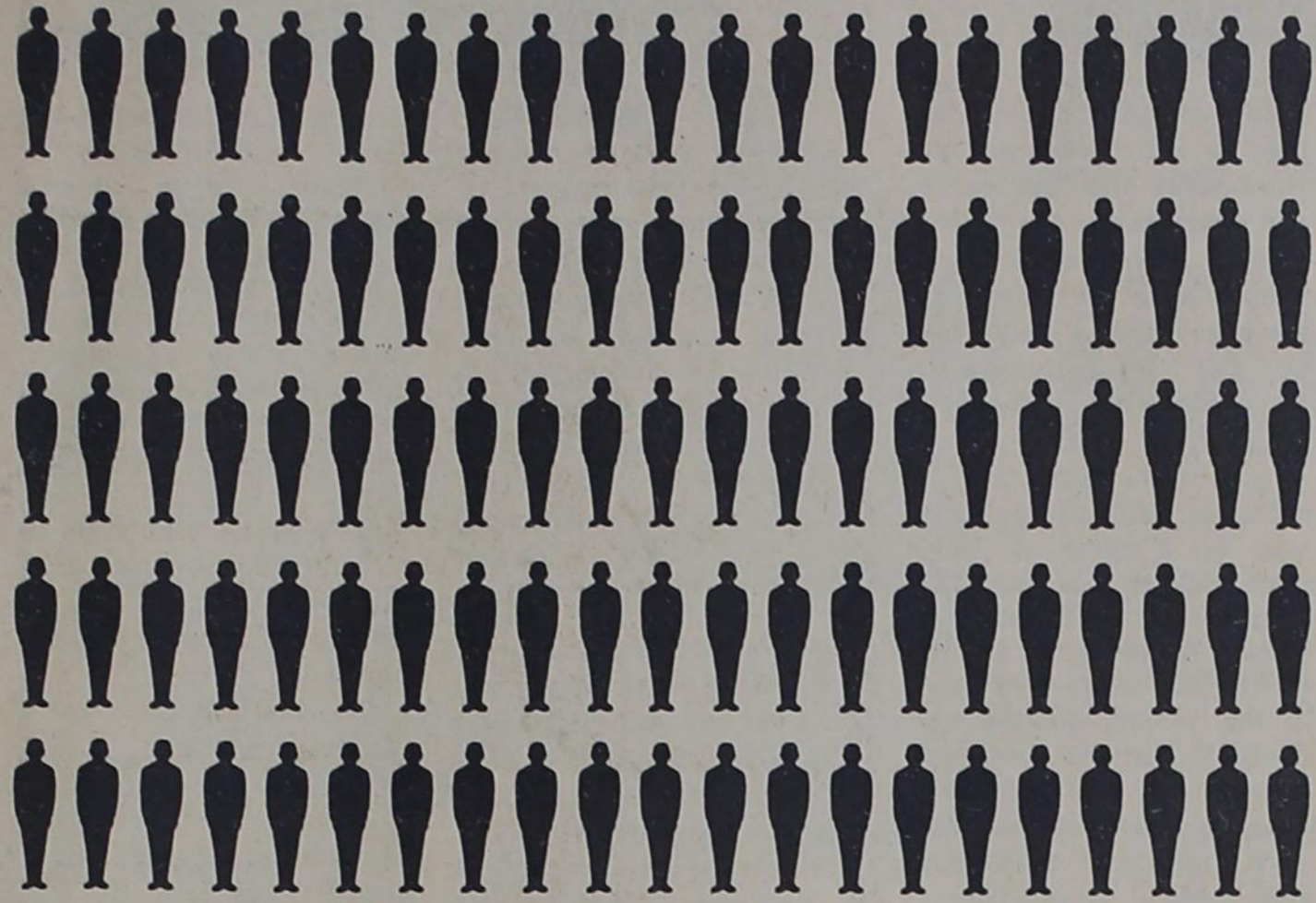
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OPERATION "DEATHWATCH" DEC. 24 thru JAN. 3 ESTIMATE 105 MOTORCIDES

"The Gruver School System is progressive and modern. It is a pleasure to work with congenial people in such nice surroundings."

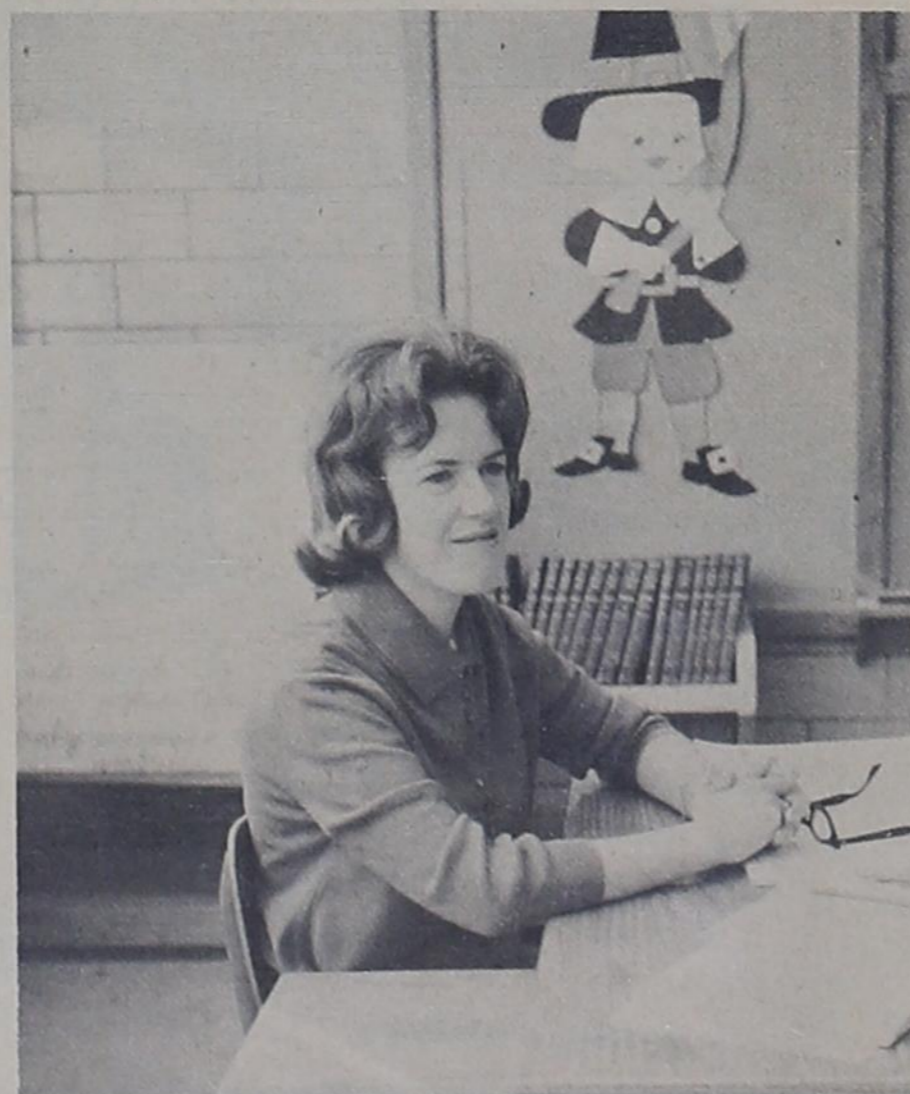

If we want Him through the day.

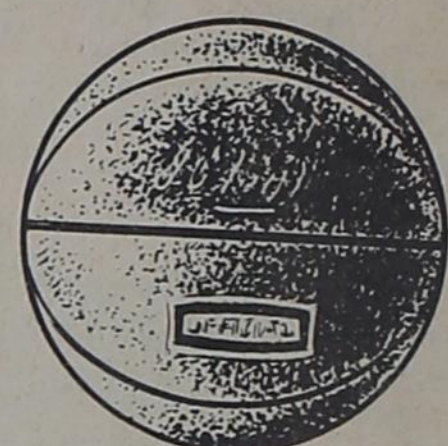

COUNTY AGENTS REPORT

by Robert Adamson

Middle age is that period between juvenile delinquency and senior citizenship when you have to take care of yourself.

ERADICATE LICE

Lice are busy with their annual invasion of Texas livestock and will take a sizeable chunk of producers' profits again this year unless controlled.

These pests appear in greatest numbers during

fall and winter, and losses can be reduced materially if control measures are taken now, says Weldon Newton, associate Extension entomologist, Texas A and M University.

Animals infested with the parasites usually are restless, eat less, do not have good feed conversion and have a rough, coarse appearance.

Sprays recommended for

controlling lice on beef and nonlactating dairy animals include Ciodrin, Coumaphos (Co-Ral), methoxychlor, malathion, dioxathion (Delnav), lindane, Ruelene, carbaryl (Sevin), ronnel (Korlan) and toxaphene.

Newton recommends these formulations: Ciodrin, pyrethrin and rotenone.

Irritation induced by lice on sheep and goats causes the animals to rub or bite themselves. Thus wool or mohair may be pulled out or become matted or low in grade.

A thorough spraying, immersing or dusting is suggested for ridding sheep and goats of these pests. Coumaphos (Co-Ral), DDT, dioxathion (Delnav), toxaphene, Diazinon, malathion and ronnel (Korlan) are effective controls, says Newton, but should not be used on milk goats. Lindane, as well as methoxychlor, is specified for use on milk goats.

The blood-sucking lice occurring on swine can be controlled by such insecticides as coumaphos (Co-Ral), DDT, dioxathion (Delnav), malathion, lindane, ronnel (Korlan), methoxychlor and toxaphene.

To control these tiny parasites on horses, the entomologist suggests chlordane, coumaphos (Co-Ral), dioxathion (Delnav) and toxaphene.

Poultry are also attacked by several species of lice that irritate the birds and cause weight loss, reduced egg production, decreased quality of market birds and even death. Coumaphos (Co-Ral), malathion, carbaryl (Sevin) and

nicotine sulfate all rate as good controls.

In using insecticide formulations, Newton stresses the importance of following the manufacturer's recommendations and observing all safety restrictions.

More detailed information on the control of lice and other external parasites is found in Extension publication, MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry," available at my office.

COLORED FIREPLACE "LOGS"

You can add something special, colored flames in your fireplace, for more Christmas cheer provided you start now. The "sparkling joy logs" which can add the color are easy to make.

To make the "logs", roll newspapers or absorbent paper into "logs" about 16 inches long. Don't use too many newspapers in a "log" because they swell when soaked in the chemical solution. The "logs" should be tied loosely with heavy twine.

To make the chemical solution which gives the color, dissolve four pounds of bluestone, blue vitriol or sulphate of copper and

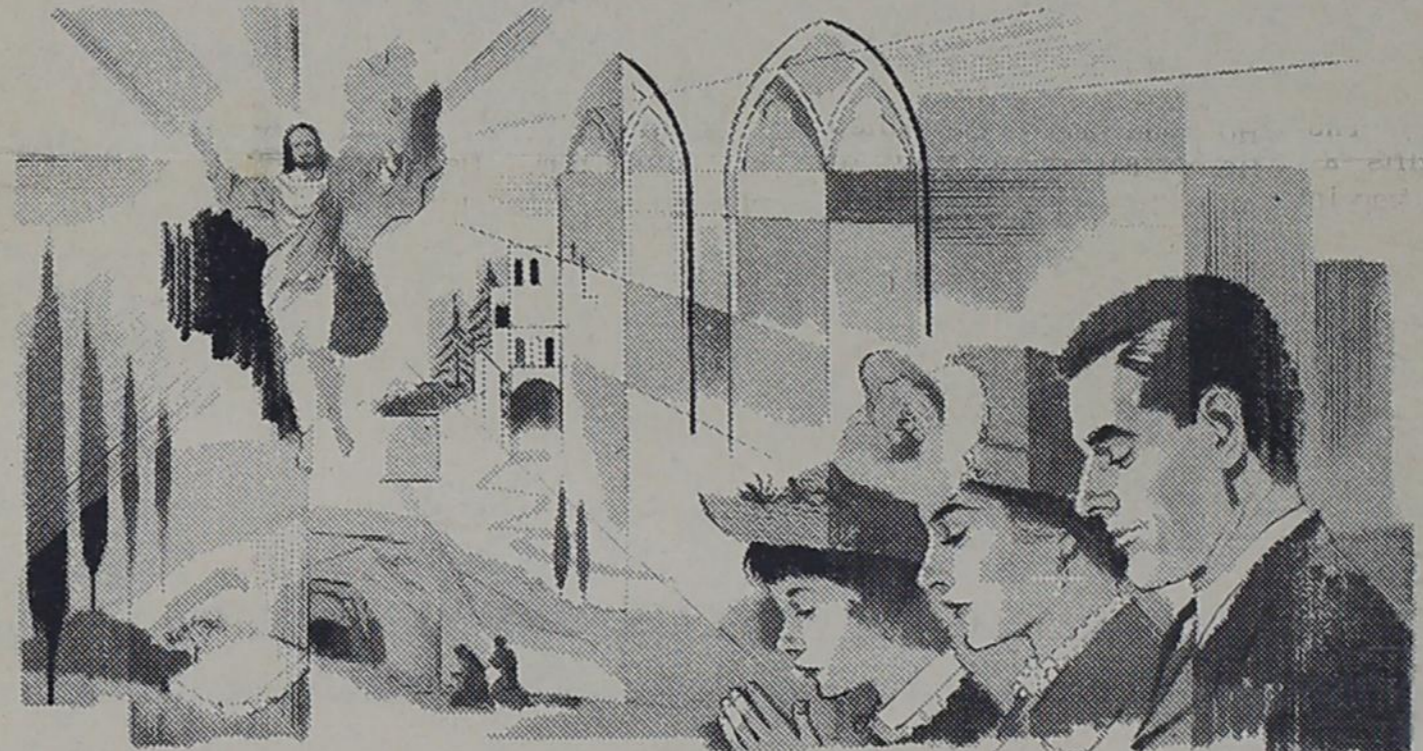

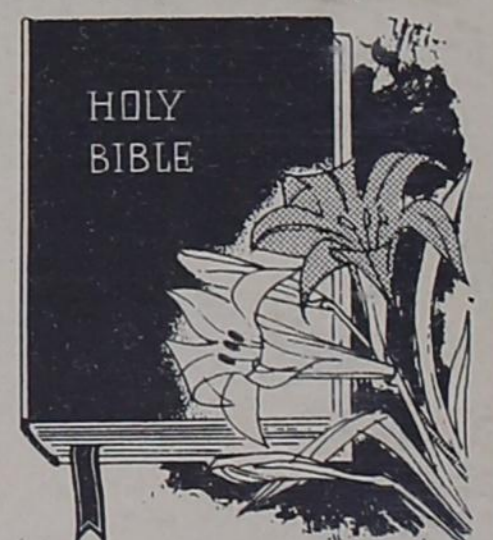

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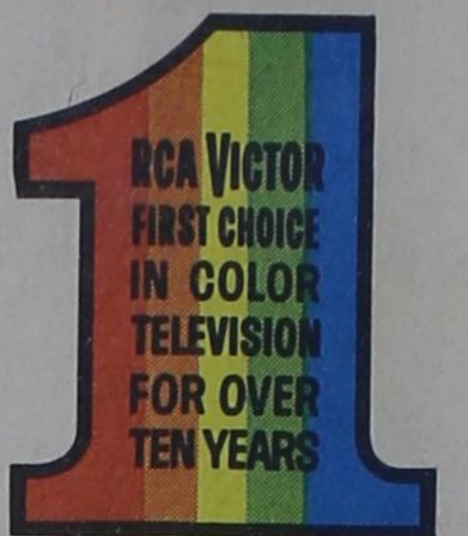
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
